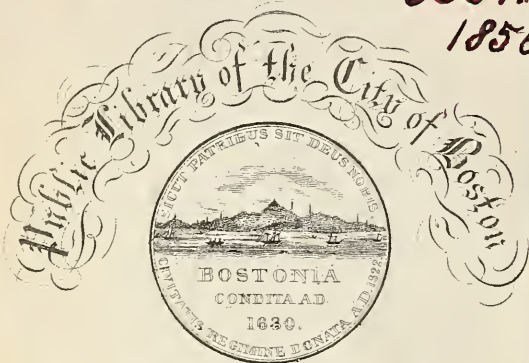

The City Charter requires that there shall be published annually, for the use of the inhabitants, a particular account of the Receipts and Expenditures, and a schedule of the City property. The Committee have prepared a statement of the Receipts and Expenditures of the City for the year ending January 31st, 1856, with the details under their separate heads.

The amount of accounts, claims and demands allowed by them during the year, is \$239,054 06.

The times when this sum becomes payable, may be seen by referring to the schedule of the City Debt, accompanying this report.

By a vote of the City Council, all monies received from the sales of land belonging to the City, are appropriated towards the reduction of the City Debt and interest. There has been received the present year from sales of land the sum of \$14,538 26; and, of this sum, there has been appropriated towards the reduction of the City Debt, \$8,500, and the balance, except the amount paid for interest, now remains in the Treasury. The debt has been increased for the following purposes, viz. :—

There remains in the Treasury, notes of sundry individuals secured by mortgage, of \$58,350 98, which, as they become due, will be appropriated to the liquidation of the City Debt, as directed.

It will be observed, that, in some instances, the City Debt has been increased for ordinary expenditures in addition to the ordinary appropriations. As a general principle, we consider this a mistaken policy, though there may be exceptions to this as well as all other general rules; and the increase, in the present case, we may very properly regard as an exception, because the public necessity and convenience seemed to require the expenditures to be made at this time, and a failure to have done so might have been otherwise than beneficial to the interests of the community. The annual appropriations ought to be sufficient to cover the ordinary expenses; and when appropriations are made for specific objects, it should be the aim of the government to bring the expenditures within the limits of the appropriation, and not to exceed it. We are aware that this is not possible at all times, nor in all cases, yet, as a general thing, we believe it can be done, if the different Boards and Committees making the expenditures should insist upon keeping them within these limits. The policy of borrowing money to meet in part the ordinary expenditures, cannot fail to entail upon any town or city adopting it, a train of serious evils, which heavy taxes, curtailed expenditures, and reduced yearly appropriations, can only remedy. We are happy to say, that this policy has not been adopted here only in rare instances, and whenever resorted to, it has been for objects for which there appeared to be a pressing public necessity to have accomplished, and a postponement of which would not have been consistent with

the principles of true economy, or with the best interests of the City.

Upon the subject of widening a portion of Washington Street,—(which cannot be considered as an ordinary expenditure,)—to a uniform width of 60 feet, agreeably to the line established in 1852, it was thought to be for the interests of the City to make this long desired improvement at once, rather than to take the land for the highway as fast as the old buildings should be removed to make way for new ones. By doing this work at once, a greater uniformity in the street could be obtained, and there can be but little doubt that in an economical point of view the interests of the City have been better subserved, than to have waited for the gradual removal or farther decay of the old buildings. The abutters, in some cases, manifested a commendable degree of public spirit in aiding this desired improvement, and the amounts paid to most of the parties, for land and damages, appear to be reasonable. In improvements of this character, if persons interested, either as owners or occupants, or both, would exercise a liberal spirit, by uniting with the City in carrying forward improvements of this kind, the interests of both would be greatly promoted.

The cost of this measure, as will be seen by referring to the several accounts, has been for

There are but two claims for land, as yet unsettled, which will increase the amount something less than \$1,000.

The ordinary expenses for repairs of Highways, Bridges and Sidewalks, amount to \$29,080 96, as will be seen by referring to the account, which shows an increase over the preceding year of \$10,472. There has been laid during the year—

1,756 yards of block stone, for crossings,
 2,845 “ brick sidewalk,
 10,355 “ round stone pavement, and
 24,867 feet, or nearly *five* miles, of edge-stones.

By reference to the report of the Commissioner of Streets, it will be seen upon what streets and sidewalks the appropriation has been expended, and the amount upon each ; together with items of expenditure for other objects.

The balance expended for new school-house, Gore Avenue, is \$6,239 07, which, together with the amount reported last year, of \$15,165 50, makes the total cost of this building together with the land, \$21,404 57.

