1 1. Reference is made to letter, Department of the Army, Office of the Adjutant General, file AGAO-C 201 McKernan, Donald L. (27 Jan 50) OUS, 1 Feb 50, subject: Travel Orders, IJ-Tokyo, Japan - BDS. (Copy attached as inclosure 1)

2. Above cited reference appointed Mr Donald L. McKernan as Expert to the Secretary of the Army for a period of 90 days beginning 27 February 1950. At current work rate Mr McKernan's appointment will expire 2 June 1950; this will necessitate his departure from Tokyo not later than 27 May 1950.

3. It is requested that Mr McKernan's appointment be extended for a period of 28 days through 30 June 1950. This will permit him to remain in Japan until 25 June 1950.

4. Mr McKernan arrived in NR 8 March 1950. Since that date he has been engaged in investigating the extent of freshwater aquiculture, methods of culture and production in this industry, government research and regulation, and the effects of flood control, hydro-electric plants and irrigation on the freshwater aquatic resources of Japan. As a result of these studies Mr McKernan will make recommendations proposing steps that should be taken in order that optimum yields may be secured from the Japanese freshwater resources. Mr McKernan has displayed a great deal of energy and ability in collecting data and it is thought that sufficient time to organize this material into a complete report will result in the government realizing the greatest possible benefit from his services.

5. Extension of the appointment is acceptable to Mr McKernan.

2. Above cited reference appointed Professor Jonas J. Christensen as Expert to the Secretary of the Army for a period of 90 days beginning 27 February 1950. At current work rate Professor Christensen's appointment will expire 5 June 1950; this will necessitate his departure from Tokyo not later than 30 May 1950.

3. It is requested that Professor Christensen's appointment be extended for a period of 25 days through 30 June 1950. This will permit him to remain in Japan until 25 June 1950.

4. Professor Christensen arrived in NR 6 March 1950. His assignment is to investigate and develop recommendations on improved measures where practicable for the control of diseases of farm crops. The effectiveness of his work is contingent in great part on his examination of crops during the various stages of growth in the fields to determine characteristics of diseases and the efficacy of various treatments. His present schedule permits examination of wheat and barley crops during the earlier part of plant growth but the schedule, unless changed, permits no opportunity to examine diseases and control measures for those crops, and others, during the stage of advanced growth and maturity during June.

MEMORANDUM FOR: Chief of Staff

SUBJECT: CI&E Visiting Experts for FY 1951 (IFEL Program)

1. CIE proposes, by attached staff study, a fifth and sixth sessions of the Institute for Education Leadership (IFEL) during FY 1951. The two sessions will require 15 visiting experts for a period of approximately 35 weeks (210 working days), including travel time, at an estimated cost of \$94,500 not including travel. The FY 1951 budget, on which no firm information is yet available, includes \$250,000 for visiting experts for SCAP as a whole.

2. CIE indicates that the first three sessions of IFEL trained 703 superintendents of education, 1005 teacher consultants, 217 normal school instructors, 380 administrators and teachers, and 1073 youth organization leaders (short courses). Also, it is indicated that approximately 1500 additional Japanese are, or will be, registered for the fourth session now in progress. Thus, the four sessions approved to date will provide for visiting expert instruction to over 4800 Japanese educational leaders.

3. The first three sessions have undoubtedly met with success, and it may be assumed that the fourth session will provide additional effective guidance to Japanese educational leaders. The proposed fifth and sixth sessions indicate an intent to delve into a high degree of refinement of educational methods, through the instruction by visiting experts of the staffs of teacher-training institutions.

4. G-1 considers that the accomplishments indicated in paragraph 2 above adequately meet the obligations of the U.S. government to improve the Japanese educational system at U. S. expense. Any extension of the IFEL program subsequent to completion of the current fourth session should be accomplished by the efforts of the Japanese themselves, under the guidance of CIE full-time staff. The proposed fifth and sixth sessions would probably result in additional improvements, but such represents a refinement of the occupation mission which is not required.

5. In view of the foregoing, and the Supreme Commander's stated desire that no additional "missions" be brought to Japan, G-1 concludes that the CIE proposal should be disapproved. A proposed checknote to CIE has been inclosed.

1. The successful accomplishments of the IFEL program to date, and the anticipated accomplishments of the fourth session now in progress, are considered to meet adequately the obligations of the U.S. Government to improve the Japanese educational system by the use of visiting experts. It is essential that future improvements in the Japanese political, economic and social institutions be accomplished by the efforts of the Japanese themselves, with minimum assistance at the expense of the United States.

2. Accordingly, the proposal by CIE for fifth and sixth sessions of the Institute for Educational Leadership, by use of visiting experts, is disapproved. Any extension of the IFEL program should be accomplished by CIE personnel, within approved manning levels.

Brief of Staff Study

I. THE PROBLEM PRESENTED

To finalize planning for the fifth and sixth sessions of the Institute for Educational Leadership (1950-1951).

II. FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM

1. Three sessions of the Institute, under joint sponsorship of CIE and the Japanese Ministry of Education, have been completed; a fourth session is now in progress. The first two sessions were designed primarily to train superintendents of education and teacher consultants. The third and fourth sessions have shifted emphasis to setting patterns for teacher training institutions for continuous professional training.

2. Evaluations of the first three sessions have been highly favorable. The Ministry of Education has indicated, and CIE concurs, that the most pressing training problem in Japanese education at this time is in the staffs of teacher training institutions. This need is emphasized by requirements of new certification laws establishing minimum standards. CIE considers that the training of teacher-trainers during FY 51 is in line with the policy of preparing the Japanese, at the earliest practicable date, to assume the responsibilities which will be theirs at the end of the Occupation.

