In accordance with the vote of the Town, the Selectmen and Engineers met at the Fire Department headquarters for the purpose of furnishing the Fire Department with a hose wagon.

J. H. Scott was chosen chairman and L. E. Belknap clerk of the committee.

It was unanimously voted that the committee purchase an exact duplicate of the No. 1 hose wagon.

Voted to ask all responsible builders in town to bid on building the wagon.

L. Grow & Son and L. E. Belknap furnished bids as follows: L. Grow & Son, \$275; L. E. Belknap \$272.50; without the equipments.

Voted that the contract be awarded to Mr. L. E. Belknap, and that the Fire Department furnish the equipments, the builder to attach the same.

The wagon being completed, the committee met, examined and tested it, and found it complied with the agreement.

Voted unanimously that the wagon be accepted, and turned over to the Fire Department. It was then placed in commission by the Engineers, and assigned to Hose No. 2.

## REPORT OF THE BOARD OF HEALTH.

---

The Milford Board of Health respectfully present this report as the result of their work for 1895 and '96.

The health of the Town compares well with former years. Of contagious diseases, there have been nineteen of diphtheria and twenty-eight of scarlet fever. Deaths of the former, three; of the latter, none.

Most of the cases have been of a sporadic character, presenting but little evidence of contagion. Without exception, the cases have been reported early by the physicians in attendance, and immediate isolation has followed. This care on the part of physicians gives the Board reason to believe that the prosecution of a physician for either neglect of making an early report, or an error of diagnosis, has had good results. In this connection it is well to suggest to the voters of Milford that nothing is more demanded, or that could be of more benefit to the health of Milford, than a small hospital for contagious diseases, that the cases may be well isolated, which is not possible at their homes, and that the other members of the family may pursue their usual daily avocations.

The need of a general system of sewerage increases as the years roll by, and is of the greatest importance. An accurate survey now rests in the archives of the Town ready for approval. Why not *now* act on this great want, and place Milford where it belongs, on an equality with all other towns and cities of like population. At the present time it is a continual "up hill" fight for the Board of Health to see that the cesspools are to any degree kept in the condition they demand. In the immediate future we shall ask the Town to render legal by their vote certain rules making it imperative to keep in good condition a cesspool uniform and thoroughly answering the indications which such receptacles demand.

An improvement of the Pond street sewer is recommended. That it is in a certain degree a nuisance there is no doubt. The State Board of Health have the case under advisement and will undoubtedly make a report soon. The Town should take action on the matter at an early date.

# SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

---

A full and detailed report of the schools you will find in the report of the Secretary and Superintendent, which the Committee have approved and adopted.

The Committee have endeavored to keep within the limits of the special and general appropriations for building and furnishing the new schoolhouse and running of the schools. There is a credit balance of \$18.29. In completing the building on Spruce street we have a fine four-room building properly lighted, well ventilated, and good sanitary arrangements, adapted for the younger and youngest scholars, supplying a long felt need. When the surroundings and conditions of life are such as to destroy delicacy and purity in the young, public morality is poisoned at the spring.

The system of public schools had its origin in the New England states, and has a strong and increasing hold in the hearts of its citizens;—it is not perfect, but gradually improving. The old methods of running the schools entirely by committees has almost ceased; 93 per cent of the schools are under superintendents, who are held responsible, and justly, for the standing of the schools. Good work is being done in all the schools.

The Legislature has made liberal and generous provision in providing for four new normal schools for the teaching of the teachers, which is a great feature in the great scheme of education—the preparation of teachers for their work. A plan for the state examination and certification of teachers as passed by an act of the last Legislature, has been approved by the Board of Education and adopted by the School Committee, so that hereafter only trained teachers shall be employed in its public schools.

An advance toward more equal conditions of life has been so great that amongst the more progressive nations such terms as “lower orders,” “common people” and “working classes” are losing much of their old meaning, and the masses of the peo-

ple are being slowly raised and the barriers of birth and class privilege are being broken through.

The revolution in methods of travel and means of communication, and our system of universal education are the products of the century in which we are still living. All the members of the community in the rivalry of life should be on a footing of equal opportunity in educational privileges; the laws should be equal for the poor and the rich. Education, power and wealth are open to all, and our laws should not stop with providing the bare rudiments of education for the people.

In this country, with all our educational facilities, crime is certainly not waning; it is rather increasing. There are other factors to be taken into consideration besides education. It is undoubtedly true that a purely intellectual education is no effective safeguard against criminal tendencies, and that the latter will not be checked until we engraft moral teaching and conscience training on our system of instruction.

There has been a gain of 92 scholars in town the last year; there are now 1592 scholars; 1256 are between 5 and 15 years.

The population of the town is 8958. The number of scholars in the state public schools in 1885 was 339,714; public schools in 1895 was 412,953; a gain of 73,239; a gain of 13,000 last year; a gain in attendance of 15,000. The average cost per pupil in state in 1885 was \$16.38; the average cost per pupil in the state in 1895 was \$19.98; the average cost per pupil in town in 1895 was \$16.33. In academies, private schools and parochial schools the number is 64,688; 87 per cent of scholars are in public schools.

#### A REVIEW OF THE YEAR.

In reviewing the work of the year, I am compelled to use an expression which may seem somewhat hackneyed, when I say that the condition of our schools is, on the whole, satisfactory. However, when I say this, I do not wish to convey the impression that I am entirely satisfied with the work; indeed it is hardly the duty of the superintendent to be satisfied; he

should always be on the alert to discover some means of improving the schools under his charge, and, in every field of labor, he who earnestly seeks improvement will attain it.

It is right to expect that the superintendent should devote much of his time to a personal inspection of the teacher's work; the work of the pupils is always a sure evidence of the teacher's ability, and the only fair way to judge her worth is to visit the schoolroom and see her at her work.

The teachers' meeting is undoubtedly one of the most efficient means by which the superintendent can work for improvement; I have obtained excellent results from a series of grade meetings where teachers of the same grade have met to talk about their work, and to consider means of securing better results. Our teachers are earnest, conscientious workers, and have always been willing to aid me in carrying out any changes which I have made with a view to the best interests of the schools.

### READING.

I am more nearly satisfied with the improvement in reading than with that in other branches of study. Four years ago we adopted the plan of supplying to the pupils in the grammar schools, reading matter consisting of complete selections from some of the best authors, in place of the regular fourth and fifth readers, which contain only fragments from many writers. Pupils in grades above the fourth now read complete selections from Andersen, Hawthorne, Whittier, Longfellow, Burroughs, Tennyson, and others. This plan has not only awakened an increased interest during the reading hour, but it has created in many pupils a desire to read other works of the same authors,—an evidence that they are acquiring a taste for the best literature.

A taste for that which is best in literature is an important factor in the formation of character, and we should begin the education of such a taste as early in life as it is possible to do so. A large number of the children in the grammar grades are constant patrons of the public library, and the amount which they read at home is many times greater than that which it is



possible to give them in the schoolroom. The result is that the influence which the school course of reading exerts on the cultivation of a taste for that which is best, is not so strong as it would be if the school authorities had power to control their selection of books.

With the pupils of the lower grades the school influence is more potent, because the children are able to do comparatively little reading without the assistance of the teacher. It therefore seems desirable to extend our course in literature to the fourth grade, and as far as possible to the lower grades. It is somewhat difficult to obtain good literature which is adapted to the ability of the younger children, but some of the publishers are making earnest efforts to meet the demand for this class of reading. There is so much pernicious literature which the children obtain with little expense, that it becomes our duty to give them every possible protection against its influence, and we can afford them no better safeguard against this growing evil than by giving them an early opportunity to acquire a taste for that which is pure and beautiful.

### ARITHMETIC.

This study has so long held the place of honor among the branches pursued in our schools, that it is not an easy matter to induce teachers to relegate it to its proper position, which should be to consider it merely as one of many important subjects. There can be no sound reason for thinking that a pupil who is unable to readily solve mathematical problems shows a greater mental deficiency than one who is unable to express his ideas in intelligent English, or to make a logical deduction from cause to effect in the preparation of a lesson in geography or history; so strong, however, is the force of habit, that in the first case the pupil is invariably called dull, while in the second case we simply say that he is slow. In the transaction of ordinary business affairs, the ability to express thought correctly and fluently is surely of as much practical advantage as the ability to calculate rapidly in fractions and percentage.

A few years ago all the number work in the four lower grades was prepared by the teacher and given to the pupils by

means of the black-board or dictation. Constant use of the black-board has been proved to be so injurious to the eye-sight that I advised placing text-books in the hands of the pupils. This has been done in the third and fourth grades, and this year I hope to use books during the last half of the second year.

### LANGUAGE.

Our work in this important study is improving, but much yet remains to be accomplished before we can say that it is satisfactory. Language, in whatever form it is used, is the expression of thought; no child can ever become skilful in the use of language until he has thoughts of his own to express; it follows that the logical order for the instructor to pursue in the language lesson is, first to induce thought, and then to train in its expression.

The fact that it is not practicable to place text-books on language in the hands of children in the first and second grades, and a desire to furnish them with an abundance of suitable material for thought, has induced me to introduce a systematic course of nature study in the primary grades. During the spring term these grades began the study of plant life. Boxes and jars of earth were placed in the schoolroom and seeds planted in them; branches of the horse-chestnut, lilac, apple, pear, elm and other well-known trees and shrubs were procured and placed in jars filled with water. This work, as far as possible, was done by the children, and they watched with lively interest the growth of the plant and the unfolding of the leaf and flower buds. In the fall term the study of leaves was taken up by all the grades and continued throughout the term.

This work was undertaken, not so much for the purpose of giving the pupils a correct knowledge of botany, as to furnish them with interesting material for thought, and by the expression of their thoughts to supply the teachers with better means of language drill.

To the majority of our teachers this was entirely new work and demanded much additional labor and study, but I

was pleased to observe that, without exception, they cheerfully undertook it and carried it out in a spirit which has secured very satisfactory results.

### GEOGRAPHY AND HISTORY.

Constant progress is being made in the methods of instruction in these branches, and although some of the teachers are inclined to confine themselves too closely to the subject-matter contained in the text-books, the growing demand on our public library for books relating to geography and history is evidence that our best teachers are leading their pupils to obtain information on these subjects from every available source. In order to assist and encourage them in this line of work, I desire to be able to start a reference library on these subjects in each of our grammar schools. With a small outlay each year for this purpose, each room would soon be provided with material which would be of great benefit to the children and assistance to the teachers.

### SPELLING AND WRITING.

The work in these branches, has been, and is now, less satisfactory than that in any other line of work. Nothing can be gained by concealing the fact that many of our children spell poorly and are unable to write well; the teachers are aware of the necessity of giving special attention to spelling, and with additional exertion on their part in this direction, I feel sure that I shall be able to report improvement during the coming year.

After a careful consideration of the advantages and disadvantages of vertical writing, I decided to recommend its adoption, and by vote of the committee, it was introduced in the four primary grades at the commencement of the present term. The arguments in its favor are its greater simplicity and legibility, and that by its use we are able to secure a more natural position of the pupil at the desk, a position which is more conducive to health. At this time it is too early to speak of the result of the change, but I am much pleased with the change in position, and the ease with which the children are making the transition from the slant to the vertical writing.

## PREPARATION OF TEACHERS.

In the report of last year, I made the suggestion that it would be well for us to demand that candidates for positions on our corps of teachers should be required to furnish evidence of special preparation for their work or proof of successful experience, and at the regular meeting in July the Committee adopted the following regulation:—

“On and after July 9, 1895, each candidate for a position as teacher in the grammar and primary grades of the Milford public schools shall be required to present either a diploma from a state normal school, or a diploma granted by the State Board of Examiners, or to furnish satisfactory evidence of at least one year of successful experience as a teacher.”

This regulation is in full accord with the best educational spirit of the times, and can not fail to improve the quality of our teaching force. I feel sure that, by the adoption of this regulation, the Committee have taken an important step towards the improvement of the schools. In this connection I will quote the following extract from the Governor’s message delivered at the commencement of his present term of office:—

“The board of education has directed that in 1896 and thereafter candidates for admission to the normal schools must be graduates of high schools, or must have received an equivalent education, and that their examinations shall be in high school as well as in grammar school subjects.

