THE resources of this Charity are mainly spent in the relief of the Sick Poor of Paddington, Kensington and Marylebone.

These three parishes, among the richest in London, contain, nevertheless, a population exceeding 100,000 souls living in a state of poverty and distress scarcely paralleled certainly not exceeded—in the East End.

Thus engaged, in the midst of affluence, in relieving the sufferings of thousands of the poorest poor, the Hospital is thought by many, from its well-to-do surroundings, to be liberally supported, but this is not the fact.

The necessary Annual Expenditure is \therefore £24,000

The Reliable Income (including Dividends on Investments, Annual Subscriptions, Awards of Hospital Sunday Fund, Hospital Saturday Fund and the Prince of Wales's Hospital Fund) is only. . 10,400

Leaving an Annual Sum, for which the Hospital is dependent on casual and uncertain sources, of £13,600

The need of Funds is, therefore, most urgent, and the Board of Management earnestly ask for assistance.

There are 244 beds occupied on the average every day, and of these 244, 54 are for children, a larger number of beds than many Children's Hospitals contain.

The Hospital is Free, and no urgent case is ever refused admission.

PREFACE.

THE author very much regrets the unavoidable delay which has taken place in the production of BURDETT'S HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES this year. It is due to special circumstances, quite beyond his control, but he has now made arrangements which will provide that it shall in future be published without fail in March, 1900, and early in each succeeding year. The book has such a wide circle of readers and is so valued (the author has frequent testimony to the high estimate in which it is held) that he thinks it due to his readers to make this apology at the outset of the preface this year.

Last year we were able to show that charity towards the institutions throughout the United Kingdom had not been injuriously affected by the commemoration of the sixtieth year of Her Majesty the Queen's reign. The figures contained in the last volume of this book having excited great interest, it has been thought desirable to extend the inquiry to the year 1898, and to show in the first chapter, by the reproduction of figures from official sources, that the increase in the revenue of the voluntary hospitals in London is maintained and that the special efforts made in the Diamond Jubilee year are likely to prove a permanent benefit to voluntary institutions all over the country. It is not surprising that such a result should follow on the loyal manifestions in question, seeing that experience shows that it is far more difficult to induce a non-giver to give for the first time than to persuade any such person to continue giving after the pleasure to be derived from such liberality is once appreciated by the individual. Those who read the first chapter carefully will be struck no doubt by the circumstance that public speakers who consent to appear upon hospital platforms must be careful in future to ascertain for themselves the accuracy of the data supplied to them before committing themselves to any statement based upon them, or they are likely to seriously injure their reputation for accuracy and knowledge.

With the aid of this book so far as the general management of the finances of hospitals and charities generally is concerned, with the assistance of *Burdett's Official Nursing Directory* as far as the question of nursing matters is concerned, public men have now a library of accurate data on which to draw, which should make them independent and secure whenever they have to speak about hospitals or charities. We mention this because we are anxious to show that our warning is made in no captious spirit but with the honest desire to help both public speakers and the institutions which they support.

There is evidence in favour of the view that the principle of payment by patients at all hospitals is gaining in public favour. Heretofore it has been held that paying patients cannot be taken into a general hospital in this country because the medical staff is an honorary one, and if payment of any kind is taken the doctors must receive a fee. We entirely agree with this view, but we would point out that every difficulty could be readily overcome by pooling the whole of the money received from patients' payments, and placing those patients in separate wings to which paying patients alone are admitted, and where they can be attended, if they so desire, by their own doctors, and the members of the regular hospital staff who may be called upon to attend them. The fees of these doctors would be paid out of the percentage of the pooled money which it may be determined to set aside for that purpose. In practice, by the exercise of reasonable intelligence, the whole of the difficulties supposed to surround this question may be readily overcome; the popularity and usefulness of the great hospitals would be immensely increased, and their resources multiplied thereby. We do therefore most earnestly urge this vital change in system on the serious consideration of every intelligent manager who gives time and thought to the administration of our hospitals.

We have had many gratifying testimonies to the value which those engaged in hospital work throughout the English-speaking world attach to this book. A gentleman who had just returned from making a tour of the hospitals of the United States of America stated recently that he heard everywhere that BURDETT'S HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES was a book to which hospital experts in the States referred constantly, and from which they obtained great assistance. This is independent testimony which we greatly appreciate and value, and must be added to many similar expressions which have come to us from time to time from those most actively engaged in the manage-ment of the institutions included in this book. We feel that our indebtedness to the whole body of officials is immense, because hardly one of this great army of workers has failed to courteously co-operate with the Editor during the year, with the object of making this book accurate and complete. The spirit of co-operation grows as the years roll on. We shall take it as a great kindness if any one who is actively engaged in managing a hospital, or who has a knowledge of hospitals in any country or in any city, will kindly send us information or ask questions upon any point when a difficulty arises. There is in the United States of America a literature of the highest value which is confined entirely to pamphlets. Some of the ablest writing in the English language we have found in pamphlets of the sort we have in mind, and we should immensely appreciate the co-operation of any residents in the United States who would kindly procure and despatch every pamphlet of the kind which comes under his notice, so that the collection we have commenced may ultimately be as complete as possible.

There is one other question which we may as well deal with in the preface, and it is this. There can be no doubt that progress in hospital construction, as we have had occasion to point out, is still largely prevented by the absence of knowledge as to the procedure which it is essential for all to follow when they have to decide upon the plans of a new hospital or kindred building. It is of the first importance that any assessors to whom plans of this kind may be referred for decision should include a trained administrator with a full knowledge of the work and requirements of a great hospital. To leave the matter entirely to an architect, however able, is almost necessarily to provide a disappointment for the best informed when their hospital is built and ready for occupation. There are an infinity of details and an immensity of practical points to be borne in mind which no architect can learn for himself, and which it is therefore wholly impossible for him to provide for in any plans he may submit unless he has the assistance and guidance of a fully trained administrator of large experience.

If the matter is referred to the Royal Institute of British Architects, we understand the practice is for the Council to select the six senior architects, and to send their names down to the institution, in order to enable those concerned to select one to act as assessor. It frequently happens, we understand, that amongst the six names there may not be one single architect who has ever built a great hospital or who has really any practical knowledge of hospital construction. The only plan is to seek the co-operation of some one with large experience of hospital administration who is known to possess accurate knowledge and sound judgment, and to ask him to act as assessor, because then the Committee or individual who provides the money will have some one who can be held absolutely responsible for any omissions or faults which are found to exist after the institution is built. The money that is wasted under the present system induces us to raise our voice once more in favour of the only safe plan for prudent people to follow in these cases.

CHAPTER I.

THE CONTINUOUS GROWTH OF HOSPITAL EXPENDITURE AND HOSPITAL INCOME.

The Progress of the Voluntary Hospital System—The Evils it has to Contend Against—Enthusiasm not always a Blessing—The Continuous Growth of Hospital Expenditure—The Ever-Increasing Cost of Hospital Buildings—Increases in the Staff—Lavish Expenditure becoming the Fashion in all Departments of a Modern Hospital—The Income and Expenditure of Ninety-three Metropolitan Hospitals for the years 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897 and 1898—The Continuous Growth of Income of the London Hospitals—The Effect of the Diamond Jubilee on the Metropolitan Hospitals—The Critics of the Prince of Wales' Fund— How Legacies should be Treated—Table Showing in Detail the Income and Expenditure of Ninety-three Metropolitan Hospitals during 1894, 1895, 1896, 1897 and 1898—A New Departure—The League of Mercy: its Object and Mode of Working—The Progress already made by the League.

YEAR by year it has been our privilege to deal with the figures which show the progress or set back of the voluntary system of hospitals in detail or in bulk. Thirty years' work of this description has convinced us that the voluntary hospital system is in no danger of annihilation for want of sufficient money to keep it going. Nor is its cost likely to prove fatal to the system so long as the public are satisfied with the administration of the voluntary hospitals. The greatest evils which the voluntary hospital system has to contend with are the ill-considered and rash generalisations which find their way into print over the signatures very frequently of men who have done a good deal of work for hospitals or who are actively interested in the progress of individual institutions. Remonstrance with such persons, who suffer from an excess of sentiment and a lack of common sense and self-restraint, usually proves fatal. They have not the courage, for example, to name over their own signatures particular hospitals with the system of which they are at war, and so they recklessly speak as if the whole of the voluntary hospitals were in the parlous condition which they have convinced themselves rightly represents a true aspect of the inner working of the few institutions which they make it their pride and pleasure to condemn. One section of the critics which we have in mind devote their whole energies to the subject of nursing, and by laying down a

few arbitrary rules they are easily able to persuade themselves that every responsible hospital manager who does not at once conform to their rules, no matter what the difficulties and circumstances of a particular institution may be, deserves to be held up to public reprobation and censure. Another class of critic is persuaded that every step in the progress of scientific discovery is to be condemned on the ground that no such advance can be made without experiments, and that all experiments entail needless suffering. They say, in effect, that all new treatment should be forbidden by law, and that all who indulge in it should be consigned to the public prison, if not to the pillory or the stake.

Now, enthusiasm is an excellent quality when accompanied by self-restraint and a due sense of responsibility, but we venture to say that there are a number of very excellent people who worship sentiment to such an extent that each year their judgment becomes less robust, and so they justly fail to secure to themselves the influence which would otherwise be theirs by virtue of the amount of useful work which some of them undoubtedly do for particular charities.

The author of this book may claim the right to speak very plainly in the interests of the hospitals because his work in the cause of improved nursing, and the results which have followed his advocacy of radical changes throughout the whole economy of the voluntary hospitals entitle him to the privilege of plain speaking as occasion may require. There must be a limit to expenditure, and that limit has been more than exceeded in certain directions. For instance, when a hospital expends on an average f_{30} a bed occupied upon nursing alone, it is time for the governing authority to pause and ask themselves are they justified in increasing their expenditure in this direction. Similarly there must be a limit to the sum expended per bed upon new buildings and new hospitals. In this latter direction the increase in cost has gone up and up and up until we are within measurable distance of the time when a modern hospital with, say, 500 beds will

cost \pounds 500,000, in addition to any sum which may have been expended upon the site on which it stands. In our judgment—and we have had a very wide experience and have expended very many years in considering this question of expenditure upon new buildings from every aspect— f_{300} per bed is the outside sum which ought to be spent, and to exceed it is to sanction a wasteful outlay of public money, the cause of which must be put down to want of knowledge or courage on the part of the architect, to a want of supervision and knowledge on the part of the governing body, and to a serious failure of duty on the part of the medical staff, and especially of those members of the staff who have made themselves responsible for the plans upon which the new hospital has been built. We must be within measurable distance of the time when sensible people will refuse to give largely, if at all, to a building fund for a hospital before the plans have been settled and the contracts accepted, so that they can have before them a precise statement of the total outlay and of the accommodation which the new buildings will contain for the sick. Another direction in which expenditure is outrunning the constable lies in the engagement of a larger and larger number of employees to do the work in each institution. We have become conscious of new evils which attach to certain of our largest and best administered hospitals from the fact that the governors have been too generous in sanctioning an increase in the number of employees, for such weakness on their part in practice does not promote efficiency, but just the opposite. Wherever the number of persons employed upon a given piece of work is excessive, there the quality of the work necessarily degenerates, and the cost is excessive. It is time, therefore, that these matters should be brought to the notice of the governing bodies of British hospitals of every kind, because the continuous growth in cxpenditurc during the last twenty years has become so great that the maximum has everywhere been reached, and in some institutions it has even been exceeded. No doubt the excess in expenditure may be traced largely to the wish

to provide the maximum of comfort and efficiency in every department of the institution. It must not be forgotten, however, that a well-managed hospital must after all be conducted upon business lines or it must fail to adequately do the work it ought to accomplish in the interests of the people. Luxury is an impediment, not an assistance to the worker. It tends to diminish efficiency and to attract to the staff the least capable and the least industrious, and unless it is severely withstood it must eventuate in making an institution, where it is generally permitted, pass from a relatively high to a relatively low level of usefulness. Necessary as hospital accommodation is to the population of civilised nations, it is undoubtedly true that it may cost too much, and so fail to effect all the good it would otherwise be capable of accomplishing. We do not wish to be misunderstood. Old institutions must be renovated or renewed. It is essential that such buildings shall either be brought up to the modern standard of completeness, or that they shall be demolished, and new buildings erected in their place. This position we have always taken and shall continue to take. Where new buildings have to be erected they should be made highly efficient in all respects for the object they were designed to fulfil. All this, however, may be accomplished for a reasonable expenditure, providing those responsible for the work have the wisdom to secure capable expert advisers who are possessed of a due sense of responsibility in regard to the maximum outlay which is justifiable in such cases.

Unfortunately, lavish expenditure is becoming the fashion in every department of the modern hospital. The more money which the public give to hospital purposes, the greater seems to be the effort made to find excuses for the expenditure of larger and larger sums in every department. We take it, as the result of close observation and of full knowledge of the facts, that if in any way it were possible to place two sound men of business upon every hospital board—men who were impressed with the feeling that the present rate of expenditure is too high, the

result would be that the cost per bed, instead of increasing, would be materially reduced, to the advantage of the institutions, and without affecting in any way the comfort of the inmates or the efficiency of the work done. We hope these remarks will be thoroughly weighed by all who have at heart the permanent prosperity and perpetuation of the voluntary system of hospital support in the United Kingdom. We invite them to study the figures which are appearing in subsequent pages of this chapter, and to ask themselves plainly why it is that, whenever the volume of contributions from the public increases largely, certain institutions invariably launch out into lavish expenditure, and so persistently keep in a condition of chronic indigence, where they might, with reasonable care in the management, occupy a sound financial position. The tables on pages 68 to 71 reveal several striking instances illustrating and enforcing these remarks.

An examination of the above figures gives the following results compared with the average receipts during the three years ended 1896. The total income of ninety-three metropolitan hospitals in 1897 shows an increase of no less than £150,000, and in 1898 an increase of £203,000. Thus the ordinary income increased in 1897 by £35,500, and in 1898 by £36,700; legacies in 1897 by £62,000, and in 1898 by £78,000; and donations for special purposes by upwards of £55,000 in 1897, and £87,000 in 1898. As we said last year, such figures as these effectually dispose of the argument that the Prince of Wales' Fund has not had a beneficial effect upon the revenues of the metropolitan hospitals. The figures in the table on page 65 prove to demonstration that the prince of Wales' Fund was nothing like so great as it has become after two years' experience of the working of the Fund.

It is true that it might be argued, from the fact that the total of individual deficits between the ordinary income and the ordinary expenditure is larger in the year 1898 than in any of the previous four years, that the general prosperity of the hospitals has diminished. This argument will not bear investigation in view of the detailed figures contained in the tables on pages 68 to 71. From them it appears that nearly the whole increase in the total of individual deficits is due to the fact that the financial management of nine of the ninety-three hospitals included in the tables has been such as to permit an increase in the deficits of those institutions amounting to over £23,000. To state such a fact as this is to produce irrefutable evidence that something is lacking in the control which should be exercised over the financial administration of some of the principal hospitals mentioned in the tables. We do not for a moment contend that cause cannot be shown which may account for a portion of the huge extra deficiency referred to, but, after full allowance has been made for every circumstance, there remains the fact that no well-conducted business could prosper nor could long continue to exist if the managers did not better equalise their income and expenditure in particular years. This is a serious business question which hospital authorities must face and provide for if they are to receive an adequate measure of public support.

THE EFFECTS ON PARTICULAR HOSPITALS.

We have felt it to be desirable not to rest content with the summary of the figures which we have just been considering. If the matter were left there some people might contend that all the figures proved was that on the whole the hospitals had prospered greatly, but that particular institutions, and probably the majority of them, had suffered. In order to dispose of this point once and for all, we give on pages 68 to 71 the figures for each of the ninety-three metropolitan hospitals included in the foregoing summary. From these figures it will be seen that about 70 per cent. of the whole of the hospitals mentioned in the tables had a larger ordinary income, or a better total income in 1898, than they had in 1897. In the case of many of the hospitals included in the 70 per cent. which showed an improvement in the ordinary revenue there was a considerable improvement in the total income as well. It is satisfactory to note that this improvement in revenue is not confined merely to the general hospitals or to the special hospitals, or even to the larger special hospitals, but hospitals of every kind had an increased revenue in 1898 compared with 1897. The fact that 70 per cent. of all the hospitals had more funds at their disposal in 1898 than they had in 1897 is the more remarkable from the circumstance that the revenue of 1897 was an infinitely larger revenue in the case of the majority than the year which preceded it. Last year we called attention to the speeches of the Duke of Marlborough on behalf of the National Orthopædic Hospital and of Mr. F. A. Bevan on behalf of the St. Peter's and the Dental Hospitals. The purport of these speeches is to the effect that the Prince of Wales' Fund had injured the hospitals financially, and we condoled with these gentlemen for the errors into which they were inadvertently led, especially as such errors had been upheld as correct by the Charity Record. It is gratifying to have again to point out to the Duke of Marlborough and to Mr. F. A. Bevan that the three hospitals to which they referred, namely, the National

Orthopædic, the Dental and the St. Peter's Hospitals, have not only not been injured by the Prince of Wales' Fund, but as a matter of fact the ordinary income of the National Orthopædic Hospital was f_{100} better in 1898 than it was in 1897, the ordinary income of the Dental Hospital was £250, and of St. Peter's Hospital £300 better in 1898 than it was in 1897. Another striking instance of the loose way in which attacks are made without foundation upon a central fund is furnished by the circumstance that the ordinary income of the Royal Chest Hospital was f_{3070} better in 1898 than it was in 1897, and the total income of the same hospital showed an increase of f_{2700} in 1898 over that of the previous year. We hope that everybody who speaks or writes about this particular hospital in future will take care to verify their facts before they commit themselves to incorrect criticisms which cannot do any possible good to the individual charity in which they are interested, whilst the utterance of such statements causes speakers to do injustice to an important organisation like the Prince of Wales' Hospital Fund for London.

In the case of about 30 per cent. of those hospitals mentioned in the tables there was a falling off in the amount of ordinary income or of the total income in 1898 compared with 1897. When each hospital is taken separately, with a few exceptions, it is at once seen that the falling off is due to special causes, and it has for practical purposes no bearing upon the question as to the relative income of the individual hospitals for the two years 1897 and 1898. For instance, in the case of Charing Cross Hospital, the falling off is more apparent than real, because it is due to the circumstance that great efforts were made to raise a large sum by means of a special appeal in 1897, such efforts having been materially relaxed in 1898, and the difference is consequently due to the circumstance that there is practically no Special Appeal Fund in the latter year. In several other cases the difference is due to the fact that the legacies received in 1897 were larger than in 1898, a disadvantage under

which all voluntary charities must labour from time to time. A fact like this merely emphasises the importance of treating legacies as reserve fund and not spending more than the average receipts during the previous three years in each year so as to adjust expenditure to the estimated income, the course pursued by the more intelligently conducted institutions throughout the country.