3. A tentative plan for the next two sessions of IFEL has been prepared by CIE, although no assurances have been given the Japanese, in response to their many requests that the program can be carried out. It is planned that the Japanese staff would be supplemented by American visiting experts, as in the first four sessions of IFEL. The number of visiting experts required for the two sessions is limited to fifteen, to be supplemented by nine regular staff members of CIE who would devote a major portion of their time to IFEL. Total time involved for visiting experts would be approximately 150 man-months. The Ministry of Education has indicated that it will provide yen funds required for Japanese instructors, participants and administrative expenses.

4. Because of recruiting difficulties, DA for the past two years, has requested that a staff member of CIE be sent to the ZI on TDY to assist. Inasmuch as visiting experts must arrange one-year leaves of absence from their regular posts, early recruitment is essential. Decision on commitment of appropriated funds is of greatest urgency.

III. CONCLUSIONS

That continuation of the IFEL during FY 51 is not only desirable but of the highest importance in the accomplishment of CIE's mission; that the services of 15 American visiting experts are essential to the success of IFEL; that funds necessary for their employment will be available; and that early recruitment by a staff member of CIE is essential if the target date is to be met.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS

That plan attached as TAB A for the fifth and sixth sessions of IFEL be approved; that draft letter to DA (TAB B) be approved for dispatch; and that a staff member of CIE be authorized TDY in the ZI for recruiting purposes.

SUBJECT: Institute for Education Leadership Visiting Experts for
Fiscal Year 1951

I. THE PROBLEM PRESENTED

To finalize planning for the fifth and sixth sessions of the Institute for Educational Leadership (1950-1951).

II. FACTS BEARING ON THE PROBLEM:

1. Three sessions of the Institute for Educational Leadership (IFEL), conducted under the joint sponsorship of the Civil Information and Education Section and the Japanese Ministry of Education, have been completed during 1948 and 1949. The fourth session is now in progress.

2. Japanese educational officials in the following categories satisfactorily completed programs of studies in the first three sessions: superintendents of education, 703; teacher consultants, 1,005; normal school instructors, 217; university administrators and teachers, 380; youth organization leaders (short courses), 1,073; total, 3,378. Approximately 1,500 Japanese are or will be registered for the fourth session of IFEL.

3. The first and second sessions of IFEL were designed primarily to prepare educational personnel to assume the duties and responsibilities of the newly created positions of superintendents of education and teacher consultants (the latter to replace the vicious pre-Occupation "school inspectors"). The third and fourth sessions have continued to offer training in these fields but emphasis has been shifted to setting patterns for teacher training institutions in their responsibility for the continuous training of educational personnel for administrative and supervisory positions.

4. With the assistance of CIE, the Ministry of Education assumed general responsibility for planning and administration of the first two IFEL sessions. In the third and four sessions, detailed planning and local administration has been delegated by the Ministry to the educational staffs of four universities; Tokyo, Tohoku, Kyoto, and Kyushu. This is in line with the general policy of decentralizing the powers of the Ministry.

5. The first three sessions of IFEL have had a tremendous impact upon the Japanese educational world. Civil Affairs Section, in evaluating the project, states ". . . the IFEL program is one of the best basic ideas that have been promoted by the Occupation." Hundreds of expressions of appreciation have come from Japanese participants. The Ministry of Education, members of local and prefectural Boards of Education, and many others whose activities have brought them into contact with the program have expressed enthusiasm for IFEL and a desire for its continuance. The Visiting Experts who have participated in the program have indicated their belief in its importance, not only in reports to this headquarters, but in lectures and articles published in the United States. Japanese graduates of IFEL are now serving as superintendents of education with prefectural and local Boards of Education. A nucleus of trained teacher consultants (though all too few) is now in service in every prefecture and giving valuable leadership to local school administrators and classroom teachers.

6. The Ministry of Education has indicated, and CIE concurs, that the most pressing personnel training problem in the Japanese educational field at present is in the institutional staffs of teacher training institutions. This need has been emphasized by the requirements of new Certification Laws establishing minimum standards for teacher training and implying the incorporation into the programs of teacher training institutions of new content and methods of instruction. CIE further considers that the training of teachers during Fiscal Year 1951 is in line with the policy of preparing Japanese, at the earliest practicable date, to assume the responsibilities which will be theirs at the end of the Occupation.

7. A tentative plan for the next two sessions of IFEL has been prepared by CIE, although no assurances have been given the Japanese, in response to their many requests, that the program can be carried out. Details of the plan are attached as TAB A. The program is designed to meet the basic need referred to in paragraph 6, above. It is planned that the Japanese staff would be supplemented by American visiting experts, as has been the practice in the first four sessions of IFEL. The number of visiting experts required for the two sessions would be limited to a total of fifteen, to be supplemented by nine regular staff members of CIE who would devote a major portion of their time to IFEL during the period it is in session. Total time involved for visiting experts would be approximately 130 man-months. Job descriptions and qualifications for visiting experts are included in TAB A.

8. The Ministry of Education has expressed a strong desire for joint sponsorship of the program by CIE and the Ministry, and has indicated that it will provide the not inconsiderable yen funds required for Japanese instructors, participants, and administrative expenses.

9. Recruitment of visiting experts for the IFEL program has presented numerous difficulties for Department of the Army in the past two years. Lack of qualified personnel and lack of familiarity with the requirements of the program have been the major obstacles. In each instance, Department of the Army finally has requested that a staff member of CIE, familiar with IFEL and Occupation conditions, be sent to the ZI on TDY to carry on the recruiting. Recruitment by CIE personnel has been uniformly successful. The visiting experts selected for IFEL have proven to be sound educators and sound citizens and none of them, so far as is known to CIE, has caused embarrassment to the headquarters either while in Japan or after their return to the United States.