“Inasmuch as free high school tuition has been made the legal right of every properly qualified child in the state, and is attainable at home by the great majority of pupils, the new standards of admission seem to be within general reach, and are likely to improve the qualifications of teachers.

“The policy of the state in providing means for the professional training of its teachers has received not only the sanction that comes from half a century of successful trial, but also the implied approval of that general normal-school movement of the country that had its beginning in Massachusetts.

“The state’s generous provision for such training points to the wisdom of making a beginning, at least, in some policy of demanding that hereafter only trained teachers shall be employed in its public schools.”

## THE HIGH SCHOOL.

By the resignation of Miss A. R. Hayward in August, this school lost a valuable teacher, whose earnest, conscientious la-

bors have been highly appreciated by all who have had an interest in its welfare. At about the same time the Committee received the resignation of Miss Mary Burgess, who accepted a position in the Fitchburg high school. The vacancies thus formed were filled by the election of Miss G. I. Deans of Medway and Miss Claribel Moulton of Newburyport. Both of these ladies are teachers of experience, and the progress of the classes in their charge is proof of their ability. Miss Richardson remained in charge of the classical department, where her thorough work in the preparation of those who intend to enter college is worthy of special commendation.

It has been a pleasure to note the steady improvement of the school since Mr. Williams has been in charge as its principal. In discipline and in the quality of work performed by the pupils it is in excellent condition.

Our citizens have reason to be proud of the school, although they will hardly be able to maintain that feeling when they consider the condition of the building in which its sessions are held. During the latter part of last year it was necessary to employ the services of a fourth assistant, and Miss C. M. Field was engaged to take charge of three recitations daily. Owing to the scarcity of class-room we were compelled to hold some recitations in the laboratory. This room is arranged for laboratory work by classes in chemistry, and any one who is acquainted with its arrangement will realize how poorly it is fitted for a general class-room. The necessity for a new high school is as great as it was when the town unanimously voted an appropriation for that purpose, and I hope the citizens will soon consider the erection of more commodious quarters.

For some years it had been the custom of the Committee to grant partial diplomas to members of the senior class who had not taken a full course of study, or who had failed to reach the required standard in some of the studies pursued. This course was found to be detrimental to the best interests of the school, and it was decided to grant no more partial diplomas. At a meeting on Nov. 12 the following regulation was adopted by an unanimous vote of the Committee:—

“A pupil in the high school shall be entitled to a diploma

after having completed one of the three prescribed courses of study, and having attained each term, in each of the three studies pursued, a mark not lower than 50 per cent, and an average mark in the three studies not lower than 60 per cent. If a pupil fails to meet the above requirement, he shall be allowed the eight weeks of school next following the term in which the failure occurs, in which to make up the deficiency to the satisfaction of the principal. If at the expiration of said period of eight weeks a pupil still has a deficiency, he shall be considered not a candidate for a diploma, and shall be assigned work in classes at the discretion of the principal of the school and the superintendent of schools."

Under this rule no pupil will be allowed to shirk his duty under the pretence that he is "doing as well as he can," but each will be required to maintain the standing prescribed by the Committee in order to retain a membership in his class, or to be considered a candidate for a diploma.

At the close of each term, a report card is sent to the parents of each member of the school. This report shows the standing of the pupil in each of the studies pursued, and it is earnestly desired that parents will carefully examine them, and make strict inquiry regarding the cause of any deficiency reported.

## REPORT OF TEACHER OF DRAWING.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF MILFORD.

Gentlemen:—The general plan of the work has been about the same as in previous years, only more attention has been given to freehand drawing from objects the first five years, together with the study of color. The scientific work has been confined to the last four years in the grammar schools. It deals with the principles underlying working drawings, subjects which cannot be well understood by young pupils.

The plans given the teachers are not presented with the intention that the lessons are always to be given absolutely as planned, as to order or subject. (It is impossible to obtain by mechanical means, any satisfactory substitute for a trained intellect, which must be depended upon to have instruction successful.) These plans are given simply to assist the teachers in

their work, it being their privilege to vary them to meet the conditions.

Owing to the generosity of the school committee the schools have been well supplied with color wheels, charts, books, and paper as aids in teaching color. As these involved considerable expense I will give reasons for so doing.

Every child has an inborn love of color, although it is not always of beautiful color, so it is our privilege and duty to cultivate that love. We should lead them to see and appreciate the beautiful colors and harmonies of color found in nature and in art. And the knowledge they gain we should assist them to apply in simple combinations of color and form for decorative purposes. In this way we can develop the æsthetic as well as the practical nature of the children.

It is a well-known fact that many people are color-blind, and it is probable that color-blindness may be to a slight extent general. Such a defect may be readily discovered, although many persons so affected have engaged in occupations where color perception was required before they became aware of their deficiency. If a large number of the people are color-blind how much of the beauty of nature is denied them. This color perception must come from within, as well as everything else that is necessary to the higher nature of man, and cannot be bought or even accepted as a gift, as it is the result of gradual growth. It is our duty then, to train the child in this direction. It is far more difficult to train the eye to color than the ear for music. For good music—the best music—is heard by a large part of the public from childhood; bad art is the popular art.

I would recommend a few good pictures hung in each schoolroom, pictures that have a meaning, that the children may cultivate a taste for good works of art, become interested enough to learn their history, and in that way help to guide their course in reading.

I have dwelt on the subject of color so long that one might be led to believe we studied it to the exclusion of form. In the curriculum a very short time is given each week to drawing, but form and color are so closely allied that while

cultivating love for one in the children, we may also cultivate a love for the other.

Thanking the teachers for the active spirit in which they have entered into the work, and the results they have achieved, not only in the character of the lines but in the accuracy and neatness of the papers, I am

### REPORT OF TEACHER OF MUSIC.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF MILFORD.

Gentlemen :—It is difficult for me to give in this report an account of the progress made in the study of music, so that the parents, who are not familiar with the methods employed, can fully understand it. To those who have not heard the children sing in the schools, the results are discernible in the various religious and social meetings in town. Those directing the music in these meetings have spoken of the great improvement noticed, and the readiness with which the children learn new music.

Each grade is farther advanced this year than at the corresponding time last year, so that two-part singing is now practised in the fourth grade, and the eighth and ninth grades are using the books formerly used in the high school. More attention is also given to expression and quality of tone.

At the beginning of this school year the "Euterpean," a book containing choruses and part-songs, arranged by John W. Tufts, was provided for the high school, which the scholars are now studying.

The readiness of the teachers to carry out all suggestions and assist in gaining the best results is highly to be commended, and I thank them for it.

## THE NEW BUILDING.

This building, which is called the Spruce Street Primary School, was so fully described in the last report that further description is unnecessary here. The work of the architect and that of the contractors was performed to the complete satisfaction of the Committee, and the building was ready for occupancy in season for the opening of the fall term, on September 2. Miss S. E. Sheldon was elected principal of the school, and the building was occupied by transferring to it three schools, one of the fifth grade, from the Old Town House, and two primary schools from the Claflin building, which were composed of children from the Old Town House district. On September 4, the fourth room was opened, and at present there are but three unoccupied seats in the building. In the last report it was stated that the contracts would call for about \$300 in excess of the \$16,000 appropriated. The actual excess has been \$518.63, which has been paid from the regular appropriation.

## REPAIRS.

In addition to the outlay for ordinary repairs, which requires about \$700 annually, I again call your attention to the imperative need of new floors and desks in the South Grammar, Park, and Plains schoolhouses. An outlay of \$1000 is needed in each of these buildings, as the floors are in wretched condition, and the desks, of the old style, double pattern, are not only worn out, but are very poorly adapted to the comfort and health of the pupils. I recommend repairing one of these buildings each year, beginning with the South Grammar, where the need is greatest.

# APPENDIX.

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## ATTENDANCE LAWS, 1894.

SECTION 1. Every person having under his control a child between the ages of eight and fourteen years, and in every city and town where opportunity is furnished, in connection with the regular work of the public schools, for gratuitous instruction in the use of tools or in manual training, or for industrial education in any form, a child between the ages of eight and fifteen years, shall annually cause such child to attend some public day school in the city or town in which he resides, and such attendance shall continue for at least thirty weeks of the school year, if the schools are kept open for that length of time, with an allowance of two weeks' time for absences not excused by the superintendent of schools or the school committee. Such period of attendance shall begin within the first month of the fall term of school, and for each five days' absence of any such child thereafter, in excess of the above allowance, before the completion of the required annual attendance of thirty weeks, the person having such child under his control shall, upon the complaint of the school committee or any truant officer, forfeit to the use of the public schools of such city or town a sum not exceeding twenty dollars, but if such child has attended for a like period of time a private day school approved by the school committee of such city or town, or if such child has been otherwise instructed for a like period of time in the branches of learning required by law to be taught in the public schools, or has already acquired the branches of learning required by law to be taught in the public schools, or if his physical or mental condition is such as to render such attendance inexpedient or impracticable, such penalties shall not be incurred.

SECTION 2. For the purposes of the preceding section school committees shall approve a private school only when

the teaching in all the studies required by law is in the English language, and when they are satisfied that such teaching equals in thoroughness and efficiency the teaching in the public schools in the same locality, and that equal progress is made by the pupils therein, in the studies required by law, with that made during the same time in the public schools; but they shall not refuse to approve a private school on account of the religious teaching therein.

SECTION 3. The truant officers and the school committee of the several cities and towns shall vigilantly inquire into all cases of the neglect of the duty prescribed in section one, and ascertain the reasons, if any, therefor; and such truant officers or any of them shall, when so directed by the school committee, prosecute in the name of the city or town any person liable to the penalty provided for in said section. Police, district and municipal courts, trial justices and judges of the probate court, shall have jurisdiction within their respective counties of the offences described in section one.

SECTION 4. All children within the Commonwealth may attend the public schools in the place in which they have their legal residence, subject to the regulations prescribed by law.

SECTION 9. The school committee shall not allow a child who has not been duly vaccinated to be admitted or to be connected with the public schools.

SECTION 10. The school committee shall not allow any pupil to attend the public schools while any member of the household to which such pupil belongs is sick with small-pox, diphtheria, or scarlet fever, or during a period of two weeks after the death, recovery, or removal of such sick person; and any pupil coming from such household shall be required to present to the teacher of the school the pupil desires to attend, a certificate, from the attending physician or board of health, of the facts necessary to entitle him to admission in accordance with the above regulation.

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WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH  
4, 1895.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, ss.*

To Either Constable of the Town of Milford, in said County,

Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified by law to vote in elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the fourth day of March, A. D. 1895, punctually at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely:—

[The Polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.]

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. A Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, three Selectmen, three Assessors, three Overseers of the Poor, two members of the School Committee, three Trustees of Public Library, three members of the Board of Health, (1, 2, 3 years,) two Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and fifteen Constables; to be voted for on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1893; also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No" in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?"

Article 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Engineers of Fire Department, Tax Collector, Trustees of Public Library, Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and any other officers and committees of said Town.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting its streets, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes of the current year.

Article 7. To determine when all taxes shall be collected and paid into the Treasury the year ensuing, and to fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for collecting the same.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred and fifty dollars towards defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 9. To see if the Town will accept a By-Law for the Regulation of Plumbing, as recommended by the Board of Health, in accordance with provisions of Chapter 455, Acts of 1894, now on file in the Town Clerk's office, or take any action in relation to the same.

Article 10. To see if the Town will vote to heat the present Town House by steam or other improved heating apparatus, make an appropriation therefor, or take any action in relation to the same.

Due notice having been given, the polls at 4.30 were declared closed.

# TOWN WARRANT.

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## COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER, SS.

To Either Constable of the Town of Milford, in said County,  
Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified by law to vote in Elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the Second day of March, A. D., 1896, punctually at Eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely:—

[The Polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.]

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. A Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of the Poor, Two Members of the School Committee, Two Trustees of Public Library, One Member of the Board of Health, (for 3 years,) Two Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and Fifteen Constables; to be voted for on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1893, and amendments thereto; also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No" in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer,

Engineers of Fire Department, Tax Collector, Trustees of Public Library, Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and any other Officers and Committees of said Town.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting its streets, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the Taxes of the current year.

