Code Enforcement

The City of Youngsville Code Enforcement Dept. ensures that city ordinances are being followed by property owners, developers, and business owners. They supervise a variety of issues from tall grass to nuisance properties and from construction without permits to illegal signs. They play a vital role in our community to make sure everyone is playing by the rules and our city remains presentable.

Permitting

Our permitting team is here to serve you! Common items that need permits that are often overlooked include any concrete additions, sheds, roofing, pools, golf carts on city roads, plumbing, and electrical. HOA approval is generally required in addition to obtaining a city permit for construction. Trash Pick-Up

Trash pick-up days vary by location. Contact city hall if you have questions regarding your scheduled pick-up day. To avoid missing a pick-up, place items at your front curb the night before as these guys show up pretty early. Waste Management of Acadiana furnishes the garbage containers and provides collection services.

Report A Problem

To some degree, taking care of our city is everyone's job. Problems observed and reported by citizens such as downed road signs, potholes, malfunctioning streetlights, etc. help us maintain the quality of life we're so proud of in Youngsville. Recycling

Every time you choose to recycle, you're giving that item a second life to serve a new purpose and save natural resources. Now more than ever, it's important that only the right items, free from contamination, make their way into your recycling bin. If you wish to participate in our Recycle Program, please call City Hall to have a recycling cart delivered at no additional cost to you.

Three basic rules of recycling. Knowing these rules and putting them into practice will help you recycle more efficiently. And it will help to ensure everything that makes it into your bin finds a second life.

- 1. Recycle plastic bottles, cans, paper and cardboard.
- 2. Keep food and liquid out of your recycling.
- 3. No loose plastic bags and no bagged recyclables.

Not accepted in your bin.

Try to reduce and reuse these items instead of putting them in the trash. No bagged recyclables. No plastic bags. No plastic wrap & film. No flexible packaging. No cups with wax or plastic coatings. No polystyrene foam & plastic. No tangled items (i.e. hoses). No diapers. No household items. No medical waste. No glass.



PUBLIC WORKS

Branch & Household Debris Pick-Up

- Branches must be placed curb side the Sunday before pickup.
- Branches cannot be longer than 4 feet in length.
- All branches and household debris must be stacked separately, if not stacked separately it will not be picked up.
- Leaves and loose debris must be BAGGED!
- No hazardous waste material, tires, paint, clothes, recycle items, creosote items and house garbage.
- The City will make only one pass in a neighborhood during the week of pick-up.
- If residents miss the pickup, they may bring their branches and bagged vegetative debris only to the drop off location at 310 Railroad St from 7:00-12:00 and 1:00-3:00 Monday- Friday.



DRAINAGE 101

Do you know...

The difference between detention and retention ponds? All development is required to provide "detention" of additional rainfall runoff. Basically, the additional runoff from the hard surface or "impervious" areas are calculated for multiple rain events and the 25-year, 24-hour storm event additional runoff must be "detained" in an approved manner such as detention or retention ponds, underground detention systems or nature-based systems. If the pond maintains a constant water level, it is a wet "retention" pond as it retains a consistent amount of water, and the detention volume is "stacked" on top of the normal water level. If the pond is dry and only holds water during a rain event, it is a detention pond.



So how does the City continue to thrive while improving our drainage?

- In 2015, the City of Youngsville developed and adopted a master plan that identified over \$8M in drainage improvements that included two (2) Regional Detention Ponds, one along Bayou Parc Perdu and one along Coulee LaSalle, which are now under construction and fully funded by federal grants.
- In September of 2016, the City of Youngsville led the state in increasing drainage requirements for development that included doubling the amount of detention of runoff from developments.
- Every year the City of Youngsville reviews our development standards and increases the standards necessary to positively manage our drainage system.
- Since 2016, the City has:
 - Purchased additional equipment and added staff to provide for increased drainage maintenance
 - Implemented an annual channel maintenance program, an annual roadside ditch maintenance program, and an annual program to clean subsurface drainage systems
 - Hired a full-time code-enforcement officer to minimize sediment runoff from development construction
 - Completed 4 subdivision detention pond outfall improvement projects
 - Initiated construction on more than 100 acres of regional detention pond projects not associated with development along Anslem Coulee, Bayou Parc Perdu and Coulee LaSalle that will be completed by June 2024.
 - Bailey Grove Regional Detention Ponds (42 acres)
 - The Lakes Regional Detention (17 acres)
 - Coulee LaSalle Regional Detention (17 acres)
 - Anslem Coulee Regional Detention Pond (22 acres)
 - Lily Pond (1.5 acres)
 - Veterans Memorial Pond (2 acres)
 - Dog Park Regional Detention Pond (2.5 acres)
 - La Gymnasium Regional Detention Pond (1 acre)