10. A major problem encountered in both planning and recruiting during the current fiscal year resulted from the delay by Congress in approving the budget, as well as the ceiling placed on Project 412 from which visiting experts are paid. For the current session of IFEL, the Department of the Army proposed (with concurrence by this headquarters) the transfer of the necessary funds from Project 162 (Reorientation materials) to Project 452 (Exchange of Persons) on which there is no Congressional ceiling. This was finally accomplished and the necessary funds made available, but the many delays involved made recruiting very difficult and caused certain of the American personnel to arrive too late for the orientation program which had been planned. Inasmuch as visiting experts participating in the IFEL program must arrange a leave of absence for one academic year from the college or university where regularly employed, early recruitment is essential.

11. Preliminary information on the fiscal year 1951 budget indicates that sufficient funds will be included in Project 412 to pay the visiting experts contemplated for the next IFEL program. In the event that there are not sufficient funds in Project 412 it is considered almost certain that there will be sufficient funds in Project 162 to provide for transfer of the necessary amount to Project 452 as was finally done this fiscal year. Since it is desired that the visiting experts report to this headquarters by 10 August 1950, decision on the source of funds is considered of the utmost urgency. Also because of the target date, it is considered that early recruitment (on a tentative basis until funds are firm) by a CIE staff member is of great importance.

III. CONCLUSIONS

1. It is concluded that the continuation of the Institute for Educational Leadership during the Fiscal Year 1951 is not only desirable but of the highest importance in the accomplishment of CIE's mission.

2. It is concluded that the services of 15 American visiting experts are essential to the success of the Institute for Educational Leadership.

3. It is concluded that funds necessary for the employment of 15 American visiting experts will be available, either through Project 412 or by transfer from Project 162 to Project 452.

4. It is concluded that early recruitment of 15 American visiting experts by a staff member of CIE is essential if the target date of 10 August 1950 is to be met.

IV. RECOMMENDATIONS.

1. That the plan, attached as TAB A, for the fifth and sixth sessions of the Institute for Educational Leadership be approved.

2. That the draft letter, attached as TAB B, be approved for dispatch to the Department of the Army.

3. That a staff member of CIE be authorized temporary duty in the ZI, to begin not later than 1 June, for the purpose of recruiting American visiting experts for the fifth and sixth sessions of the Institute for Educational Leadership.

PLAN FOR FIFTH AND SIXTH SESSIONS OF
THE INSTITUTE FOR EDUCATIONAL LEADERSHIP (FY 51)
(Sponsored Jointly by Ministry of Education and
Civil Information and Education Section)

1. Higher educational institutions in the Tokyo area will provide courses in two sessions, first from 11 September 1950 to 22 December 1950, second from 8 January 1951 to 30 March 1951, for the training of educational personnel in the fields listed in paragraph 5 below.

2. The instructional staff for the program will be furnished by the Japanese universities and by this headquarters. Fifteen of the American personnel involved will be recruited for the purpose from United States institutions of higher education as visiting experts. Nine members of the permanent staff of CIE will participate.

3. Each of the 52 Japanese universities having education faculties and the 75 (approximately) having education departments will be invited to send a member of its staff as a student-participant in each of the fields of study offered. A total of 635 Japanese student-participants in each session, estimating five from each university, will mean 1270 in all.

4. The program of each student-participant will consist of twelve hours of seminar and six hours of lectures per week for fifteen, twelve, or twenty-seven weeks.

5. The student-participants and the fields of instruction will be as follows:

a. Teacher trainers in universities in, or those preparing for such positions in:

- (1) Educational psychology
- (2) Educational sociology
- (3) Educational tests and measurements
- (4) Pupil guidance
- (5) Curriculum development in the elementary school
- (6) Curriculum development in the secondary school
- (7) Principles of education
- (8) Administration and supervision in the elementary school
- (9) Administration and supervision in the secondary school

1. Under GARIOA Project 412 it is understood that funds will be allocated for the fiscal year 1951 for the employment of visiting experts for Japan in the field of education. It is understood also that funds allocated for this purpose are to be retained and administered in Washington.

2. It is requested that visiting experts be recruited in the fields listed in the inclosure. Individuals recruited should meet the qualifications described.

3. It is requested that security and loyalty assurances be undertaken before individuals leave the Zone of the Interior.

as to the services expected of them and, as far as practicable, be oriented as to billeting, messing, and general working conditions in Japan. Dependents and/or secretarial help may not accompany these individuals or be brought subsequent to arrival. They will have the same status as Department of the Army civilians as regards theater regulations, billeting and messing facilities, and Post Exchange and Commissary privileges.

7. It is requested that, in general, visiting experts be recruited whose experience has been on the practical or operational level, who have served recently in teacher college faculties or in university colleges of education.

EXPERT CONSULTANTS - FIELDS AND JOB DESCRIPTIONS

1. During the fiscal year 1951, it is planned to use the services of expert consultants to assist in conducting an intensive training program for Japanese educational leaders. This program is to be a continuation of a program which was initiated in fiscal year 1949 and continued in fiscal year 1950, and known as the Institute for Educational Leadership. The participants who completed the program satisfactorily were as follows: 703 Superintendents of Education, 1,005 Teacher Consultants, 217 Normal School Instructors, 380 University Administrators and Teachers, and 1,073 Youth Organization Leaders. This program has been declared highly successful by Japanese participants, American Visiting Experts, Civil Affairs Education Officers, staff members of Civil Information and Education Section, Ministry of Education, and many others whose activities have brought them into contact with the program. This program has been effective in bringing about a democratization and decentralization of the educational system of Japan. There is, however, a need for the continuation of the program.