The cost of the Public Schools, as compared with the year preceding, for teachers' salaries, fuel and contingencies, shows an increase of about \$2,100.

In the account of the Support of Poor, there has been a decrease, compared with that of last year, of some \$4,000. But there has been a considerable outlay for repairs of Almshouse, grading a portion of the grounds upon Highland Street, and improving the barn and out-buildings. This does not, as it ought, appear under the head of a specific appropriation for this purpose, and embraced among the items properly chargeable to this department; but will be found among the Contingent Expenses and Miscellaneous Claims. The cost of these improvements and repairs has been \$2,992 85. An additional expenditure has been made, which should also have appeared as a specific appropriation,—as will be seen upon reference to the Miscellaneous Claims,—in removing a large wooden building from the yard to Highland Street, and altering the same into a dwelling-house, which expenditure was deemed necessary in order to provide a suitable place, with proper accommodations, in the vicinity of the City Stables, for boarding a portion of the men employed on the highways. The cost of removal and alterations was \$2,120 57.

In the early part of the year, a new system was established in regard to the pay of the Watch and Police, which has been attended with beneficial results, and which has avoided many of the evils hitherto complained of. Until the change, the officers, in addition to their pay *per diem*, received the fees to which by law they were entitled from cases brought before the Court. They now receive a fixed sum *per diem*, and all their fees are received by the City Marshal and paid into the Treasury. The amounts received from this source, and the amount expended for the pay of officers and for other expenses, are expressed in the details of the account.

The Police Court was established by act of the Legislature, and went into operation May 10th. By the provisions of the statute, the Standing Justice is paid a fixed salary, and all the fees to which he would be entitled by law are paid by him into the Treasury.

Considerable repairs, amounting to \$1,030 03, have been made upon the Watch-house and Lock-up, in constructing brick cells and other repairs which were very much needed; and the rooms are now more comfortable and in better condition than formerly, and more in accordance with the dictates of humanity.

The expenses of the Fire Department correspond nearly to those of the preceding year, except the increase of about \$1,400 for new Hook and Ladder apparatus, outlay on Relief Engine, and new hose. The pay of firemen, which was \$25, has been increased to \$30 per year. The report of the Chief Engineer, showing the condition of the department, with details of service, is appended.

Two new Reservoirs have been constructed, one at the junction of Winthrop and Greenville Streets, and one on Smith, near Parker Street, at a cost of \$1,593 49.

It will be observed that the expenditures for Lamps appear much larger than usual. The ordinary appropriation was in-

creased by a loan of \$5,000, which became necessary in order to enable the Committee to locate posts and lanterns in the public streets through which the gas pipes were laid, and also to procure fluid lamps and posts in other streets where the gas pipes have not been laid down as yet. During the year there have been upwards of 150 cast iron posts set, and many wooden ones, for gas lights, and also a large number of wooden ones, for fluid lamps. The lanterns have not proved so durable and of such a quality as might have been desired, and have already required considerable repairs, and will require still more to make them serviceable. The details of expenditures will be found under the appropriate head.

The Liquor Agency has cost \$1,269 81. The receipts have been \$631 91, showing a loss of \$627 90 for the year. This amount may be reduced somewhat by deducting the value of the liquors on hand, of which the Committee can form no opinion. The agency has been abolished, and provision will doubtless be made to answer the requirements of the law in another form.

The proceeds of sales of lots or rights of burial in the Cemetery at Forest Hills, are yearly paid into the City Treasury, and kept separate from any other funds of the City, and subject to the order of the Commissioners. The proceeds are devoted to the liquidation of the debt incurred in the purchase of the land, and for improving and embellishing the grounds, as provided by act of the Legislature. For full details respecting the condition of the Cemetery, the sales of lots the past year, and other subjects connected therewith, reference may be made to the Annual Report of the Commissioners, appended.

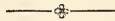

It may be proper to remark, that Brook Farm having been sold, the paupers were removed from that locality to the Highland street Almshouse, early in April last. The accommodations at the Highland street Almshouse have been improved during the year, and adapted to the change which it was necessary to make. The out-buildings have been put in good condition, and it is probable that no further considerable expense for improvements or repairs will be required for years. The poor are well provided for, and every convenience and accommodation in sickness or in health are furnished to that unfortunate class, which is called for by a spirit of kindness and humanity, and consistent with an economical expenditure of the public moneys. For the support of the Poor, for the ensuing year, the Board would recommend an appropriation of five thousand dollars.

The Reports of the Superintendent and Physician of the Almshouse, furnishing the details connected with their particular departments, accompany this Report, and it is gratifying to be able to state, that those officers have discharged their responsible duties throughout the year, with their accustomed fidelity and ability.

