## Calendula, Campfire

## ASPARAGUS SEED <br> Asperge Epargel Esparrago

Cover manure with about 1 inch of soil, then place crowns 15 inches apart, with roots straightened, and cover roots or crowns to level of land.


## BUSH BEANS

Haricots<br>Bohnen<br>Habicbuelas

Culture.-Beans are tender to frost, but it often pays to take some risk for the sake of earliness. Plant in warm, loamy soil at the beginning of settled weather in spring, and at intervals for succession until August. Rows may be made 2 feet apart and the Beans should be planted not over 1 inch deep, several inches apart in the drills; or three or four Beans in hills 6 to 8 inches apart. Cultivate and hoe frequently when the vines are perfectly dry. In hoeing, draw the soil up toward the plants. For String Beans, gather the pods clean when they are fit for use. The plants will bear all the longer.
Weight of seed Beans by Parcel Post including packing: Pt. 2 lbs., qt. 3 lbs., 4 qts .9 lbs ., pk. 17 lbs . Sow 1 pound of Beans to 100 feet of drill; 60 lbs . to the acre

A top-dressing of poultry manure, ashes, some good fertilizer or some good compost around the plants will be of much benefit in hastening maturity and increasing the yield. Sow 2 lbs. to 150 hills; 20 to 24 lbs. to the acre

## BEET

## Betterave Salatrübe Remolacba

Culture.-Rich, well-drained, fibrous loam will insure a good Beet crop. For early table Beets, make drills 16 to 20 inches apart and sow the seed about 1 inch deep, as early as the ground can be put in shape, or seed may be sown under glass four weeks earlier and the young seedlings transplanted to open ground, for an extra-early crop.

Give thorough, clean cultivation, and thin the plants to stand 2 inches apart in the row. For succession, sow at intervals to the middle of July. For earliest sowings, a light dressing of nitrate of soda, 100 pounds per acre, will sometimes work wonders.

## CABBAGE

## Repollo Ropffohl Cbou pomme

Culture.-Early Cabbage requires a rich, warm Ioam, welldrained. The soil for late Cabbage should be heavier, more retentive of moisture, and not so rich, as the heads are liable to burst.

To have Cabbage very early, sow seed in hotbed in February; or winter over in a coldframe. For this purpose the seed is sown from September 10 to 20. Four to five weeks after sowing they will be fit to transplant into the coldframes. It is very important that the plants be set down to the first leaves so that the stem is all under the ground, otherwise it would be split by frost.

These early Cabbage plants are set out in March or April, in rows 3 feet apart and $11 / 2 \mathrm{ft}$. between the plants. They mature in June. For second-early crop, sow seed first week in April and plant out in May. This crop matures in July and August. Late Cabbage for fall and winter use should be sown May to June. The plants are set in July with 3 feet between the rows and 2 feet between the plants. This crop matures in October. Cabbage should not be planted two years in succession in the same ground.

Culture.-Sow the Iast of March or early April in rich, mellow ground in shallow drills well pressed down, watering freely in dry weather. Pinch back the seedlings once or twice before planting out, to make them stocky. When 5 to 6 inches high, transplant the dwarf varieties in rows 3 feet apart and the taller sorts to rows 4 feet apart, 6 inches apart in the rows. Cultivate well and when large enough, blanch by earthing up. The first operation is that of "handling," generally done by the beginning of September. After the soil has been drawn up with the hoe, it is placed around each plant by hand to keep the leaves firm in upright position and prevent spreading., When plants have become "set" and are wanted for early use, they should be "banked." This is done by throwing the soil up as close to the plants as possible with a plow and finishing it with a spade, bringing the earth nearly up to the tops of the plants. The method employed now for protecting it is by covering the tops of the banks with waterproof paper.

## RADISH

## Rabanos Mabiej Radis

GENERAL CULTURAL DIRECTIONS. To get an early start seeds can be sown indoors in shallow boxes or seed-pans, not over 3 inches deep. About 1 inch of rough material should be placed in the bottom, and on top of this another inch of fine sifted soil. After the surface has been smoothed and lightly pressed, sow the seed evenly and cover lightly with soil. Then press firmly and water very carefully in order not to wash the seeds out of the ground. Cover the box with a pane of glass, keep in a temperature of about 65 degrees, and water carefully as needed. As the seedlings grow, the glass can be removed and the plants transplanted into other boxes or small pots from which they may be planted in the open ground when the weather is favorable. Before sowing seed outdoors, the ground should be thoroughly spaded and raked until it is as smooth and fine as possible. The seeds should be covered three or four times their diameter in order to prevent rains from washing them out. Do not sow seeds of tender plants until all danger of frost is over.

Culture - Early planting is necessary to raise the best Sweet Peas, as it gives the plants opportunity to develop deep root systems to sustain them during the hot days. Sweet Peas may also be sown in the autumn, covering the bed with a heavy mulch over winter removing it very early, before the frost is entirely out of the ground.

## Hardy Perennial and Biennial Flower Seeds

## HARDY LILIES

Most Lilies seem to thrive best when planted in a situation where the ground can be kept cool and moist by the protection of shrubs and a carpet of lawn-grass cuttings. Cültural Directions. A good average garden soil will produce wonderful flowers. It should be well drained and thoroughly loosened to a depth of 8 to 10 inches. Plant the tubers so that they are about 6 inches below the top of the ground. Either animal or commercial fertilizer may be used but care should be taken not to let it touch the roots. A handful of commercial fertilizer may be mixed with the soil at planting and another handful or two hoed in during the growing season. To obtain exhibition flowers, disbud all but a few of the buds, thus throwing all the strength of the plant into a few flowers. Cultivate continuously throughout the growing season.

## Hardy Flowering Shrubs

Shrubs are very necessary in planting the home-grounds. They can be used in many ways, as a dividing-line between the lawn and the vegetable- or flower-garden, hiding unsightly buildings, a background for the flower garden, or foundation planting.

Dwarf varieties should be planted at least 3 feet apart and the taller ones 5 feet. As a general rule, shrubs should be pruned just after they have finished flowering. The best time to plant is early spring, as soon as the ground can be worked, until about May 10. ## Abelia

Size of Parcel that Can Be Sent by Parcel Post
Size of package that can be sent by Parcel Post cannot be over 84 inches in length and girth combined．

The rate of postage on mailable parcels of seeds，cuttings， bulbs，roots and plants，weighing 8 ounces or less，shall be 1 cent for each 2 ounces or fraction thereof，regardless of distance，and on those weighing more than 8 ounces the pound rates shown in table shall apply．

## Weights by Parcel Post

Parcels up to 70 pounds can be sent by Parcel Post in the Iocal，first，second and third Zones，and up to 50 pounds in all other Zones．

To points farther than the Second Zone，on weight of over 10 pounds，the charge by freight or express is usually more economical．