2. The Ministry of Education has indicated, and Civil Information and Education Section concurs, that the most pressing personnel training problem in the Japanese educational field at present is in the institutional staffs of teacher training institutions. This need has been emphasized by the requirements of new Certification Laws establishing minimum standards for teacher training and implying the incorporation into the programs of teacher training institutions of new content and methods of instruction. Civil Information and Education Section further considers that the training of teachers during fiscal year 1951 is in line with the policy of preparing Japanese, at the earliest practicable date, to assume the responsibilities which will be theirs at the end of the Occupation.

3. There is, at the present time, no Japanese institution equipped to undertake this program of training, nor is there available a sufficient number of professionally qualified Japanese personnel who can undertake such a program without guidance. The proposed intensive training program will utilize qualified Japanese personnel, many of whom were trained in previous Institutes for Educational Leadership programs, personnel of Civil Information and Education Section, and a nucleus of visiting experts from the United States.

4. The training program is tentatively scheduled as follows:

a. Higher educational institutions in the Tokyo area will provide courses in two sessions, first from 11 September 1950 to 22 December 1950, second from 8 January 1951 to 30 March 1951, for the training and educational personnel in the fields listed below -

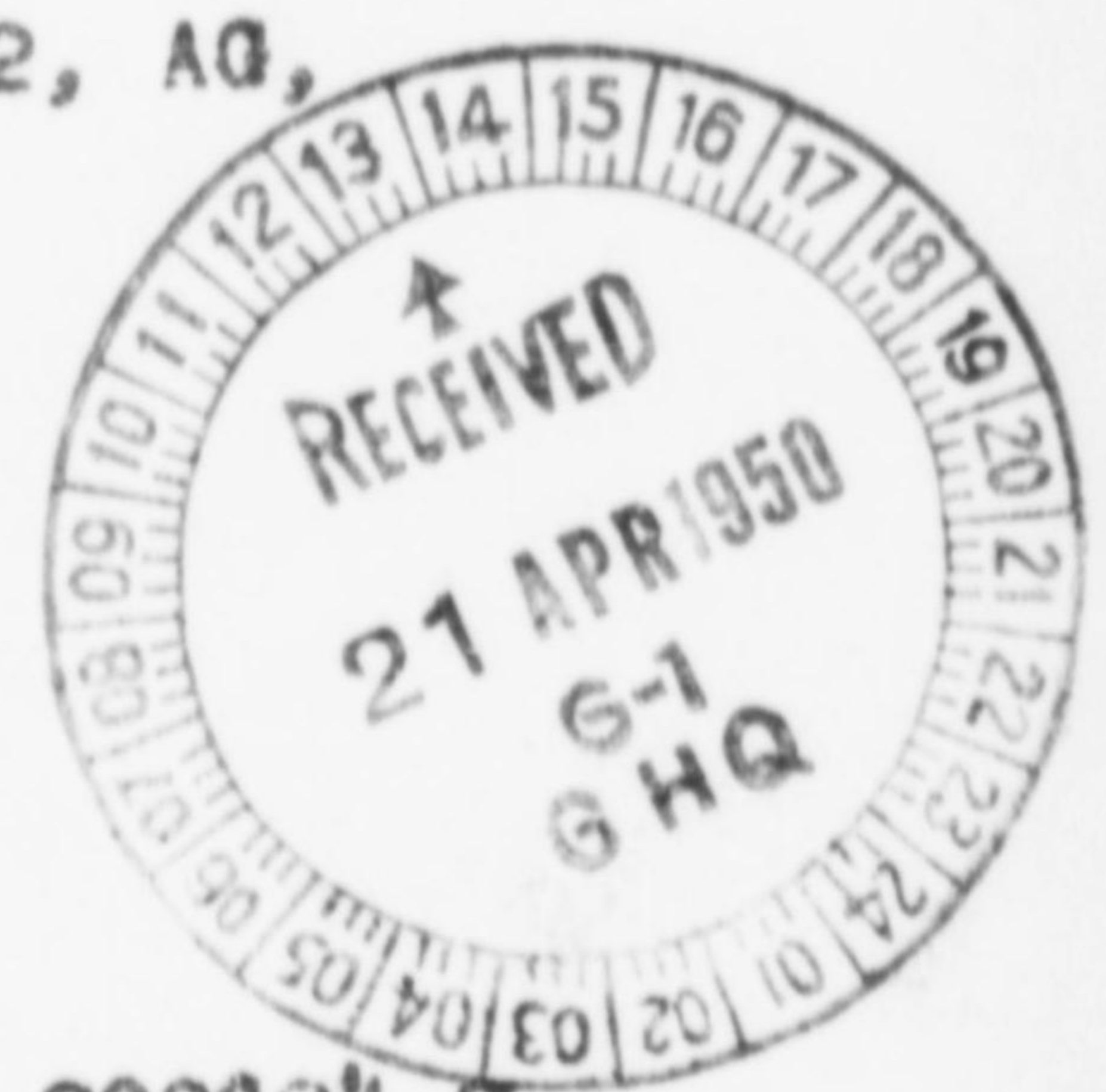

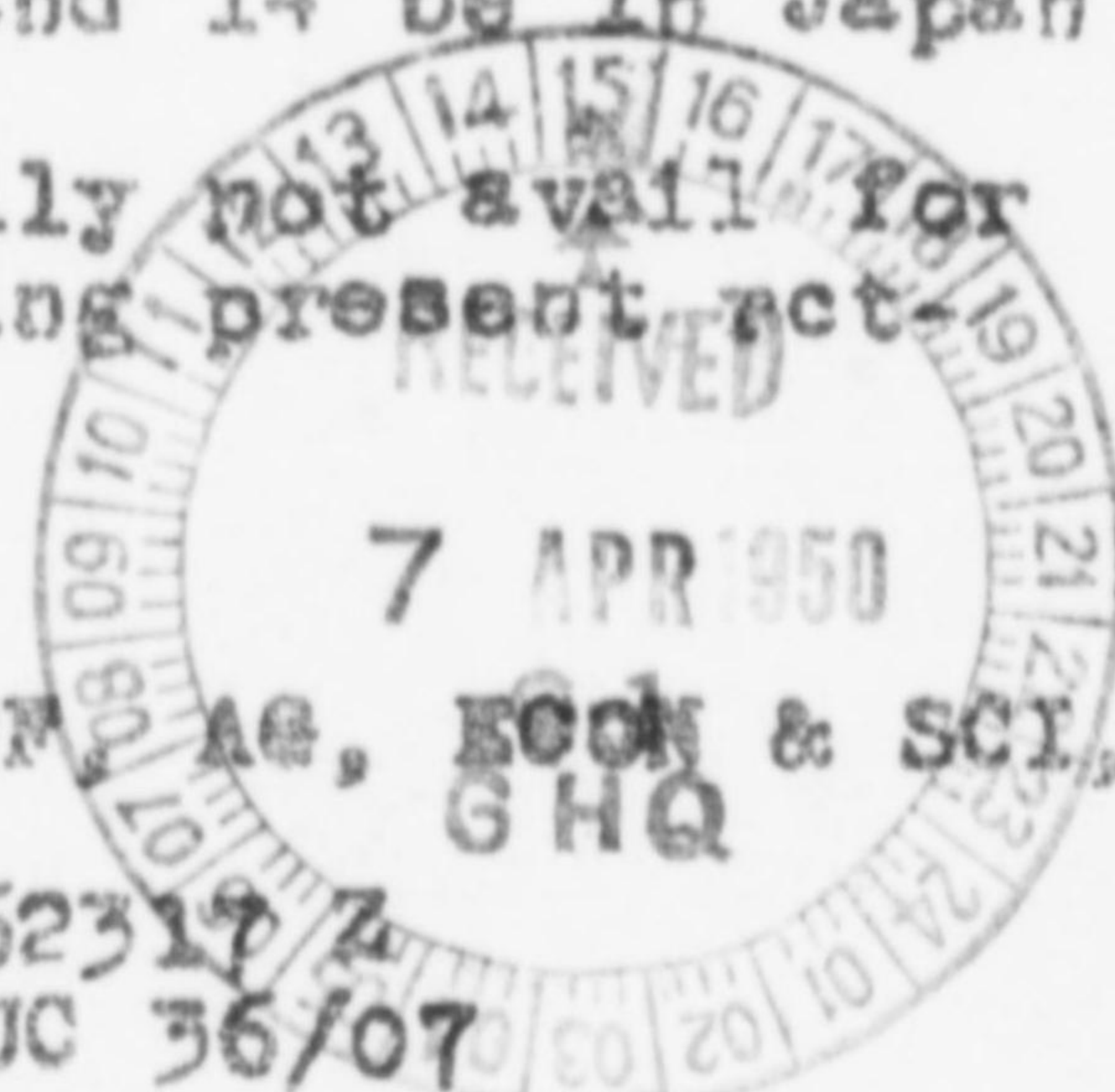

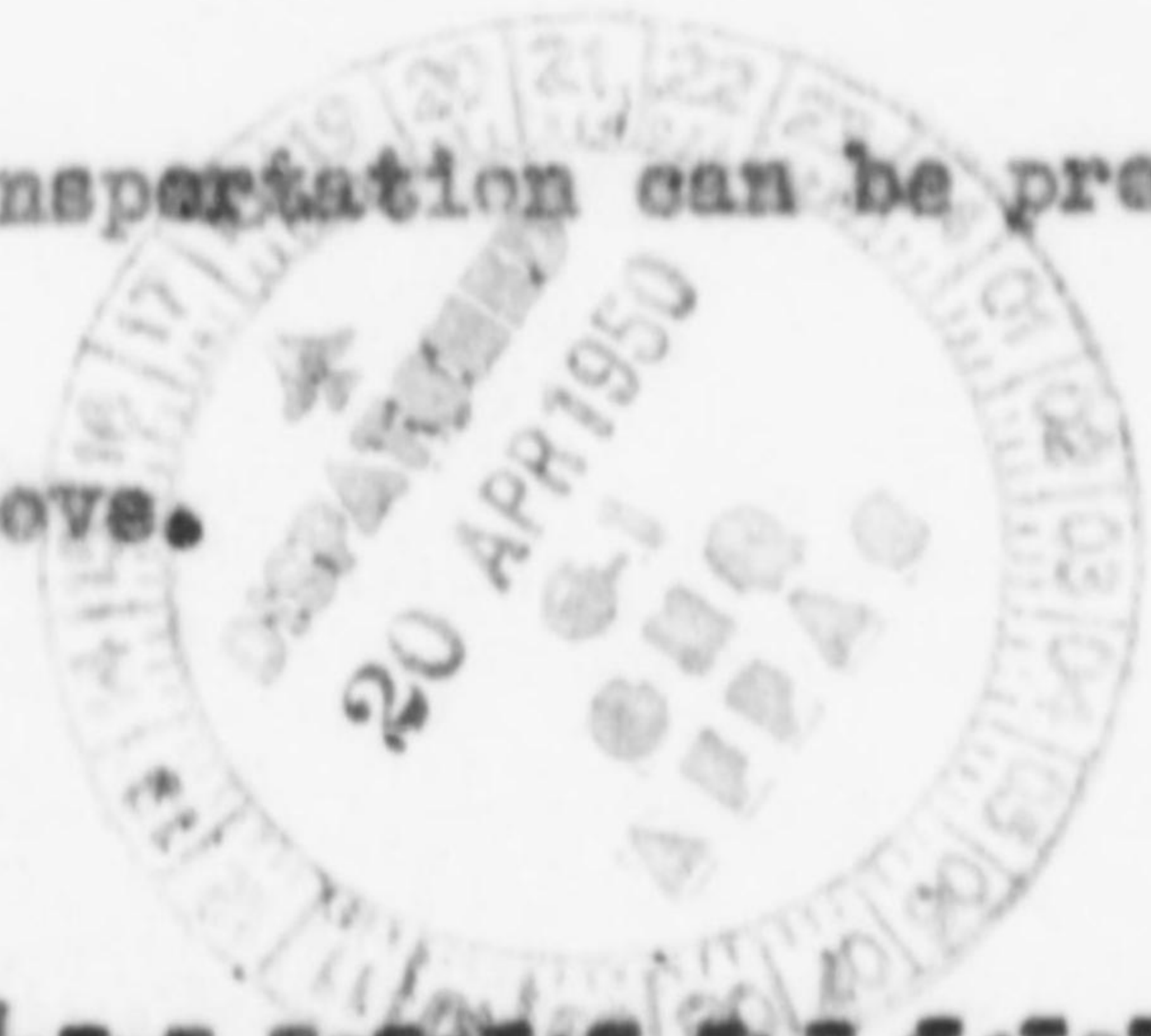

2. Above cited reference placed Mr Charles J. Kraebel, U. S. Forest Service, as a Visiting Expert, on reimbursable detail with Department of the Army for a period of one hundred twenty (120) days effective 6 February 1950. Mr Kraebel's detail with Department of the Army will expire 5 June 1950.

3. It is requested that the services of Mr Kraebel be obtained for an additional twenty five (25) days which will extend his temporary duty with Department of the Army through 30 June 1950.

4. Mr Kraebel arrived in Japan 24 February 1950. His services were requested to investigate the flood control problems in Japan as it is influenced by existing forest management practices, the soil erosion and conservation problem, the water supply problem as it is influenced by water storage capacity of forest soils, and hydroelectric power supply as it is influenced by stream flow and regulated by forest cover on the watersheds. As a result of these investigations Mr Kraebel will be able to offer concrete suggestions and advise on total effects of the forest cover on the regulation of water and stream flow in development of a coordinated land use plan.