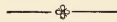

PHYSICIAN TO THE ALMSHOUSE.

To the Overseers of the Poor of the City of Roxbury :

GENTLEMEN, — In preparing this Report, I have omitted the table of classification of diseases usually accompanying similar Reports in years past. During the year from Feb. 1st, 1855, to Jan. 31st, 1856, there have been eight deaths in the house: Died with consumption, four; small pox, two; disease of the heart, one; asphyxia, one. There have been three births in the house during the year.

In the early part of the season there were eight cases of small pox and varioloid; two of the inmates of the house had varioloid, and six persons were admitted to the pest house with small pox, two of whom died, and four recovered. We have not had any ship fever in the house this year, nor but one case of typhoid fever, that is now in the house and under treatment, though the most of the inmates now in the house have been under medical treatment at some time during the year.

The three persons under treatment at the commencement of the year have since died with consumption.

There have been a number of State paupers admitted to the house sick, who received medical attendance until they were sufficiently recovered to be carried to Bridgewater. The expense for the same has been charged to the State.

There is at the present time, a number of persons in the House in a very helpless and infirm condition, which requires some attention from the physician, and the usual and unwearied care and

nursing which has universally been given by the Superintendent and his wife to each and every inmate to improve and make their condition more comfortable and happy.

Many of the number now in the house are well known to you as well as to many of our citizens, and are placed here only from force of circumstances, which have compelled them to withdraw from the society of those with whom they have for many years associated, and have sought the Almshouse as an abiding place for the remainder of their days.

CHIEF ENGINEER OF THE FIRE DEPARTMENT.

ROXBURY, FEB. 1, 1856.

To the Honorable the Mayor and Aldermen, and Common Council.

GENTLEMEN—In accordance with the requirements of Section 6th of the Fire Ordinance, I herewith present the Annual Report of the names, ages and residences of the Officers and Members of the Roxbury Fire Department; the condition of the Engines and other fire apparatus; the location and condition of the Reservoirs, Hydrants, and other sources for obtaining water in case of fire; also the number of Fires and Alarms within the City during the year ending January 31st, 1856, together with the amount of Loss and Insurance, as far as could be ascertained.

The Department has been called out the past year from fires within the City, 46 times; false alarms, 13 times; burning chimneys, 5 times; burning brush, 2 times; bursting of boiler, 1 time; burning grass, 1 time; ringing of factory bells, 6 times; re-kindling of ruins, 1 time; fire from foundry chimney, 1 time; alarms originating out of the City, 36 times; making a total of 112 alarms.

The amount of loss by fire, as far as can be ascertained, was \$30,900. Insurance, \$20,632.

The Department consists of 5 Engineers and 186 Firemen; there are 5 Engines and 7 Hose Carriages, 1 Hook and Ladder Carriage, 142 feet of Suction Hose, and 3,900 feet of Leading Hose. The several Engine-houses are in good condition.

IN conformity to the fifth section of "An Act relative to a Public Cemetery in the City of Roxbury," the Commissioners respectfully submit their

EIGHTH ANNUAL REPORT.

It is but a few years since attention began to be directed to the beautifying of burial places. The highest aim formerly seemed to be to find a spot where the dust of the departed might slumber undisturbed and forgotten till its final renovation. And it mattered not, apparently, how dreary or even disgusting the receptacle for the dead might be. As if to add to the repulsiveness of death, or rather, perhaps, as if it might seem to detract from a proper regard for the immortal in man, to care for the mortal, no spot could be found more bleak and barren, more uncared for by taste and uninviting to the footsteps of the living, than that which should entomb the decaying remains of departed friends. It might be, in the city, the dark, damp, sepulchral vault, which lingering affection would never choose to visit, to search out among its crowded and mouldy niches the slumbering remains of its object, and where no flower or shrub by its annual resuscitation should betoken a coming resurrection. Or if in the country, some un-

productive, treeless waste was selected, which, enclosed with a rude fence, was made the crowded and unattractive receptacle of the multiplying dead of a given locality; where the most that stricken affection was permitted to do, was to erect some modest slab with its inscribed testimonial of love, or perhaps to plant a solitary shrub or flower as the frail token of remembrance; and there, overgrown with grass and weeds, repulsive in all its exterior, and unpathed save as the repeated tread of some solitary survivor had marked its way among forgotten mounds to the resting place of some one more loved than the rest;—there, teeming with the evidences of neglect and forgetfulness, was the spot towards which all eyes looked as “the house appointed for all the living.”