A NEW DEPARTURE.

Satisfactory as are the figures contained in the tables which we have just had under consideration, it has long been felt that it would be an immense service to the voluntary system of hospitals throughout the metropolis if the area of givers could be widened and extended. In the letter which the Prince of Wales addressed to Londoners, dated 5th February, 1897, H.R.H. invited subscriptions of from 1s. a year and upwards from all classes to the Prince of Wales' Hospital Fund for London. He wrote : "Our attention will be concentrated upon an endeavour to secure from $f_{100,000}$ to $f_{150,000}$ in annual subscriptions from those who have not hitherto regularly contributed ". It has been pointed out that to accomplish this object successfully some organisation is required to reach the classes to whom the Prince referred. After much consideration an unanimous feeling has made itself felt that non-givers must be approached personally by means of local organisations, which under proper guidance could fully realise the end in view. A League of Mercy for London and the Home Counties, consisting of members of both sexes and all classes, has therefore been instituted, with the sanction of the Queen, under the presidency of T.R.H. the Prince and Princess of Wales, and this League was incorporated by Royal Charter in the early part of 1899.

THE LEAGUE OF MERCY,

The purpose for which the League has been established is to promote the welfare and further the objects of the Prince of Wales' Hospital Fund for London, and in every way, but especially by encouraging personal service on the part of large numbers of persons, to advance the interests and contribute towards the adequate maintenance of hospitals and other institutions for the relief of sickness and suffering, especially those institutions which are supported by voluntary subscriptions.

In connection with the League an Order called "The Order of Mercy" has been instituted; and distinguished personal service rendered to the League or otherwise in connection with the especial purposes for which the League has been established may be recognised by the bestowal of this Order.

THE CONSTITUTION OF THE LEAGUE.

The League consists of the Patron and Sovereign (Her Majesty the Queen), a Grand President (His Royal Highness the Prince of Wales), a Lady Grand President (Her Royal Highness the Princess of Wales), presidents, lady presidents, vice-presidents, lady vice-presidents, members, lady members, associates (both gentlemen and ladics), the honorary treasurer, and the honorary secretaries. In order to carry out the purposes for which the League of Mercy has been formed, the whole of London and the Home Counties have been divided into about 100 districts. The boundaries of each district are as nearly as possible those of the several Parliamentary divisions. For each of these districts one president and one lady president has been, or will be appointed. Each district is divided into not more than thirty sub-districts, and to each of these sub-districts the president and the lady president have assigned, or will respectively assign, one vice-president and one lady vice-president. With each vice-president and with each lady vice-president there will be associated not more than twenty members, gentlemen or ladies, as the case may be. Each member and lady member undertakes to secure every year at least twenty subscribers (to be called associates) of one shilling and upwards to the Prince of Wales' Hospital Fund for London.

THE ORDER OF THE LEAGUE.

The Order will be conferred by Her Majesty the Queen, on the presentation of His Royal Highness, as a reward for personal services only, and such services must have been gratuitously rendered in connection with the relief of sickness, suffering, poverty or distress. Subject to the foregoing essential condition, but not otherwise, chairmen of the committees of hospitals who have actively held that office for at least ten years, founders and benefactors of important hospitals and other institutions for the relief of sickness and suffering, persons who have gratuitously rendered the required services to the League for five years at least, and persons giving gratuitous services, which shall render them worthy in the judgment of the Grand President, are eligible to receive the Order.

The Order consists of a red cross surmounted by the Prince of Wales' Feathers, and having in the centre a group of figures representing "Charity," by Sir Joshua Reynolds, and suspended by a riband in the case of gentlemen, and by a riband tied in a bow in the case of ladies.

SUBSCRIPTIONS.

Presidents, lady presidents, vice-presidents and lady vice-presidents will contribute an annual subscription to the League; members and lady members will not be required to subscribe; but to become an Associate a subscription of a shilling a year or upwards is requisite.

It is arranged that Associates' subscriptions shall be devoted wholly (and undiminished by any expenses of the League) to the benefit of the hospitals.

It has been felt that very many persons who are unable to give largely would gladly make some contribution to the hospitals. The whole country owes a debt of gratitude to the London hospitals, seeing that the medical profession is to a large extent recruited from the medical schools attached to several of the hospitals, and thus all classes receive, although perhaps indirectly, considerable benefit from the institutions which, through the medium of the League of Mercy, they are asked to support. The League of Mercy, besides augmenting the resources of the London hospitals, will, it is hoped, form a complete organisation whereby the personal services of many who are willing to assist in succouring the sick and injured, but who have hitherto been unaware of how to volunteer this aid, may be enlisted, and, by thus co-ordinating the work of distinct and scattered agencies and opening new fields of activity to the benevolent who have time to spare, secure that double blessing which is the especial grace of works of mercy.

THE PROGRESS OF THE LEAGUE.

The progress made already (up to July, 1899) has been most satisfactory. Eighty-three presidents and 50 lady presidents have been appointed, and already there are 461 vice-presidents at work in 38 districts, and 126 lady vicepresidents working in 18 other districts. It will thus be seen that the progress made is most encouraging, and we are gratified to learn that the presidents instead of appointing the whole number of vice-presidents and lady vicepresidents are taking care to delay these appointments, until they have convinced themselves that the ladies and gentlemen willing to undertake the office are fully conscious of the responsibility, and are wholly competent to carry out the duties completely, so as to ensure the permanent success of the League. Subscriptions are coming in, and there is good reason to hope that during the six working months of the present year a goodly sum will be raised through the local organisations established by the League of Mercy in London and the Home Counties. We shall watch the progress of this League with great interest, seeing that if it succeeds, as we believe it will succeed, the whole of the metropolitan hospitals will be placed once and for all in a sound financial position, and will thus be left free to institute many reforms including necessary economies, which it is impossible to attempt where the income is uncertain, and the managers are unable to satisfy themselves that they will be able to meet the whole of the necessary expenditure in any given year.

CHAPTER II.

THE COST OF HOSPITAL MANAGEMENT, AND OF IN= AND OUT=PATIENTS' MAINTENANCE.

Bases of Examination of Cost of Hospital Management—What constitutes the Maximum Limit of Expenditure upon Management—Lavish Expenditure does not necessarily mean Efficient Administration—Reasons for Difficulty in Raising Funds—A few Words as to the Tables—Tables showing Cost of In- and Out-Patients as estimated by the Hospital Authorities; the Percentage Administration is of Maintenance and Total Expenditure; and the Average Gross Annual Income and Expenditure for the years 1895, 1896, and 1897.

MUCH criticism has been evoked in past years by the examination of the expenditure on the administration of a hospital upon the basis of a comparison of the cost of administration with that of maintenance. Since that of Mr. G. A. Cross, the Secretary-Superintendent of the London Homœopathic Hospital, however, there has been no criticism of note on this subject. We, therefore, think it well to repeat what we said with reference to Mr. Cross's remarks on this point made in a very able though pessimistic paper read at a meeting of The Hospitals' Association in December, 1897, on the methods of distribution pursued by the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday and Saturday Funds. Mr. Cross, devoted a considerable amount of space to an attempt to prove that the comparison of the cost of administration with that of maintenance was unreasonable and inaccurate. His points were (I) that the process of rigidly keeping down the cost of maintenance resulted in an increase in the percentage which administration is of maintenance; (2) that administration costs could not be regarded as a part or percentage of maintenance costs; and (3) that the excess of the erroneous percentage arrived at by comparing administration with maintenance increased itself in the cases of high administration costs far beyond the excess of the erroncous

percentage of hospitals with small administration costs. Finally, he declared that the only true percentage was the percentage which cost of administration is of the total expenditure. The first point we need not touch upon because it militates against the true percentage according to Mr. Cross as much as it does against the other method of calculation, and because we do not for one moment believe Mr. Cross would advocate the carrying out of his objection to its logical conclusion, that in order to keep down to an apparently low percentage institutions should pile up the cost of maintenance with a lavish hand. The second point is strained because surely it is allowable to compare one thing with another even though it does not form part of that thing, and especially when the two are intimately connected as they are in this case. In the third case, Mr. Cross reasons thus-take a hospital spending $f_{10,000}$ of which f_{1000} goes for administration. Here a sum equal to 10 per cent. of the total expenditure, or equal to II'I per cent. of maintenance costs is expended on administration; difference between the two methods of calculation, 1'1. Take another hospital spending $f_{10,000}$, of which f_{2000} is expended in administration. Here a sum equal to 20 per cent. of the total expenditure, or equal to 25 per cent. of maintenance costs, is expended on administration: difference, 5. Therefore the excess of erroneous percentage is five times as great in the latter case as in the former. In pursuing this line of argument, however, Mr. Cross has quite lost sight of the fact that he is comparing two sets of figures which arc not comparable, and that therefore his deduction is not a true one. The best answer to Mr. Cross is a study of the actual figures given on pages 84 to 87, as in practice the difference between the two systems may be regarded as inappreciable. For practical purposes the discussion raised by Mr. Cross must therefore be regarded as merely academical.

In the tables which are given at the end of the chapter, we have again included both calculations so that any one interested may be able to compare the cost of the administration of a given institution upon either of the two bases

as he may think best. A careful examination of the percentages contained in the tables must encourage the public to give more liberally to our hospitals, seeing that they reflect the greatest credit upon the management of our voluntary charities. They prove that the committees and their officers are fully alive to the importance of economy, and that there is, with a few exceptions, a continuous tendency towards a reduction in these charges, notwithstanding the financial difficulties which managers have had to face in recent years.

WHAT CONSTITUTES THE MAXIMUM LIMIT OF EXPENDITURE UPON ADMINISTRATION ?

In reply to this question we would suggest, as we have done in past years, that the maximum expenditure on administration which each group of hospitals ought to fix if the managers desire to secure economy and efficiency, should be as follows :---

(1) General Hospitals.—For metropolitan general hospitals the cost of administration should not exceed, as a maximum, 15 per cent. of the cost of maintenance, whilst in the provinces experience proves that from 10 per cent. to 12 per cent. is the highest outlay permissible under this head. These calculations relate to hospitals containing 100 beds and upwards.

(2) Special Hospitals.—The special hospitals may be divided into two main groups: (A) those which contain 100 beds and upwards, or are devoted to the treatment of diseases which make them specially popular; and (B) those smaller hospitals where the difficulty of raising funds is increased by their relative unimportance, and by the further fact that the class of diseases treated does not appeal especially to public sympathy.

In the first group (A) we include hospitals for children, hospitals for consumption, lying-in, ophthalmic, and large miscellaneous metropolitan special hospitals. We have laid it down in previous editions of this book, and we see no reason to change our opinion, that 15 per cent. should be the maximum percentage which the cost of administration may be of that of maintenance in this group of special hospitals; provided that where a hospital is built upon an out-of-the-way site, in a densely populated poor neighbourhood, and where (as happens to the secretary of a lying-in hospital, for example), the objects do not excite such great sympathy as those of some of the other hospitals, especially if the expenditure be relatively small when compared with that of the remaining institutions, it would not be unreasonable to increase the maximum cost of administration to a sum not exceeding 20 per cent.

In the case of Group (B), which includes the smaller special hospitals, we have arrived at the conclusion that the outside percentage which administration should be of maintenance is 20 per cent.

We feel bound to insist that the giving public should be made to understand that any hospital which expends more than 20 per cent. of its income upon administration is one which ought properly to be regarded as suspect unless or until its managers produce adequate reasons to justify such an exaggerated expenditure. It is of course conceivable that such a result may be attained, and we have heard it asserted that in one or two cases this result has actually been attained, by certain special hospitals. It has been added (though we have failed to find evidence in support of the statement) that the management has been so bad in every department, or the figures have been so manipulated by wrongful classification of items under the uniform system, as to conceal altogether the enormous expenditure upon administration, a result which has been reached by the sanction of those responsible for the most extravagant expenditure upon maintenance. We would once more urge the committees of every well-administered hospital to fix a maximum for expenditure not only upon administration, but upon every other item, whilst they individually and collectively keep a strict cye upon every branch of expenditure, and compare it zealously with that of previous years.

We have heard it urged that an expenditure of 20

per cent. of the income of any charity upon administration must be too high. Our experience, however, is that it is infinitely better for a young and struggling charity to spend 20 per cent. of its income upon administration, and so maintain itself free from debt, than for an older and less actively administered institution, having conand less actively administered institution, having con-siderable invested funds, to expend say 6 or 8 per cent. of its income upon the same items, when the manage-ment, as frequently happens in these cases, is for all prac-tical purposes fast asleep. Many of the most admirable charities have too large an amount of invested property. This is seen at once when they are compared with the best administered institutions of the class to which they belong. The cause of much indifferent management may belong. The cause of much indifferent management may be rightly attributed to the absence of any real necessity, owing to the invested funds, to keep the institution in touch with the public, and to secure that its management shall be of the best. Without the best management, the necessary income will not be forthcoming to defray the necessary expenses of an institution which has to rely mainly upon voluntary offerings for its maintenance. Hence the danger of piling up large invested funds. Finally, we wish to impress once more upon our readers that it is a mistake to suppose that lavish expenditure means efficiency in administration, for lavish expenditure in any department or upon any article, even upon pro-

in any department or upon any article, even upon pro-visions, makes for inefficiency, and tends to lessen the comfort and well-being of the patients.

We have always advocated, and shall continue to advocate, a wise and liberal expenditure upon salaries in all departments, because the best administered institutions are those which attract to their work the brightest minds, the most capable administrators, and the most zealous workers it is possible to employ on the work which has to be done. We therefore hope that every hospital com-mittee which expends less than 10 per cent. upon adminis-tration, will look into this question of salaries very carefully, with a view to seeing how far they may be increased with advantage in certain cases, and how far, possibly, in certain other cases a change of officers and the payment of a better salary to a more experienced and better trained official will bring about that growth in the revenue and the enforcement of economy throughout every department of the institution which it is most desirable to secure in the best interests of everybody.

We are certain that no metropolitan hospital of repute need suffer severely for want of funds, providing, but only providing, sufficient energy and capacity are exhibited by those who are responsible for its administration. A hospital is, after all, like a business; and if the history of a particular hospital is carefully followed out it will show, that the periods of greatest prosperity were the periods when the officials-the chairman, treasurer, secretary, residents, and committee men, one or all of them—were men of especial activity, capacity, and zeal. Any one who goes carefully through the figures of some of the great and best administered hospitals will see that they are doing reasonably well, if only the management is as efficient and active as it undoubtedly ought to be in order that the suffering poor may have their needs adequately supplied in the greatest city of the British Empire.

The difficulty in raising funds, wherever it occurs, is usually traceable to one of two causes. Either the managers of the particular institution to be helped lack initiative and originality, and do not possess the faculty of bringing their institution into line with the sympathy of people who would otherwise be glad to help it; or else those charged with the duty of raising income are wholly ignorant of the business—and, after all, the raising of charitable revenues is a business which requires as much ability, energy and persistence as it takes to make a success of any undertaking founded upon commercial principles, the chief of which is to secure that all the trading done shall be done at a profit. Nothing succeeds in the present day except under skilled direction, a fact which should force upon the minds of all the voluntary workers connected with our charities the importance of

placing at the head of the executive an active, trained, and experienced administrator, who should be properly paid, thoroughly trusted, and adequately supported.

A FEW WORDS AS TO THE TABLES.

It will be seen that the tables which follow give (1) the approximate cost of each in-patient per day and of each out-patient, as estimated by the hospital authorities; (2) the percentage which the cost of administration is of that of maintenance; (3) the percentage which the cost of administration is of the total expenditure; (4) the average gross annual income (including legacies) during the years 1895, 1896, and 1897; (5) the average gross annual expenditure during the same three years, including the outlay on new buildings, etc.; and (6) the average yearly surplus or deficiency.

It must be borne in mind that the figures we give in the tables which follow (pages 84 to 87) have been prepared from returns made by the hospital authorities themselves, or from the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund returns, where they appeared, and that they are (except in the columns relating to the cost per head) calculated on an average of the receipts and expenditure during the three years 1895, 1896, and 1897. They are therefore not identical with the figures given in Chapters VI. and VII., the latter being those for the year 1897.

CHAPTER III.

GENERAL CHARITIES: HOME AND FOREIGN MISSIONS.

A New Departure—General Considerations for Subscribers and Committees —The Importance of a Trustworthy Audit—Professional Philanthropists—Hints to Committees—The Necessity for an Uniform System of Accounts—Home Missions—Foreign Missions—Table containing an Analysis of the Income and Expenditure of thirty-five typical Home and Foreign Missionary Societies for the Year 1897.

LAST year we initiated an elaboration of the statistics we gave in this and the two following chapters concerning charities, so as to bring them more into uniformity with those given in the case of hospitals. We now therefore include an analysis of the income of the charities which appear in the tables, bringing out the amounts received from invested property, subscriptions and donations and other items which are of interest. In the matter of expenditure we have, with the aid in many cases of the officials connected with the various societies, separated the amounts expended on the administration of the societies (i.e., the office expenses) from the expenditure on the primary objects for which the associations were formed, and have added a column showing the percentage which the charges of administration are of the ordinary expenditure. By this means we have brought the particulars given throughout these preliminary chapters into a common form, and have thus, we hope, increased their usefulness to our readers.

Before proceeding to a consideration of the facts brought out by the tables, we do not think we can do better than again repeat the substance of what we have in previous volumes set out in these chapters dealing with general charities, as it is as appropriate at the present moment as it was when it was first written.

GENERAL CHARITIES.

HINTS TO SUBSCRIBERS.

Various State efforts are made, all over the world, to deal with the vast amount of want and misery which everywhere prevail; but none can ever take the place of that willing and kindly private benevolence for which our own country is so honourably distinguished. Without attempting to trace the connection between the existence, side by side, of excessive wealth and of grinding poverty, we may urge on the wealthy and well-to-do the responsibility which lies on them to support any wise scheme for the relief of distress. This responsibility and this duty become the more marked where the distress is that in which the weak, the suffering, and the helpless are involved, through no fault, perhaps, of their own. It is not necessary to go to the socialist for arguments to prove that conscience forbids us to live contentedly in comfort or luxury, whilst human beings, kindred flesh and blood, are dragging out their lives in suffering, squalor and penury, with starvation staring them in the face.

It is true that immense sums are subscribed yearly to charitable institutions—sums which would have been thought fabulous a century ago—but somehow the want and misery of the age far outstrip its generosity. A certain proportion of the ever-increasing population of these islands can find neither work nor food. Some must fall out of the race, and these naturally the weakest—the infirm, the crippled, and the aged. It is the grand aim of the societies, whose cause we plead, to relieve the suffering, to raise the fallen, to give a helping hand to the young—in fact, to help all those who cannot help themselves.