ARTICLE 7. To determine when all Taxes shall be collected and paid into the Treasury the year ensuing, and to fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for collecting the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred and fifty dollars towards defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the Town.

ARTICLE 10. To see what action the Town will take in relation to changing Hose Carriage No. 4 into a Hose Wagon, and appropriate money for the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light at some suitable point on North Bow street, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light at some suitable point on School street, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light at some suitable point on Green street, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light opposite Chapin street on Main street, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition as provided in Chap. 428, Acts of 1890, and amendments thereto, to abolish the grade crossings on Central street, hear the report of the committee on Union Depot, and to take any action concerning the same.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build a bank wall in front of the residence of David Quinlan's on South Union street, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Barn in the rear of Hose House on Spruce street, and appropriate money for the same or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to continue the sidewalk on the north side of Central street beginning at East street, near land of Michael McNamara, and continuing in an easterly direction about fifty rods more or less to a point near the residence of Thomas G. Gillman, said walk to be curbed, graveled and topped out with coal ashes, and appropriate five hundred dollars for the same, or take any action in relation to said sidewalk.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will unite with the Town of Mendon in causing to be printed copies of the Proprietors' Records of the original Town of Mendon, or act in any way in relation to the same.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of a way leading in a northerly direction from Congress street by land of N. W. Weed and Owen Wales, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of a way called Granite Street Extension, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of a way leading from Pearl street to School street through land of L. A. Cook and heirs of Peter Cook, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out, grading, and extension of Fruit street from South Main street to Depot street, appropriate any money to construct the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the Public Meeting Houses and at the Post-Office in said town; also cause an attested copy to be published in The Milford Daily Journal, Milford Daily News, Milford Gazette, and Milford Times, newspapers printed in said Town, Two Sabbaths at least before the time set for said meeting.

We find that the sills, floor joist, and floor at the engine house have become decayed quite badly, and for the safety of the engines we would recommend that the above appropriation be made for its repair.

We would respectfully call the attention of the citizens to the valuation, damage and insurance upon buildings in which fires occurred the past year, which ought to be a sufficient guarantee that the fire department of our town is not excelled by any within the Commonwealth. We have had several fires the past year that might have extended into conflagrations had not our fire department been efficient in every particular and detail.

## SCHOOL COMMITTEE'S REPORT.

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A full and detailed report of the schools you will find in the report of the Secretary and Superintendent, which the Committee have approved and adopted.

The Boston public library has on its walls this inscription: "The Commonwealth requires the education of the people as the safeguard of order and liberty." The common school is a rich inheritance from our fathers; our public schools of today are an improvement on the past, and more strongly fixed in the hearts of the people as the years go by.

A noted educator has said: "There comes to most children between the ages of five and eight years, a period of time during which they learn to read with great facility; that time passed never returns." Reading bears such an important relation to the acquisition of knowledge, this time should be realized and utilized that good reading in the upper grades should not be "a lost art." Whatever else may be taught, reading, spelling and writing are the essentials.

There are in the public schools of the state 417,335 between five and fifteen years of age. Scholars of all ages in public schools, 424,350. The number in academies, parochial schools and private schools is 61,090; a very large per cent are in the public schools.

The secretary of the Board of Education suggests three legislative requirements that will contribute most to the pro-

gress of our schools: 1st, Universal skilled supervision; 2nd, For trained teachers; 3d, For partial state participation in the tax for schools. These measures will come before the present Legislature, and it is hoped with favorable results.

It is generally conceded by the committees that teachers from the normal schools begin the work of teaching with a decided advantage as to method.

Mr. S. F. Blodgett, our former Superintendent, who had been with us for nine years, left, much to our regret, for a more remunerative position; in whose place after considerable delay, Mr. C. W. Haley of Georgetown was chosen;—a man of experience in teaching and as Superintendent, coming to us highly recommended; from whom we expect much for the management of our schools. He has been with us too short a time to get fully started in the work.

A new principal of the High School, Mr. A. E. Tuttle of Amesbury, was chosen,—a man of twelve years' successful teaching, finely recommended, devoted to his work. From the record he has made since he came among us, we feel there was no mistake in his selection, from whom we expect fine results.

We have made extensive but necessary repairs at the Brick School; re-seating, new floors and painting, making some very pleasant schoolrooms. We ought to do a similar thing at the Plains School another year.

At the Chapin-street School the out-building was moved, stairs made to the cellar and a place fixed for coal.

Water has been put in the Fountain-street and West-street schoolhouses; nothing but ordinary repairs on the other buildings.

#### APPROPRIATIONS.

There has been a gain of 203 scholars in town. This, together with additional repairs that are much needed, and the unpaid bills amounting to \$700, will necessitate an increased appropriation. We therefore recommend the following:—

# SUPERINTENDENT'S REPORT.

TO THE SCHOOL COMMITTEE OF MILFORD.

GENTLEMEN: Having so recently come into official relations with the schools of this Town, I can hardly be expected to give a full and detailed account of their condition and needs, together with the work being done therein.

I present herewith, however, such statistics and other data concerning the schools as I have been able to collect, and also a few general statements based on my observations during the past five weeks.

#### ATTENDANCE.

The regularity of attendance in this Town, it seems to me, is not what it should be,—a condition for which the parents must be largely responsible. A large share of the failures of promotion is the result of irregular attendance and lack of application. To get the full benefit of school the pupil should attend every half day. An absence of two or three half days causes a break in the work, and the child gets behind. If this occurs often the child becomes uneasy or discouraged, and fails to enjoy his school work. Some people seem to think that a pupil can be absent from school occasionally without sustaining great loss, but they forget that he may be absent from just the exercise or explanation which he needs, the one which is of vital importance for his understanding of the work that is to follow.

I would urge the parents to see to it that their children are in school every half day that it is possible for them to attend. It does not seem much at the time to keep Johnny out of school for a day, but the absences count up at the end of the year. It will be seen by the table of statistics printed in connection with this report, that there have been 24,091 half-day absences, 2,590 cases of tardiness, and 2,654 cases of dismissal in the schools of this Town during the past year. The half-day absences indicate a loss of school time equal to the attendance of 69 pupils for the whole school year. I believe a large number of the absences could be avoided, and that a large share of the cases of tardiness and dismissal are unnecessary.

I would urge with much earnestness that the parents interest themselves in this matter, and help to establish in their children an idea of promptness and punctuality, and a feeling that nine o'clock every school morning should find them in their seats.

### READING.

Of all the subjects taught in our Public Schools I believe none is of greater importance than that of Reading. Much of the future career of a child may hinge upon this. I am more and more convinced that if we can direct the reading of our boys and girls, we to some extent direct their future course, and help to make them useful and contented citizens. I heartily endorse the views of Supt. Blodgett in the matter of reading, and am pleased to find in your schools quite an abundance of literature, consisting of complete selections from many of our best authors, suited to the upper grades. I would emphasize the recommendation in last year's report concerning the introduction of literature into the lower grades. There are now published several myths, fables and fairy stories that seem well adapted to the purpose, and as fast as the present readers need replenishing I should advise their being partially replaced by books of this sort.

So far as I have observed, there seems to be considerable ground covered in reading. The children have a good vocabulary, and in several schools there is some good work being

done in phonics, so that they recognize and pronounce words quite readily, but there seems to be a lack of expression in their reading. Quality seems to be sacrificed for quantity. Several of the teachers are already trying to remedy the matter, and I shall watch the results with considerable interest.

### THE HIGH SCHOOL.

I presume it is useless at this time to discuss the urgent needs of the High School, as the matter seems to have been kept well before the public in previous reports, but I cannot well help saying that neither the present accommodations, nor the limited appropriations, will admit of the best work being done.

The demands made upon a modern High School are greater than they were twenty years ago. More commodious buildings, better equipped laboratories and a larger teaching force are needed for the same number of pupils. The present corps of teachers are all working to the full limit of their time, and still it has recently been found necessary to reduce the number of recitations per week in some of the studies in order to make room for others. A large share of the graduates never go beyond the High School, and to them the addition of a business course would be of inestimable value.

Your High School seems to be under excellent management, and with the proper equipment need be second to none of its size in the state.

A temporary arrangement has recently been made whereby on very stormy mornings the High School session, if any, will begin at 8.30 instead of 8. A. M., thus giving the pupils the benefit of the no-school signal.

There is a great deal of tardiness in the High School, and to prevent this I would recommend for the consideration of the Committee and those interested, that the school begin during the winter months at 8.15 instead of 8 A. M., and close at 1.15 instead of 1 P. M.

For a further report of the High School see the Principal's report, printed herewith.

## REPAIRS.

I can but emphasize the recommendation of Supt. Blodgett in his last report concerning the imperative need of special repairs at both the Park and Plains Schools. The floors are in a very bad condition. The desks are of an old style, badly worn and poorly adapted to the needs and comfort of a modern school.

The plastering throughout the building at the Plains is very badly cracked. Much of it has fallen and been patched, while more is just ready to fall. I would strongly recommend the repairing of one or both of these buildings during the coming summer. The South Grammar building has been fitted up the past year with new floors and desks, and painted throughout, at an expense of \$1243.61. In my judgment it will take at least \$1200 to put the Plains building in proper shape.

## CONCLUSION.

The true function of the school is to lead. It should train the child for the life of today, and not for that of fifty years ago. Schools cannot stand still: They must move on. The advancement in nearly every avenue and department of life makes it apparent that what was a good education fifty years ago does not meet the demand today.

There seems to be an educational awakening everywhere. More pupils are entering school, and they are remaining longer. Teachers are working as they never worked before, and the people are calling for more and better schools.

The famous report of the Committee of Ten, said to be the most important educational document ever published in this country, has done much to create an interest among educators, and now the most prominent among them are agreed that the whole school curriculum should be enriched. This is being done in nearly all of the most progressive schools.

For us to get into the procession and remain there requires, it seems to me, at least three things: (1) Liberal appropriations, that we may secure and retain the best of teachers,

(2) the relieving of the crowded condition of some of our schools, as no teacher can do her best work with such large classes, and (3) time to bring about and establish the necessary changes. With this done, our schools will be in a fair way to be reckoned among the best.

As our schools have been conducted on a liberal basis in the past, I have reason to believe that they will continue to be, and, as their work becomes better understood, I trust that they will receive more and more the cordial support of the people.

# Report of the High School Principal.

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TO C. W. HALEY, SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS:—

The work of the High School since last August has been conducted along the same general lines as in former years; the old course of study has been followed, and the assistant teachers of previous years have directed practically the same work as formerly. With only one change in the corps of teachers of last year, the ill effects which naturally follow any change in established order have not been seriously manifest.

The high standard of scholarship, which has been established and maintained for so many years, should be a source of gratification and pride to every citizen of the town. And I assure you that no effort will be spared by the present Principal to continue the good record of the past, and to take advantage of all possibilities for improvement.

The fact that in previous years so many have gone from our High School to higher institutions of learning, gives evidence of the wisdom and earnestness of the parents and a general appreciation in this community of the importance of a good liberal education. This tendency should be encouraged in every possible way, as the demands of the best citizenship make the need of a broader and more accurate scholarship greater with each succeeding generation.

The recent report of Pres. Eliot would seem to indicate that the day is not far distant when only college graduates will be admitted to any of the professional schools,—“a consummation devoutly to be wished.” For the best liberal education possible is none too broad a foundation for the superstructure of a creditable and successful professional career. And for the unprofessional man or woman, such training is even more important, and the advantage of it is becoming more marked every year.



The training afforded by our scientific and technical schools must not be disregarded, as this is peculiarly an era of scientific development. And there is awaiting many of our High School students of today an eminent career in the domain of scientific research. Greater problems remain to be solved than any that have been; and even greater credit and honor will reward the effort and zeal of the successful.