It is a matter of sincere rejoicing, that in the progress of improvement in other respects, the cemetery has not been overlooked. And the amount of skill and taste employed in beautifying these places, which are to embosom all that is mortal of our households, bespeaks not less a true and rational refinement, than a sincere and Christian affection. The Forest Hills Cemetery is a witness among others, of the advance in public sentiment on this subject, and not less a token of the refinement of social affection in the community which appreciates and demands a place so lovely and attractive for the burial of the departed. Its proximity to the cities of Roxbury and Boston, being only three miles from the line dividing the two places, and the avenues leading to it being skirted with some of the richest scenery in the neighborhood, thus furnishing a most delightful ride, attract annually increasing numbers of visitors to enjoy its beauties. And its ease of access either by carriage or by the Boston and Providence rail-road, especially to the southerly part of Boston, where so many are now choosing their place of residence, make it a most convenient, as well as inviting place for the burial of their departing friends.

In the progress of the work of beautifying the grounds of the Cemetery and preparing them for occupancy, 136 lots have been graded and finished with stone posts, and the borders planted with trees and shrubs, during the last year.

One hundred and twenty-five lots have been sold during the same period, averaging $314\frac{1}{4}$ square feet each.

One hundred and forty graves in the Field of Machpelah have been sold.

Three family tombs have been constructed during the year and filled with stone shelves; two of which have been sold.

Lake Hibiscis has been enlarged during the last summer 16,000, square feet, by further excavations; a substantial wall built around the part newly excavated, and the border graded and

sodded out to the avenue. The increased attraction around this spot has led nearly all visitors at the Cemetery to pass by it, and many of them, whether on foot or in carriages, to halt and linger awhile to enjoy its beauties. In consequence of this, it has been found expedient to widen the avenues on the west and north sides from sixteen to twenty feet.

The loam has been removed from 1670 feet of avenues, and from 340 feet of paths, which have been relaid with stone and gravel in the same thorough manner as heretofore.

In order to secure the distinct and permanent numbering of the Cemetery lots, the Commissioners have procured a quantity of slate-stones of uniform size, with the number legibly engraved upon them, and have had them set in 1000 lots. The expense thus incurred has amounted to \$500.

Three hundred graves in the Field of Macphelah, have been numbered in the same manner, at an expense of \$150.

It having become necessary to improve for lots the grounds heretofore occupied by the nursery, the trees and shrubs have been removed to the southern portion of the Cemetery lands.

In addition to lots sold the past year, there are now on hand thirty-five lots which are finished and ready for sale, towards supplying the future demand. Seventy-five other lots have been trenched, which will be sodded and finished as early as the season will permit.

One hundred graves in the Field of Macphelah have also been finished to meet the demand the ensuing year.

The Commissioners having an opportunity to purchase of the Town of West Roxbury a quantity of loam, where a road was to be graded, and having constant occasion for it in the finishing of their lots, have made the purchase, and caused the same to be removed and put in heaps, ready for use as it may be needed.

Thirty-five monuments, beside monumental scrolls and slabs, have been erected the last year at a cost of from \$300 to \$600 each.

Fifty-five lots have been enclosed with iron fences, and one lot with Castleton slate.

The number of interments the last year in private lots and in the Field of Macphelah was 435, which is greater by seventy than the preceding year.

For several years the Commissioners, by permission of the Town of West Roxbury, have taken gravel from Bourne Street for use in the avenues and paths of the Cemetery; the grading of the street being regarded by the town as sufficient compensation for the gravel removed. This source of supply having been

exhausted, and a favorable opportunity occurring of securing the gravel and sand in constant requisition, the Commissioners purchased a gravel hill, embracing a little more than two acres, and have caused a deed of the same to be made to the City of Roxbury; for which they paid the sum of \$637 50.

During the year the debt incurred in the purchase of Cemetery lands has been reduced by the payment of \$2,000; leaving a balance of \$24,000 yet unpaid.

The Commissioners wish to call the attention of lot owners to another item of expenditure which is making large demands upon them each successive year. This arises from the labor necessary to keep in order the private lots of the Cemetery. This has been done the last year at an estimated cost of \$2,000. Each owner of a lot has a common interest with the others that all be kept in neat and attractive order. And there is no feature of Forest Hills Cemetery, which has occasioned more universal admiration on the part of visitors, or a higher satisfaction in the bosoms of lot holders, than the high degree of neatness and order and tasteful embellishment which every where meets the eye.