As far as we can see, the help given by few, if any, of the general societics, whose claims are advocated in this work, has a pauperising tendency. None of them waste their funds on idle vagabonds who, by working, could remedy their own want. Their object, on the contrary, is to afford relief to unavoidable suffering and distress. It may seem incredible that, in a rich country such as this is, such institutions should suffer from a chronic lack of funds; yet this is undoubtedly the case with many which are thoroughly deserving of support.

It would manifestly be invidious on our part to select and specify institutions as more or less deserving of support, but we may repeat the practice we have followed of late years and again place before subscribers general principles to aid them in forming a judgment.

In weighing the claims of a charity two main points have to be considered :—

- I. Are the funds prudently and honestly spent?
- 2. Are the results obtained worth the expenditure incurred?

The prudence and honesty of the expenditure of a charity should be deducible from its published accounts. If these are clearly and fully set out—working expenses being shown separately and *in detail*—and vouched for by a trustworthy and independent audit, the materials for forming an opinion are present.

The crucial test, then, to be applied is-what proportion of the whole expenditure is spent on officials and management? The proportion varies, as we shall show, to a remarkable extent, and the variation furnishes a fair measure of the claims of a charity on confidence and support. It must, however, be borne in mind that, where the income of a society is small, the working expenses, under paid management, necessarily bear a far greater proportion to the whole expenditure than in the case of richer societies. The latter, even though the percentage of their large incomes spent on management appears to be small, are often in reality much more extravagant. In any case it may fairly be urged, that a society which omits to give a full and detailed account of the way in which subscriptions are spent, fails to make good its claim for support.

Not the least important part of the inquiry relates to the efficiency of the audit. We are sorry to have to express a very decided opinion that the audit of the accounts of the classes of Charities under review here is still unsatisfactory. Some are satisfied with amateur auditors. The greater part, it is true, employ chartered accountants; but facts are continually coming to light which prove that their examination of accounts is often perfunctory and superficial. If the object of an audit is to make things go smoothly, they perform their duty in an admirable manner. But the true function of the auditor is to check extravagance, to detect dishonesty, to call attention to useless or improper expenditure. How often is this done by the friendly accountant? Perhaps nothing short of an official audit, such as that of the auditors of the Local Government Board, can be accepted as entirely independent and trustworthy. Meantime, until such can be secured, committees might immensely improve on the present faulty system by a few precautions. Let them select the auditor themselves, and instruct him to carry out an exhaustive inquiry into the whole financial position and management of the society, and encourage him to make suggestions and to disallow questionable payments. Above all, let the inquiry be conducted in the presence of two or three members of the committee, who are well acquainted with the society's affairs. By these means they would ensure the proper administration of their funds and gain the confidence of subscribers.

In estimating the value of the results of the work of a society the inquirer will, naturally, be largely influenced by his, or her, personal sympathies. By one the spread of religion, by another the relief of suffering, by another the care for children or for those deprived of one or more of the organs of sense, is regarded as all-important. But it should be possible, even for an enthusiast to take a business-like view of a matter involving the best way of spending pounds, shillings and pence. If the question "Are the results worth the cost?" is put with reference to the general hospitals, the reply is unanimous and hearty enough in the affirmative. There is no uncertain sound about the reply in the case of the numerous institutions all over the country which care for the Blind, the Deaf and Dumb, or, indeed, in the case of the best managed of those in every class. There can be no reason, therefore, why subscribers should not indulge their sentiment within limits. Enthusiasm is the best ally of charity; and its aid is invaluable, provided it does not magnify objects out of all proportion to their true dimensions, and blind the eyes of the giver to the magnitude of others which have far greater claims on sympathy and support.

To these limits we would add a repetition of the caution -beware of professional philanthropists. There are some few societies, founded or controlled by one man who lives on his share of the subscriptions. It is true he may parade a committee of names, more or less known; but too often it is a committee in name only, and the man himself has the entire management of the institution and its funds. Usually his appeals are interlarded with texts of Scripture and canting phrases, in which case it may be the more necessary to inquire closely into the application of the money entrusted to him. We are far from asserting that all charities managed by one head fall under this category, but it is certain that many do, and, therefore, it would be well to make strict inquiry before contributing to any of the class indicated. In such cases subscribers might, with advantage, avail themselves of the advice, always readily given, of the Charity Organization Society, or of the Mendicity Society.

HINTS TO COMMITTEES.

To any one desirous of obtaining a clear idea of the financial position of these societies, or of making comparisons between them, the form in which the accounts of many are rendered presents an almost insuperable obstacle. Some are full enough, others meagre and muddled to an incredible degree. Capital and revenue are mixed in one nondescript sheet—dividends of investments are credited, but there is no record even of the amounts invested. Official expenses are lumped with others, so that it is impossible to separate the cost of management. Now, the very first condition of a prudent expenditure is the proper keeping of accounts. If the main object of the

officials, in some cases, were to mystify subscribers, committee, and auditors alike, they could not adopt a more effective method than the one we are condemning. It is quite time that an end should be put to the diversity of the methods shown in these accounts, by the general adoption of some simple and easily comprehended system. Even those institutions which at present give full and detailed information would find it to their advantage to be able to compare the items of expenditure with those of others, calculated on the same basis.

Whatever excuse there may have been in the past for this want of uniformity, or for rendering incomplete or muddled accounts, there can be none now. The hospitals have shown what can be done in the way of a uniform system of accounts, and it is only necessary for the managers of the different classes of charities to meet in consultation in order to evolve a form of accounts on similar lines which will give to charitable societies what the hospitals and kindred institutions now enjoy, a system under which comparisons can be made with some hope of perfect accuracy. Much help in this matter will be derived from a perusal of our book which has been out for some years now, entitled The Uniform System of Accounts, Audit and Tenders for Hospitals and Institutions. Forms are given suitable to the requirements of large or small institutions; and complete sets of account-books, embodying the various forms, are published at very moderate prices by The Scientific Press, Limited, Southampton Street, Strand, London. The Editor will, if consulted, gladly make modifications in the forms to suit special institutions.

It is not too much to say, that the general adoption of some such system would effect a wholesome revolution in the accounts of charitable institutions. It would not only clear away the obscurity in which the finances of so many institutions are involved, and so enable committees, as well as outsiders, to take an intelligent interest in the financial position and work of each society, but it would also effectually shut the door on waste and possible fraud. Officials will never, of their own accord, carry out such a change; it is for the committees to insist on it and to see that it is done.

Members of committees of charitable institutions seldom realise fully their responsibilities. With the best of motives, they often allow their names to be used to further what seems to them a good cause, and are content to leave the whole management of the funds to officials. Yet their position is precisely on a par with that of directors of companies. Their personal attention is relied on by contributors. Their names are used because they in-spire confidence—a confidence which is misplaced unless they exercise a watchful care over the interests which they are supposed to safeguard. We would especially call their attention to the vital importance of making the audit of the accounts more thorough, and to the recommendation given above that, to that end, some of their number should be present and take an active part in the inquiry. It may be taken as a broad statement of fact, that the success of the work and the soundness of the finances of an institution are in proportion to the personal interest taken in the management by its committee.

The societies which we are reviewing in these chapters may be divided broadly into two classes : 1st, those dealing with spiritual wants, and, 2nd, those relieving physical distress; but, inasmuch as the former have to deal chiefly with those whose bodily needs are often as pressing as the spiritual, they can effect little without looking after these also.

In the present chapter, we propose to deal with those societies which fall under Class I, leaving the others for discussion in Chapters IV. and V.

Societies which fall under Class I may be arranged under the heads of Home Missions and Foreign Missions.

HOME MISSIONS.

Home Missions proper are those whose efforts are directed to reclaiming the heathen of our own land.

There are very many good people who justly regard this as a first duty, and who grudge the large expenditure of money and energy on those outside our borders, whilst so many within are uncared for. But the majority of worthy religious people, unhappily, take a different vièw. They sweep the distant corners of the earth with telescopic surveys, to discover some degraded, incapable race on which they may lavish their care, and overlook the countless crowds of the highly organised, susceptible people living in degradation at their very doors. In money alone twice as much is spent on Foreign as on Home Missions. Such a state of things is creditable neither to the good heart nor the good sense of the British nation. True charity begins at home. Our first duty is clearly to look after our own lost sheep, to cope with the vice and misery of our own heathen. When this is done, and done effectually, we may turn our attention with a clear conscience to distant lands.

No sadder reading is to be found anywhere than in the reports of the home societies. It is enough, one would think, to stir the hearts of all who read, and to call forth practical help. The enthusiasm and devotion shown by those engaged in the work are unequalled in any other field of charity; but the workers are too few, and their efforts too much scattered, to make any real impression on the vast amount of evil which confronts them. Both money and energy are wasted on numerous societies, which might well combine and so extend their influence. What is sorely needed is united action, such as would best be secured by the formation of a central association of the societies engaged in the work.

Home Missions may be divided into four classes :---

- I. Societies making grants for curates.
- 2. Missions to sailors.
- 3. General missions.
- 4. Missions giving prominence to the relief of distress.

Examples of each of these classes are grouped together in the table on page 99. Thus the societies numbered

14 to 18 come under Class 1, those numbered 19 to 23 under Class 2, Nos. 24 to 32 under Class 3 and Nos. 33, 34 and 35 under Class 4. Besides the societies numbered 14 to 18 which essentially belong to Class 1, there. are many others, such as those in Class 2, which make large grants for the maintenance of additional curates, and most of the dioceses have a special fund devoted to the same purpose. So far as the funds are used to maintain agencies promoting the religious welfare of the poorest, outside and in addition to the regular arrangements and services, they may be considered as applied legitimately to the work of Home Missions. But many grants are made to supply curates to parish churches which should not need such help. The societies whose accounts are analysed in this table, and in those which follow, are selected either because they are the most prominent societies of their class, or because they supply fair instances representative of many similar societies.

Taking each group of charities, it will be noticed what startling differences are to be found in the cost of administering the funds of the societies. In Class 1, administration varies from over 15 per cent. of the ordinary expenditure to less than 3 per cent. In the case of the latter amount, it must be remembered, however, that a great deal of the management is honorary. Still the next highest amount where the management is not honorary is only 6 per cent., or a difference between the highest and lowest of 9 per cent. In the case of two of the societies in Class 2, over a quarter of the ordinary expenditure goes in administration expenses, and this in two societies as widely separated as regards size as the Mission to Deep Sea Fishermen and the St. Andrew's Waterside Church Mission. It might be argued that the smallness of the funds of the latter would in part account for the excessive percentage of administration, but such an argument could not hold good in the former case as two other societies doing the same class of work, the Missions to Seamen and the British and Foreign Sailor's Society, only expend 14 and nearly 7½ per cent. respectively of

their ordinary expenditure in management. In Class 3, the percentage averages about 12 to 13 per cent., exceptions to this being the Wesleyan Home Mission Fund $(6\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.), the Parochial Mission Fund $(4\frac{1}{2}$ per cent.), and the Christian Community where $34\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the expenditure was spent on management, a slight decrease on last year, when 38 per cent. was expended on management. St. Giles Christian Mission with nearly 19 per cent. heads the list, and the Church Army spent least on administration in Class 4.

As to income, we have again to draw attention to the fact that in only a few cases do the accounts of Home Missionary Societies separate the annual subscriptions from the donations received. In one case, that of the Christian Community, it has been nearly impossible to analyse the income at all, as the various items are so mixed up with one another. A noticeable fact is the comparatively small amount received by these societies from invested funds. Thus the Society for the Employment of Additional Curates, with receipts amounting in 1897 to £57,500, received only £2500 from investments, the Wesleyan Home Mission, with receipts amounting to £36,000, only £1450, and the Church Army, the East London Church Fund and the Bishop of St. Alban's Fund, which collected £85,500, £17,000 and £17,000 respectively in 1897, received only £205, £136 and £149 respectively from this source.

FOREIGN MISSIONS.

The accounts of Foreign Missions show a similar variation in the cost of management, ranging from nearly 25 per cent. of the ordinary expenditure to $5\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. With two exceptions (the South American Missionary Society and the Colonial and Continental Church Society), the cost of management comes out at under 14 per cent. of the ordinary expenditure. The cost of management of the wealthier societies, however, although the percentage seems more moderate, is really very heavy. Of these very large societies, the Society for the Propagation of the

Gospel has the highest percentage (13.61), while the Church Missionary Society with 11.56 per cent. stands next. Undoubtedly taking into consideration the fact of the immense revenues of these societies, the percentage in these cases is excessive and out of all proportion, as will be seen on comparison with the Wesleyan Methodist Missionary Society and London Missionary Society, which only spent about 7 per cent. on administration although they collect and spend a sum equal to the S. P. G.

Turning to the income side of the account it will be seen that the remark made under Home Missions as to the amalgamation of subscriptions and donations in the accounts has still more force here. With but one exception it is impossible to separate the amounts received in annual subscriptions from those received as donations. Legacies appear to be a great feature of the Foreign Missionary Societies, huge sums being received by the larger societies from this source. In this class of charity it will be noticed that with but two exceptions dividends and receipts from invested property play but a small part in making up the income required for carrying on these societies.

Altogether, about $\pounds_{1,200,000}$ is spent every year on Foreign Missions by the societies included in the tables, and $\pounds_{115,000}$ of this is accounted for under "cost of management," a considerable part of which might be saved if all the societies were conducted on the same economical lines as some of them are.

MISSIONARY SOCIETIES.

CHAPTER IV.

GENERAL CHARITIES: ORPHANAGES, HOMES, AND REFUGES.

Orphanages, Homes and Refuges—Drawbacks to Life in Institutions— Defective and Epileptic Children—Reformatory and Industrial Schools— Foundlings—The Inspection of Homes—Compulsory Registration of Homes—Cost of Management per Inmate—The Necessity for a Uniform System of Accounts—Table giving an Analysis of the Income and Expenditure in 1897 of typical Orphanages and Homes.

ORPHANAGES, HOMES, AND REFUGES.

THESE and other institutions for housing and feeding destitute children appeal with peculiar force to the hearts of the benevolent. For this very reason it is the more necessary to call in the aid of the head to prevent the heart being imposed on. It is in this class of charities that the professional philanthropist finds his happy hunting ground. Yet no institutions are more necessary or valuable, and none are more worthy of support, provided they are managed with prudence and honesty.

The number of homes for orphans and destitute children increases rapidly year by year. There is great matter for congratulation in the activity displayed in this particular field of work. Few things can more closely affect the welfare of a nation than the measure of success which attends the rearing of those children left by the death, vice or poverty of their parents without natural protectors. In a population of about 29,000,000 a certaint proportion of such friendless children must always be found, and few will contend that the Poor Law is the proper instrument for dealing with them all. In view, however, of the multiplicity of appcals which bewilder the charitable, a few words of caution may not be amiss.

The drawbacks to institution life have long been fully recognised by the experienced. Much has been done of late years in the best of the homes to vary the monotony; and modern modes of instruction, active exercises, and a greater variety of industrial occupations have set a fresh current of life stirring, in place of the old listless indifference. Yet, notwithstanding all improvements, the life of the institution remains an unnatural one. The child is inevitably excluded from any experience of the duties, dangers and responsibilities of family life, and passes, when the time of seclusion is over, to freedom and temptations for which the laborious training of years has supplied no practical preparation. In homes where children are admitted in infancy, and remain until the age of seventeen or eighteen, the long-continued routine, however good the discipline may be, cannot fail to place the young at a very serious disadvantage as regards their future life. Where, again, the discipline is indifferent, or the children of good and bad parents are admitted indiscriminately, the demoralising effects of the life can hardly be exaggerated.

The remedy is to be sought in shortening, as far as possible, the period of institution life. It is not found well to send the children out into the world too early, but it is a wise rule in many excellent homes not to admit them before the age of eleven or twelve. For children of normal health and intelligence, three, or at most four years are found amply sufficient for establishing orderly habits and imparting industrial training to serve as a basis for future employment. Such a period of discipline in a well-ordered Home has all the bracing effect upon the character and habits produced by a good boarding-school on boys and girls in a higher rank of life, and the value to the nation of the charitable work done in this direction is beyond estimation.

But for little-children the institution life can never be anything but an evil, to be avoided by every means which the resources of charity afford. For them the boardingout system supplies a ready alternative, less attractive to the subscriber, perhaps, than those expensive buildings where prettily clad orphans can be seen at musical drill; but how far more healthful for the individual child! The system to be well worked involves, it is true, much anxiety and watchfulness; but, on the other hand, it can be worked at about half the expense of the institution, without outlay of capital and with the very best results. The money spent serves, too, a double purpose, in assisting the struggling and deserving class who undertake the duties of foster-parents, while the wise surveillance exercised tends to raise the standard of cleanliness and order in their own family life.

PROVISION FOR DEFECTIVE AND EPILEPTIC CHILDREN.

There is a large and, it is to be feared, increasing number of children known as the "feeble-minded," for whom neither the institution life nor boarding-out is at all suitable.

A Departmental Committee on Defective and Epileptic Children made inquiry some time ago into the provision made for this class of children at public elementary schools. Their report deals with feeble-minded children, who, whilst neither idiots or imbeciles, are yet incapable of being taught in ordinary schools by ordinary methods. There are upwards of thirteen hundred such children under instruction in special classes, and the results generally are encouraging, it being found possible not only to impart a certain degree of manual skill, but also by the thirteenth or fourteenth year to bring them to about the same standard of elementary education as is reached by a normal child of eight or nine. For the great part such children exhibit certain bodily defects, irregular conformation, defective palate, tongue, teeth, lips, or ears, motor or sensory defects, or general bad nutrition. Speaking generally, I per cent. of children of the public elementary school class are feeble-minded, whilst, in addition to these, one or two per thousand are incapable from physical defects, such as lameness, fits, etc., from attending school. At the present time the authorities have no power to place

feeble-minded children in special schools or classes without the parent's consent, nor, indeed, need they make any provision for such children. The committee recommened that in centres where the population exceeds 20,000 the provision of special classes and the drafting of feebleminded children into such shall be compulsory. The method of selecting the children to be as follows: Up to the age of seven years no distinction will be made, children of all grades of mental development alike attending Board schools and infant schools. At the expiration of this time the head teachers must select such children as appear to them to be mentally deficient, and these are to be examined in the presence of parent, past and future teacher, and inspector, by an expert medical man, who will certify as to their fitness for ordinary school life, special school, or home for imbeciles or idiots. The parent, if aggrieved, may appeal to the Education Department. The special classes will be taught by trained teachers, and will not be of more than four and a half hours duration daily. At least six hours a week must be devoted to manual instruction for the younger children, knitting, modelling, colouring macramé, paper-folding, basket and matmaking. For the older children cane-seating, simple woodwork and joinery, basket, brush and mat-making for the boys, and needlework, cooking and washing for the girls. Games, especially games with balls, breathing drill, and eye movements, are to form part of the curriculum. The medical officer shall visit and examine the classes every year.

It is recommended also that conveyance or guides should be furnished to deficient children and to children physically unfit, and that where necessary children should be boarded out in the neighbourhood of the school rather than have long daily journeys. Institutions and "homes" are not, as a rule, favourable for such children.