The requirements for admission to these higher institutions are being made more severe and exacting every year; so much so that an earnest protest has already been made by the teachers in Secondary Schools generally. But while the conditions exist they must be met. Our special needs in this particular are: more time for French, and a more extended drill in mathematics. In Algebra there should be nearly double the amount of work now done, with a corresponding increase in quality. In Geometry there should be time for considerable work in solid Geometry and some Trigonometry. In French considerable time must now be devoted to composition and sight translations, and to do the required amount of reading at least one year must be added to this course. The desired results in mathematics can hardly be attained without the introduction of Algebra into the ninth grade of the Primary Schools. And I am persuaded that this last step will do more for the general efficiency of our schools than any one thing that now remains to be done. In fact, we are that much behind the procession of the best schools in the state. The enrichment of the Grammar School course is no modern fad, but is a sound educational idea that has come to stay.

As regards other means of increasing the efficiency of the High School, I can do little but emphasize the recommendations made in former reports. The need of a new building with increased accommodations and improved appliances is generally recognized and appreciated. In all departments of scientific work the school is especially handicapped by lack of room and apparatus. Except in Chemistry there is practically no apparatus, and no suitable place to use it if we had it. Present conditions make an improvement in this direction almost imperative.

The English course should be so modified and remodeled that those who are unable to continue their study in higher institutions may feel that they have derived such training from their High School course as shall be of material assistance to them in earning their daily bread, and facing the stern realities of life. Such studies as Commercial Arithmetic, Commercial Geography, Commercial Law, Practical Book-keeping, and Banking, Stenography, and Typewriting should be added to the course, and the work generally be made to meet the demands of the times. These branches are now taught in many of our High Schools, and the idea is gaining popularity very generally. This would necessitate increased expense, but would certainly be cheaper than to spend the same or more money elsewhere for the same or poorer instruction.

In closing I wish to express my appreciation of the sympathy and support of the members of the school board, collectively and individually, of the forbearance and hearty co-operation of the assistant teachers, and to commend the general spirit of earnestness and good will of the pupils of the school.

## Report of Drawing Teacher.

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TO C. W. HALEY, SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

DEAR SIR: The general plan of work this year is very similar to that of last. The tendency of the present day is toward more artistic work in the schoolroom. The decorations are better, the highly colored prints are being supplanted by carefully selected subjects in well chosen frames. The language work has been materially improved.

In drawing from nature the pupil must not only draw the specimen before him, but he must arrange it so as to produce the most pleasing effect. An experiment was made in the eighth and ninth grades and in the High School to represent sprays and branches in water color, the pupils furnishing their own brushes, and the medium used being ink diluted with water. Only a few attempts were made in the fall, and while the results were not at all satisfactory, we feel encouraged to try again in the spring. The brush is the simplest and most direct means of expressing form; an illustration of this is shown in Japanese art, where pencil and pen are unknown.

The perception of color is confined to the first three grades. The work of the upper grades is to study the harmonious combination of colors producing the different color harmonies, the pupils making a collection of natural and manufactured articles illustrating the different color harmonies.

In appearance drawing, less time has been given to drawing from the wooden models and more to the drawing from objects based on the models, trying to show the character of the surface of the object by the kind of line used.

A very important part of drawing or of art training is to cultivate a pupil's good taste, to lead him to see what is beautiful in form and what makes it beautiful. So in mechanical drawing the pupil makes a working drawing of a model and

then designs a simple object based on the model and illustrating the different elements of beauty; thus applying the scientific principles already learned and calling into play his power of invention.

I would suggest that some photographs of famous paintings be introduced into the schools in order that the children may learn their story, history and composition, as well as become familiar with and cultivate a taste for good pictures. An artistic environment alone does not produce an artistic spirit. Pictures that children could take into their hands and examine can be obtained at a small expense, two or three dozen pictures answering for all the schools, and at about the cost of one framed picture to hang upon the walls.

# Report of Teacher of Music.

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## REPORT OF TEACHER OF MUSIC.

TO C. W. HALEY, SUPERINTENDENT OF SCHOOLS.

DEAR SIR: Music has been taught in the Milford schools for so long a time that it is now thoroughly established, and is regarded by teachers and scholars as any other branch of study. The teachers, without exception, assist me and strive to carry out my wishes in regard to the lessons, and the scholars, with very few exceptions, are interested, seem to enjoy singing, and endeavor to gain my approval, which, because of the combined work of teachers and pupils, is rarely withheld.

The music in the High School has been more satisfactory this year than formerly, and it should continue to improve, for each class that enters has had one more year's drill than the preceding one, and this will be so until each class shall have studied music since its entrance to the Primary School. We have had no new music books this year. Some are now needed for the seventh grade of the Grammar, and for the High School.

The Quincy Manual for use of the teachers has been replaced by a manual prepared by the publishers of the books and charts in use, and furnished by them free of cost. By the use of this we are enabled to do practically the same work in each grade, that is done by the corresponding grade in all schools where the Normal method of charts and books is used.

A chorus selected from the Grammar Schools has sung in Music Hall each Memorial Day for the past three years, and last year the music was unusually creditable. It could not have been so good but for the training in the Public Schools.

Not only will the singing continue to improve, but the speaking voice will be smoother and better pitched, and the refining and elevating influence of music must be felt throughout the whole community.

# Rules Regulating Military Drill

IN THE

## Milford High School.

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1. All male pupils of the High School, except such as may be excused by the Principal for physical disability or religious scruples, shall be required to take military instruction as a regular study.

2. They shall be organized into a company or battalion as the Principal may direct.

3. The officers shall be the same as established by law for all military organizations, and the Principal shall be Commander-in-chief.

4. The commissioned officers shall all be elected by ballot in the fall term of each year, subject to conditions specified in Rule 6. The officers of the battalion (if any) shall be elected by the commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the companies. The commissioned officers of the company or companies shall be elected by majority vote of all the members.

5. The non-commissioned officers shall be appointed by the commissioned officers of the company, subject to the approval of the Principal; and the Principal may at any time reduce to the ranks any officer who fails to maintain a high standard of scholarship, deportment and military discipline.

6. Only those students who have maintained a *fair* standing in scholarship and deportment, and are candidates for a diploma from one of the regular courses of study, shall be eligible as officers, either commissioned or non-commissioned.

# SUMMARY OF EDUCATIONAL LAWS.

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## CHAPTER 498.

SECT. 1. All children between the ages of 8 and 14, unless sick, feeble-minded, at an approved private school, or otherwise instructed, must attend the public school 30 weeks of the school year. They must begin within the first month of the fall term. Two weeks' absence is allowed. Penalty \$20 for each five days excess of 2 weeks, unless caused by sickness, or excused by the school committee or superintendent.

## CHAPTER 508.

SECT. 13. No child under 13 years of age shall be employed at any time in any factory, workshop, or mercantile establishment; during the hours when the public schools of the city or town are in session.

## CHAPTER 508.

SECT. 14. No child between 13 and 14 years of age shall be employed unless he has attended school 30 weeks of the school year.

## CHAPTER 508.

SECT. 16. No child under 16 years of age shall be employed without a certificate from the school authorities.

## CHAPTER 48.

SECT. 6. The father, if living and a resident, must accompany the child, to sign the certificate of age; if not, the mother; if neither father nor mother, the guardian.

## CHAPTER 291.

SECT. 7. Proof of correct age must be furnished, if the age certificate does not agree with the school census.

## CHAPTER 47.

SECT. 9. Children must be vaccinated before attending school, unless [Amendment, Chap. 515, Sect. 1.] a certificate signed by a regular physician is presented, saying the child is an unfit subject for vaccination.

## CHAPTER 198,—ACTS OF 1885.

No child shall attend school from a household in which there is a case of small-pox, diphtheria, or scarlet-fever. Two weeks after the death, recovery or removal of the patient, the child may return on presentation of a certificate from the attending physician or board of health.

## CHAPTER 422,—ACTS OF 1889.

Truant officers may be authorized by the school committee, to apprehend and take to school without warrant, all truants found wandering about in the streets or public places.

## CHAPTER 249,—ACTS OF 1889.

Any child between 7 and 15 years of age, convicted of being an habitual truant, may be committed for two years to any institution provided therefor.

## CHAPTER 71,—ACTS OF 1885.

## AN ACT TO PREVENT TRUANCY.

Whoever, after notice from a truant officer to refrain from so doing, offers a reward for service to any child, in consequence of which reward such child is induced unlawfully to absent himself from school, or whoever, after notice as aforesaid, in any manner entices or induces any child to truancy, or whoever knowingly employs or harbors any unlawful absentee from school, or truant, shall forfeit not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars to the use of the public schools of the city or town in which said offense occurs, to be recovered by complaint.

## CHAPTER 111,—ACTS OF 1890.

In all the public schools in the Commonwealth, the last regular session prior to Memorial Day, shall be devoted to exercises of a patriotic nature.

## CHAPTER 207.

SECT. 23. Whoever wilfully interrupts or disturbs a school or other assembly of people met for a lawful purpose, shall be punished by imprisonment in the jail, not exceeding thirty days, or by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.

## CHAPTER 203.

## CONCERNING INJURY TO PUBLIC SCHOOL PROPERTY.

Whoever wilfully and maliciously or wantonly and without cause, destroys, defaces, mars or injures a schoolhouse, church, or other building erected or used for purposes of education or religious instruction, or for the general diffusion of knowledge, or an outbuilding, fence, well or appurtenance of such schoolhouse, church or other building, or furniture, apparatus or other property belonging to or connected with such schoolhouse, church or other building, shall be punished by fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the jail not exceeding one year.

4, 1896.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, ss.*

To Either Constable of the Town of Milford, in said County,

Greeting :

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified by law to vote in Elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the second day of March, A. D., 1896, punctually at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely:—

[The Polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.]

Article 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. A Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of the Poor, Two Members of the School Committee, Two Trustees of Public Library, One Member of the Board of Health, (for 3 years,) Two Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and Fifteen Constables; to be voted for on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1893, and amendments thereto; also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No" in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?"

Article 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Engineers of Fire Department, Tax Collector, Trustees of Public Library, Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and any other Officers and Committees of said Town.

Article 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing.

Article 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting its streets, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the Taxes of the current year.

Article 7. To determine when all Taxes shall be collected and paid into the Treasury the year ensuing, and to fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for collecting the same.

Article 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred and fifty dollars towards defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

Article 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the Town.

Article 10. To see what action the Town will take in relation to changing Hose Carriage No. 4 into a Hose Wagon, and appropriate money for the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 11. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light at some suitable point on North Bow street, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 12. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light at some suitable point on School street, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 13. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light at some suitable point on Green street, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 14. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an Electric Light opposite Chapin street on Main street, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 15. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to petition as provided in Chap. 428, Acts of 1890, and amendments thereto, to abolish the grade crossings on Central street, hear the report of the committee on Union Depot, and to take any action concerning the same.

Article 16. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to build a bank wall in front of the residence of David Quinlan on South Union street, and appropriate money for the same.

Article 17. To see if the Town will vote to build a Town Barn in the rear of Hose House on Spruce street, and appropriate money for the same or take any action in relation thereto.

Article 18. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to continue the sidewalk on the north side of Central street beginning at East street, near land of Michael McNamara, and continuing in an easterly direction about fifty rods more or less to a point near the residence of Thomas G. Each item was taken up and acted upon separately.

Voted: To add \$500 to the Fire Department appropriation, to be expended on the hook and ladder house.

Voted: To appropriate \$7500 for Fire Department, \$6100 of which to be for pay of members, and \$1400 for incidental expenses of the Fire Department.

Voted: That a committee of nine (9) be appointed by the moderator, of whom the Board of Selectmen shall be a part, to consider the question of salaries of Town officers, and other expenditures of the Town, this committee to report at the next town meeting with recommendations.

The moderator appointed the following persons: George F. Birch, George S. Whitney, Benjamin T. Clancy, Z. C. Field, E. A. Thomas, James Lally, jr., C. A. Sumner, Albert C. Withington, and Patrick Lynch.

Article 5. Voted: To pass over.

Article 6. Voted: That the Treasurer is hereby authorized to borrow money at any time during the municipal year in various amounts, not exceeding fifty thousand dollars (\$50,000) in all, and give the negotiable notes of the Town therefor, the same to be paid out of the taxes assessed for the year 1896.