5. Erosion and flood damaged areas are in isolated and remote regions where travel is impeded. Delayed thaw of snow fields has restricted examination of special areas and has not permitted examination of Japanese runoff experiments in major watersheds. Evaluation of most vulnerable areas under actual spring rain conditions is necessary before constructive criticism of Japanese Forestry Agency flood control projects can be made. It is believed that extension of Mr Kraebel's tour through 30 June 1950 will allow sufficient time for him to complete this project.

2. This proposal was discussed with the Chief, NRS, who agrees on cancellation of priority 8 only. His reasons for objecting to cancellation of priorities 10 and 15 are:

a. Priority 10. Much of the basic work of Soil Classification has been completed, and data assembled for finalization. NRS had recruited a visiting expert to complete the job, but due to pressing requirements in the RYUKYUS, he was allowed to undertake the job of advising Ryukyus MG on land classification problems there. Chief, NRS considers it essential to obtain the services of a Land Classification Specialist to complete this task in Japan, which should require less than 90 days.

Comment. Priority 16 is a land Classification and Land Use Specialist, who should be able to render advice on finalization of data. However, rather than leave incomplete a project on which considerable time and money has been spent, G-1 has amended inclosure 5 to indicate recruitment of expert for priority 10 as proposed by the DA.

b. Priority 15. See Inclosure 8.

c. Chief, NRS, also did not agree with the statement concerning "recent progress in programs involving Japan's natural resources."