Epileptic children, who number about one per thousand of the child population, are classified under two heads— (I) Mild cases of normal or of feeble intellect and (2) severe cases. Mild cases of epilepsy with no mental impairment are to be retained in the elementary schools, teachers being given special instructions with regard to treatment during fits, and also as to their general training. Mentally deficient children with mild epilespy should be sent to classes for the feeble-minded, and all severe cases, having been mentally certified as such, should be treated in small country sanatoria such as at present exist, or may at any future time be erected by School Board authorities.

REFORMATORY AND INDUSTRIAL SCHOOLS.

Among the children rescued from want and vicious surroundings a large proportion, reaching in fact to no less a figure than one in five have either been already convicted of crime or proved on trial to be intractable under ordinary discipline and a source of danger to their companions. About 33,500 such children are under training in the United Kingdom in certified reformatory and industrial schools, provided by voluntary effort and aided by grants from the Treasury and contributions from the rates and parents. These schools, managed by highly-trained officials, and under regular Government inspection, are able to show very encouraging results in dealing with what might seem to be the waste product of the nation. And, large as the number of children is under this salutary discipline, there is reason to believe that it might be still further increased with great advantage. It is a grave drawback to many orphanages that children, corrupted by previous association, are admitted without sufficient inquiry into their past, and are retained, from some false notion of kindness or dislike to acknowledge failure, long after it has become clear that they are injuring their companions whilst gaining no good themselves. Many such children, apparently incorrigible under ordinary rule or in a small Home, respond to the more vigorous discipline of the industrial school, and ultimately turn out well. It need scarcely be said that it is a serious and very dangerous undertaking to bring

these poor little *mauvais sujets* together, and one which demands all the science and resource evolved by years of experience, combined with the safeguard of careful supervision from outside. Small amateur undertakings of this description are seldom to be recommended. In dealing with troublesome boys especially, it is a very decided advantage to gather them in such numbers as to warrant the use of large out-door premises, workshops and a semi-military discipline. Mischief and unruliness in boys often arise from a want of opportunity of giving vent to a restless activity of nature, which opportunity is furnished by the exercise of some handicraft and plenty of drilling.

The difference between a reformatory and industrial school is not generally understood. Reformatories are schools to which are sent juveniles up to the age of sixteen who have been convicted of an offence punishable with penal servitude or imprisonment. Industrial schools, on the other hand, are designed, broadly speaking, for children up to the age of fourteen, who may not actually have committed an offence, but whose circumstances are such, that, if left in their surroundings, they are likely to join the delinquent population. Thus the reformatories are for actual, the industrial schools for potential delinquents, though the two overlap somewhat in that an actual delinquent, if under twelve, may be sent to an industrial school.

FOUNDLINGS.

A good deal of discussion has been raised of late years as to the expediency of providing special Homes for illegitimate infants. Periodically, the public is startled by horrible revelations of baby-farming; and this evil is to be abolished, we are told, by the establishment of an entirely new net-work of Homes, designed to relieve the mother, on payment of a small sum, of all responsibility for her offspring. Unfortunately the records of infant insurance show that it is by no means exclusively among the unmarried that infant life is held at the value of \pounds_2 or \pounds_3 down. When the utmost vigilance of the law has done its part, the true remedy for child-murder must be sought, not in obliterating, but in deepening the parents' sense of responsibility towards the children they bring into the world. In cases where the natural protectors are incapable or neglectful of their duty, it should be clearly recognised that the poor-law authorities, with their exceptional means at command of enforcing contributions from the father, form the proper agency to rescue the child from destitution. It is of the utmost importance to the community that charitable funds should not be applied to discharge the liabilities incurred by the idle While there remains one child born of and vicious. honest and hard-working parents among the 25,000 children at present housed in workhouse and district schools, it is entirely beside the mark to plead the hardships of pauperism on behalf of the foundling. To lessen these hardships for all alike by a further extension of the boarding-out system, and by increased local interest in the poorlaw schools-both involving sustained voluntary effortwould be a far healthier direction for public interest to take than building expensive Homes for children whose parents are guilty of special brutality and neglect. And if money and zeal be forthcoming further to extend orphanage work, consultation with the poor-law guardians would discover only too many instances of pauper children for whose respectable antecedents workhouse associations do in fact constitute a cruel injustice, and to whom private charity might worthily lend its aid.

THE INSPECTION OF HOMES.

As the law at present stands, only "certified" Homes in receipt of a Government grant are under inspection. All children of course are subject to the ordinary School Board examinations, but the examiner inquires only into the instruction given, and school-room accommodation. The sleeping arrangements, the amount and quality of the food, the clothing supplied, the amount of exercise,

and the punishments in use, are all matters for arbitrary appointment. Sometimes the founder or foundress of the Home is sole manager; sometimes there is the nominal assistance of a committee. The reports deal mostly in generalities, and any accurate knowledge of the state of health and discipline maintained is with difficulty to be arrived at. It is true that subscribers are always admitted to see the Homes; but it needs a very keen eye to see much of the inner working during a formal walk through the establishment. In fact, the public has practically no choice but to place unbounded confidence in the character of those in charge. If, by any chance, some conspicuous infringement of humanity or of common-sense is detected, there is no method of enforcing reform. The manager has only to observe curtly that the measures objected to "have been found necessary," and what resource is left to the would-be reformer saving that—and a lame expedient it is-of writing to the papers? It is a step, too, from which most persons would shrink, lest it should entail grave disaster on the institution. For, if but a rumour gets about that all is not right, subscriptions often dwindle rapidly, and excellent work, from which all slur might have been removed by following a little authoritative advice, may be seriously crippled through failure of funds.

It is perhaps, therefore, not surprising that open criticism is often resented by managers as a bitter injury. But it should surely be allowable for persons to interest themselves in investigating circumstances affecting the welfare of a Home which they help to support, without being accused of conspiracy or likened to "beasts of prey". It is, then, in the interests of managers, inmates, and subscribers alike, that we would urge the need of a regular Government Inspection of all institutions which appeal to the public for support. There can be no question as to the value of the help which such skilled supervision would afford to all who are conscientiously striving to render their Homes as efficient as possible. The expense entailed by the alterations which would, doubtless, in many cases be dictated, would be more than balanced by the increase of public confidence which a Government Inspection would ensure. Very often the gravest abuses arise from mistaken kindness, as in cases where over-crowding is allowed in preference to the rejection of necessitous children; sometimes from ignorance, as when pneumonia ensues from the dormitories being insufficiently heated; sometimes from mere want of judgment. In all such cases the visit of the inspector would let in fresh light, and the carrying out of his recommendations would, without scandal or damage to the institution, remove defects which might otherwise have far-reaching consequences for evil.

So far, nothing has been said of those Homes in which no improvement is desired, but only detection dreaded. There is but one effectual means of reaching such cases and doing away with their plausible imposition on the public, and that is by providing for

THE COMPULSORY REGISTRATION OF HOMES.

It is notoriously true that a certain class of impostors, who draw large sums from the public, are only saved from exposure and conviction by keeping on hand a small "stock-in-trade" of orphans. The law cannot touch them so long as they can show that even two or three children are maintained out of the proceeds of their begging appeals. A scandal so grave and so closely affecting the interests of all charities, great and small alike, cannot surely be suffered to continue without remedy. It is time that all the varied institutions, doing noble work for the nation at large, should claim recognition at the hands of the State, and demand, as a guarantee to subscribers, the formal and universal registration of charities. To provide for such registration, all that is needed is a short Act of Parliament, which should also declare it unlawful for any unregistered charitable agency to appeal for subscriptions. Such an Act would place an effectual check on the dishonest hands which now divert the stream of charity from many a worthy institution. Few of these fraudulent agencies would dare to risk applying for registration, and those few would but bring about their own discomfiture,

To some others, which could not show results adequaet to the amount of money collected by them, registration would be granted only on condition of reform. In no case would it be granted without satisfactory proof of the *bona fides* of the undertaking.

Nor is it unreasonable to expect the State to perform this service. It is altogether impracticable to foist upon charitable individuals the duties of private detectives. The public is justified in looking to the State for protection against the impostors who drive a flourishing trade by profane appeals to the highest of Christian duties. On all sides we are told of good work hampered for want of money, while those who give most generously are sorrowfully declaring they have already done their utmost. And all this time greedy hypocrites are securing for their own purposes incredibly large sums, ample to supply, if turned in the right direction, the entire deficit. A measure, then, which would set up an effectual barrier against all unauthorised and fraudulent appeals for money, would not only relieve the public from a great burden and put an end to a great scandal, but would also protect the true friends of the poor from a host of unworthy competitors, and set the sacred name of charity high above all suspicion, above all reproach.

COST OF MANAGEMENT.

Whilst advocating economy in management, we, at the same time, protest strongly against parsimony in housekeeping. To cut down working expenses is a good thing; to cut down the children's allowance of bread and butter is criminal stinginess. Growing children should be allowed to eat plain wholesome food at a meal, until their hunger is satisfied. It is revolting to read in some of the tables of diet that the allowance is limited to so many ounces a day. We believe such instances are few, but the subject is one worthy of the attention of every committee. It is not necessary to build palaces in which to house the poor little ones, but it is necessary to give them plenty of good wholesome food. **ORPHANAGES AND HOMES.**

BURDETT'S HOSPITALS AND CHARITIES.

Coming now to the table on page 110 containing an analysis of the income and expenditure of 35 orphanages and homes situated in the United Kingdom, the first thing that strikes the reader is the enormous variations shown in the columns headed "Percentage Management is of Ordinary Expenditure" and "Annual Cost per Inmate." Taking the latter column first, it will be seen that the highest expenditure per inmate occurs in institutions such as the Masonic Schools, the Bank Clerks' Orphanage, the Clergy Orphan Schools and others where a higher education is given, and where necessarily the cost must be far greater than in ordinary cases. In the remainder, considering that the children are fed, clothed, lodged and trained, the cost per head, arrived at by dividing the whole expenditure by the number of children, is not excessive, amounting as it does to from f_{20} to f_{30} per head. In all the cases we have not been able to work out the annual cost per inmate. This is so principally in those institutions which have under their charge different classes of schools. Thus the National Refuges have six different classes of inmates who cost varying amounts. For instance, at Sudbury the average cost per head in 1897 was £14 15. 8d.; at Ealing, £14 13s. 10d.; on the Farm, £15 16s. 11d.; at the Shaftesbury School, £14 10s. Iod.: at Twickenham, £17 Is. 6d.; and on the ships, £35 5s. An explanation of the very low cost per head shown by the Brixton Female Orphanage (a little over £8) is probably to be found in the large gifts of meat and other necessaries which are received in the course of the year.

For the considerable variation shown in the "Percentage" column there is no such ready explanation. Leaving out those institutions where, owing to the form in which the accounts are made up, it has not been possible to separate the salaries for management from the other salaries, the cost of management varies from 3'70 per cent. at the Metropolitan and City Police Orphanage up to 26'77 per cent. of the ordinary expenditure at the Orphan Working School. That a close investigation into the cause of such large differences is requisite few will gainsay. We have so far omitted the two lowest percentages, that of the Brixton Female Orphanage (3.22 per cent.), and of the Austral Street Orphans' Home (2.98 per cent.), because the management is in both cases honorary and so no comparison can properly be made with the large orphanages, where a different system prevails.

It will be noticed that this year the accounts of the Royal Albert Asylum which last year showed the highest percentage with 30.48 per cent. spent on management now occupies a lower position with only 19.03 per cent. of the ordinary expenditure assigned to management. The reason for this is that in previous years the amount of the interest on a mortgage raised by the Society in order to acquire the freehold of the property on which the Orphanage stands was included under management. As however this interest on the mortgage really amounts to a charge for rent we have included it this year under maintenance. On this basis the figures for the previous year (1896) would have been as follows :—

So that on this basis the percentage management of total ordinary expenditure would be 18.31 per cent.

The analysis of the income does not present any very striking features. Nearly all the institutions receive a certain proportion of their income from invested property, while about one-half receive something directly from or on behalf of the inmates.

In using the figures given in the tables it must be borne in mind that hardly any two societies make up their accounts in the same way, and that therefore it is most difficult to make an exact comparison. In most of the charities included on page 110 however, we have had the assistance of the officials connected with them in getting out the figures, so that for practical purposes they may be taken as pretty nearly on identical lines. The

necessity for some uniform system of preparing the accounts of these institutions is borne in on us more strongly year after year, and our readers must bear with us if we again and again in the course of these preliminary chapters urge on the committees the importance of such a course. At the present time, as we know from letters we have received and from interviews we have had with them, the secretaries of general charities, owing to the various ways in which the accounts are made up, the officials find it well nigh impossible to compare the expenditure of their institutions with that of others of a similar character. It is, therefore, impossible for any one of them to learn from the others where there might be savings, or what items might without in any way impairing the efficiency of the institution be reasonably cut down.

CHAPTER V.

GENERAL CHARITIES: CONVALESCENT HOMES AND INSTITUTIONS FOR THE BLIND AND DEAF AND DUMB.

Convalescent Homes—General Considerations—Cost of Management— Table containing an Analysis of the Income and Expenditure of typical Convalescent Homes for the year 1897—Societies for helping the Blind —The Elementary Education (Blind and Deaf Children) Act, 1893—The Cost of Management—Societies for Helping the Deaf and Dumb— Cost of Management—Table containing an Analysis of the Income and Expenditure of typical Institutions for the Blind and the Deaf and Dumb, for the year 1897.

AFTER the doctors have done their part, whether in hospital or sick-room, there comes the stage of convalescence, when nothing but a change of air and scene can give new life and vigour to body and mind. The cramped, and often crowded and unhealthy dwellings of the poor afford no chance to the invalid of recovering a healthy tone of body or elasticity of spirits. It is for this time of languor and debility that those merciful institutions, Convalescent Homes, provide. An examination of the list given in this book, on pages 621 to 652, will show what an important, nay invaluable part they play in the work of charity. They are spread over a wide area; on healthy spots near large cities, and on many a breezy site by the seaside. Some are for children only, some for women, some for men, and others for all sorts; but all have the same beneficent object in view-the restoration of health and strength after sickness. Perhaps, from a good doctor's point of view, these are, next to hospitals, the most valuable of all charitable institutions. Certainly no others are spoken of with more enthusiasm by the medical profession, the members of which are so capable of appreciating the great benefits conferred by these homes on their patients at a most critical time.

About £300,000 was spent in 1897 on the homes mentioned in the body of this book. Owing to the general employment of honorary services, the expenses of management are as a rule most moderate. This is one of the most pleasing features of these institutions. Secretaries, treasurers, physicians, surgeons and dentists devote their time and skill, without pay, to the good work with the greatest willingness; and the result is that the money subscribed is spent in securing the advantages of the homes for the greatest number of poor invalids. Another point which may be noted with peculiar satisfaction and approval is the extent to which ladies are engaged in the work. Their names usually appear on the lists of Managing Committees ; they serve often as honorary officers, and most of the homes have a special Ladies' Visiting Committee. It would be impossible to form an exaggerated estimate of the value of their influence and help, and it would be a distinct advantage if that influence and help could be secured for every charitable institution in the country which undertakes the care of women and children.

The reports are pleasant reading, and not less so because of the utter absence of the sickening cant which characterises those of so many homes of other sorts. There is nothing to remind the reader of the humbugging phrases of the professional beggar. A good case for aid is ' made out in simple language, and the excellent results of the work are set out in modest and sensible terms.

We would gladly help the committees in one matter which is a source of continual difficulty to them. Subscribers cannot be made to understand that a Convalescent Home is *not a Hospital*. They persist in giving their orders for admission to patients who need continuous treatment by physician or surgeon, and active nursing. Such cases cannot be treated in the same institution as convalescents, but have to be rejected and sent back, on arrival. Much inconvenience and considerable suffering would be saved these patients if subsoribers would bear this in mind.

That the working classes appreciate the good work of these institutions is shown by their contributing in many instances to the funds, and by the institution in recent years of Convalescent Homes in connection with Hospital Saturday Funds and Friendly Societies.

The terms of admission are, as may be seen by reference to the list at the end of this work, most elastic and easy, and any one who is interested in a poor man, woman or child recovering from sickness, will find no difficulty in getting them admitted to a suitable home. Nor is there any other form of charity kinder or more serviceable than securing thus a perfect restoration to health.

THE TABLES.

A careful study of the tables giving an analysis of the accounts of twenty-six typical convalescent homes, which will be found on page 117 will bear out our contention that the cost of management is most moderate. Thus it will be seen that with but ten exceptions the cost of management is 5 per cent. of the ordinary expenditure and under. Indeed, in some of the cases it is even less than I per cent. The two homes which expend the highest percentage are the Caxton Convalescent Home, Limpsfield, with over 36 per cent., and the West of Scotland Convalescent Home with nearly 19 per cent. In the first of these cases the home is run by working men, and the amount of honorary service is necessarily less than in the case of other homes. In the second case compared with other institutions, the office salaries are high, and account for about eight-ninths of the total cost of management. Leaving these two homes out of consideration it will therefore be seen that two-thirds of the homes are managed at 5 per cent. or less of the ordinary expenditure, and of the remaining third, only about one home spends more than double that percentage on management. The

cost per inmate comes out roughly as follows: One home (the Mary Wardell Convalescent Home for Scarlet Fever Cases, where the expenses are necessarily much higher than at an ordinary home) expended about £9 8s. per head; one expended between £6 and £7; one expended about £5 9s.; one about £4 14s.; two expended between £3 and £4; eight between £2 and £3; seven between £1 10s. and £2; three between £1 and £1 10s. and one about 19s. 6d. a head. As the average stay at a convalescent home is about two weeks, it will be seen that at half the homes given in the table each patient is fed, housed, doctored or nursed if necessary, and looked after generally for a cost of under £1 a week.

SOCIETIES FOR HELPING THE BLIND.

Sympathy with the blind is a universal feeling, which naturally expresses itself in wide-spread associations, whose aim is to help them in every possible way. Schools, asylums, workshops and other institutions which make the welfare of the blind their care, flourish in all parts of the country, and are, apparently so conducted as to be thoroughly deserving of confidence. The greater number wisely aim at teaching the blind to earn their own living, and workshops in which occupation, instruction, and even regular wages are given, form a most important part of their operations. Nothing could be better for those who would otherwise be helpless and listless members of society, than to be taught some useful handicraft. Recently it has been suggested that the practice of massage might well be undertaken by the blind. No doubt this will prove a fresh field of usefulness for this afflicted class of persons, but the fact of their being blind and unable to note the many signs which tell the experienced masseur or masseuse what effect the process is having upon the patient will tend to limit their utility.

Conspicuous amongst the institutions for the blind for the success it has achieved in making up for the loss of the most valuable of the senses, is the Royal Normal College, Norwood. There the blind are trained as musicians (for which profession they show peculiar aptitude), pianotuners, and skilled workmen in various crafts; and want of sight seems to be no bar to excellence in gymnastics, cycling, and other athletic pursuits.