Article 7. Voted: That the taxes become due Sept. 10, and that all taxes paid on or before that time shall be discounted  $2\frac{1}{2}$  per cent, and that one half of one per cent per month be added to all taxes not paid by Sept. 10, and that the Collector be authorized to use all means of collecting taxes which a Town Treasurer when appointed Collector may use.

Voted: That the Collector be paid for collecting the first seven tenths of the taxes committed to him one half of one per cent; for the next two tenths, one per cent, and for the remaining one tenth, five per cent of all taxes collected or abated.

Article 9. Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the Town.

Article 12. Voted: That the Selectmen be authorized to locate an electric light at some suitable place on School street, and that \$100 be appropriated for the same.

Article 13. Voted: That the whole matter be left with the Selectmen, and they to locate whatever light they deem necessary, and appropriate \$100 for the same.

Article 14. Voted: To pass over.

Article 15. Under this article Charles W. Carroll made a report for the committee appointed on union station, which can be found in Book 6, Page 570, of Town Records.

Voted: That the report of the committee on union station be accepted as a report of progress.

Voted: To pass over this article.

Article 16. Voted: To appropriate \$100 for the same, and that the wall be built.

Voted: That the meeting adjourn until three weeks from tonight, (March 30,) at 7.30.

Milford, March 30, 1896.

In pursuance to a vote passed at the adjourned Town meeting held March 9, 1896, the inhabitants of the Town of Milford met in the Town Hall, and proceeded to act upon the various articles in the Town Warrant of March 2.

The meeting was called to order by L. E. Fales, moderator.

The warrant was then read by the Town Clerk.

Voted: That John J. Shockrow and Edmund Murphy be appointed Field Drivers for the year ensuing.

Voted: To appoint Edmund Murphy Pound-keeper for the year ensuing.

Voted: To appoint I. N. Davis, Chandler Cheney and Chester L. Clark Fence Viewers for the year ensuing.

Voted: To appoint Timothy Kirby, H. E. Fales and C. W. Wilcox Park Commissioners for the year ensuing.

Under Article 3, George B. Blake made a report for the committee appointed to investigate the report of the Fire Engineers, which can be found in Book 6, Page 575, of the Town Records.

Voted: To accept the report of the committee.

Voted: Not to adopt the report of the committee.

Voted: To reconsider the above vote.

Voted: That the main question be put.

Voted: That the report of the committee be adopted, with the exception of the recommendation that the number of men in the different companies be reduced.

Voted: To accept the report of the committee on salaries.

The committee appointed to consider the question of salaries of Town Officers and other expenditures made a report, which is as follows:—

Milford, March 30, 1896.

The committee chosen at the adjourned Town Meeting held March 9 to consider the question of salaries and other expenditures of the Town, beg leave to submit the following report:—

The committee held their first meeting March 17, with all the committee present, and organized with Z. C. Field as chairman and C. A. Sumner clerk. They held five meetings in all, at one of which (that of March 20) by invitation of the committee different Town officers appeared before them and were heard in their own behalf, and at a later meeting, after full discussion and careful consideration, the following recommendations were agreed upon, for salaries to be paid by the Town for services:—

For the Board of Selectmen, \$700 per year; for the Town Clerk, \$200 per year; for the Town Treasurer, \$300 per year; for the Town Auditor, \$200 per year, and in addition to his duties as Auditor, he shall compile and make ready for the printer the financial part of the annual Town Report; for the Clerk of Selectmen, \$200 per year; for the Overseers of Poor, (3), \$525 per year; for the Board of Health, \$50 each per year; for the Board of Registrars, \$50 each per year, to take effect on future appointments, this being in accordance with the law as regards reduction in the compensation of Registrars; for clerical services of the Board of Registrars, \$25 per year.

We recommend that the Town Warrant be published alternately in newspapers now printed in Milford, one paper at a time, and each Town Warrant in but one paper.

We recommend that the Selectmen get the Town Warrants posted for a less sum than \$10 for each warrant.

We recommend that the compensation of the election officers be as follows:—

For the police and constables, when acting as election officers, 25 cents per hour; for those who check the voting lists, \$5 per day, and to their assistants 50 cents per hour; for the tellers, 35 cents per hour to the close of the polls, and 50 cents per hour thereafter; for all other election officers, \$2.50 per day.

We also recommend that the Town do not pay any hotel expenses for election officers. We recommend that the number of patrolmen be limited to six to serve at substantially the same hours as at the present, and to be distributed as the Selectmen shall direct.

We recommend that the Town elect not exceeding three constables, on the ground of the cost of electing a greater number.

We recommend that the sum of \$7800 be raised and appropriated for paying of salaries. In making these recommendations your committee have endeavored to be just to all, and to allow a fair compensation for services rendered.

In fixing upon the sums to be paid we have taken into consideration the amount paid in previous years as compared with the present, and in doing this we have not been unmindful of the changes in the manner of doing business, and of the present methods as compared with those in past years.

Opportunity was given to any citizen of the Town to appear before the committee and state his views, or give any information on the question of salaries and expenditures of the Town, and your committee only regret that no one appeared.

Some of your committee are of the opinion that undoubt-

edly there are expenditures of the Town other than those we report upon, that need a revision and a probable reduction, and they believe that a considerable sum could be saved annually and not impair the service. Owing to the short time at the disposal of the committee before this meeting, and because of the appropriations already voted, it was deemed best by your committee therefore not to enter upon such consideration, yet we would here call the attention of the different boards of Town officers to the pressing need of retrenchment in all Town expenditures, to the end that our tax rate may be kept at as low a rate as is possible, thereby relieving the taxpayers of what at best is a severe burden to many.

The natural location of Milford, its good railroad facilities, and its past excellent record as a manufacturing town, together with the well-known thrift, enterprise and industry of its citizens, will avail but little in attracting new business enterprises to locate here, unless the annual contributions for taxes shall be kept at a reasonable figure. That the rate is now ruinously high, we think none will doubt. Let us then all work together, and see if by economy and good judgment we cannot reduce the burden of our taxes, and thus build up our community to the position of one of the best of our Commonwealth's manufacturing towns, as well as to make it a model community for the man of moderate means to live in.

fairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Tuesday, the third day of November, 1896, it being the first Tuesday after the first Monday, punctually at six o'clock in the forenoon, at which time the polls will be open for said voters to give in their ballots to the Selectmen of said Town for electors of President and Vice-President of the United States; and for a Representative in the fifty-fifth Congress of the United States (for the eleventh Congressional district), for Governor, Lieutenant-Governor, Councilor (seventh Councilor district), Secretary, Treasurer and Receiver-General, Auditor, and Attorney-General of the Commonwealth; a Senator for the fifth Worcester Senatorial district and two Representatives for the tenth Worcester district to the General Court of Massachusetts; one County Commissioner, and one Clerk of the Court for said County of Worcester; all on one ballot designating the office intended for each person voted for.

Said voters will also give in their votes "Yes" or "No" for the following proposed amendments to the Constitution establishing biennial elections of state officers, and members of the General Court.

#### FIRST ARTICLE OF AMENDMENT.

The Governor, and Lieutenant-Governor, and Councilors, shall hold their respective offices for two years next following the first Wednesday in the January succeeding their election, and until others are chosen and qualified in their stead.

The first election to which this article shall apply shall be that held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight; and thereafter elections for the choice of all the officers before mentioned shall be held biennially on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

All the provisions of the Constitution inconsistent with the provisions herein contained are hereby annulled.

The Secretary, Treasurer and Receiver-General, Auditor, and Attorney-General shall hold their respective offices for two years, beginning with the third Wednesday in the January succeeding their election, and until others are chosen and qualified in their stead.

A person shall be eligible as Treasurer and Receiver-General for three successive terms, and no more.

The first election to which this article shall apply shall

be that held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight; and thereafter elections for the choice of all the officers before mentioned shall be held biennially on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

All the provisions of the Constitution inconsistent with the provisions herein contained are hereby annulled.

#### SECOND ARTICLE OF AMENDMENT.

Senators and Representatives shall hold their respective offices for terms of two years, beginning with the first Wednesday in the January succeeding their election.

The first election to which this article will apply shall be that held on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November in the year eighteen hundred and ninety-eight; and thereafter elections for the choice of Senators and Representatives shall be held biennially on the Tuesday next after the first Monday in November.

The General Court shall assemble every year on the first Wednesday in January; and each General Court shall, without any proclamation or other act of the Governor, be finally dissolved on the day preceding the day appointed for the first assembling of the next elected General Court.

All the provisions of the Constitution inconsistent with the provisions herein contained are hereby annulled.

The polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon on the above mentioned third day of November, at the same place, there will be a meeting of the above described inhabitants to act upon the following articles, namely:—

Article 1. To choose a moderator to preside at said meeting.

Article 2. To see if the Town will accept the list of jurors as reported by the Selectmen.

Article 3. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer for a nominal consideration to execute and deliver in its name and behalf a deed releasing and quitclaiming to Ellen Flanigan whatever interest it may have acquired under and by virtue of a tax deed from Appleton Bragg, etc., to said Town, dated March 8th, 1875, and recorded with Worcester District Deeds, Book 950, Page 532, in and to the real estate now owned by said Flanigan.

Article 4. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars in addition to the two thousand dollars already appropriated for the purpose of building a Town barn, and to authorize the Treasurer to pay the same out of any money unappropriated in his hands.

# TOWN WARRANT.

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## COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER, SS.

To Either Constable of the Town of Milford, in said County;  
Greeting:

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified by law to vote in Elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the First day of March, A. D., 1897, punctually at Eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely:—

[The Polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.]

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. A Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of the Poor, Two Members of the School Committee, Three Trustees of Public Library, (One to fill vacancy,) One Member of the Board of Health (for 3 years,) Two Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and Fifteen Constables; to be voted for on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1893, and amendments thereto; also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No," in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Engineers of Fire Department, Tax Collector, Trustees of Pub-

lic Library, Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and any other officers and committees of said Town.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting its streets, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the taxes of the current year.

ARTICLE 7. To determine when all taxes shall be collected and paid into the treasury the year ensuing, and to fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for collecting the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred and fifty dollars towards defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the Town.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will appropriate any money to remove from the arsenal at Watertown and mount the two cannons given by the United States to the G. A. R. Post 22, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will appropriate any money to repair or rebuild the Central street sewer from the electric light station to South Bow street, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out, grading, and extension of Fruit street from South Main street to Depot street, appropriate any money to construct the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of Poplar street, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of a way leading from Pearl street to School street through land of L. A. Cook and heirs of Peter Cook, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to keep Memorial Hall Building permanently insured for a reasonable amount and make an appropriation for the same.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will appropriate three hundred dollars to paint buildings at Town Farm and put in water closets, or take any action in relation to the same.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen in regard to laying out or relocating Spruce street from Congress street to a stone fence post at land formerly of John O'Shea, appropriate any money therefor, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to appropriate the sum of one thousand dollars in addition to the two thousand dollars already appropriated for the purpose of building a Town barn, or take any action in relation to the same.

ARTICLE 19. To see what action the town will take in relation to the payment of the Town bonds (\$25,000) which become due on the tenth day of August next.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will appropriate any money to build a sidewalk on the easterly side of North street, or take any action in relation to the same.

ARTICLE 21. To hear the report of the committee on enlarging and remodeling the Town House, see if the Town will accept and allow the same, appropriate any money to carry out the recommendations of the committee, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 22. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to locate an electric light at some suitable point in the Town Park, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 23. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to locate an electric light at some suitable point on Walnut street, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 24. To see if the Town are in favor of building a street from the easterly end of Granite street crossing the Hopkinton railroad and bridging the Charles river to a point on the westerly side of East Main street.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the Public Meeting Houses and at the Post-Office in said town; also cause an attested copy to be published in The Milford Daily News, Milford Daily Journal, Milford Gazette, and Milford Times, newspapers printed in said Town, Two Sabbaths at least before the time set for said meeting.

Hereof Fail Not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Clerk of said Town, at the time of meeting aforesaid.

# SELECTMEN'S REPORT.

---

We feel an explanation is due to the voters of the town for the unusually large amount expended for highways the past year.

Last year there was owing for bills of 1896, \$1,300, including the salary of the Superintendent of Streets for the balance due 1895-96. We believe that all bills are now paid up to Feb. 1, 1898.