Instructions for

ROUNDING THE ROUNDABOUT

Look for this sign:

It's your first cue that you're approaching a roundabout



Start to slow down.

When approaching the roundabout, slow down to 10-15 mph.

Share the road.

Always look for bicyclists merging into the travel lane and pedestrians crossing. Let bicyclists merge. Let people at the crosswalk cross. It's the law!

Yield to traffic.

You may have to stop to yield to cars on your left. If the road is clear, simply enter the roundabout turning right. You don't have to stop: just enter.

Proceed slowly.

Don't pass bicyclists ahead of you within the coundabout. Continue until you get to your exit. Don't stop in the roundabout.

Follow directional signs.

Directional signs will tell you where to exit.

Exit carefully.

Using your right-turn signal, exit the roundabout. Remember to watch for pedestrians.

For Pedestrians:

Follow these 4 simple tips to walk safely through a roundabout:

• Use the designated crosswalk.

Never walk in the roundabout or the central island.

• Cross one lane at a time to the splitter island. It provides refuge between lanes.

For Bicyclists:

Ride a bicycle as if you were driving a car. Be assertive so cars see you and respect your right to be on the road. Refer to the same steps on the left column with the addition of these tips. If riding on the shoulder or bike lane:

CENTRAL

ISLAND

APRON

ENTRY LANES

PEDESTRIAN

- Merge into travel lane before the shoulder ends.
- Move slowly and signal.

If you don't want to ride your bicycle in the roundabout, use the sidewalks and proceed as a pedestrian. (Refer to the instructions for pedestrians.)

Once in the roundabout:

- Don't hug the curb
- Ride close to the middle of the lane to prevent cars from passing you.
- Watch for cars waiting to enter the roundabout
- When crossing an entry lane, watch for oncoming traffic. Even though you have the right-of-way when you are in the crosswalk, make sure that drivers see you and stop for you.
- When crossing an exit lane, watch for cars leaving the roundabout.

You have the right-of-way, but proceed carefully.



TRANSPORTATION

Youngsville is a great place to live and that is evident by the abundance of growth we have experienced over the past 20 to 30 years. Where growth comes, so do growing pains and Youngsville is no exception. Transportation has been a topic of discussion throughout the city for a few years, and the city has made it a top priority. Traffic is a sign of a vibrant city, but it is incumbent upon the city government to find innovative ways to improve the flow of traffic. The City of Youngsville, in June of 2022, worked with Vijay K. Kunada, P.E., PTOE, PTP of Neel-Schaffer and adopted a Transportation Master Plan that outlined to accomplish 4 objectives:

- Address current and future traffic conditions
- Improve connectivity
- Preserve corridors to accommodate future growth and minimize impacts to traveling public
- Identify strategies for safe movement of traffic


Upon the adoption of this Master Plan, Mayor Ken Ritter committed to major road improvements throughout the next few years. The Mayor and Council have committed to spending more than 20 million dollars this term improving existing roadway, while also adding new roadways to better connect the city.

