




PLEASE USE ORDER SHEET found in the catalog in making out your order and retain a copy of the order. If you have occasion later on to write us about the order give post-office address under which it was mailed. Orders are filed by post offices, so if you give a different post-office address in writing it is difficult for us to find the order.

WE ACKNOWLEDGE ORDERS when received unless the order, or some part of it, is to be sent at once or within a day or so. If any part is mailed right out that answers as an acknowledgment or if goods can be sent at once or very soon by freight or express we send acknowledgment and notice of shipment at the same time, enclosing Bill of Lading.

WE SEND LARGE SHIPMENTS BY FREIGHT unless otherwise instructed. See table of freight rates below. We have three railroads here at Madison, Chicago and Northwestern, Chicago, Milwaukee and St. Paul and Illinois Central.

CUSTOMERS PAY TRANSPORTATION CHARGES on all goods unless offered postpaid. Small shipments will be sent by express. There are special express rates on seeds, in the main, 25 per cent less than the merchandise rate.

NO CHARGE FOR PACKING OR CARTAGE. Everything will be securely packed and labeled and delivered free at the Freight, Express or Post Office. All express rates have been reduced since the Parcel Post law went into effect.

ORDER EARLY. Do this for two reasons. We can give your order more careful and prompt attention if received before we get into the rush, and then we will not have to write for permission to substitute for varieties sold out.

OUR THREEFOLD GUARANTEE.

1. QUALITY. We guarantee the quality of the seeds, plants, bulbs and potatoes we send out to the extent that should they not prove as represented we will refill the order or return the money; but we give no further warranty, express or implied, as to description, purity, quality, productiveness or any other matter of any seeds, potatoes, bulbs or plants we send out and will not be responsible for the crop. Goods may be returned if not satisfactory.

2. SAFE ARRIVAL. We guarantee everything we send out to arrive in good order. If potatoes freeze on the road we will refill the order if the time of shipping is left to our discretion. If any goods arrive in bad order, however, bags torn or anything else wrong, have this noted on the freight expense bill which must be sent us so that we can make proper claim. The bill of lading must be returned also. Therefore do not lose the bill of lading.

3. RECEIPT OF MONEY. We will be responsible for all money sent us through the mails, if remittance is made by P. O. or Express Order, Draft or Registered Letter. We will accept personal checks at face value. They look good to us. Small amounts, less than \$1.00, may usually be sent safely in postage stamps or coin.

High grade, recleaned Clover seed is one of our specialties. There is no better clover seed than Wisconsin seed and Wisconsin is usually ahead of all other states in amount of clover seed produced. Wisconsin's total clover crop the past season according to the Government report was 201,000 bushels and only one state surpassed us, the state of Illinois with 204,000 bushels. Iowa had 200,000 bushels, Indiana 68,000 bushels only. The total for the entire United States was only 1,214,000 bushels as compared with 1,760,000 last year.

we therefore have 30 per cent less clover in this country than last year according to the Government estimate, which is probably high, with very little carry over of old seed. Furthermore much less clover is being imported from Europe than last year. It looks therefore, as if there would hardly be enough seed to meet the demand. Our advice is buy early. Do not wait. Prices now are reasonable. They are sure to be higher.

We use the utmost care in buying to keep clear of seed containing buckhorn and dodder. These two noxious weeds are very common in clover. We never handle European seed. It is pretty sure to contain buckhorn and dodder and much of it is not adapted to our conditions anyway. Right here we want to warn our customers against buying clover seed that has not been tested. Fortunately for the farmers we have a very stringent seed law here in Wisconsin.

Do not buy cheap untested clover seed. It is the worst kind of folly. You can do untold damage to your farm in a single season. Buy Olds' tested re-cleaned northern grown seed.

SWEET CLOVER. (The Great Fertilizer and Hay Crop.)

Sweet Clover is no longer an experiment. It has become a staple crop and is grown now in all sections. The seed this year is ridiculously low in price.

A few of the reasons why sweet clover is valuable:

Hulled seed is preferable to unhulled as it germinates more readily. Scarifying the seed also makes it germinate better. We have a machine for scarifying and use it when needed. The seed should be inoculated for best results.

HUBAM SWEET CLOVER

The Wonderful New Quick Growing Annual White Sweet Clover.

Hubam Sweet Clover was discovered at the Iowa Experiment Station in 1916 by Prof. H. D. Hughes, Chief of Farm Crops. The first year in comparison with other clovers at the Iowa Station it made a growth of 4½ feet, while Medium Red clover beside it under exactly the same conditions made a growth of only five inches and common sweet clover 14.