This society has made arrangements to annul the agreement which gave the School Board the legal control of the College, a proceeding which will entirely change the character of the College from a school under the School Board to a National institution for the higher education of the Blind.

In one respect the schools for blind children, as also those for the deaf and dumb, are placed in a new position by the passing of the Elementary Education (Blind and Deaf Children) Act of 1893. Under its provisions Boards of Guardians and School Boards are empowered to send children to these schools, and to pay two-thirds of their cost, leaving one-third to be provided by subscriptions. We notice that the managers of many of these schools express doubts as to the effect of this Act on their funds; but we cannot but think it must in the end be beneficial to the institutions, and enable them to extend their operations, so that every blind, or deaf and dumb child in the country will ultimately come under their care. Already numbers of such children have joined the schools.

We would, however, impress upon subscribers that, inasmuch as only two-thirds of the expense of such pupils can be paid by local authorities, schools for the blind and deaf and dumb will need more rather than less help in the future.

With but four exceptions the percentage which the cost of management is of the ordinary expenditure reaches 10 per cent. and over, and in one case it is as much as 18 per cent. This in some instances is no doubt due to the impossibility, owing to the way that the accounts are made up, of separating the office salaries from those which would properly belong to teaching and the maintenance of the institution. In only a few instances are figures given in the column headed "Annual Cost per Inmate." This is because the admission of day-pupils—of the cost of whom no separate account can be kept—prevents any accurate calculation being made.

THE DEAF AND DUMB.

Few words are needed to commend the admirable work done by the many institutions for these afflicted ones, in all parts of the country. The improvements in the methods of teaching not only enable them now to understand, and to make themselves understood by the voiceless formation of words on the lips, but in institutions in which the " oral" system is taught it is stated that the dumb are made to speak in articulate tones. It is a great work thoroughly well carried out. From the typical societies, whose accounts we analyse on page 121, it will be seen that as a rule these Societies for the Deaf and Dumb are very economically managed, say on an average at 5 or 6 per cent. of the ordinary expenditurc. The cost per inmate, however, varies rather considerably, the lowest --- the Aberdeen Institute and the Liverpool School for the Deaf and Dumb-spending on an average about $\pounds 24$ per inmate, whilst the highest-the Claremont Institution at Dublinspends f.46 19s. 6d. on each inmate. We do not quite see the cause for such a large difference.

There is much to be desired in the form of accounts rendered by very many of the institutions of which we give examples on page 121. As a reference to the tables will show in many it is extremely difficult, in some utterly impossible, to separate the cost of management from other expenditure. It is, to say the least, disappointing that such bungling should be persisted in when a completely satisfactory method is offered in its place. Why cannot committees insist on the adoption of a Uniform System of Accounts such as that recommended in Chapter III. The change is urgently needed, for there is no hope of improvement, no possibility of proper comparison or reasonable enlightenment of subscribers, until

it is carried out. Are we to wait till subscribers themselves bring pressure on reluctant committees to effect the necessary reform?

We have endeavoured in this and the two previous chapters to lay before our readers an impartial summary of the work of the various general charities as distinct from hospitals, and to give them an insight into their expenditure and general financial position. We trust that nothing we have written will abridge the generosity or lessen the interest on which the best charities depend. Our aim is to do quite the reverse. We would stimulate subscribers to increase their contributions to all beneficent societies, and the managers to render their societies more and more worthy of confidence and support.

CHAPTER VI.

HOSPITAL FINANCE-INCOME IN 1897.

Income in 1897—Legacies in 1896 and 1897—Legacies received by London Hospitals—Legacies received by Provincial, Scotch and Irish Hospitals—General Summary of the Income for 1897—Receipts from Annual Subscribers, Donations, Hospital Sunday, Paying Patients and Invested Property—Analysis of the Income of 160 Metropolitan, Provincial, Scotch and Irish General and Special Voluntary Hospitals in 1897.

THE income of the 160 voluntary hospitals, general and special, London, provincial, Scotch and Irish (the names of which are given in the tables on pp. 129 to 134 during the year 1897 amounted to £1,778,585 against £1,619,534, for the year 1896. Of the hospitals' income during 1897, £1,240,274 represents ordinary income, £154,730 special donations, and £383,481, or 22 per cent., was derived from legacies. The sum derived from legacies in 1896 was £381,020, or nearly 24 per cent. of the total income from all sources, viz., £1,619,534.

LEGACIES IN 1896 AND 1897.

The table given below shows which classes of hospitals have been the greatest gainers or losers with regard to legacies during the year 1897 :---

THE LEGACIES RECEIVED BY LONDON HOSPITALS.

It will be seen from the above table that the 160 hospitals with which we are dealing have received as a whole in legacies only about £2500 more in 1897 than in 1896. The chief increases of 1897 over 1896 are shown by the London medical schools and the London special hospitals by whom over £210,000 were received in legacies in 1897 against £75,000 in 1896, and £182,000 in 1895. The year 1897 was a good year for the London hospitals from the legacy point of view-better than any year since 1891, except 1892, as will be seen from the following figures: The legacies received during this period by the fifty-eight metropolitan hospitals included in the tables on pp. 129 to 134 were, in round figures, as follows: In 1891, £135,000; in 1892, £267,000; in 1893, £154,000; in 1894, £137,000; in 1895, £191,000; in 1896, £111,000, and in 1897, £225,000.

THE LEGACIES RECEIVED BY PROVINCIAL, SCOTCH AND IRISH HOSPITALS.

It will be observed that the legacies received by hospitals outside the Metropolitian area in 1897 compared with 1896 show a decrease in nearly every case. Provincial hospitals with medical schools received £24,000 less in legacies in 1897 than in 1896, while the general and special hospitals received about £9000 more. Scotch hospitals, received about £90,000 less than in the previous year, and about £18,000 less than in 1895. Irish hospitals, too, received about £5000 less from this source in 1897 than in 1896, and over £1000 less than in 1895. The total expenditure upon new buildings and extraordinary repairs at the 160 hospitals given in the tables was £162,991, of which about £85,000 was expended by the fifty-eight metropolitan hospitals, a fact which we once again commend to the earnest attention of those immediately concerned.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

This year we have as usual analysed the income returns of 160 voluntary hospitals situated in London, the provinces, Scotland and Ireland, the details connected with each institution being set forth in the tables which follow. Of these 160 hospitals, 32 having medical schools attached, possess an income of $\pounds 934,787$; the income of 81 general hospitals without medical schools amounted to $\pounds 511,484$; whilst the income of the remaining 47 special hospitals in 1897 was $\pounds 332,214$. Generally it may be said that the income of the general hospitals in 1897, compared with 1896, shows an increase all round. Hospitals for children head the list of special hospitals this year with a total income of $\pounds 99,064$. Hospitals for consumption come next, with an income of $\pounds 79,756$, a considerable falling off, owing to a dearth of legacies. Although the special hospitals represent nearly one-third of the number of the institutions dealt with in the tables, their combined income was less than one-fourth of the whole sum received by the 160 hospitals during 1897.

Some instructive facts are deducible from the analysis of the different sources of income and the percentage which each bears to the total. It will be seen, for example, that the general hospitals of London are far behind the special hospitals of the metropolis and all other hospitals throughout the country in the matter of annual subscribers, only 10.5 per cent. (a decrease of 0.6 per cent. as compared with 1896) of their revenue being derived from this source, whereas the London special hospitals received 31.1 per cent. (an increase of 3.3 per cent. as compared with 1896) from annual subscribers. The provincial general hospitals received 28.8 per cent.; provincial special 28.9 per cent.; Scotch general 29.4 per cent.; and Scotch special hospitals, 40.6 per cent. from the same source.

Donations in 1897 represented about 18 per cent. of the income of the general hospitals, the London hospitals receiving 21'4 per cent., the provincial 14'1 per cent., and the Scotch 22.2 per cent. from this source. On the other hand, special hospitals derived 22'I per cent. of their income from this source, as compared with 31.7 per cent. in 1896. This apparent drop in the percentage of donations received is due to the fact that this year a separate column has been set aside for special donations made for building and endowment purposes. We may mention that the Irish hospitals, having failed to adopt the uniform system and the account keeping being none too precise, it is impossible to accurately ascertain the actual sums contributed to revenue in annual subscriptions and donations respectively. We feel called upon to repeat that we think that the Dublin Hospital Sunday Fund, which has done so much to promote the efficiency of the Dublin hospitals, might usefully turn its attention to this question of accounts, and enact that to qualify for a grant each institution must keep its accounts on the uniform system and present them duly audited by a public accountant. We might then hope to find that the example set by Dublin was followed by other Irish hospitals throughout the country, which latter leave much to be desired so far as their accounts are concerned at the present time.

Hospital Sunday and Saturday Funds account for about 9 per cent. of the income of the general hospitals and about 8 per cent. of the income of the special hospitals under consideration. The London general hospitals received 6 per cent. from these sources; provincial general hospitals, 13.4 per cent.; Scotch general hospitals, 4.2 per cent.; Irish general hospitals, 5.7 per cent. The special hospitals received in London 10.3 per cent. and in the provinces 7.4 per cent. of their income from these sources.

We welcome the tendency to admit paying patients into all classes of hospitals. The London general hospitals received a little over 2 per cent. from this source in 1897, as compared with about $2\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. in the previous year, $2\frac{1}{2}$ per cent in 1895, 2 per cent. in 1894 and less than 1 per cent. in 1893. The Scotch general hospitals show an increase from 3.6 per cent. to 6.1 per cent.; Irish general hospitals show a decrease from 77 per cent. in 1895 to 66 per cent. in 1896; and provincial hospitals remain stationary at about 2 per cent. Taken all round, the general hospitals received 2.6 per cent. of their ordinary income from patients' payments in 1897. The special hospitals have always encouraged their patients to pay, according to their means, for benefits they received. Hence the income received by special hospitals from patients' payments is much greater than it is in general hospitals. Thus in 1897 patients' payments amounted to 10.4 per cent. in London, an increase of 0'3 per cent. compared with 1896, and to 18'9 per cent., an increase of 2'3 per cent., in the provinces. No doubt those hospital managers who are good men of business will take steps to encourage this source of income, which might be materially increased if more economy were enforced upon those charged with the duty of admitting both in- and out-patients,

Investments bring in about $36\frac{1}{4}$ per cent. of the ordinary income of general hospitals, and about $17\frac{1}{2}$ per cent. of the ordinary income of special hospitals. London general hospitals derive about 50 per cent. of their ordinary income from this source as against 27 per cent. for provincial general hospitals and 21 per cent. for Scotch general hospitals. The figures given for the Irish general hospitals include the county and Parliamentary grants voted each year to the hospitals included in the tables.

CHAPTER VII.

HOSPITAL FINANCE-EXPENDITURE IN 1897.

General View of the Expenditure in 1897—Separate Accounts of Actual Expenditure upon In- and Out-Patients necessary—General Summary for 1897—Tables giving Detailed Analysis of Expenditure under all Heads in 160 Metropolitan, Provincial, Scotch, and Irish General and Special Hospitals in 1897.

GENERAL VIEW OF THE EXPENDITURE IN 1897.

TURNING to the expenditure of the 160 voluntary hospitals, general and special, metropolitan, provincial, Irish and Scotch (the names of which are given in the Tables enumerated on pages 143 to 167 during the year 1897, we find that it amounted to £1,507,593 against the \pounds 1,473,414 which was expended by the same hospitals in 1896. The total expenditure of the thirty-two general hospitals with medical schools amounted to $\pounds751,942$ in 1897 as compared with £700,149 in 1896. Of these, the expenditure at the metropolitan hospitals was nearly £40,000 more than in 1896, owing to increased expenditure in 1897 on both ordinary expenditure and on new buildings and extraordinary repairs; provincial hospitals spent about \pounds 2000 less; Scotch hospitals about \pounds 24000 more than they did in 1896; and the Irish hospitals about the same as in 1896. The expenditure of all the eighty-one general hospitals without medical schools was \pounds_{4500} more in 1897 than in 1896, on account of increased ordinary expenditure. The forty-seven special hospitals mentioned expended together £285,515 in 1897 as against £309,915 in 1896 and £299,343 in 1895. Of these, consumption hospitals spent about £9000 less in

1897 than they did in 1896; children's hospitals £700 more than in 1896; women and children's hospitals £3500 less; women's hospitals about the same; lying-in hospitals £300 less; ophthalmie hospitals £400 more; the fever hospitals £8000 less; hospitals for the para-lysed and epileptie, about £2000 more; and the miseel-laneous special hospitals over £6000 less than in 1896.

SEPARATE ACCOUNTS OF ACTUAL EXPENDITURE UPON (a) IN-PATIENTS AND (b) OUT-PATIENTS.

After a good deal of eorrespondence, we have estimated the cost of an out-patient at the various hospitals as follows ·---Per

This estimate is at best a makeshift. It is humiliating to be obliged to make this confession, but until the managers of the various institutions mentioned in the tables become alive to the importance attaching to a system of separate accounts of the actual expenditure upon (a) in-patients and (b) out-patients to enable them to properly enforce economy throughout each establishment, we are compelled to content ourselves with the above estimate, based upon practical experience and worked out with the most accurate and painstaking detail, and a full eonsideration of the many eireumstanees which contribute to impose a larger outlay than ordinary in out-patient eases in particular groups of hospitals. We may further repeat for the information of the uninitiated that the eost of treating 1000 out-patients is about equal to the expenditure upon one constantly occupied bed, provided the administration of the institution in question is conducted with reasonable efficiency. We may add that the eost of treating 200 lying-in patients at their own homes through

the maternity department is equivalent to that of treating 1000 out-patients or of maintaining one constantly occupied bed.

The tables will be seen to include two columns—one giving the average cost of each bed occupied, after deducting the sums mentioned on page 138 per out-patient treated, and all extraordinary expenses, from the total expenditure; the other showing the average cost of each bed occupied on the total ordinary expenditure, that is, after deducting the cost of new buildings, and other special or extraordinary outlay. We have printed the foregoing sentences in italics, as one London Secretary attacked our figures before the Lords' Committee, on the ground of their being inaccurate, because they were based on the total expenditure, whereas his contention was that extraordinary expenditure upon buildings and other matters should be deducted. In these calculations an allowance of 10s. for each lying-in case and of 4s. for each case treated at home has been made, a fact which should be borne in mind when considering the relative bearings of the figures in question. We may add that it would be unreasonable, if not unjust, to draw invidious comparisons from the figures, as they work out in the case of the various institutions, without fully allowing for the differences, which we have not failed to notice in previous volumes of this book, and which we have illustrated in Chapter XI. of the 1897 edition and Chapter IX. of the 1896 edition in dealing with the hospital commissariat.

GENERAL SUMMARY.

We have thought it may be helpful for purposes of easy reference and comparison first to summarise the average cost of each bed occupied during the year 1897. This is arrived at by dividing the average number of beds daily occupied into the total ordinary expenditure, with the deduction of a certain sum (see page 138) for each outpatient.

LONDON HOSPITALS.

Expenditure over £100 pcr bcd occupied.—Of fifty-eight London hospitals, seventeen had an expenditure of over £100 per bed occupied, of which six were general hospitals.

Expenditure over £90 per bed occupied.—There were two general hospitals and one special hospital.

Expenditure over £80 pcr bed occupied.—There were fifteen hospitals in this group, of which five were general and ten were special.

Expenditure over £70 per bed occupied.—There were nine hospitals in this group, of which five were general hospitals and four special.

Expenditure over £60 per bed occupied.—There were ten institutions in this group, four general and six special.

Over $\pounds 50$ per bed occupied.—There was one special hospital in this group.

Expenditure over £40 per bed occupied.—There were two hospitals in this group, one general and one special.

Expenditure over f_{30} *per bed occupied.*—There was one special hospital in this group.

PROVINCIAL HOSPITALS.

Of seventy-five provincial hospitals, one general hospital had an expenditure of over \pounds 100 per bed occupied, and one general and one special hospital an expenditure of over \pounds 90 per bed occupied.

Expenditurc over £80 per bed occupied.—There were four general hospitals in this group.

Expenditure over £70 per bed occupied.—There was one general and one special hospital in this group.

Over £60 per bed occupied.—There were twenty general hospitals in this group.

Over f_{50} per bed occupied.—There were twenty-five general hospitals and one special hospital included under this head.

Over £40 per bed occupied.—There were fourteen hospitals, all being general. Over f_{30} per bed occupied.—There was one general hospital in this group.

Over £20 per bed occupied.--One special hospital came under this head.

SCOTCH HOSPITALS.

There are sixteen Scotch hospitals included in the Tables, and of these we have particulars concerning fourteen.

Over $f_{.50}$ per bed occupied.—There were eight hospitals in this group, seven general and one special.

Over £40 per bed occupied.—There were four general hospitals in this group.

Over £30 per bed occupied.—There were two special hospitals in this group.

IRISH HOSPITALS.

We give particulars concerning eleven of the Irish hospitals in the tables which follow.

Over £50 per bed occupied.—There was one special hospital in this group.

Over f_{40} per bed occupied.—There were five general hospitals and one special hospital in this group.

Over £30 per bed occupied.—There was one general and one special hospital in this group.

Over £ 20 per bed occupied.—There was one general hospital in this group.

We have information concerning one hundred and sixty general and special hospitals in England and Wales, Scotland, and Ireland (of which three Provincial hospitals two Scotch and one Irish do not appear in the foregoing summary owing to the absence of information necessary to complete the particulars).

SPECIAL NOTICE.

Chapter XI. entitled "What Hospital In-Patients Have to Provide for Themselves," should be thoroughly mastered before studying the figures in the Tables which follow.

LONDON HOSPITALS WITH MEDICAL SCHOOLS.

(Note.—All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts. Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

It will be observed that the average cost of each bed occupied on the total ordinary expenditure, after allowing for the cost of out-patients and home and lying-in cases, at the London voluntary hospitals with medical schools, was highest in 1897 at St. Thomas's and St. George's Hospitals, viz., between f. 101 and f. 102, a slight decrease from the year 1896. The Middlesex Hospital, which comes next, shows a slight increase of from $f_{.93}$ to $f_{.97\frac{1}{4}}$, a sum about midway between that expended in 1896 and 1895. The figures given for St. Bartholomew's are those for 1898 as the report for 1897 has not been received. An increase in the cost per bed occupied, comparing the years 1897 with 1896, is shown by nearly all the hospitals included in the table. These differences are due in a measure to the relative number of beds occupied during the years under consideration, the number being smaller in most cases. Thus at St. Mary's in 1897, when the average number of beds occupied was very low, owing to the closing of the hospital for two months, the average cost was f_{81} . In 1896, when the hospital was in full working, the cost fell to f_{10} Gg³. Again at University College Hospital 50 beds were closed for two months in 1897, and the cost per bed has consequently risen from $\pounds 76\frac{1}{2}$ to $\pounds 84\frac{1}{4}$.