See below a few proposed changes in the near future:


- Widening of Hwy 89 (Youngsville Hwy) from 2-lanes to 4-lanes from Iberia St. to Ambassador Caffery Pkwy.
- Fortune Rd. Roundabout at Hwy 89 (Youngsville Hwy) and extension to Fairfield Rd. in Broussard
- Widening of Hwy 92 from St. Blaise Ln to Brookdale Blvd. adding a strategic middle turning lane
- Redesigning and improving Veterans' Memorial Roundabout (Chemin Metairie @ Hwy 92) to become a 2-lane full circulating roundabout
- Redesigning and widening of Lafayette St. and Church St. in Downtown Youngsville
- Redesigning and improving the Tractor Roundabout (Chemin Metairie @ Guillot Rd.) to have strategic 2-lanes to better facilitate traffic coming North and South
- Widening of Bonin Rd. from Fortune to Ambassador

All of the listed road improvements above will better facilitate and accommodate the traffic Youngsville is experiencing as a result of our growth. This is a long, expensive process and a collaboration of all stakeholders in Youngsville: our citizens, our city government, our state legislators, our state government, and our private sector contractors having patience and appreciation for the process.

Youngsville Fire Department

The Youngsville Fire Department responds to all fires, major vehicle accidents, rescue calls, hazardous material calls and also responds to medical calls at the First Responder level. HISTORY

We are so very proud you chose the City of Youngsville as your home! Often on the list of Best Places to Live in Louisiana; as well as the fastest growing city in Louisiana, those of us that live here truly know that our biggest asset is our people! Throughout our rich history, our people have made it what it is today. The growing city you see today started out as a little farming settlement that now has been replaced by a mixture of farming, residential and commercial areas, and yet there is a strong desire to preserve the small-town feel.

In 1834, after receiving a substantial land grant, Charles Abraham Roy along with his wife and 10 children moved to the area. In 1839, Mr. Roy laid out a settlement and named it Royville. After the death of Mr. Roy in 1847, his oldest son Desire' donated nine arpents of land to create a Catholic Parish in Royville. The church, originally named St. Etienne, was significant for the long-term viability of the settlement; as well as an integral part of the life of the residents of Royville. The church name was later changed to St. Anne and is one of the oldest Catholic Churches in the Diocese of Lafayette. Many members of the Roy family are buried in the cemetery at St. Anne.

In 1908, the Village of Royville got a new name! At the request of the United States Postal Service, the name was changed to avoid confusion with a city in North Louisiana called Rayville. There are many stories about how the name Youngsville was chosen. The consensus is that the citizens chose the name Youngsville by combining "young village!"

In the early 1940's, the population of Youngsville had grown to approximately 650 residents. It was at this time, the United States found itself involved in World War II. The State of Louisiana along with the United States joined together to solve a great labor shortage to farmers in Louisiana. The Village of Youngsville was among many of the locations in Louisiana that were chosen to receive German prisoners to provide



labor assistance to the local farmers by working in the fields and helping at the local cannery and cotton gin. The prisoner of war camp was in what is now known as Foster Park.

By 1960, Youngsville's population reached close to 1,000 residents! By all accounts, the idyllic tight knit community was living its best life. It seemed that there was a grocery store on every corner, good schools, a popular event that drew people from all over Acadiana called "The Festival of Beauties" and even a saloon or two.

In the very early morning in the fall of 1969, tragedy struck Youngsville when the town's mainstay employer, the Youngsville Sugar Refinery, caught fire. The refinery was a total and devastating loss to the

residents of Youngsville. Fortunately, the "can do" spirit of the community, along with great leadership, pulled themselves together.

In the early 1980's, the population of Youngsville exceeded 1,000 residents. Governor Dave Treen declared that the Village of Youngsville was now officially a town. At that time, it was necessary to restructure the town government to accommodate the growing community. Since 1908, the village had operated with a mayor and three Alderman. The decision was made and the town voted to change the charter. The resulting change to elect a mayor and five council persons still exists today. In 2005, with the population reaching 5,000 residents, Governor Kathleen Blanco declared Youngsville a city!

In the last 16 years, the City of Youngsville has experienced incredible growth with new neighborhoods, restaurants, a world class sports complex, and three beautiful new schools. Youngsville can uniquely say that it doesn't even have one traffic light! Instead, the city is also affectionately known as the "Roundabout Capital of Louisiana" and is home to ten major roundabouts! The City currently operates with a budget of over \$50 million dollars, and with the construction of a new Municipal Complex, an expansion to the current Sports Complex, renovations to St. Anne's Catholic Church, and even more businesses choosing Youngsville, the future truly is bright! The 2020 census revealed that our population is 16,898 which makes us the 19th largest city in Louisiana. Youngsville is currently growing at a rate of 4.30% annually and its population has increased by

107.03% since the 2010 census, which recorded a population of 8,105.