No one would willingly see this beautiful feature marred, or less lovely than now. But as private lots are multiplied, the expense of keeping them in order must necessarily increase. The true policy would doubtless have been for each purchaser of a lot to make a deposit at the time of purchase of an amount, the interest of which, annually applied, should be sufficient for needful repairs and the perpetual embellishment of his lot. To meet this necessity, the City of Roxbury in 1852 secured the passage of an Act by the State Legislature, authorizing the Commissioners to hold any grant or donation or bequest of property, upon trust, for this end. This Act will be found in connection with this Report; and it is hoped that this allusion to it may be sufficient to secure the coöperation of all the lot holders for the accomplishment of an object so essential to the permanent beauty and attractiveness of this "garden of graves."

As the members of our households are gathered, one by one, to their last sleep, and each one prepares for himself a bed in that spot where living trees and blooming flowers speak so significantly to the living of peace and hope, it can hardly fail to be a source of high gratification to know that a sure provision has been made for the perpetuation of its quiet loveliness in all future time.

The Commissioners have occasion, as in past years, to make mention of their indebtedness to Mr. Brims, their industrious and efficient Superintendent, for the taste and skill which have contributed so largely towards developing the beauties of Forest Hills; and also to J. W. Dudley, City Treasurer, and J. W. Tucker, City Clerk, the prompt discharge of whose respective duties has tended to facilitate the designs of the Commissioners.

In closing their Report, the Commissioners would express the gratification which they feel in the progress already made in the

work entrusted to their supervision. There is a chastened satisfaction in a work which robs the grave even externally of its gloom, and which thus points the living, by significant tokens, to Him who himself said, "I AM THE RESURRECTION AND THE LIFE."

AN ACT

In addition to An Act relating to a Public Cemetery in the City of Roxbury.

Be it enacted by the Senate and House of Representatives, in General Court assembled, and by the authority of the same, as follows :

SECT. 1. The board of commissioners of the rural cemetery in Roxbury, elected by the city council, pursuant to an act approved March 24, 1848, are authorized to take and hold any grant, donation or bequest of property, upon trust, to apply the same, or the income thereof, for the improvement or embellishment of the said cemetery, or for the erection, repair, preservation or renewal of any monument, fence or other erection, or for the planting and cultivation of trees, shrubs or plants, in or around any lot, or for improving the said premises in any other manner or form, consistent with the purposes for which said cemetery is established, according to the terms of such grant, donation or bequest. And whenever any such grant, donation or bequest, or any deposit shall be made by the proprietor of any lot in said cemetery, for the annual repair, preservation or embellishment of such lot and the erections thereon, the said commissioners may give to such proprietor, or his representative, an agreement or obligation, in such form and upon such terms and conditions as they may establish, binding themselves and their successors to preserve and keep in repair said lot forever, or for such period as may be agreed upon.

SECT. 2. Any sums of money, so received by said commissioners, shall be invested by the city treasurer of Roxbury, under the direction of said commissioners, in public stocks or mortgages of real estate, and all such property, received under the provisions of the foregoing section (unless other provision is made by the terms of any such grant, donation or bequest), shall be made under the charge of said city treasurer, but shall always remain separate from and independent of any other moneys or property belonging to the city of Roxbury, and free from the control of the city council. And the income of such fund, or funds, shall be received by said treasurer, subject to the order of said commissioners, and shall be appropriated by them in such manner as shall in their opinion, best promote the purposes for which said grants, donations, bequests or deposits are made.

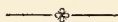
SECT. 3. The city of Roxbury shall be responsible for the good faith of said commissioners, and the treasurer of said city, in the execution of any trust which they may assume pursuant to the foregoing provisions. But said commissioners shall not be liable to make any renewal or reconstruction of any monument, or other erection on any lots in said cemetery, unless such liability shall be expressed in the agreement given by them as aforesaid, or in the terms and conditions under which they accept any grant, donation or bequest.

SECT. 4. This act shall be void, unless the city council of Roxbury shall accept the same, at a meeting of said council called for that purpose, within thirty days after its passage.

SECT. 5. This act shall take effect from and after its passage. [*Passed Feb. 25, 1852.*

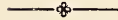

ABBREVIATED REGULATIONS.

One volume can be taken at a time from the Lower Hall, and one from the Bates Hall. Books can be kept out 14 days.

A fine of 2 cents for each volume will be incurred for each day a book is detained more than 14 days.

Any book detained more than a week beyond the time limited, will be sent for at the expense of the delinquent.

No book is to be lent out of the household of the borrower.

The Library hours for the delivery and return of books are from 10 o'clock, A. M., to 8 o'clock, P. M., in the Lower Hall; and from 10 o'clock, A. M., until one half hour before sunset in the Bates Hall.

Every book must, under penalty of one dollar, be returned to the Library at such time in August as shall be publicly announced.

The card must be presented whenever a book is returned. For renewing a book the card must be presented, together with the book, or with the shelf-numbers of the book.
