He reached Victoria on the steamer Riojun Maru, of the Nippon Yusen Kaisha line, and should arrive at Montreal in something less than sixty days from the date he started on his long and interesting journey. If these plans can be carried out by taking the Imperial Limited from Vancouver, Mr. Prince's ambition will be realized, and he wift have beaten out all his rivals in the unique race now nearing an end.

The trip, unlike that of his competitors, however, has been full of venture, and teems with episodes of an exciting character, being in additions meakably, many annoying delays, but for which he would have entirely eclipsed that of either of his rivals. The story of the sending out of Messrs, Prince and Marion by the manager of the La Presse in order that the honor of holding the world's record, so covetuously sought after, might rest with Canada, and of their success up till July 5th, has already been published in the Times. But this was the least interesting of the young men's journeyings, Both fell prey to Russian oppression, and one, August Marion, may still be in Russian captivity for ought Mr. Prince knows.

British Congress on Tuberculosis.

Loudon, July 23.—A feature of to-day's session of the British congress on tuberculosis was Dr. Robert Roch's paper which was listened to with the deepest interest by a big gathering in St. James's hall.

Lord Lister, professor of surgery in Glasgow and Edinburgh universities, and one of the British vice-presidents of the congress, introduced the noted German professor to the assembly.

During his address to the congress, Dr. Koch said his experiments had satisfied him that human tuberculosis and bowher tuberculosis were radically different diseases, and that he had amply demonstrated that cattle could not be infected with human tuberculosis. The counter proposition, that human beings were not liable to infection from bowing tuberculosis was harder to prove, he said, owing to, the difficulty of experimenting upon human subjects, but personally he was satisfied that such was the case. He then entered into a lengthy analysis of the best methods of preventing consumption.





The construction since that time has been less—enly about 27,000 miles—because the country then became almost fully equipped, with railway accommodations. The history of railway development in Europe is equally recent. In the whole of Europe, according to a recent article in one of the foreign financial journals, the railway equipment in operation doubled between January 1st, 1875, and January 1st, 1890, when it was 165,000 miles, The estimated railway miles age of the whole world in 1980 was about 445,000 miles, representing a cost of nearly \$33,000,000,000.
