Dublin, Aug. 17.—The public meeting of the Dail Eireann was djourned this afternoon to an indefinite date. Private sessions will be held in the meantime, beginning to-morrow.

London Papers Comment on His Attitude

London, Aug. 17.—London newspapers, even those that have most warmly supported Southern Irish aspirations, to-day viewed with considerable regret the statements made by Eamonn de Valera at yesterday's meeting of the Dall Eireann. There was, however, reluctance to regard his speech as expressing his followers last words and some editorials declared with confidence that if the issue were placed before the Irish people the British terms of settlement would be accepted. Despite his age, King Peter presented one of the most courageous figures of the Great War.

Forced from his capital, Belgrade, and thence from Nish by the advancing army of the Central Powers in 1915, his country laid waste by fire and shell, Peter lived to return to Serbia, though too frail to share in the work of reorganization and reconstruction of his domains.

His son, Prince Alexander was designated Prince Regent by the elder Karageorgevitch, and on November 28, 1915 the National Council of Jugo-Slavia, at Agram, Croatia, confirmed the choice, thus relieving the venerable king of the rulership of Serbia, Montenegro Slavonia, Bosnia, Herzegovina, Dalmatia and Croatia, which had united after their liberation from Austria.

King Peter's royal career was be-clouded by a grave and terrible trag-edy—the assassination of his predeedy—the assassination of his prede-cessor, King Alexander and the lat-ter's wife, Queen Draga, in the pal-ace at Belgrade on June 10, 1903. A suspicion that members of the Kara-georgevitch family, of which Peter suspicion that members of the Aarageorgevitch family, of which Peter
was a member, were implicated in
the conspiracy which exterminated
the rival ruling Obrenovitich dynasty,
of which Alexander and Deaga were
representatives, and which placed
Peter on the throne five days later,
was never entirely removed. In 1911,
when King Peter made a tour of
Europe, he experienced somewhat of
a cold reception from other royalties.
All told more than fifty persons
were killed or wounded in the place

shot down all who stood in their way
as they pressed toward the apartments of King Alexander and Queen





Morelos is known as one of the richest states in the republic but agriculture has been retarded because, until recently, it was owned practically in toto by twenty-two landlords, who are said to have failed to culivate the land to the best advantage.

Master and Mate of Exporter Suspended

Vancouver, Aug. 17.—The certificate of Captain William Bradley, of the C. G. M. M. steamship Canadian Exporter, wrecked recently off the Oregon coast, is suspended for six months, and the certificate of Chief Officer Newton Campbell suspended for four months, according to judgment handed down here this morning by the Court of Inquiry into the wreek of the vessel

This was the decision of Captain J. D. Macpherson, B. C. Wreck Commissioner, who presided, and Commander Radeliffe, R.N., one of the assessors. The other assessor, Commander F. W. Evans, R.N.R., while agreeing with the terms of the report, thought that the suspension of the master for the period stated was too severe.

One of the most important features of the evidence was the statement of Captain Bradley that the Exporter's compassed showed too much deviation, that he had warned his owners and that he had made application for a new instrument.

On this point the court found that no possible blame attached to the owner or to the equipment of the ship.

The accident was caused, found the tourt, because the ship was not navigated properly. Soundings had not been taken as they should have been and the master and mate were solely to blame for the stranding which led to the breaking up of the ship.

Dr. S. S. Goldwater, of Rockefeller institute, Outlines Problems to Be Met

"We have as our guest this evening a man who has specialized on hospitals, Dr. Goldwater," said President Mark W. Graham last night at the Kiwanis Club luncheon at the Dominion Hotel, when introducing the guest of the evening. 'In addition to a large attendance of Kiwanians, the luncheon was attended by many members of the medical profession and the directors of the Royal Jubilee Hospital. "I know of no equivalent test to compare with hospital equipment as a gauge of the progress and spirit of a community," said Dr. Goldwater, congratulating the Canadian cities on the average of high excellence of this feature of their equipment.

He explained that while interested in the design of hospitals, his main intent was in the welfare of the patient, promoted by first class equipment for medical and surgical work.

Balanced Specialization.

He pointed out that specialization was the great thing to-day, especially in medicine, but if all the specialized units fail to work together, the organization as a whole will break down and the hospital fail to function as it. should. "Judged by such ideal standards no hospital is perfect to-day, but then no human being is 100 per cent. perfect," said Dr. Goldwater, declaring that many hospitals, judged by such a yardstick, only function at 20 or 30 per cent. of efficiency, yet the directorate are complacently satisfied, in the knowledge that, within its limits, their undertaking has done considerable good.

Publicity Brings Improvement.

"It is only through publicity, pittless continuous publicity, that the weaknesses of hospitals can be discovered and remedied," he said, congratulating the Kiwanis Club on its work for hospitals of the city.

"Coming down to hospital administration't should tike to give you some of the points to be aimed at or avoided," the doctor continued. "Specialization is widely advocated to-day, but at times is dangerous and to be avoided," he said, mentioning cases where laboratory equipment was out of the proportion through specialization. "Conditions financial may cause funds to be lacking, but it should always be the laim to have a well-rounded plant.

"Where there is not a good balance between the business, medical and surgical branches of hospitals, it is not possible to have a well run intitution," arged Dr. Goldwater.


