NEW SCHOOL HOUSE.

Will Be A Great Improvement.

The Additional Tax to be Levied too Insignificant to be Considered an Objection.

The location of this proposed new school building has been discussed more or less of late. It should be borne in mind that so long as there is nothing to locate nothing can be located. When the proposed bonds have been voted there will then be something in sight to locate and consequently a location can be selected. The trustees can not change the location nor purchase land with that object in view (See school law of California Section 1517.) If the district desired to change the location it can be done, but, of course, only as the law directs.

So near as we can learn the trustees think it unnecessary and therefore unwise to build a school building costing more than five thousand and five hundred dollars as this they think will be large enough to supply the needs of the district for the next ten years. If at that time or earlier more room is needed, build it then. The plans recently submitted for the voter's criticism provide for such additions as may be required later on. These additions will not mar but add to the appearance of the building. The trustees think that the voters do not want an addition made to the present school building and therefore would not vote in favor of any proposition of that kind therefore they decided not to attempt that. Some of our people say that to make an addition to the present building would be almost a loss of the money thus expended and so it appears to the trustees.

The trustees thought wise to have the bonds run for ten years. Thus taking ten years to pay for the new building would make the annual payments extremely light, so light as scarcely to be felt. It would also be the means of obtaining the proportional part that newcomers ought to pay rather than collect the total amount from those who now own the property of the

district. Those who may sell their property or a portion of it prior to the expiration of the time the bonds are to run, would only have to pay a portion of the tax and those buying it would have to pay the balance which is as it should be. This building would certainly increase the value of each owner's property a great deal more than the tax he would have to pay. Hence any one who has property to sell would act wise by aiding in making this needed improvement. It would not only be a paying investment but would also add to the attractive appearance of the county. A community is supposed to be pretty accurately measured by its school facilities. The property of the district is valued for the purpose of taxation at about 500,000 dollars, and the entire amount to be raised is about 1 per cent of this valuation. Since the bonds are to run for ten years therefore the tax to be raised each year is about one-tenth of one per cent of the taxable valuation—a very light tax.

San Jose Orchestral Society.

This very popular musical society will give a concert in Masonic Hall, Los Gatos, Tuesday evening April 7th. A soloist will assist in the concert and all the music will be strictly first class. Prof. F. Loui King will act as director.

electric railway was passed upon by the supervisors on last Tuesday the right to construct the road being granted to L. M. Hale for a consideration of \$150.

D. 1896, at the Public School House, in said Campbell School District, at which time will be submitted to the electors of said District the question of issuing bonds of the District and selling the same, for the purpose of raising money for building or purchasing one school house in such District, and furnishing the same.

The polls will be opened and the election held at the School House in Campbell School District, on the 6th day of April, 1896, and the polls will be open from 9 o'clock A. M. of said day until five o'clock P. M. of said day. S. G. Kodeck and P. G. Keith will act as Judges of said election to conduct the same, and K. K. Thomas will act as Inspector.

W. C. T. U. COLUMN.

The members of the W. C. T. U. of Campbell cordially invite a perusal of this column, the matter for which is furnished by members of the society.

In her farewell address in New York on "The New English Women," Lady Henry Somerset drew a striking picture of the degradation caused among the women in English cities by the habit of strong drink. It is the practice of women to frequent the drink shops in England, as they do not in America, a practice which adds greatly to the demoralizing results of the drink traffic. It is not an uncommon sight, said Lady Somerset, to see a public bar room in London half filled with women of the poorer class, some with babes in their arms, whos cries are hushed with the stupefying dregs of the beer mugs and tumblers of gin. The employment of young girls as barmaids was spoken of as another agency of corruption and ruin in connection with the liquor business in England. It was her personal observation of such scenes and practices as these, said Lady Henry Somerset, that had made her what some were pleased to call a temperance "fanatic." If a determination to do what laid in her power to overcome these agencies of evil which were bringing such a fearful burden of woe and misery upon the homes of England, made her a "fanatic," she gloried in the title.