The case of Levi White, M.D., against the town, being decided against us so late in the season, we had to take it out of the Highway appropriation to the amount of \$465, as we had no other appropriation from which to draw it. It would usually be drawn from the Incidental Department.

The work done by the Highway teams on Sidewalks appropriation, which is usually put into the Highway Department, is credited to the unexpended appropriations.

After completing what we expected to repair on the Central street sewer, we found that another portion needed repairing, and we expended between \$300 and \$400 on the extra repairs.

The big snow storm cost us about \$1,400, for which we have presented a bill to the M. H. & F. Street Railway for \$460 as their part of the expense, but could not get it in in time to go into this report.

We have also bought a new team throughout, at an expense of about \$400.

As we are constantly looking to the improvement of the fire department, we find that a material improvement can be made by substituting a hose wagon for the reel now used by the Engine company. This would necessitate an additional horse and driver, but would relieve the engine horses from a large amount of weight, which now nearly exhaust them, especially on some of the outlying district runs.

The expense of maintenance would not be very much when we consider the advantages to be obtained by such an improvement. The depreciation of the value of the horses, caused by over-exertion in getting the engine and reel to a fire on a long run, would be a matter for consideration. The antiquated idea of a reel attached to an engine, is a thing of the past. We do not know of a town that has not abolished this method, wherever it has been in use. It is too much for a pair of horses to draw, and might be somewhat improved by having a three-horse hitch.

We make the above suggestion for the consideration of the citizens, as the matter may come up for action at some future date.

The steam-whistle at the electric light station, 22 repeated four times. When this signal is sounded at 8 A. M. there will be no morning session. When it is sounded at 12.30 P. M. there will be no afternoon session. When it is sounded at 8 A. M. and not repeated at 12.30 P. M. there will be an afternoon session.

## ATTENDANCE.

There has been a marked improvement in the per cent. of daily attendance during the past year, it being 95.5 per cent. which is an increase of 1.4 per cent. over the previous year. This, while not satisfactory, is both pleasing and encouraging.

The matter of attendance has received considerable attention during the year. The daily record has been kept upon the blackboard, and made in the presence of the pupils, whose daily attention is called to it. Several schools have taken much pride in striving to secure perfect attendance for the week.

The teachers, I think without exception, have made special efforts to secure prompt and regular attendance, but I regret to call attention to an increased number of dismissals. The carrying of dinners causes a great many, while the various church societies, together with private music and elocution teachers, help to swell the number.

Much of the tardiness and a very large share of the dismissals could be avoided if the parents so desired. There seems to be a lack of appreciation of the importance of teaching children promptness and punctuality.

Upon these may depend the success or failure of school work, and of after life. I, therefore, again urge the parents to interest themselves in this matter, and to co-operate with the teachers in securing better attendance, less tardiness and fewer dismissals.

Truancy, if judged by the number of cases reported, seems to have increased, but I think such is not really the case. Both teachers and truant officer have been on the alert to investigate every case, and thus a greater number has been detected. Below is the truant officer's report:

To C. W. Haley, Superintendent of schools.

Dear Sir:—

At your request I present the following report:

In investigating the different cases of truancy, I found that in many cases the parents were responsible for it by giving permission to their children to remain from school without a good reason, which is encouraging the child to be a truant.

I think that if the parents would co-operate with the teachers, this evil would be greatly decreased.

### PROMOTIONS.

The promotions last June were made partly on the teacher's estimate and partly on the results of examinations.

The intention being to promote only those who appeared to be well fitted to do the work of the next higher grade, and thus raise the standard of the various grades and the schools as a whole, but we failed to accomplish all that we desired in that respect.

Many of the pupils in their examinations fell below what is a fair average for promotion, but if the teacher's estimate of their daily work was above, in most cases they were allowed a trial. Others because of their age, or because they had been in the grade two years, or perhaps because of some condition peculiar to themselves, were allowed a trial in the next grade. Still another class of pupils who had been faithful but had done very poor work in some one or two subjects, was conditioned, and allowed to go on into the next grade, providing the condition was removed.

While a few of these pupils, promoted on condition or on trial, have done creditable work, a large majority of them have done unsatisfactory work and have been a source of constant lagging and dragging down of the class standard.

I believe, in the future, more rigid lines of promotion should be adhered to, by promoting only those pupils who are well fitted to do the work of the next higher grade. This may seem hard and even severe in some cases, but it would result in raising the standard of our schools. I believe in rewarding earnest efforts and faithful application, but am opposed to putting a premium upon laziness, not only in school work but in any occupation.

There are so many pupils doing poor and unsatisfactory work that I am inclined to believe there has been too much leniency in promoting, caused partly by a crowded condition of the lower grades. Pupils have been sent on to get them out of the way in order to make room for others.

This should not be done, as it is almost sure to work injury to the higher grades.

Who expects a child to run before it can walk? What carpenter would think of building a house without first laying the foundation? Or how can a man become an expert machinist without first serving an apprenticeship?

In like manner how can we expect a grammar grade pupil to do high school work? How can a primary pupil do the work of the grammar grades? Or how can a pupil do the work of any grade without first understanding the principles which lead up to it, and without first laying a foundation?

### READING.

If there is any one subject in which the results during the past year please me, it is that of Reading in the Primary grades. I am not satisfied, however, as there is still room for improvement.

Not all the schools are securing equally good results in Reading, but many are doing good work, while several are doing excellent work. I want to commend the teachers for their efforts in carrying out my suggestions on this subject.

I have watched with much interest the marked improvement, and shall expect more in the future. I wish to emphasize

what I said in last year's report upon this subject. It is well nigh impossible to exaggerate the importance of reading. It is the foundation of education. "We learn to read that we may afterwards read to learn." Much care should be taken in selecting reading material for our schools, for in this way we may exert a far-reaching and powerful influence upon the pupils.

While some of the books in our schools are very satisfactory, others should be replaced by those more interesting and attractive, and additions made to the literature for the upper grades,

Baldwin's Third and Fourth year books and Pratt's Stories of Colonial Children have recently been added to our reading material, and it is hoped that before long we will be able to secure more for the higher grades.

## TEXT BOOKS.

### THEIR USE AND ABUSE.

Never, anywhere, have I seen text books so used up as here. I have found a large number nearly worn out and too filthy for use. I have found them partly or wholly torn from their binding; one or both covers gone; the corners rolled up or turned down; leaves gone, and the pages cut, marked, scratched and defaced in every conceivable manner.

I believe such abuse of text books should be sharply condemned, and those who deface or destroy books be compelled to pay for them.

Text books belong to the town and are simply loaned to the pupils, who are expected to take reasonable care of them. Teachers should examine the books, at least once a term, and hold pupils responsible for them.

The tax payers do not care to furnish money to buy books for pupils to destroy. An effort is being made to prevent abuse of school books. Suitable paper with which to cover them will be provided and teachers will be expected to keep due watch of all books in their schools, causing pupils to pay for those marked or defaced, or report the same to the Superintendent.

## SCHOOL ACCOMMODATIONS.

If pupils continue to increase, it will not be long before there will be an urgent demand for increased school accommodations in certain parts of the town. Even now we can see the need of it pressing upon us. During the last term, the third and fourth grade rooms at the Spruce St., Clafin and Chapin St. Schools were full almost to overflowing, and it was only with difficulty that I was able to arrange for their accommodation. The first grade classes in these schools, and also at the Plains and West St. Schools, already have as many pupils as the teachers can do justice to. With these grades full, I cannot see how we can admit pupils in April, unless we adopt the half-time plan,—a condition to be avoided if possible.

The classes at the Park School are quite large, while at the South they average larger, and I am now at a loss to know what we shall do with the eighth and ninth grades in the latter school after the promotions are made in June and the schools open in September—as there will be many more to enter it than will leave to go to the High School.

There are two ways to provide for the increase. One is by enlarging the Chapin St. and West St. buildings; the other is by erecting a new High School building which would doubtless be built large enough to provide for the High School and also to accommodate, for the present, the ninth grade grammar pupils.

No one denies that the entire seating capacity of the school rooms in town is more than sufficient to accommodate all the pupils.

The trouble arises because of location, there being too few school rooms in some of the more thickly settled and growing sections, while there is room to spare in others.

## THE TOWN HOUSE SCHOOL BUILDING.

It is to be regretted that the inside of this building is being used as a dumping ground by some one around the Town Hall.

I had occasion to go there during the fall and found the door

unlocked and just inside a pile of ashes fully three feet deep and a cart load in all, besides various other kinds of rubbish. I am told that the School Department no longer has control of this building, since it is not used for school purposes, but whoever does should not allow the present state of things to continue, as it is possible that this building may be needed again for school purposes. It is centrally located. The rooms are well arranged and could be easily fitted up for Manual Training. The upper room as a kitchen for the Cooking department for the girls of the eighth and ninth grades, and possibly the lowest class in the High School, and the lower room as a wood-working room for the boys of corresponding grades.

This may seem visionary, but I think not when we stop to consider that Manual Training is no longer an experiment. It has been tried and tested until now it is seen to have both an educational and highly practical value. It is educational because it trains both the eye and the hand. It is practical because its principles can be directly applied in every-day life; because it enables the pupil to make himself useful; because it teaches him that honest labor is not beneath him, and because it will add essentially to the comfort and happiness of home.

If in the whole category of subjects taught in the Public Schools today, there is any one of them more than another, aside possibly from that of reading, that deserves special consideration from a practical point of view, I believe it is that of Manual Training. I should be pleased to discuss the subject further but space will not permit. If this brief mention of it sets the people of Milford to thinking along this line I shall feel repaid.

#### THE DEER BROOK SCHOOL.

It seems to me that this building is totally unfit for school purposes.

It is the poorest apology for a school house that I have ever seen.

If a school is to be maintained in that part of the town, a new building should be erected, one worthy of being called a school

house. If a new building cannot be had, the pupils in that district should be brought into town where they can have the advantages of better and graded schools, also of better and experienced teachers.

None but young and inexperienced teachers will take such a school as that at Deer Brook, and then if they are successful and have any ambition they will not remain there long.

There are not more than a dozen pupils in the school, and nearly twice as many classes with seldom two pupils together.

This is not conducive to good results. The ordinary teacher can neither properly prepare nor teach lessons under such circumstances, and for the want of rivalry, pupils lack interest and enthusiasm.

The cost of bringing these pupils into the center would probably not exceed \$20 per month, while the cost of supporting a school for them at Deer Brook would be at least \$48 per month.

The movement all over the state to consolidate small and scattered schools, by transporting the pupils into the center, where they can have the advantages of larger and better equipped schools, is no passing fad, neither is it the result of a desire to change for the sake of changing, as some may suppose. On the contrary, provisions were made in this state in 1869 for the transportation of pupils, and the plan has been constantly growing in favor ever since, until last year no less than 213 towns had adopted it.

The secretary of the State Board says: "The general policy of transportation, as a factor in the solution of the question as to what can be done for small ungraded schools in sparsely settled regions of the state, is proving to be very helpful."

### TEACHERS' INSTITUTE.

In the early fall I attempted to arrange for a state Institute to be held here, but was unsuccessful. I then planned for a private Institute to be held on Dec. 6th, and was exceedingly

fortunate in being able to secure the assistance of two teachers from Framingham Normal, State Agents J. T. Prince, J. W. MacDonald and Henry T. Bailey, Miss Sarah Arnold, Supervisor of Boston Schools, and Miss Celia P. Battles of Brookline.

The Institute was very satisfactory, and many of the teachers expressed themselves as receiving much benefit from it. One valuable feature was a small exhibition of written work from every school in town, the object of which was four-fold. First—to show the character and quality of the work from each school; second—to show the neatness and arrangement; third—to give the teachers and committee an opportunity to compare the work of the various schools; and fourth—to show to some extent, each teacher's standard or ideal of school work. I felt that the object aimed at was accomplished. Some of the work was poor; much of it was *good*, and some excellent. On the whole it surpassed my expectations. I heard many a word of praise for it from those who saw the work, and was told by several that the town's people should see it, but this I could not allow, in justice to the teachers, as I had previously told them that the work was not for exhibition, although very many of them might well have felt proud of it.