It will be seen that the authorities of St. Thomas's Hospital have at last adopted the Uniform System, so that now practically all the London hospitals, and an ever-increasing number of the large English and Scotch hospitals, have adopted this method of keeping their books. This fact proves to demonstration that the Uniform System is now recognised as the best form of accounts for public institutions.

PROVINCIAL, SCOTCH & IRISH CLINICAL HOSPITALS.

(Note.—All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts. Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

In looking at the cost per bed of the provincial clinical hospitals, it will be noticed that, in half the cases the figures again show a steady decline per bed compared with the previous year. As regards the Scotch and Irish hospitals the cost per bed has slightly increased. Generally it will be seen that the expenditure per bed is surprisingly less than at the metropolitan clinical hospitals. This is plainly shown by the column giving average cost per in-patient per day. Whereas in the metropolitan hospitals the average was 4s. 10d., in 1897, at the hospitals in the tables now under consideration the average is about 3s. On reference to the analysis of the accounts, it will be seen that the Liverpool Royal Infirmary spends least per bed occupied on provisions. This is due partly to the fact that the nurses are supplied from the Nurses' Home, to which a fixed sum of £2200 is paid, covering cost of their food and other expenses. This also accounts for the relatively high cost per bed on maintenance, salaries, etc.

The average total cost per occupied bed (without allowing for outpatients) at the hospitals included in this group, exclusive of the Miller and the Metropolitan, is about £83; or allowing for out-patients, £67. We exclude these two hospitals because their expenditure is so abnormal as to raise the average cost per bed, if they are taken into consideration, by no less than f_{II} in the one case, and about f_0 in the other. The cause for this apparently excessive expenditure at the Miller is the relatively large number of patients treated at the dispensary, the expenditure upon whom should certainly be kept separately from that of the hospital. For the large expenditure per bed at the Metropolitan (about 47 per cent. higher than the average cost at the other hospitals in this group) the reason is not apparent, and we feel obliged to again call attention to it, especially as there was an increase in 1897 of \pounds 7 per bed occupied as compared with 1896. Taking the average cost per bed occupied, after allowing for out-patients, we find that with the exception of the West London there have been increases at all the other hospitals in this table.

The objection has been raised to our calculation of the average cost per occupied bed under each head of expenditure, seeing that some of the expenditure has been entirely due to the out-patients. We think it well to repeat therefore that there must be a unit of comparison, and where the latter is made upon a uniform plan, it is equally fair to all institutions.

PROVINCIAL GENERAL HOSPITALS WITHOUT MEDICAL SCHOOLS.

(NOTE.—All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts. Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

This is a very interesting section to study. The institutions given contain collectively nearly 7000 beds, and have relieved upwards of 400,000 patients during the year 1897. The average cost of an occupied bed at the 57 institutions included in the section during 1896 was about £57, *i.e.*, about f_{9} less than similar hospitals situated in the Metropolis. Among the larger hospitals containing 100 beds and upwards the highest expenditure, after allowing for the cost of out-patients, was $\pounds 82\frac{1}{2}$ at the Sussex County Hospital, an increase of about £5 per bed on the previous year The next highest cost was incurred at the Royal Hants County (1806). Hospital at Winchester, where $\pounds 81\frac{3}{4}$ per bed was expended. The authorities at the Royal Hants County Hospital, however, in calculating the average cost per bed, etc., deduct in their calculations the wages of and cost of provisions supplied to the Private Nurses. The deduction of these items reduces the cost per bed to \pounds_{73} , the cost per in-patient to \pounds_{7} and the cost per in-patient per day to 3s. 4d. Generally we regret to say the figures show an increase in the cost per occupied bed when 1897 is compared with 1896. Some few of the hospitals, however, show a steady decrease during the past five years. For instance, the Salford Royal Hospital cost f_{47} per occupied bed in 1893, $\pounds_{43\frac{1}{4}}$ in 1894, \pounds_{36} in 1895, $\pounds_{37\frac{1}{2}}$ in 1896, and $\pounds_{39\frac{3}{4}}$ in 1897; the East Suffolk and Ipswich Hospital, \pounds_{56} in 1893, $\pounds_{53\frac{1}{4}}$ and $\pounds_{49\frac{3}{4}}$ in 1894 and 1895 respectively, $\pounds_{48\frac{1}{4}}$ in 1896, and $\pounds_{48\frac{3}{4}}$ in 1897; and at the Stockport Infirmary, $\pounds 76$, $\pounds 73$, $\pounds 69\frac{3}{4}$, $\pounds 67\frac{3}{4}$, and $\pounds 62\frac{3}{4}$ respectively.

A point which must not be overlooked in using the tables is that in the case of the Royal Albert Hospital, Devonport, the Hospital is composed of two sides a General Hospital and a Lock Hospital. Although therefore as regards cost per bed the Royal Albert compares favourably with other hospitals included in the table, the fact that the diet, nursing and medical expenses on the two sides are quite different renders a comparison somewhat difficult.

We would also call attention to this fact. All the hospitals whose accounts are analysed in these tables do not make up their accounts on the Uniform System and in some cases the accounts are not given in sufficient detail. The result is that it is not possible in every case to get all the lesser items under their proper headings, though by consultation with the hospital authorities this has been done to an extent which is, though we say it, a testimony to the care we have always exercised to endeavour to make the figures we give accurate. For instance, in the case of the Taunton and Somerset Hospital, soap, blue, washing requisities and candles are included in one sum with groceries which appear under "provisions" whilst the wages paid to the laundry women are given under servants' wages under the heading "Salaries and Wages".

We would point out that in two cases, the Royal Surrey County Hospital and the Bootle Borough Hospital, we have not been able to work out the averages as the average number of beds occupied daily cannot be ascertained. WITHOUT MEDICAL SCHOOLS, 1897.

SCOTCH AND IRISH GENERAL HOSPITALS WITHOUT MEDICAL SCHOOLS.

(NOTE.--All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts. Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

The Uniform System of accounts is becoming more and more adopted in Scotland, though the number has not been added to this year in the case of those Scotch hospitals which are included in these tables. The Aberdeen and Dundee Royal Infirmaries, the Kilmarnock Hospital, the Royal Aberdeen Hospital for Children, and the Ayr County Hospital have set an excellent example in this respect, and we hope every Scotch hospital, small and great, which aims at securing efficiency, will resolve to introduce the Uniform System without further delay. Irish hospitals, or some of them, might with advantage adopt the Uniform System. We still do not know of any Irish hospital which has adopted the Uniform System, and so they are at a disadvantage which the best of them ought to remedy without delay.

SCOTCH HOSPITALS.—The Perth County Infirmary no longer maintains the premier position in regard to cost per occupied bed, which again this year is taken by the Ayr County Hospital. All the hospitals in the table, except the Paisley Infirmary and the Kilmarnock Hospital, show a decrease in the expenditure per bed occupied, due in a measure no doubt to the fact that the average number of beds occupied was slightly greater in 1896 than it was in 1897.

IRISH HOSPITALS.—It will be seen that only five Irish hospitals are included in this group. The average cost per bed occupied is very small, being only about $\pounds 40$, a sum much below the average which efficiency demands. This smaller cost Irish hospitals no doubt secure because the population, and with it the demands upon the resources of the institutions, tends to decrease rather than to increase. In these circumstances the managers have little, if any, encouragement to incur any expenditure which they can avoid, because they have not the impulse of public opinion behind them to the extent which the managers of those institutions have who are constantly called upon to increase both the volume and efficiency of their work.

The cost per occupied bed at the South Charitable Infirmary at Cork fell in the years 1891 to 1894 from $\pounds 42$ in the former year, when the average number of beds occupied was 68, to $\pounds 36\frac{1}{2}$ in the latter year, when the average number of beds occupied was 73, rose again in 1895 to $\pounds 43$ with 70 beds occupied, and fell again in 1896 to $\pounds 37\frac{3}{4}$ with 68 beds occupied. The Queen's County and the Donegal County Infirmaries spent $\pounds 43\frac{3}{4}$ and $\pounds 43\frac{1}{2}$ per bed in 1897 as compared with $\pounds 43^{\frac{3}{4}}$, and $\pounds 49\frac{1}{2}$; a little over $f_{14}6$ in each case in 1895 and f_{139} and f_{50} respectively in 1894; County Down Infirmary expended $f_{41\frac{1}{2}}$ per bed and Fermanagh County Infirmary $\pounds_{26\frac{3}{4}}$ in 1897 compared with $\pounds_{34\frac{3}{4}}$, $\pounds_{33\frac{1}{2}}$, and $\pounds_{28\frac{1}{2}}$, $\pounds_{29\frac{1}{2}}$ respectively in 1895 and 1896.

SPECIAL HOSPITALS-CONSUMPTION.

(NOTE.-All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts. Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

The average cost of an occupied bed at a consumption hospital during the year 1897 varied from f_{1831}^{+} at the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest, to $f_{114\frac{1}{2}}$ at the Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest, and averaged about \pounds_{97} . The average number of patients who occupied each bed yearly was about 7 at the Brompton, 8 at the North London, 10 at the City of London, and about 12 at the Royal Hospital for Diseases of the Chest. The average cost per in-patient per day varied from 4s. 9d. at the Brompton to 6s. 5d. at the Royal Chest Hospital. Generally the expenditure per occupied bed diminished in the year 1897. Comparing, as we have done in past years, the expenditure in detail at the largest and the smallest of the hospitals on our lists-the Brompton and the North London Hospital for Consumption—we find that provisions cost f_{27}^{\ddagger} at the former against f_{26} at the latter; alcohol, $f_{1\frac{1}{2}}$ against about 5s.; surgery and dispensary, f_{12} against $f_{11\frac{1}{2}}$; domestic expenses, $f_{20\frac{3}{4}}$ against f_{14} ; salaries and wages, £28 against £12³/₄; and administration, £9¹/₂ at the former against $f_{122\frac{1}{2}}$ at the latter. It will again be noticed that at two out of the three remaining London hospitals so large a sum was spent upon administration as to be worthy of the special consideration of the authorities of the institutions immediately concerned.

HOSPITALS FOR CHILDREN IN GREAT BRITAIN.

Most of the London Children's Hospitals show an increase in the cost per occupied bed when compared with 1896. Thus the East London Children's Hospital has gone up from $\pounds 59\frac{1}{2}$ to $\pounds 64\frac{3}{4}$; the Victoria from $\pounds 84\frac{1}{4}$ to $\pounds 87\frac{3}{4}$; the Evelina from $\pounds 71$ to $\pounds 85\frac{1}{2}$; and the Paddington Green from $\pounds 69\frac{1}{2}$ to $\pounds 70\frac{3}{4}$. The Evelina Hospital for Sick Children which showed a large decrease in the cost per bed occupied, is still some $\pounds 12$ less than it was in 1895, it having been $\pounds 97\frac{1}{4}$ in 1895, $\pounds 71$ in 1896, and $\pounds 85\frac{1}{2}$, and this in spite of an increased number of patients. The cost per in-patient per day did not in 1897 show very great difference. Thus the highest in the case of London Hospitals was the Victoria Hospital with 4s. 11d. expended per in-patient per day, whilst at the lowest (the East London Hospital) the cost was only 3s. 7d. per day. An in-patient cost about 3s. a day in the provincial hospitals, given in the tables, and only about 2s. 4d. at the Scotch Hospitals.

Among the provincial hospitals the average cost per occupied bed at Manchester in 1896 was $\pounds 59\frac{1}{4}$ and at Birmingham $\pounds 78\frac{1}{4}$, a great increase in the latter case from the cost in 1896. The two Scotch children's hospitals where we have been able to get the figures to complete our calculations show in one case a smaller expenditure per bed occupied, viz., $\pounds 36\frac{1}{4}$ at Aberdeen, and in the other case a slight increase, *i.e.*, from $54\frac{1}{4}$ to $\pounds 54\frac{3}{4}$ at Glasgow. We wish, as we have before stated, that the authorities at other hospitals in Great Britain would follow the example of the Birmingham, Manchester, and Glasgow Children's Hospitals in keeping separate accounts for the expenditure upon the in-patient and the out-patient departments.

LONDON, PROVINCIAL, AND IRISH HOSPITALS FOR WOMEN AND FOR LYING-IN CASES.

(Note.-All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts. Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

In but very few cases do the reports of the women's hospitals state the average number of days each in-patient has been resident in the hospital. We have worked it out, however, in those cases where the authorities have failed to give the information, by reckoning the residence on the basis of the proportion of in-patients to each occupied bed. It will be seen on studying the column which gives the figures that the "average cost per in-patient per day" in the women's and children's hospitals in London varies from os. 11d. at the Grosvenor Hospital (where the fact that the patients were located in a small temporary hospital during the greater part of the year while the hospital was being rebuilt possibly accounts for the high expenditure) to 35. Sd. at the Royal Hospital for Women and Children. The cost per day at the hospitals for women now approximates more nearly than it used to, being 4s. 10d. and 5s. 7d. at the Chelsea and New Hospitals for Women, and 6s. 4d. at the Hospital for Women, Soho. In the case of the lying-in hospitals in London, the average cost per in-patient per day at the Rotunda Hospital, Dublin (i.e., 2s. gd.), is only about $\frac{4}{11}$ of the cost at the British Lying-in Hospital (i.e., 7s. 2d.). This difference is no doubt accounted for in the circumstance that the number of lying-in cases attended at their own homes at the British Lying-in Hospital is only 187, as compared with 2071 at the Rotunda, in addition to which 9634 out-patients were attended at the Rotunda. It should be borne in mind that the cost includes, in the case of lying-in hospitals, the board of pupils, a very considerable item at several of these special hospitals.

All the hospitals included in these tables show an increased expenditure per bed occupied in 1897 as compared with 1896, except the Royal Eye Hospital and the West of England Eye and Ear Infirmary at Exeter. The former shows a reduction of f_{21} per bed, and the latter has fallen from $f_{27\frac{3}{4}}$ to f_{127} . The increases are as follows : Royal London Ophthalmic, from f_{1592} in 1895 and $\pounds 61\frac{1}{2}$ in 1896 to $\pounds 64\frac{1}{4}$ in 1897; Western Ophthalmic, from $\pounds 43\frac{1}{4}$, and $f_{59\frac{3}{4}}$ to f_{73} ; Central London Ophthalmic, from $f_{36\frac{1}{2}}$ and f_{49} to $f_{61\frac{1}{4}}$; the Glasgow Eye Infirmary, from $£30\frac{1}{2}$ and $£30\frac{3}{4}$ to $£31\frac{3}{4}$; and the Royal Victoria Eye and Ear Infirmary, from $f_{25\frac{3}{4}}$ in 1896 to $f_{30\frac{1}{2}}$ in 1897. This latter institution is the amalgamation of the Royal National Eye and Ear Infirmary, Dublin, which formerly appeared in the tables with the St. Mark's Eye and Ear Infirmary. It is interesting and instructive to note how the average cost per in-patient per day differs at the London Hospitals and at the Provincial Hospitals, and the figures given in this column deserve attention and study. A matter well worthy of the closest investigation on the part of the authorities of these special hospitals is the proportion of in-patients to each bed occupied. It will be seen that whereas 28 patients are passed through each occupied bed at the Royal London Ophthalmic Hospital, only 10 inpatients are passed through each occupied bed at the West of England Eye Infirmary at Exeter. These facts account in some measure for the differences shown in the average cost per in-patient per day, because an ophthalmic in-patient, except possibly during the period when he is under active treatment, requires probably the simplest, and consequently the cheapest diet of

any hospital patient. Hence the fewer the number of in-patients to each occupied bed the cheaper must be the cost per in-patient per diem. Apart from all considerations of economy, however, it seems to us that the medical staff of the West of England Eye Infirmary ought to show cause why they retain their patients twice as long as other hospitals of a similar kind.

LONDON AND IRISH FEVER HOSPITALS.

(NOTE.—All the Tables in this Chapter are based on the Uniform System of accounts Hospitals which have adopted this system are marked with an U.)

Though the Tables relating to this class of institutions contain the particulars of only two hospitals, they are interesting and instructive. The proportion of in-patients to each bed occupied in 1897 was on an average 12 to 1 at each institution as compared with in the case of London 9 to 1 for the three previous years; and in the case of Dublin 13 to 1 in 1896 and 1895, and 17 to 1 in 1894. The average cost of each bed occupied in 1897 was $f_{14}8_{4}^{1}$ in London against £105 $\frac{1}{2}$ in 1896, £119 in 1895, £161 $\frac{1}{4}$ in 1894, and £82 in 1893; and £50 in Dublin against £36½ in 1896, £54½ in 1895, £67 in 1894, and £61 in 1893. The expenditure per occupied bed during 1897, 1896, 1895, 1894, and 1893 was made up as follows : Provisions— \pounds 33³/₄, \pounds 25¹/₄, \pounds 27³/₄, $\pounds_{42\frac{1}{4}}$, and $\pounds_{25\frac{3}{4}}$ in London against \pounds_{19} , $\pounds_{13\frac{1}{2}}$, $\pounds_{17\frac{3}{4}}$, $\pounds_{22\frac{3}{4}}$, and $\pounds_{21\frac{3}{4}}$ in Dublin; alcohol— $\pounds_{3\frac{1}{4}}$, $\pounds_{2\frac{1}{4}}$, $\pounds_{2\frac{3}{4}}$, $\pounds_{3\frac{1}{4}}$, and $\pounds_{1\frac{3}{4}}$ in London against \pounds_{4}^{3} , \pounds_{2}^{1} , $\pounds_1, \ \pounds_1^{\frac{3}{4}}, \ \text{and} \ \pounds_1^{\frac{1}{2}} \ \text{in Dublin}; \ \text{surgery and dispensary} - \pounds_2^{\frac{3}{4}}, \ \pounds_2^{\frac{1}{2}}, \ \pounds_2, \ \pounds_3^{\frac{3}{4}},$ and $\pounds 2\frac{3}{4}$ in London against $\pounds 1\frac{1}{2}$, $\pounds 1$, $\pounds 1\frac{1}{2}$, $\pounds 2\frac{1}{4}$, and $\pounds 2\frac{1}{4}$ in Dublin ; domestic expenses—£32, £18¹/₄, £21³/₄, £29¹/₂, and £13³/₄ in London against £10¹/₄, £8¹/₄, $\pounds_{11}, \pounds_{13\frac{3}{4}}, \text{ and } \pounds_{16}$ in Dublin; miscellaneous charges— $\pounds_{13\frac{1}{2}}, \pounds_{13}, \pounds_{10\frac{1}{4}},$ \pounds_{11} , and $\pounds_{6\frac{1}{4}}$ in London against $\pounds_{5\frac{1}{2}}$, $\pounds_{2\frac{3}{4}}$, $\pounds_{5\frac{1}{4}}$, $\pounds_{8\frac{1}{4}}$, and $\pounds_{4\frac{1}{2}}$ in Dublin; maintenance salaries, and wages $-\pounds_{3}8\frac{1}{2}$, $\pounds_{2}6\frac{3}{4}$, $\pounds_{3}0\frac{3}{4}$, $\pounds_{4}2\frac{1}{4}$, and $\pounds_{1}8\frac{3}{4}$ in London against $\pounds 9\frac{3}{4}$, $\pounds 8$, $\pounds 13$, $\pounds 11\frac{1}{2}$, and $\pounds 14$ in Dublin. The figures at the London Fever Hospital confirm the soundness of the opinion we have often expressed to the effect that the expenditure at a fever hospital, owing to the absence of continuous pressure upon its beds, must be treated upon an average of five years, to ensure a result upon which any sound deductions as to cost can in reality be made. The average number of beds occupied at the London Fever Hospital increased from 57 in 1891 through 98 in 1892 to 120 in 1893, fell to 56 in 1894, rose to 78 in 1895, to 100 in 1896, and fell again

to 71 in 1897, which accounts for the great differences in the cost per bed in the different years. There is no more useful institution in the metropolis than the London Fever Hospital, which adequately meets the need of well-to-do patients who are able and willing to pay for hospital treatment when suffering from fever or other infectious diseases. No rate-supported hospital under the control of a municipality or a health authority can be deemed efficient unless it provides special accommodation for paying patients. This accommodation is rendered the more necessary by the strict enforcement of the Act providing for the notification of infectious diseases. We have often advocated the throwing-open of fever hospitals during periods of the year when they are unoccupied, for the inspection of the public, so as to make people better acquainted with the excellent accommodation now provided in many public hospitals for the reception of fever and small-pox cases—accommodation which is often superior to that which it is possible to improvise in an ordinary dwelling-house.