The great value of Hubam Sweet Clover lies in the fact that it makes such a heavy growth the same season it is sown. As the Rural New Yorker puts it "It does in one season what alfalfa or the old sweet clover requires two years for doing. It will make a faster and stronger growth than any other plant yet well tested in this country." It can be sown in the spring like any other clover and a full crop of seed harvested the same season. Or it can be cut earlier for hay and usually two crops of splendid hay can be secured the first season. If sown with grain it will make a heavy growth, 2½ to 3 feet, after the grain is taken off, and this makes the best kind of green manure to plow under.

As a Honey Crop Hubam is of greatest value as it begins to bloom two months after seeding and continues blossoming in profusion all summer long making the best clover honey. In fact when the ripe seed is ready for cutting in the fall new blossoms will be found on the same plant.

Culture. Sow with or without a nurse crop 10 to 15 pounds per acre. Or it can be sown in rows and cultivated and that way 3 or 4 pounds will seed an acre. Spring is the best time for sowing but Hubam can be sown in the fall the same as other sweet clover. The seed we offer is genuine Hubam, certified and scarified and all northern grown. Part of our stock was grown on the University of Wisconsin farm here at Madison.



Prices at this date are low. We are looking for somewhat higher prices. Our seed is all American grown. Foreign seed we do not handle as we do not think our customers want it at all. The seed is apt to contain bad weed seeds and it does not do as well as American grown by the seed anyway. Look out for this inferior foreign seed.

Insist on knowing where the seed grew before you buy. If you buy of a Wisconsin dealer he will have to give you that information as the Wisconsin seed law requires it. Insist also on knowing what it tests both for purity and germination. Our seed all shows high tests. Buy from samples showing tests. Use inoculation and use lime.



GRIMM ALFALFA. (The Alfalfa for Northern Latitudes.)

The Variety of Alfalfa known as Grimm is the hardiest of all varieties and best adapted to the Northwest.

History. The seed of this variety was brought to Minnesota from Germany in 1857, by a German farmer named Grimm. Prof. W. M. Hays, while at the Minnesota Experiment Station about 1890 found Mr. Grimm growing this alfalfa and at once began calling attention to its hardiness and adaptability to Minnesota conditions. At one time Prof. Hays had advised farmers that it was not worth while to attempt growing alfalfa in the Northwest. Wr. Grimm had never heard of this advice and in his 25 years' experience with alfalfa had not discovered that it was not adapted to Minnesota conditions.



COLD RESISTANT GOLDEN GLOW.

The Best Silage Corn for Central and Upper Wisconsin.

We have long been looking for a good dent corn a little earlier than anything else we have had, something for extreme northern sections. Here we have it. Wisconsin No. 25 originated at the Ashland Station. It is a cross of Wisconsin No. 8 and a very early but deep-kerneled yellow dent which Prof. Delwiche secured from Northern Michigan. Prof. Delwiche says:

"We have selected from the original cross with the idea of fixing a type of corn similar in general appearance to the Wis. No. 8 but of earlier maturity. Our tests at Spooner have shown this new variety to be about a week to ten days earlier than the Wis. No. 8. The ideal we are working towards, and which is quite well fixed now, is for stalks ranging from seven to nine feet in height on medium soil, quite leafy; ears rather low on the stalk with from twelve to sixteen rows, kernels well dented but not rough. The proportion of corn to cob for this variety is somewhat greater than for the Wis. No. 8, being about 85% while our Wis. No. 8 (northern strain) is approximately 81% to 82%.







Why Use Fertilizers? Did you ever stop to figure what a lot of work it takes to grow a bushel of corn? Suppose the yield of one of your fields is at the rate of sixty bushels per acre. If you count off 58 hills and husk out the ears, you will find that you have about a bushel. Then go over to a field where the soil produces only a thirty-bushel crop. You will find when you have husked out a bushel there, that you have gone over about 116 hills—58 more than were needed in the other field. Big yields of corn or of any crop pay better. Fertilizers increase yields and profits when properly used.

Fertilizers contain three plantfoods—ammonia, phosphoric acid and potash. Some fertilizers contain all three of these; some have only two, while others contain but one plantfood. This variation gives you a chance to select the fertilizer which will fit the conditions on your farm.

What Are Fertilizers?

NITROGEN OR AMMONIA.

Fertilizer nitrogen enables the plant to get a quick start and carries it along through a critical period. It promotes leafiness, and gives a dark green color to foliage.

PHOSPHORIC ACID.

Phosphoric acid helps fill the grain or fruit and hastens ripening. Cereals are especially heavy feeders on this plantfood. Most soils respond profit-ably to a fertilizer containing phos-

POTASH.

Potash strengthens the straw or stalk, increases starch and sugar formation and makes for a better quality. Potatoes, root crops, and most truck crops use potash in large