In the evening a public meeting was held in the town hall for parents and citizens and addressed by J. W. MacDonald on "The Home as a Preparation for School," and by Henry T. Bailey, on "The School as a Preparation for Life." While a fair audience was present, I regretted exceedingly that so few people in a town of more than 9000 inhabitants, were sufficiently interested in education to attend such a meeting.

## THE SUMMER SCHOOL AND PROFESSIONAL IMPROVEMENT.

To avoid getting into ruts, to keep abreast of the times and do progressive work, it is necessary for teachers to devote some time to professional improvement. There are several ways by which much can be accomplished in this direction, and I believe one of the best is to attend some good Summer School, for it is



there that one comes in contact with progressive teachers and educational workers from far and wide. It is there that one has the privilege of listening to talks and lectures by many prominent and enthusiastic educators, and it is there that one has the opportunity to learn what other teachers are doing in various parts of our own state and many others, or it may be to pursue some special subject. It puts one in touch with modern means and modern methods, and if the work there is supplemented by home reading, home study and home reflection together with a careful preparation of work, teachers will begin to grow and their time and services become more valuable.

I am glad to report that five of our teachers, Miss Toohey, Miss Gilfoyle, Miss Gallagher, Miss M. H. McDermott and Miss Conroy, attended the summer school at Martha's Vineyard last summer. They enjoyed their vacation, came home with new ideas and enthusiasm, and several of them have expressed their intention to go again next season.

It is a mistake to think that only inferior teachers attend summer schools, for such is not the case. Many of the best teachers in Massachusetts make it a point to attend some Summer School every two or three years. High School teachers, special teachers, superintendents, normal and college graduates, in fact whoever wishes to progress by studying methods, or by pursuing some special subject, all are attending summer schools.

Many teachers say they cannot afford to attend a Summer School; that their salary is altogether too small. We will grant the latter, but can they afford not to progress? Is not that the very thing which will make their services more valuable, and thus enable them to command better salaries?

But summer schools will not make teachers any more than normal schools or colleges. The writer is inclined to believe that the real teacher is born, not made. The born teacher, however, will save much time and make fewer mistakes if properly trained for the work. The person who is not adapted by nature for teaching, may, by careful training, be fitted to do fairly good work; but in the words of another: "The teacher not fitted for

her work by nature or by art, is a wicked infliction upon the children intrusted to her care.”

### ASSIGNMENTS.

At the election of teachers in June the Committee thought it wise to elect all teachers below the High School as teachers in the Public Schools of Milford, rather than for any particular school.

It is well known that all teachers are not equally adapted to any and all grades of school. Some are best fitted for and constitutionally adapted to primary work; others for intermediate classes and still others for upper grammar grades.

Taking this into consideration, together with local conditions and surroundings, the Committee deemed it best to make assignments somewhat different from previous years. In order that the best good of all the schools might be considered and the matter studied from every point, the final decision was delayed until the August meeting, and even then the assignments were unsatisfactory, but, after a five months' trial, it is plain to be seen that, with a few exceptions, the changes were beneficial.

### RESIGNATIONS AND APPOINTMENTS.

During the past year we have had an unusual number of resignations, which were as follows:—

Misses E. M. Richardson and Claribel Moulton from the High School.

Miss B. F. Powers from the Plains School.

Miss M. E. Whitney from the Spruce Street School.

Misses A. B. Chapin and Lillian Smith from the Chapin Street School.

During the year the following appointments have been made:

For the High School:—Miss Adeline C. Teele, who had a special four years' course at Wellesley and some experience in teaching. Miss E. L. Bishop, a graduate of Boston University,

with two years' experience in teaching, and Miss M. H. Woodbury, a graduate of Mt. Holyoke.

For the other schools:—Miss Margaret Lewis, a graduate of Philadelphia Normal Schools, with two years' experience. Miss Harriet M. Parkhurst, a graduate of Wellesley. Miss Julia Boyle, a graduate of Newburyport Training School and one year at Salem Normal, and Miss Mary E. Mullane, a graduate of Worcester Normal.

### REPAIRS AND EXPENDITURES.

An effort has been made in expending the money, so generously appropriated by the town, to use it to the best possible advantage, and where it seemed to be the most needed.

The bulk of the repairs has been at fewer places this year than usual, the most of them being quite extensive and of a permanent and durable nature.

The repairs at the Plains School exceeded the estimate because unexpectedly the roof had to be repaired and the ceiling was found to be in such poor condition as to need replacing. A metal ceiling was thought to be more desirable and cheaper in the end, so it was supplied at considerable additional expense. Besides this each room has had new floors, new adjustable desks, two coats of paint upon all woodwork and the ceiling, the walls kalsomined, thus making these rooms as pleasant and attractive as any school room in town.

Quite extensive repairs have been made at both the Braggville and High School buildings. We regretted to expend anything upon the latter, but with the increase of both pupils and teaching force, it seemed absolutely necessary that some changes be made, that the work of the school might be done to better advantage.

The grading of the grounds at the Claffin school made as much show for the outlay as anything that has been done.

Aside from concreting, the other repairs have been minor and incidental.

Many of the text books in both the High and Grammar schools were in a very filthy and dilapidated condition, and had to be replaced, so that quite an outlay for this purpose seemed imperative.

An increased number of pupils in the High School made it necessary to purchase additional books, besides the Commercial Course required several complete outfits. Fully one-third of the expenditures for supplies has been for the High School, while all of the schools have been liberally, but not extravagantly, supplied with working material, such, as blank books, paper, pens, pencils, etc.

### RECOMMENDATIONS.

From among the many needs of the School Department I present the following for your consideration. I recommend:

That the Park School building be repaired the same as the South and Plains building.

That either the Purchase Grammar or the Bear Hill building (both are in need of it) be refloored, re-seated with single desks and painted inside.

That the outbuildings at several of the schools be thoroughly repaired.

That a dry closet system for the Park School be investigated.

That the town be requested to purchase a small strip of land upon the southerly side of the West St. school lot for the purpose of moving the out-building further from the school.

That at least three school buildings be painted upon the outside each year.

That a new building be built at Deer Brook, or the pupils brought into the center.

That some steps be taken in the near future looking toward increased school accommodations for the center of the town.

In many rooms there are several pupils much larger or much smaller than the average, so that the old stationary seats and desks are a decided misfit. The larger pupils are cramped

for room, while the smaller dangle their legs in the air and elevate their arms to an unnatural height. Such conditions, I think every physician will say, are likely to produce physical deformities. We have tried to remedy this evil by changing the desks, by changing the pupils, and even by furnishing square pieces of plank for them to rest their feet upon. The only way, however, to overcome it entirely, is to furnish adjustable seats and desks.

The expense makes me hesitate to recommend an immediate change, but the subject is worthy of consideration.

I also recommend the appropriation of the following amounts for the expense of the School Department for the current year :

### CONCLUSION.

During my connection with the School Department of Milford I have endeavored to acquaint myself as much as possible with the teachers, with the condition of the schools and their needs, with the endless detail connected with their administration, and with the accustomed method of conducting the business of the department.

Much of the work of a superintendent is of such a nature that it is difficult to measure results, but, while no radical changes have been made, I can report progress.

There has been marked improvement in reading, of which I have already spoken.

Considerable attention has been given to writing, and while the results are not wholly satisfactory, they are pleasing. An effort is being made to secure better results in number work in the primary grades.

There are excellent opportunities in Milford for a more rational study of Geography, and a slight beginning has been made in that direction.

The introduction of Algebra into the Ninth Grade is a step in the right direction, although we are not looking for immediate results.

The High School, under the excellent management of Principal Tuttle, has shown marked improvement during the past year. The addition of a Commercial Course, the enlarged and better equipped laboratory, and an increased teaching force have added very materially to the efficiency of the school.

The reports of the Principal, and special teachers, also the course of study for the High School, and other data, will be found in connection with this report.

In closing this report allow me to say that I have been much gratified with the pleasant and harmonious relations that have existed during the past year in the whole School Department, also with the kindly feeling and cordial manifestations throughout the town.

I wish to thank the teachers for their willing co-operation, and the Committee for their confidence and support.

# Report of the High School Principal.

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TO C. W. HALEY, SUPT. OF SCHOOLS:—

Dear Sir:—At the beginning of the year one hundred and fifty pupils were enrolled in the High School—about fifteen per cent. more than the enrollment of the previous year. If there should be the same increase next year the seating capacity of the building will be entirely inadequate.

It appears that this increase may be due, in some measure, to the new course of study adopted by the Committee and which became operative at the close of the last year. That this new course, embodying nearly all the recommendations of my last report, has been received with favor by the patrons of the school is attested by the fact that about sixty pupils are now pursuing the new studies which have been added to the course. And the commercial studies evidently have not attracted many from taking the regular literary courses, for there is a larger number than last year taking college preparatory work. As soon as practicable one year of elective work should be added to the Commercial Course to enable those who desire to make themselves more proficient in all the details of office work.

The enlargement of the laboratory has resulted in greatly increased facilities for scientific work, and is duly appreciated by pupils and teachers. All apparatus is now kept in this room and all study of natural science is conducted there. A small expenditure for needed apparatus would enable us now to do fair work in this department.

The introduction of military drill as a part of the prescribed work for the boys in the school seems to have met with general approval and to have accomplished fairly good results. Our aim in this instruction is not to stimulate the military spirit, but

rather to cultivate accuracy and precision, promptness of action, careful attention, strict and unquestioning obedience to recognized authority, and to correct, by the "setting up" exercises, certain physical defects generally resulting from student life. The best results of this drill will not be apparent until it has been established for three or four years. To encourage more painstaking work along these lines one medal is now offered, and it is hoped that some interested citizens may contribute more of similar incentives. The principal would be pleased to confer with anyone who may be interested in this suggestion.

The continued interest in the higher education is a commendable feature of our student body. Of the last graduating class about fifty per cent. are now studying in higher institutions. Members of this class were admitted to Dartmouth, Smith and Boston University, and several of the State Normal Schools.

The support and encouragement received during the year from all interested in the schools has been very helpful, and if this good-will might be carried to the extent of visiting the school frequently, I believe much general improvement would result.

# Report of the Supervisor of Drawing.

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TO C. W. HALEY, SUPT. OF SCHOOLS :—

Dear Sir :—The drawing in the schools has improved very much during the past year. The pupils seem to grasp the work better and work more freely and with more confidence than before. At the time of the teachers' institute in December, each teacher was asked to mount some of her work that the others might see it, and they were able to take from the regular daily work that which was a credit to themselves and to their pupils.

They have also in many cases had extra lessons, which consist of landscapes in ink, drawing of objects in colored chalk, pose drawings from one of the pupils, cutting vase forms from colored paper, and in the fourth and fifth grades drawing in ink from animals, cats, dogs, rabbits, etc.

This last has aroused a great interest and has been very successful, for in a half-hour lesson small silhouettes, that could be instantly recognized, can be obtained from every or nearly every member of the class. And as the animal being placed where all the class can see it changes its position very often, it takes quick perception and power of expression to get a drawing of it.

Brush drawing from nature has been carried on throughout the grades, and besides being satisfactory in itself, has accomplished in pencil drawing at least five ends, namely: A growing interest, better condition of thought, observation more extended, a lighter touch, less erasing. But ink has its limitations, and it is color that gives increased pleasure, and adds so much to the object. Nor is it very expensive, as one set of brushes will do for a school, and a few tubes of paint will go a good way.

The entering class in the High School has been using color to great advantage in designs for book covers, dress fabrics and

wall paper ; also in painting from objects. A class has been formed this year in mechanical drawing, and being provided with T squares and angles, are doing satisfactory work in machine and working drawings.

I would again suggest that photographs of famous pictures be introduced into the schools. Children are fond of pictures, and the study of them broadens their ideas.

In studying "The Angelus" in one of the schools, the children thought it was painted by some one in Milford, and estimated the value of the original from fifteen dollars to one hundred and fifty.

# Report of Music Teacher.

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TO C. W. HALEY, SUPT. OF SCHOOLS:—

Dear Sir:—There is very little more to be said now in regard to the study of Music in the schools, than could be said of any other branch of study.