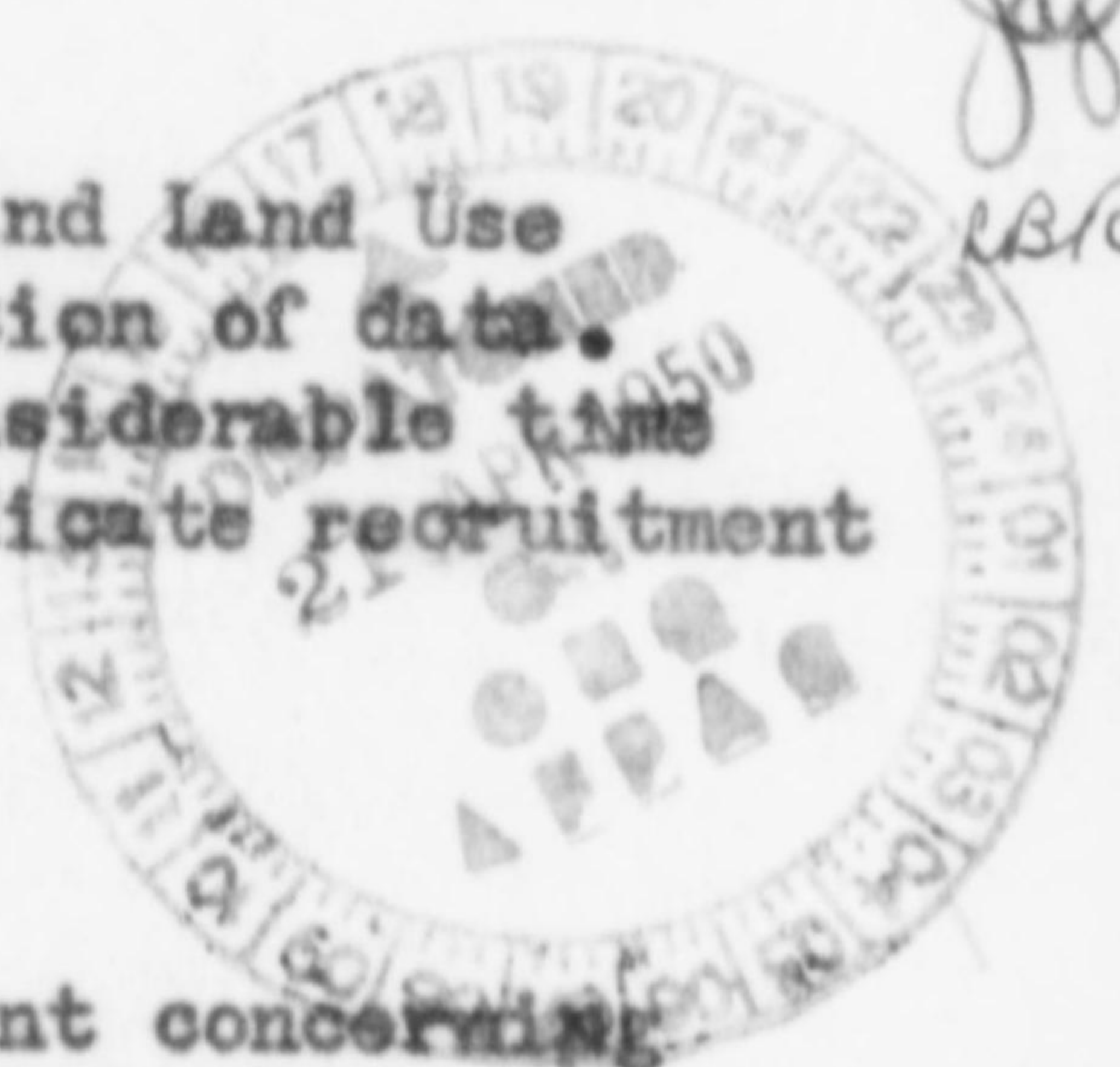

3. NRS programs during the current fiscal year appear to have progressed satisfactorily, even without a full complement of visiting experts. With continuing emphasis being placed on relaxation of controls, it is believed that the Japanese should be relied upon to continue under present SCAP direction with a minimum of advice and guidance furnished by visiting experts. 2. NRS in Checknote 1 outlines desired recruiting action for each priority referred to in DA radio and incloses draft radio reply to the DA.

3. NRS programs during the current fiscal year appear to have progressed satisfactorily, even without a full complement of visiting experts. With continuing emphasis being placed on relaxation of controls, it is believed that the Japanese should be relied upon to continue under present SCAP direction with a minimum of advice and guidance furnished by visiting experts. 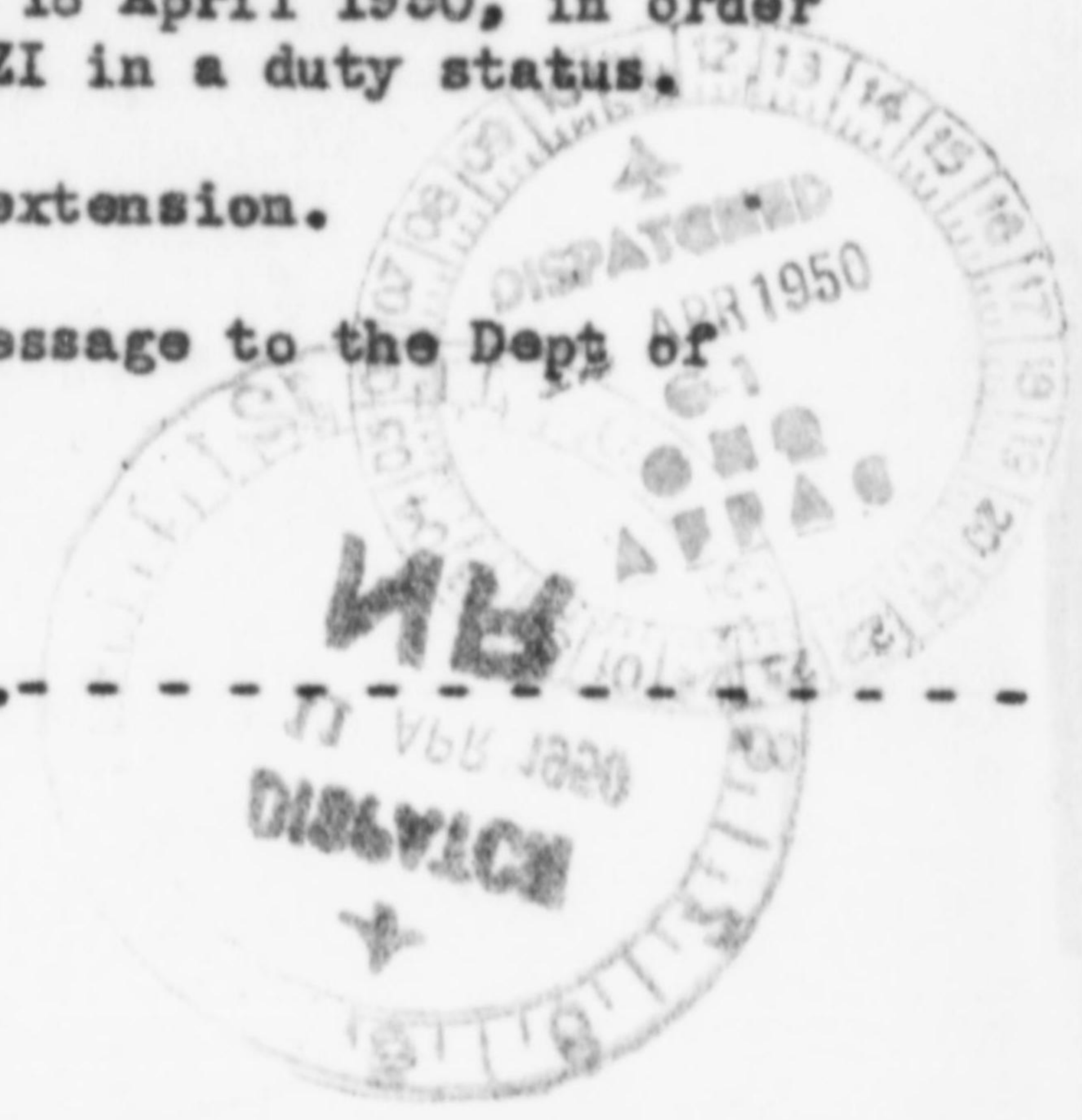

