**CAN GET MONEY FOR WOOL MILL, HE SAYS**

year. The Ministry of Food extended its control to a point where the interference with the free flow of Canadian products into the British Empire became a menace to the prosperity of the producing industries had previously enjoyed. As the representative of the Canadian Manufacturers' Association and at their desire the organization fought for the removal of control upon Canadian bacon, a control which was rapidly destroying the hard-earned good will of the Canadian industry by the harmful effect upon supplies of inferior quality from the United States. This struggle was waged to a successful issue, and the organization also acted in alliance with F. C. Wade, K.C., Agent-General for British Columbia, in order to free the canned salmon from that province from unfair restriction at the hands of the Government of this country. Canadian apples, too, were championed by the organization when control militated against the interests of that industry.

**Has Strong Connections.**

With regard to Canadian goods in other parts of the Empire, the organization, through the Council of which Mr. Morgan presides, has strong connections in every part of the Empire, and one of its cardinal activities is the stimulation of inter-Empire trade. In this connection representations are being made with a view to bringing about effective preferential arrangements between Canada and Australia. Mr. Morgan's visit, therefore, is of the greatest interest to all those who are concerned with Canadian production and who desire to arouse British interest in it or are looking for guidance in regard to the opening up of overseas markets within the Empire for their products. Mr. Morgan's organization stands for the development of the Empire connection and the application of Empire preference to all matters of industrial and commercial intercourse through H. M. Dominions.

Secretary of the Manufacturers' Association of Great Britain, 1902-10; lectured on colonial trade, London School of Economics, Birmingham University, Royal Colonial Institute, Society of Arts, etc.; chairman, Trade and Industry Committee, Royal Colonial Institute; vice-chairman Canadian Chamber of Commerce; member Victoria Economic Committee of Honk Kong University; member of the Imperial Council of Commerce; editor of The Britannic Review; vice-president of the Society of Engineers; his suggestion for appointment of Permanent Imperial Trade Commissioners was adopted by Imperial Government; assisted in construction and revision of first British Trade and Com-

**NEW OFFICERS FOR VANCOUVER G. W. V. A.**

Vancouver, Aug. 17.—Resignation of the whole executive of the G. W. V. A. was called for at a general meeting last night. Nominations will be received next Tuesday, and the elections will be held in two weeks' time.

The question arose when the secretary read the minutes of an executive meeting at which four members of the executive had handed in their resignations on being charged with the association's business.

Making it clear that the lack of confidence in the executive was on account of their administration and not by reason of their personal character, Comrade H. A. Lees charged that there had been secrecy among certain members of the executive, that "unauthorized proposals had been made to the Government, and that no details of the alliance with the Army and Navy Veterans and the G. A. U. V. were being divulged to the members. The motion called for a general election in four weeks, but after much discussion an amendment calling for the resig-

nations of the whole executive carried almost unanimously. Past President Captain C. W. Whittaker occupied the chair.

All Must Share Loss, Premier Warns; Banks Urge B.C. to Curtail

Premier Oliver, at the close of the unemployment conference here, gave his ideas on the present financial, labor and industrial situation. "I know you are not going to agree with some of the things I am going to say," said the Premier. "I want to deprecate the idea that unless employment is found there is going to be trouble. Remarks of that kind in the press hurt rather than help. The Government realizes the situation. The question is one of finances and the Government has to look at it from every standpoint."

Bonds Safer Than Industry. "The real reason for the scarcity of funds is that the man who has money does not see his way to use it in enterprises under existing conditions when he can invest it in Government securities and secure interest, rather than invest it in industries, the products of which he cannot dispose of."

Only Gave Quarter Value. "You tell us you don't want dollars of relief work. You can put it under my gun like that but you are contending with the Government and asking it to undertake work to relieve your condition. You may not like that, but it is the case. I can tell you of works on which the men did not give 25 cents value for every dollar spent by the Government. We must be prepared at times to face a loss, and your laboring men must be prepared to bear your share of that loss."

Russia a Bad Example. "We are told something worse may happen. Yes, it has happened in Russia, but I ask you how that happening is going to benefit the working man, that threatened spoliation, rioting and trouble. That is not the way out, it will not help anyone, or in any way improve the situation. We realize there is a different

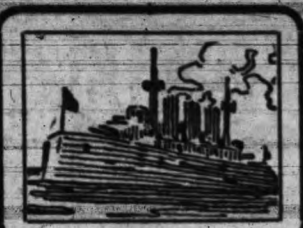

Dr. S. S. Goldwater, of Rockefeller Institute, Outlines Problems to Be Met

"We have as our guest this evening a man who has specialized on hospitals, Dr. Goldwater," said President Mark W. Graham last night at the Kiwanis Club luncheon at the Dominion Hotel...

He explained that while interested in the design of hospitals, his main interest was in the welfare of the patient, promoted by first class equipment for medical and surgical work.

Publicity Brings Improvement. "It is only through publicity, pitiless and continuous publicity, that the defects of hospitals can be discovered and remedied," he said, congratulating the Kiwanis Club on its work for hospitals of the city.

Outlines Chinese Campaign. Explaining that he was on his way to China, Dr. Goldwater outlined what he planned to be undertaken at Peking to make a practical demonstration to the Chinese people of the good attainable by modern hospital and medical practice.