In the cost and expenditure of the Dublin Fever Hospital is included that of Beneain's Convalescent Home.

It is interesting to note that at the National Hospital for the Paralysed and Epileptic and at the Hospital for Epilepsy at Regent's Park, where the proportion of in-patients to each bed occupied is 6 and 5 to 1 respectively, the average cost per in-patient per day is 4s. 2d. and 4s. 5d. respectively. It will be seen that the average cost per occupied bed at the nine special hospitals mentioned in the tables varies from $\pounds_{144\frac{1}{2}}$ at the St. Mark's Hospital for Fistula and $\pounds_{128\frac{1}{2}}$ at the Cancer Hospital to $\pounds_{37\frac{1}{4}}$ at the National Orthopædic Hospital, the average cost for the remaining hospitals being as follows: National Hospital for the Paralysed and Epileptic, $\pounds_{77\frac{1}{2}}$; Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis, $\pounds_{89\frac{1}{4}}$; National Hospital for Diseases of the Heart, $\pounds_{83\frac{3}{4}}$; Royal Orthopædic Hospital, $\pounds_{43\frac{1}{4}}$; London Lock Hospital, \pounds_{51} ; and Royal Ear, $\pounds_{60\frac{3}{4}}$.

CHAPTER VIII.

HOSPITAL SUNDAY.

The Success of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund—Brief Summary of the History of the Fund—The Collection in 1899—Sir Sydney Waterlow's work on behalf of the Fund—The Amounts Collected per 1000 of the Population in the United Kingdom—Tables showing the actual amount collected and the amount collected per 1000 of the Population; the Working Expenses, and the amounts paid over to the various Charities for the years 1895, 1896 and 1897.

THE Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund during the twenty-seven years of its existence has raised for the benefit of the hospitals a sum which exceeds $\pounds 1,000,000$ sterling. Sir Sydney Waterlow, who has been connected with the Fund from the outset and who was mainly instrumental in starting it in London, is therefore to be warmly congratulated on the fulfilment of the hope he recently expressed that he might live to see the amount collected reach this sum. We are sure that every one connected with hospitals will desire to offer the heartiest congratulations to Sir Sydney Waterlow on the attainment of this magnificent result, which justifies the publication in the present volume of a brief summary of the history of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund.

In 1873, when Sir Sydney Waterlow was Lord Mayor, he communicated with the Lord Mayor of Birmingham (in which town the Hospital Sunday Fund was first established in 1859), asking him for full particulars of the organisation and methods adopted. Sir Sydney's letter was handed by the Lord Mayor of Birmingham to the author of *Burdett's Hospitals and Charities*, and he prepared a statement and supplied all forms, with the aid of

which Sir Sydney Waterlow in 1873 instituted the Hospital Sunday Fund in London. In that year only 1072 congregations contributed, and the total receipts amounted to £27,700. There was an increase of £2000 in the amount collected in 1874, from which year the total receipts gradually diminished till they reached the minimum of $\pounds 24,905$ in 1878. An increase was then perceptible year by year, till the receipts rose to $\pounds 39,330$ in 1884, when the contributing congregations amounted to 1522. In 1885 the total receipts fell to $\pounds 34,320$, and in that year Dr. James Wakley, who was suffering from a mortal disease, sent for the writer and urged him to devise some scheme which would help the hospitals by increasing the interest in and collections on Hospital Sunday. After due deliberation, a number of public meetings were organised throughout London, at which some of the most eminent leaders of public opinion kindly consented to speak. Dr. Wakley, as editor of the Lancet, published a special supplement, which was edited by the author of this book, and widely circulated. In the result, the total receipts in 1886, although the contributing congregations only amounted to 1595, reached $f_{40,399}$. With a view of still further stimulating the interest of the public in the voluntary system of hospital support, the late Dr. Wakley and the present writer discussed together the outlines of a newspaper which should deal with all the questions involved in the maintenance of an adequate hospital system. In the result, the first number of The Hospital was published on 2nd October, 1886. In the year following Dr. Wakley's death (1887) the proprietors of the Lancet discontinued the issue of a special supplement, and The Hospital filled the void thus created by publishing a special supplement, and has continued the practice ever since. In 1888 the Lancet again issued a special supplement, and the present proprietors like *The Hospital* have continued to do so, and have circulated many thousands of abstracts from it amongst the congregations each year.

Up to and including the year 1892 the total receipts always exceeded $\pounds_{40,000}$, the maximum being reached in

1891, when they amounted to £45,331, including donations of $f_{1,5000}$ from the late Duke of Cleveland and f_{1000} from Sir Savile Crossley, Bart., the latter of whom continued to give a similar sum annually up to and including the year 1896. In 1893 the total receipts fell to £39,291, and in 1894 to £38,680, exclusive of a legacy of £5000 bequeathed by the late Mr. W. I. Whitaker. For about twenty years Mr. Henry N. Custance, the present secretary of the Fund, has laboured assiduously and successfully to increase the number of contributing congregations, which now amount to about 1800, as compared with 1072 at the outset. By his attention to the requirements of the poor who seek hospital and convalescent aid, and surgical appliances through the agency of the Fund, Mr. Custance has rendered yeoman's service. Still, the fact that the amounts received from congregations fell to £35,962 in 1894, the smallest sum received, with one exception, in any year since 1886, induced the proprietors of The Hospital to organise the special effort during the year 1895, which proved so successful that Hospital Sunday in London was lifted out of the rut of £40,000 and increased to $f_{,60,000}$.

This effort was originated by The Hospital newspaper, and was cordially supported by the editors of the metropolitan Press, who enthusiastically co-operated to make the effort a success. The Council of the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund in their report stated that nearly 60,000 copies of the special supplement of The Hospital were circulated at the cost of the editor and a few of his friends, and that £18,000 was sent in contributions to the Lord Mayor as the result of The Hospital appeal. This magnificent result of the special efforts of the Press raised the Hospital Sunday Fund in London in 1895 to the unprecedented sum of £60,360. Of this sum £38,370 was received from congregations, and $f_{21,990}$ from legacies and special donations. The last item includes the first dividend from the Court of Chancery on the Guesdon bequest of £45,346 $2\frac{3}{4}$ per cent. Consols, amounting to £904 for nine months; £3400 from the members of the Stock Exchange; $f_{10,000}$ from Messrs. B. I. Barnarto, David Marks, and about 500 friends; and f_{1000} each from Lord Iveagh, Sir Savile Crossley, Bart. (fifth year), and Mr. J. B. Robinson.

In 1896 there were 1811 contributing congregations, the largest number since the Fund was instituted, who collectively raised £,40,502 in the churches. Legacies, special donations, and dividends, brought the total sum received to f, 46,035, the largest sum ever received except that contributed during the previous year under the special circumstances already explained. In 1897 and 1898 the Fund somewhat languished, the number of contributing congregations falling to 1785, and the total receipts to about £40,750. 1897 was the Jubilee year in which the Prince of Wales started his special Fund for hospitals, and many people have thought and said that that Fund must interfere with the Hospital Sunday Fund. That this fear was groundless, however, is proved by the circumstance that during the year 1899 the total receipts are estimated by the Distribution Committee to amount to nearly £53,000 of which upwards of £50,000 was distributed amongst the hospitals. This £50,000 includes a special donation of £10,000 from Mr. George Herring, who has frequently shown the deepest interest in the work of the hospitals, and is one of their most bountiful and valued supporters. Mr. Densham also generously gave 1000 guineas to the Fund.

Sir Sydney Waterlow has occupied the position of vice-president to the Metropolitan Hospital Sunday Fund from the year of its institution, and has never missed being present at the meeting each year to move the adoption of the report of the Committee of Distribution. The Fund has greatly prospered under his direction, for when the committee began its work in 1874, only seventeen general hospitals, six convalescent homes, and three cottage hospitals applied for grants against thirty-one general hospitals, twenty-nine convalescent institutions, and fourteen cottage hospitals, asking help in 1899. These figures are very gratifying in view of the fact that the population of London increases so largely that a population approaching that of an average sized provincial town is added to the metropolis every year. It is pleasant further to be able to record that increased accommodation for the sick poor has been provided during the years the Fund has existed, which bears some proportion to the growth of population. We offer our sincere congratulations to the successive Lord Mayors of London, to Sir Sydney Waterlow, the vice-president, and to the Council and officers of the Fund, on the success which the Fund has achieved under their able administration.

We append, as usual, a statement in tabular form showing the progress made by the Hospital Sunday movement in the principal cities and towns in Great Britain and Ireland where collections are held. In addition to giving the total amounts collected during the years 1895, 1896 and 1897, we also show the working expenses and the nett sum distributed amongst the various charities. Other columns giving the amount collected within the limits of the borough, the population of the borough, and the amounts collected per 1000 of the population in 1897 are also added. As to the latter columns, we have continued the plan we commenced a couple of years ago of analysing with the assistance of the secretaries the collections in each town, so as to arrive at the sum contributed within the limits of the town, and have based our calculations per 1000 of the population on this amount.

Turning to the tables, we find that Liverpool in 1897 collected the largest sum per 1000 of the population, *viz.*, $\pounds 22.32$, while Southampton with $\pounds 16.07$, Carlisle with $\pounds 13.25$ per 1000, take second and third places. In these towns, however, the collections in workshops and on Hospital Saturday are included in the one fund, so that Cheltenham with $\pounds 13.12$ collected per 1000 of the population occupies a better place than is apparently the case. The other towns in which over \pounds 10 per 1000 was collected are: Bradford, $\pounds 12.92$; Southport, $\pounds 12.87$; Hastings, $\pounds 12.79$; Norwich, $\pounds 11.92$; Birmingham, $\pounds 10.83$; and Eastbourne, $\pounds 10.21$. In the case, however, of Bradford,

Hastings and Norwich, the collections include workshop and other similar collections. The towns which collected less than $\pounds I$ per 1000 of the population were: St. Helens, $\pounds 0.97$; Grimsby, $\pounds 0.77$; and Merthyr Tydvil, $\pounds 0.45$. Nine towns collected between $\pounds I$ and $\pounds 2$; twenty-six towns between $\pounds 2$ and $\pounds 5$; and ten towns between $\pounds 5$ and $\pounds 10$ per 1000 of the population.

CHAPTER IX.

HOSPITAL SATURDAY.

The Metropolitan Hospital Saturday Fund—Mr. Acland's Resignation of the post of Chairman—Workpeople's Contributions to Medical Charities in Nine Large Towns—Workpeople's Contributions Compared with Hospital Expenditure—The Largest Amounts Collected per 1000 of the Population in the United Kingdom—Tables Showing the Actual Amounts Collected and the Amounts Collected per 1000 of the Population; the Working Expenses; and the Amounts Paid Over to the Various Charities for the Years 1895, 1896 and 1897.

It may be well to repeat at the outset of this chapter what we have often stated, that those who are interested will find a complete history of the origin and progress of the Hospital Saturday Fund and the many questions which relate to it in the previous volumes of this book. It would be interesting, no doubt, to have recapitulated step by step the progressive development of this movement, the object of which is, or should be, to afford the readiest facilities to the artisan classes at the minimum of cost to contribute, according to their means, to the hospitals to which they, in common with all classes of the community, owe so much, but we feel that there are other subjects concerning the Hospital Saturday movement in the United Kingdom which are of more pressing interest at the present moment.

THE METROPOLITAN HOSPITAL SATURDAY FUND.

No one who has studied the management of this movement during recent years can fail to realise how great an improvement has been effected in its administration. The organisation and machinery at the present time is very good. Indeed it is not creditable to the intelligence or to the citizenship of the artisan class throughout the Metropolis that an organisation which, as a system reflects so much credit upon working men, should be treated so slightingly, and be so generally neglected as this Fund undoubtedly is at present. No doubt, as the committee is frank enough to admit, as a body it has made many mistakes, but it has nearly always shown a notable disposition to remedy errors of this kind when they have been proved to exist.

The most momentous fact in connection with the Hospital Saturday movement during the year 1899 has been the resignation of Mr. R. B. D. Acland of the post of Chairman of the Hospital Saturday Fund in London, which he has held since 1890. It is not too much to say that Mr. Acland has zealously devoted himself to the service of the Fund for many years past, and that one great result of his individual efforts has been to remove the general impression of indifference, which at times has amounted to hostility, which the majority of those most interested in the hospitals of the Metropolis have felt towards this Fund. By the exercise of great tact, by example, by courage, by insistence upon the enforcement of right principles in the administration of its affairs, and in many other directions Mr. Acland has won for himself and the Fund the cordial support of everybody who takes an intelligent and active interest in the development of the hospital system of London. He has united all parties within the Fund and has further brought about a better feeling by awakening sympathy in the work of the Fund in outsiders who have heretofore regarded it with suspicion and mistrust. These are no mean achievements, and the thanks of all those who know most about hospitals will be cordially given to Mr. Acland, who, we hope, will feel that his resignation has caused a general feeling of regret. We can quite understand the sorrow felt by Mr. Acland when it became inevitable owing to urgent private affairs for him to resign the post of Chairman of the Hospital Saturday Fund, but he has, we hope, the consolation of feeling that the work he has done in that responsible post is of a character to endure, and that it will certainly leave its mark upon the Metropolitan Hospital Saturday Fund so long as it continues to pursue its useful labours.

WORKING MEN'S CONTRIBUTIONS TO MEDICAL CHARITIES.

In the three previous volumes of this book we have endeavoured to arrive at the total sum contributed to hospitals and dispensaries by working men in the more active manufacturing centres. In the tables we have given in previous years, we have at considerable trouble and labour, with the assistance of the secretaries who kindly helped us in the inquiry, set out the amounts collected through (1) Hospital Saturday Funds; (2) Friendly Societies; and (3) from working men direct. The particulars of nine large towns where the working classes show an especial interest in the support of hospitals were This year we have not repeated the tables, as we given. have taken out the figures now for three years, and the results shown each year have been strikingly similar.

We, however, think it well to repeat the conclusions we have arrived at, as our work was an attempt to bring out clearly and impartially the total sum paid from every source to the medical charities by the working classes in great cities, the contributors being confined to the inhabitants within the county borough of each town. That is to say, non-residents have been eliminated from the population unit, and all gifts from outside districts have been carefully excluded. What we gave, therefore, were the actual contributions which had come absolutely out of the pockets of the working men, except so far as their masters might have encouraged their gifts by adding something to the workshop collections. It may be fairly stated, therefore, that the amounts given represented the free gifts of the working classes to the hospitals.

The working men of Wigan headed the list in 1896, the last year for which we gave figures, with a contribution of $\pounds 65.92$ per 1000 of the population. Next in order came Birmingham, where the contributions of the workpeople amounted to $\pounds 45.34$ per 1000. Next were Wolverhampton and Sunderland, with $\pounds 41.87$ and $\pounds 36.00$ per 1000 respectively, and then came Exeter, West Bromwich and London, with $\pounds 29.62$, $\pounds 26.82$, and $\pounds 24.51$ per 1000.

One of the most interesting facts brought out by the figures we gave was the circumstance that the plan we have always advocated, *viz.*, that which brings the working classes into direct communication with the individual hospitals, in preference to the plan of uniting the working classes through a central fund, which acts as a sort of breakwater between the hospitals and themselves, has nearly everywhere proved most fruitful in results. Thus the workpeople of Wigan—the premier town—sent the bulk of their contributions direct to the hospital, under 3 per cent. of the amount being contributed through the Hospital Saturday collection. At Sunderland, the fourth on the list, between 4 and 5 per cent. only of the total contributions was derived from Hospital Saturday.

A further point which we brought out was the percentage which the amount contributed by the working classes was of the expenditure of the medical charities in each town. We did this by taking the total expenditure (a) of the hospitals, and (b) of all the medical charities of each city or town, and the actual contributions of (c) the workpeople to the hospitals, and (d) the workpeople to the hospitals and dispensaries, including patients' payments and fees and payments to dispensaries, etc., and then ascertaining what percentage these contributions were of the total expenditure. If, for instance, it was found that out of every f_{I} expended in any town on medical relief two-fifths was contributed by the working classes, it followed that three-fifths of the amount must be provided from other sources, *i.e.*, from subscriptions, donations and legacies contributed to the medical charities by the wellto-do classes. It was found that the working men of Wigan and West Bromwich contributed nearly 10s. out of every f_{1} , *i.e.*, 49 per cent. of the total ordinary expenditure of all the medical charities. In Sunderland the workpeople contributed 45 per cent., or about 9s. of every £1 expended by hospitals and medical institutions upon medical relief. At Birmingham, if we include, as we have done in the other cases, patients' payments, fees, subscriptions for dispensary tickets, etc., the working classes contributed 39 per cent., or about 7s. 10d. in the f_1 . Out of every f_1 expended upon medical relief in Wolverhampton, the Finally, in working men gave 34 per cent., or 6s. 9d. London, where the vastness of the population must be taken into account, the working classes and the patients together contributed 2s. 7d. out of every f_{I} expended upon medical relief by the Metropolitan hospitals and dispensaries.