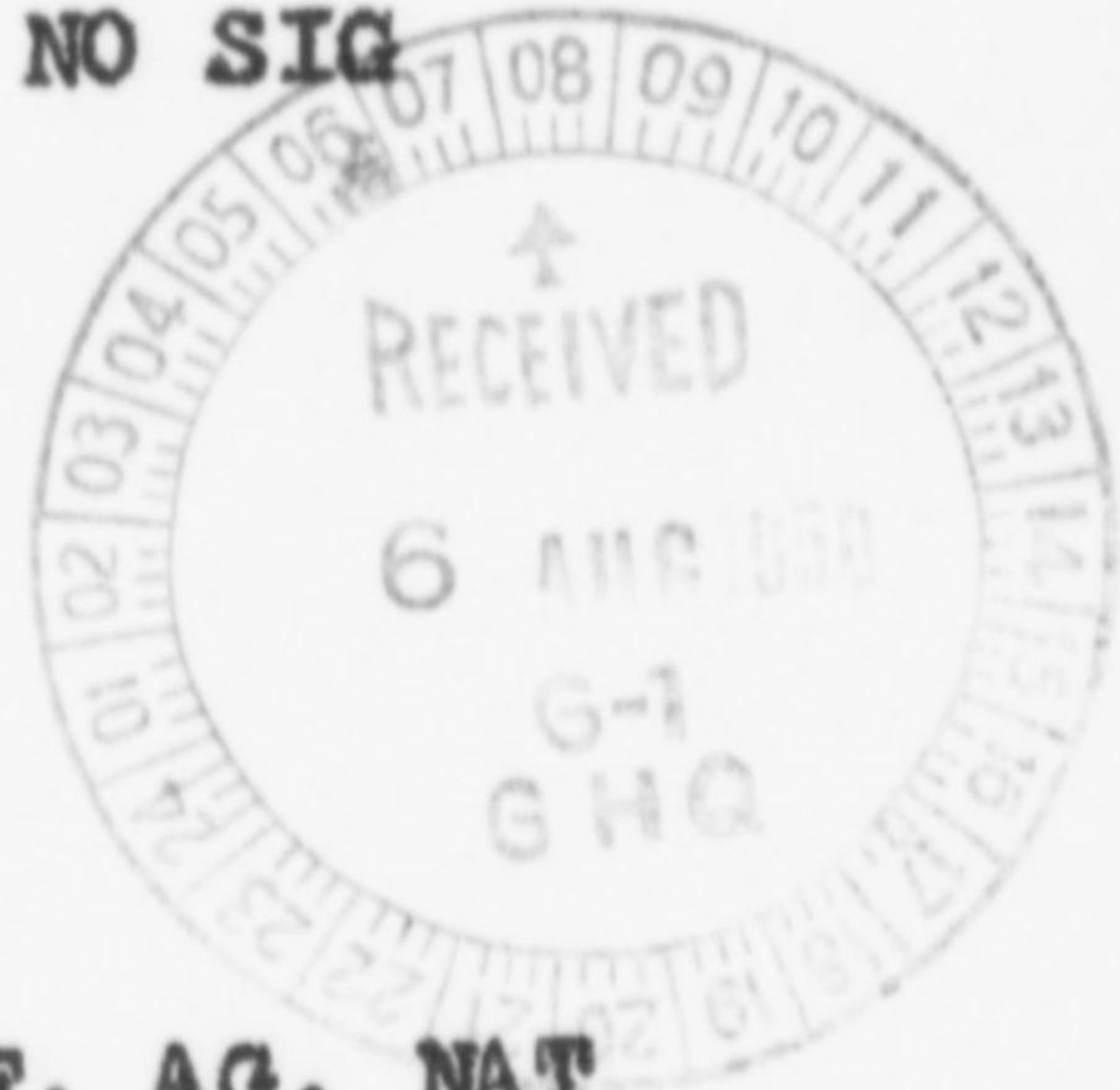