We hope you enjoy living here; Youngsville has always been a special place. Since our humble beginnings in 1839, through good times and hard times, our city has flourished because of its commitment to supporting each other. Today, our residents enjoy many of the benefits and conveniences of larger cities while maintaining that small town feel. PARKS & RECREATION





Complimenting the Youngsville Sports Complex are three satellite parks located throughout the city. Foster Park is located on 4th Street and is Youngsville's oldest recreational area, with a rich history dating back nearly 50 years. Foster Park features 2 lit baseball/softball fields, a large multi-use green space, a children's playset, a fitness trail, 2 tennis courts, and a new concession and restroom building. Rounding out these parks are the Youngsville Bark Park, a new 4+ acre community dog park located on S. St. Blaise Lane, and Veterans Memorial Gateway Park, which is located on Hwy. 92, features a fitness trail, and is dedicated to active and retired service members. Both Veterans Park and the Bark Park were built around functional retention ponds, built to help mitigate stormwater drainage. The Youngsville Parks and Recreation department is growing and evolving as rapidly as the city and intends to provide great memories, positive experiences, and direction for our young people, helping them to become effective adults who will continue to be involved in their community. Our philosophy is to provide quality programs with emphasis on teaching sportsmanship, responsibility, discipline, and communication – qualities that encourage the healthy development of our children, strengthen families, and create a vibrant, energetic community.

YOUNGSVILLE SPORTS COMPLEX



With phase one of a 47-acre expansion of the Youngsville Sports Complex set to open in the summer of 2024, more amenities and events are on the way! Included in the expansion are two high school and collegiate size baseball fields, an 8-court outdoor pickleball facility, and a 2,500+ seat outdoor amphitheater capable of hosting large scale community events and concerts. The soon to be 117-acre Youngsville Sports Complex is the premier recreational facility in our region, hosting a variety of sports and events. The Complex is an economic driver of our community, drawing over 850,000 visitors to the site with established events including the NCAA Women's Softball Mardi Gras Mambo, various PONY youth baseball and softball international World Series tournaments, NCAA Women's Beach Volleyball tournaments, and more! The Complex is currently home to 9 multipurpose baseball/softball fields, 6 soccer/flag football fields, 11 covered and lit batting cages, 10 tennis courts, and 9 beach volleyball courts. Other amenities include 9 pavilions, a 1-mile fitness trail, a large fishing pond, 2 children's playsets, and a 3,000 square foot splash park! Indoor volleyball, pickleball, and basketball courts are available inside the 25,000+ sq. ft recreation center. The Youngsville Recreation Center is also home to community events such as the Annual Youngsville Chamber of Commerce Banquet and the Southside High School Social, as well as sporting events including MMA events, boxing tournaments, various cookoffs, and more.

Cultivating and Growing Leadership

The City of Youngsville is comprised of an engaging and active community, both in business and with its residents. The City and Chamber want to create an environment where community leadership can flourish.

During the sessions, candidates will have the opportunity to meet with local and regional leaders to examine issues of critical importance to the City of Youngsville.

Site visits, roundtables, group discussions, and hands-on applications allow for active engagement.

The Leadership Youngsville program offers participants access to an extraordinary network of area leaders and a unique opportunity to strengthen leadership skills within a growing community.

Applicants should live within Lafayette Parish and have an interest in learning about Youngsville. The class consists of 8 sessions from April – December. Currently, program tuition is \$650 for participants. Session times run approximately from 8:00a.m. to 5:00p.m. and may start earlier or run later. Some sessions may include a full day and others may include half day sessions. Locations vary based on the session topic but will be primarily in Youngsville. Lunch will be included for full day sessions. Tours of some facilities will be included. Out of town travel for the day may also be included.