It having been pointed out to us that the figures heretofore received from the secretaries of the various Hospital Saturday Funds in the large towns included contributions from outlying districts; and that it was, therefore, unfair to estimate the contributions of the workpeople in any town by dividing the total sum collected by the Saturday Fund, by the population of the particular town, we, in the 1896 volume, gave the total amount

contributed from all sources per 1000 of the population, including the inhabitants of the outlying districts from which the chief contributions were received. As we then stated, we did not think this was quite fair to all the towns in the tables, and so in the 1897 volume we endeavoured—with the co-operation of the secretaries of the various funds—in the last three figure colums to confine the figures to the amounts contributed within the limits of the borough boundaries. This practice we have continued this year.

Of the towns mentioned in the tables Wigan again takes first place, with a contribution of $\pounds 71'43$ per 1000 of the population of the town, an increase of $\pounds 8$ per 1000 or nearly 2d. a head; Birmingham is again second with $\pounds 30'61$, an increase of about $\pounds 4$ 10s. per 1000; Wolverhampton is third with $\pounds 29'95$; Coventry is fourth with $\pounds 29'45$; Sunderland is fifth with $\pounds 26'01$; West Bromwich is sixth with $\pounds 22'13$; Wakefield is seventh with $\pounds 18'49$; and then come Burton-on-Trent $\pounds 18'44$; Lancaster, $\pounds 18'04$; Leeds, $\pounds 17'97$; Leicester with $\pounds 17'33$; Preston, $\pounds 15'97$; Bolton, $\pounds 13'66$; Bootle with $\pounds 13'65$; Oldham, $\pounds 13'33$; Bury, $\pounds 13'19$; Warrington, $\pounds 12'97$; Exeter, $\pounds 11'90$; Derby, $\pounds 11'67$; Colchester, $\pounds 11'19$; Luton, $\pounds 10'33$; Blackburn, $\pounds 10'29$; and Nottingham, $\pounds 10'03$. Fourteen towns collected between $\pounds 5$ and $\pounds 10$ per 1000 of the population; nine towns between $\pounds 2$ and $\pounds 5$; and two (Hull and Belfast) between $\pounds 1$ and $\pounds 2$.

Taking the amounts collected by both the Hospital Sunday and Hospital Saturday Funds together in the towns mentioned in the tables on pages 176, 177, 185 and 186, we find that the following towns collected over \pounds 10 per 1000: Wigan, \pounds 72'92; Birmingham, \pounds 41'44; Wolverhampton, \pounds 33'29; Coventry, \pounds 32'07; Sunderland, \pounds 29'96; West Bromwich, \pounds 24'80; Burton-on-Trent, \pounds 23'72; Southport, \pounds 22'77; Lancaster, \pounds 22'53; Liverpool, \pounds 22'32; Leicester, \pounds 19'58; Preston, \pounds 18'85; Wakefield (Saturday Fund only), \pounds 18'49; Eastbourne, \pounds 18'16; Bootle, \pounds 18'02; Leeds (Saturday Fund only), \pounds 17'97; Bury, \pounds 17'56; Cheltenham, \pounds 16'89; Warrington, \pounds 16'17; Southampton, £16'07; Bolton, £15'28; Chester, £15'31; Oldham, £14'77; Derby, £14'74; London, £14'36; Colchester, £13'62; Luton, £13'53; Carlisle, £13'20; Exeter, £13'20; Bradford, £12'92; Hastings, £12'79; Stockport, £12'50; Blackburn, £12'22; Nottingham, £12'12; Norwich, £11'92; Plymouth, £11'35; Lincoln, £11'30; Swansea, £11'13.

NOTE.-The Hospital Sunday and Saturday Funds at Barnsley, Bournemouth, Bradford, Carlisle, Hastings, Liverpool, Manchester and Salford, Newcastle, Northampton, Norvich, and Southampton, are in each case managed by one Committee. As there is no way of arriving at an accurate division of the sums received and expended in these cases, we have given the total amounts collected and distributed by both funds in the Hospital Sunday Table.

CHAPTER X.

THE UNITED STATES, CANADA, AUSTRALASIA, AND INDIA.

Difficulties of Obtaining Information—Horse Ambulances—Rating and Water Supply—Cost per Patient per Day in the United States, the Colonies, and the United Kingdom—Table showing the Beds, Patients, and Cost per Day in Typical General Hospitals in the English-speaking World—Hospital Saturday and Sunday Funds in the Colonies—Sources of Income, with Table—Expenditure Table.

ONCE more for our own protection, and in order to explain the large number of notes which are appended to the tables which follow, we feel bound to call attention to the difficulties which beset the compiler of information concerning hospital and other charitable institutions. These difficulties are well exemplified by the returns upon which the information given in this chapter is based. Although the figures given have in many instances been kindly supplied by the institutions themselves, yet even in some of these cases, and in most of those where we have had nothing but the published reports to refer to, the methods of setting out the accounts are so various, and the details given so few, or so combined with other items, as to render it well-nigh impossible to get out the figures on an absolutely identical basis.

We have, however, to thank most heartily the everincreasing number of correspondents and superintendents of hospitals throughout the British Empire and the United States for their courteous co-operation in the compilation of this book.

HORSE AMBULANCES.

On reference to the body of this book, it will be seen that we have again this year specially noted those hospitals at which horse ambulances are kept for the removal of patients, and especially accident cases. In the United Kingdom, hospitals which possess a horse ambulance are few and far between, but the system is a marked feature of the hospitals in the United States of America, where even comparatively small hospitals boast of one, while the larger hospitals have two, three, and sometimes eight or nine constantly ready to be sent out. The system has never found favour in London, possibly owing to the fairly complete system of hand ambulances now provided for central London by The Hospitals Association, the St. John Ambulance Association, and the police, and to the number of hospitals crowded into this portion of London, which renders the use of horse ambulances unnecessary. Still, that a system of horse ambulances is needed in the suburbs of London is undeniable, and for this reason we would wish to see the example set by the United States followed more generally in the Metropolis. By this means a suitable vehicle for moving such cases in will be provided, and the delay which almost always occurs in removing an accident case in the outlying districts to the nearest hospital will be prevented. Besides its use in accident cases, there is also the equally important service which such a system will render in the removal of serious cases of illness from the homes of the patients when they reside at any distance from the hospital. Here again the amount of suffering prevented renders the cost entailed but a small consideration. Amongst the hospitals in the United Kingdom which have horse ambulances are the London, University College and the Seamen's Hospitals in London, the Birmingham General Hospital, the Bolton Infirmary, Leeds General Infirmary (2), Liverpool Northern Hospital, Oldham Infirmary, Preston Royal Infirmary, Royal Berkshire Hospital at Reading, Royal Albert Edward Infirmary at Wigan, Ayr

County Hospital, Dumfries and Galloway Royal Infirmary, Paisley Infirmary and Dundee Royal Infirmary. Outside London, in many instances the ambulance is horsed by a livery stable, a small sum according to a fixed scale being charged to the persons using the ambulance, and the vehicle being kept in order by the livery stable in return for this. Usually when the patient is unable to pay for the hire of the ambulance, the necessary sum is paid by the hospital. At Wigan, horse ambulances are stationed throughout the hospital district, each district bearing the cost of its own.

RATING AND WATER SUPPLY.

Another feature of the United States hospitals is the fact that in most cases their buildings are exempt from rating and taxation. They also, with but few exceptions, are supplied with an abundance of good water by the municipal authorities free of cost. This state of affairs obtains also in Australasia, in fact in Victoria the matter is carried further as charitable institutions are exempt from stamp duty, and receipts and cheques given by them are free of stamp tax.

COST PER PATIENT PER DAY IN THE UNITED STATES, INDIA, THE COLONIES, AND THE UNITED KINGDOM.

Following out our practice for the past two years, we have throughout the tables given the daily cost per patient in typical hospitals throughout Great Britain. In order to reduce the facts thus collected into a form in which the results can be readily compared, we publish on p. 191 a table containing such information in regard to typical general hospitals in every part of the English speaking world. In the case of the British hospitals we have confined the particulars to the general hospital in each class which has respectively the highest and the lowest cost per patient per day. Any one who desires to have further particulars of typical British general and special hospitals will find them set forth in the tables appended to Chapters VI, and VII. From the table we see that the highest cost per inpatient per diem at a general hospital in the United States of America is that at the Presbyterian Hospital, New York, namely, \$2:48 or 9s. 11d. Dividing the other hospitals into two classes, those with 200 beds and over, and those with under 200 beds, we find that in the former class at the Roosevelt Hospital, New York, the cost per in-patient per day was \$1:95 or 7s. 10d.; at the St. Luke's Hospital, New York, and at the Western Pennsylvania Hospital \$1:77 or 7s. 1d.; while at the other end of the scale are the City and County Hospital, at San Francisco with \$0:67 a day or 2s. 8d., and the Kansas City Hospital with \$0:35 or 1s. 6d.

In the second class the highest amount is expended at the Grace Hospital, Detroit, \$1.76 or 7s. 1d., and the lowest at the Wilkes Barre City Hospital, \$1.11 or 4s. 5d.

Turning to the Colonial institutions we find that in Canada only two of the three hospitals whose accounts we have analysed give the daily average number of beds occupied. These two expended \$1.30 or 5s. 3d. and \$0.90 or 3s. 7d. a day. In Australasia, the cost runs from 2s. 8d. at the Ballarat District Hospital, to 4s. 1d. at the Hobart General Hospital and the Launceston General Hospital. The two latter, however, had to contend with the disadvantage that only about two-thirds of their beds were constantly occupied in 1897. Unfortunately, the returns received from Johannesburg, though full in other respects, do not give data from which the cost per day can be worked out. In India the authorities of the Madras General Hospital return the cost per in-patient per day in the European wards at about 7 annas, or about 7d. a day. If we take the average cost per day of an in-patient at

If we take the average cost per day of an in patient it the general hospitals in London with medical schools it will be seen that it varies from 1.39 to 0.91, whilst at the English provincial hospitals with medical schools it is rather less, e.g., about 0.95 to 0.54. At the London general hospitals without medical schools it varies from 1.41 to 0.62, and at the English provincial hospitals of the same class from 1.48 to 0.54. In Scotland the

general hospitals with medical schools treated their patients at a cost varying from \$0.79 to \$0.68, whilst those without medical schools varied from \$0.83 to \$0.50.

As we have previously said, we are gratified to find that the figures show such comparatively trifling differences. It is indeed surprising that the cost throughout all these different institutions should in practice be found to approximate so closely as it does.

HOSPITAL SATURDAY AND SUNDAY FUNDS IN THE COLONIES.

Hospital Saturday and Sunday seem to be growing in favour in the Australasian Colonies, and the movement is spreading from the capital towns to those in outlying distriets. The two chief funds in Australasia are of course the Hospital Saturday and Sunday Fund Melbourne, and the Hospital Saturday Fund at Sydney. The institution of Hospital Sunday collections in Melbourne began twenty-five years ago, and during that time some £180,000 have been gathered for the charities. In the first year the amount collected was £3940; ten years later nearly double that amount was collected, and high water was reached in 1888, the year of the "boom," when $f_{12,482}$ was the sum. Every year after till 1895 the amount decreased, until in that year the sum was £3900. The next year saw a slight improvement, followed by a further fall last year and this, as bad seasons have been making their effect felt. It is right to remember that during the last few years a number of special appeals have been made. In 1898 the special appeal was for the Children's Hospital, which has built much-needed additions, and has not the wherewithal to meet the contractor's. bill at the end of the year, and a number of fêtes and bazaars have been held for different charities-for the. Melbourne District Nursing Society and the Austin Hospital for Incurables lately, amongst others-all helping to drain the money from the small population. Meanwhile, every hospital is more or less in debt, and all the charities

want money. In the country towns that held collections for their local hospitals on the same days as Melbourne there was a similar tale of decrease in the sums collected.

The Hospital Saturday fund in Sydney is registered under the Companies Act as a company not for profit, the qualification of membership being a subscription of \pounds I, but any society, workmen's club, or institute, or any five persons or more in one employment subscribing not less than \pounds I are entitled to elect a delegate who becomes a member of the Association without payment. Collections are made in the workshops, and on Hospital Saturday a street collection is organised throughout Sydney and its suburbs. The amounts collected show a steady increase, having more than doubled in four years, and the expenses are low, having regard to the nature of the collection, ranging from 5 to 6 per cent. of the amount collected.

SOURCES OF INCOME.

On p. 194 we give a table showing the principal items of income at typical hospitals in the United States, Canada, Australasia, South Africa and India. As we have pointed out before, it will be seen that the principal hospitals in the United States are mainly of two kinds,-voluntary and municipal. The municipal hospitals derive their chief revenue from the City funds. Here and there the city hospitals receive an occasional legacy, donation, or subscription of a small amount. In the main, however, the municipal hospitals are supported out of the City rates, though some receive a considerable revenue from patients' payments. It will also be observed that most of the hospitals in the table, though generally supported largely by the municipality or the State derive some revenue from invested property, whilst those in India, like the city hospitals elsewhere, are mainly dependent upon grants from the Government and patients' payments.

EXPENDITURE.

In the expenditure tables (pp. 196 and 197) the "Interest on Loans" column reveals the fact that as a rule business

men in the United States do not believe in running a hospital at such a loss as to necessitate the payment of large sums in interest to the bankers. This is very satisfactory, because it indirectly proves that the interest felt by individual citizens in the hospitals throughout the United States is constant and considerable. It further indicates that the financial management is on the whole satisfactory, although the fact that the majority of the hospitals are rate-supported may account in some measure for the circumstance to which we here refer.

The foregoing remarks are especially true of the Canadian hospitals, and also of the majority of those in Australia.

CHAPTER XI.

WHAT HOSPITAL IN=PATIENTS HAVE TO PROVIDE FOR THEMSELVES.

The Bearings of this Question upon the Cost per Bed—Metropolitan Hospitals which do and those which do not tax the In-patients— Provincial Hospitals which do and those which do not tax the Inpatients—The Practice in Scotland and Ireland.

ONE point which, as we have already pointed out, bears closely on the comparative cost of a hospital bed when constantly occupied, is the amount of food and linen which each in-patient is required to provide. The practice varies considerably; but, strange to say, the demands made on the patients for supplies are greater at those hospitals where the cost per bed is higher, than at the Scotch hospitals, where the cost of an occupied bed is relatively small.

PATIENTS HAVE TO SUPPLY TEA, SUGAR, AND BUTTER AT

the Hospital for Epilepsy and Paralysis (IS. per week for tea and sugar), King's College Hospital, the London Homœopathic, the London, the Middlesex, the National Hospital for the Paralysed and Epileptic (IS. per week), the North London, the Royal Orthopædic, the West Ham Hospital (tea and sugar only), and the West London (butter only).

PATIENTS HAVE TO SUPPLY A CHANGE OF LINEN AT

the Blackheath and Charlton Cottage Hospital, the British Lying-in, the Brompton Consumption, the Cancer Hospital, the Central London Ophthalmic, the Chelsea Hospital for Women, the City of London Hospital for Diseases of the Chest, the Grosvenor, Guy's, the Hospital for Diseases of the Skin (Blackfriars), the London, the London Homœopathic, the Middlesex, the Miller, the National Hospital for the Paralysed, the National Orthopædic, the New Hospital for Women, North London Hospital for Consumption, the Poplar Hospital for Accidents, the Royal Eye, Royal Ear, Royal Westminster Ophthalmic, St. George's, St. Mary's, the Samaritan Free, University College, and the West End Hospital for Diseases of the Nervous System.

WHERE PATIENTS HAVE TO PAY FOR LAUNDRY.

The patients are charged in addition for washing at the Brompton Consumption Hospital, the Cancer Hospital, Great Ormond Street Children's Hospital (6d. per week), the Grosvenor, Guy's, the Hospital for Epilepsy, the Hospital for Women, the Middlesex, North Eastern for Children (6d. a week), North London, Royal Ear, Royal Orthopædic, Royal Westminster Ophthalmic, St. Mark's for Fistula, St. Mary's, Samaritan Free, the Victoria Hospital for Children (3d. per week) and West End Hospital for Diseases of Nervous System (6d. a week).

OTHER ARTICLES WHICH HAVE TO BE PROVIDED IN LONDON.

SCOTCH AND IRISH HOSPITALS.

At the large infirmaries in Scotland and Ireland inpatients are required to provide nothing, while but few of the smaller hospitals require anything from the patients.

We give this information for two reasons: First of all, it is desirable, in the best interests of the institutions and of those whom they treat, that the in-patients should be required to provide nothing. Discipline, cleanliness, and due regard to the circumstances of the poor, all demand the abolition of the old-fashioned practice of allowing patients to provide even personal linen, much less to permit them to defray the cost of their own washing. Secondly, any one who has a knowledge of hospital accounts will readily recognise the considerable reduction which there ought to be in the cost per bed, in the case of hospitals which require the in-patients to supply themselves with linen and groceries.

METHOD OF ADMISSION.

Admission to a Provincial Infectious Hospital can be obtained most readily by communicating with the Medical Officer of Health, whose office is sure to be known locally. As regards cost of maintenance, Section 132 of the Public Health Act, 1875, empowers the local sanitary authorities to recover it from the patients; but it will be seen that usually, at all events when the patients are very poor, this power is not exercised, and the cost is thrown on the rates. Arrangements can usually be made at the larger institutions for special accommodation at a higher rate of payment, a system which it is desirable to make universal The charges mentioned in the above list are weekly unless the contrary is stated.

METHOD OF ADMISSION.

Admission to the County and Borough Asylums is usually obtained through the relieving officer. Paying patients are frequently admitted into these institutions when there is room, the payments varying—according to the arrangements made by the medical superintendent with the relatives—from fourteen shillings to one guinea per week. The usual charge made to the various Unions for the reception of pauper cases averages about half a guinea per week. When the accommodation provided in a County or Borough Asylum is almost exhausted, it is usual to give notice for the removal of the paying patients to make room for the pauper cases.

INDIA.

(1) A school shall not be certified by the Education Department as suitable for providing elementary education for blind or deaf children :-

- (a) if it is conducted for private profit; nor
 (b) unless it is either managed by a school authority, or the annual expenses of its maintenance are, to the extent of not less than one third, defrayed out of sources other than local rates, or moneys provided by Parliament, and are audited and published in accordance with regulations of the Education Depart-
- ment; nor (c) unless it is open at all times to the inspection of Her Majesty's Inspectors of Schools, and of any visitors authorised by any school authority sending children to the school; nor
- (d) unless the requirements of the Act are complied with in the case of the school.

(2) Every school so certified, shall be deemed to be a certified efficient school within the meaning of the Elementary Education Act, 1876, and for the purposes of section eleven of that Act may, in the case of a blind or a deaf child, be treated as if it were a public elementary school.

(3) The certificates granted in pursuance of this section shall be annual.

The following abbreviations have been used: (a) Certificate of Blindness required; (b) Certificate of Vaccination required; (c) Guarantee required as to Removal; (d) Guarantee required for expenses of burial; (c) Guarantee for payments required; (f) Guarantee as to clothing required. 





THE population of South London has increased at the enormous rate of 25,000 annually during the past fifteen years, and now numbers upwards of a million and a half.