That the study of Music is beneficial to the great majority of pupils, I think no one will deny. Occasionally a child is found of whom it might be said “He is tone-deaf.” He cannot distinguish the difference in tones, and unless by persistent effort and attentive trial he can notice a difference in others’ singing, he cannot sing correctly, but often such a pupil can keep time, answer all questions concerning what has been taught him about music, and can become an average performer on some musical instrument.

All children in the Primary Grade are anxious to sing and willing to try. To the parents I would say, do not tell a child he cannot sing because his father or mother never could, and do not laugh at him if his first attempts are not successful.

With encouragement, his success may sometimes surprise you.

A new book of songs has been provided for the seventh grade of the Grammar Schools, which has been profitable and pleasing.

When I asked for a new book for the High School, I was told so much money had been expended for that school that no more could be used at present.

At the request of Principal Tuttle and myself, the pupils decided to provide themselves with copies of the Cantata of Esther, composed by William B. Bradbury, which they are at present studying, one of the young ladies acceptably playing the accompaniments.

They have found it very interesting, not too difficult and the result most satisfactory.

If the number of pupils in the Milford schools who are now taking private lessons, both vocal and instrumental, were compared with the number who took lessons before music was taught in the schools, it would be evident that a desire for greater knowledge of this art has been awakened, both in parents and children.

The Classical Course is designed to prepare students to enter the academic department of any New England College.

5. The Normal Scientific Course is designed to prepare students to enter the literary and scientific departments of our colleges, the scientific and technical schools, and the normal schools.

The Commercial Course is designed to prepare students for Mass. Agricultural College, also to give as much general culture and practical training as possible to those who see no likelihood of going beyond the High School and who wish as early a start in life as possible.

Drawing is optional after the first year, one exercise each week.

Drill in declamations and compositions will be given regularly by the English teachers throughout the course.

A pupil may drop any study in his course or take a partial course upon written request of his parents, but will not be considered a candidate for a diploma until such studies be made up, and the same of any study in which POOR work has been done.

# Rules Regulating Military Drill

## in the Milford High School.

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1. All male pupils of the High School, except such as may be excused by the Principal for physical disability or religious scruples, shall be required to take military instruction as a regular study.

2. They shall be organized into a company or battalion as the Principal may direct.

3. The officers shall be the same as established by law for all military organizations, and the Principal shall be Commander-in-chief.

4. The commissioned officers shall all be elected by ballot in the fall term of each year, subject to conditions specified in Rule 6. The officers of the battalion (if any) shall be elected by the commissioned and non-commissioned officers of the companies. The commissioned officers of the company or companies shall be elected by majority vote of all the members.

5. The non-commissioned officers shall be appointed by the commissioned officers of the company, subject to the approval of the Principal; and the Principal may at any time reduce to the ranks any officer who fails to maintain a high standard of scholarship, deportment and military discipline.

6. Only those students who have maintained a *fair* standing in scholarship and deportment, and are candidates for a diploma from one of the regular courses of study, shall be eligible as officers, either commissioned or non-commissioned.

# Summary of Educational Laws.

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## CHAPTER 498.

SECT. 1. All children between the ages of 8 and 14, unless sick, feeble-minded, at an approved private school, or otherwise instructed, must attend the public school 30 weeks of the school year. They must begin within the first month of the fall term. Two weeks' absence is allowed. Penalty \$20 for each five days excess of 2 weeks, unless caused by sickness, or excused by the school committee or superintendent.

## CHAPTER 508.

SECT. 13. No child under 13 years of age shall be employed at any time in any factory, workshop, or mercantile establishment, during the hours when the public schools of the city or town are in session.

SECT. 14. No child between 13 and 14 years of age shall be employed unless he has attended school 30 weeks of the school year, beginning in September.

## CHAPTER 508.

SECT. 16. No child under 16 years of age shall be employed without a certificate from the school authorities.

## CHAPTER 48.

SECT. 6. The father, if living and a resident, must accompany the child, to sign the certificate of age; if not, the mother; if neither father nor mother, the guardian.

## CHAPTER 291.

SECT. 7. Proof of correct age must be furnished, if the age certificate does not agree with the school census.

## CHAPTER 47.

SECT. 9. Children must be vaccinated before attending school, unless [Amendment, Chap. 515, Sect. 1.] a certificate signed by a regular physician is presented, saying the child is an unfit subject for vaccination.

## CHAPTER 198,—ACTS OF 1885.

No child shall attend school from a household in which there is a case of small-pox, diphtheria, or scarlet-fever. Two weeks after the death, recovery or removal of the patient, the child may return on presentation of a certificate from the attending physician or board of health.

## CHAPTER 422,—ACTS OF 1889.

Truant officers may be authorized by the school committee to apprehend and take to school without warrant, all truants found wandering about in the streets or public places.

## CHAPTER 249,—ACTS OF 1889.

Any child between 7 and 15 years of age, convicted of being an habitual truant, may be committed for two years to any institution provided therefor.

## CHAPTER 71,—ACTS OF 1885.

## AN ACT TO PREVENT TRUANCY.

Whoever, after notice from a truant officer to refrain from so doing, offers a reward for service to any child, in consequence of which reward such child is induced unlawfully to absent himself from school, or whoever, after notice as aforesaid, in any manner entices or induces any child to truancy, or whoever knowingly employs or harbors any unlawful absentee from school, or truant, shall forfeit not less than twenty nor more than fifty dollars to the use of the public schools of the city or town in which said offense occurs, to be recovered by complaint.

## CHAPTER 111,—ACTS OF 1890.

In all the public schools in the Commonwealth, the last regular session prior to Memorial Day, shall be devoted to exercises of a patriotic nature.

## CHAPTER 207.

SECT. 23. Whoever willfully interrupts or disturbs a school or other assembly of people met for a lawful purpose, shall be punished by imprisonment in the jail, not exceeding thirty days, or by a fine not exceeding fifty dollars.

## CHAPTER 203.

## CONCERNING INJURY TO PUBLIC SCHOOL PROPERTY.

Whoever willfully and maliciously or wantonly and without cause, destroys, defaces, mars or injures a schoolhouse, church, or other building erected or used for purposes of education or religious instruction, or for the general diffusion of knowledge, or an out-building, fence, well or appurtenance of such schoolhouse, church or other building, or furniture, apparatus or other property belonging to or connected with such schoolhouse, church or other building, shall be punished by fine not exceeding five hundred dollars, or by imprisonment in the jail not exceeding one year.

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WARRANT FOR ANNUAL TOWN MEETING, MARCH  
1, 1897.

COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

*Worcester, ss.*

To Either Constable of the Town of Milford, in said County,  
Greeting :

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said Town, qualified by law to vote in Elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the First day of March, A. D., 1897, punctually at eight o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely :—

[The polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.]

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all necessary town officers for the year ensuing. A Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of the Poor, Two Members of the School Committee, Three Trustees of Public Library, (One to fill vacancy,) One Member of the Board of Health (for 3 years,) Two Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and Fifteen Constables; to be voted for on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1893, and amendments thereto; also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No," in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this Town?"

ARTICLE 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Engineers of Fire Department, Tax Collector, Trustees of Public Library, Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and any other Officers and Committees of said Town.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting its streets, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the Taxes of the current year.

ARTICLE 7. To determine when all Taxes shall be collected and paid into the Treasury the year ensuing, and to fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for collecting the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred and fifty dollars toward defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the Town.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will appropriate any money to remove from the Arsenal at Watertown and mount the two cannons given by the United States to the G. A. R. Post 22, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will appropriate any money to repair or rebuild the Central street sewer from the Electric Light Station to South Bow street, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out, grading, and extension of Fruit street from South Main street to Depot street, appro-

priate any money to construct the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of Poplar street, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen on the laying out and grading of a way leading from Pearl street to School street through land of L. A. Cook and heirs of Peter Cook, appropriate any money to build the same, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will instruct the Selectmen to keep Memorial Hall Building permanently insured for a reasonable amount and make an appropriation for the same.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the town will appropriate Three Hundred Dollars to paint buildings at Town Farm and put in water closets, or take any action in relation to the same.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will accept and allow the report of the Selectmen in regard to laying out or relocating Spruce street from Congress street to a stone fence post at land formerly of John O'Shea, appropriate any money therefor or take any action in relation thereto.

In pursuance to the foregoing Warrant, the inhabitants of the Town of Milford, qualified by law to vote in elections and in Town affairs, met in the Town Hall in said Town on Tuesday, the second day of November, in the year of our Lord one thousand eight hundred and ninety-seven, and were called to order by the Town Clerk, who then read the Warrant and the officer's return thereon.

In accordance with the provisions of Chap. 417 of the Acts of 1893 and amendments thereto, the sealed package said to contain 2700 ballots, specimen ballots, and cards of instructions, was delivered to George S. Whitney, the presiding election officer, and his receipt therefor given to the Town Clerk. The seal was then publicly broken, the package opened, and the blocks of ballots delivered to the ballot-clerks, and one of each kind of cards of instructions posted in each voting compartment, and five specimen ballots and five of each of the cards of instructions were posted in the hall outside the rail.

The ballot-box (New Gravity) required by law to be used in elections was then opened in public meeting and shown to be empty, and examined by the election officers and found to be empty. The register of the box was then set at 0000 and the box locked, and the keys thereof delivered to Oliver D. Holmes, constable in attendance at said meeting.

S. C. Sumner and R. H. Cochran, appointed inspectors by the Selectmen, acted as ballot-clerks, and during their absence D. J. Sullivan and S. Alden Eastman, deputy inspectors, acted in their stead, each of them having been sworn to faithfully perform the duties of their office by the Town Clerk.

P. H. Curran, who had been appointed by the Selectmen to check the list at the polls, was duly sworn to faithfully perform the duties of his office by the Town Clerk.

Higgins, appointed tellers by the Selectmen, were then sworn to faithfully perform the duties of their office by the Town Clerk.

The polls were opened at 6.08 A. M. for the reception of ballots.

Voted : To close the polls at 4 P. M.

Due notice having been given, the polls at 4 P. M. were declared closed.

At 2 o'clock in the afternoon on the above mentioned second day of November at the same place, the above described inhabitants acted upon the articles in the warrant as follows:

Article 1. The meeting made choice of Lowell E. Fales as moderator, the check list being used. Total ballots cast, 2; all of which were for Lowell E. Fales.

# TOWN WARRANT.

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## COMMONWEALTH OF MASSACHUSETTS.

WORCESTER, SS.

To Either Constable of the Town of Milford, in said County, Greeting :

In the name of the Commonwealth aforesaid, you are hereby required to notify and warn the inhabitants of said town, qualified by law to vote in Elections and in Town affairs, to meet at the Town Hall, in said Town, on Monday, the Seventh day of March, A. D., 1898, punctually at 8 o'clock in the forenoon, to act upon the following articles, namely :—

[The Polls may be closed at four o'clock in the afternoon on said day of meeting.]

ARTICLE 1. To choose a Moderator to preside at said meeting.

ARTICLE 2. To choose all necessary Town Officers for the year ensuing. A Town Clerk, Town Treasurer, Tax Collector, Auditor, Three Selectmen, Three Assessors, Three Overseers of the Poor, Two Members of the School Committee, Two Trustees of Public Library, One Member of the Board of Health, (3yrs.,) Two Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and Fifteen Constables ; to be voted on ballots prepared and furnished in accordance with the provisions of Chapter 417 of the Acts of 1893 and amendments thereto ; also upon said ballots the voters will give in their votes "Yes" or "No" in answer to the question, "Shall licenses be granted for the sale of intoxicating liquors in this town?"

ARTICLE 3. To hear and act upon the reports of the Selectmen, School Committee, Overseers of the Poor, Treasurer, Engineers of Fire Department, Tax Collector, Trustees of Public Library, Trustees of Vernon Grove Cemetery, and any other Officers and Committees of said Town.

ARTICLE 4. To raise and appropriate such sum or sums of money as may be necessary to defray Town expenses for the year ensuing.

ARTICLE 5. To see what action the Town will take in regard to lighting its streets, and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 6. To see if the Town will authorize the Treasurer to borrow money in anticipation of the Taxes of the current year.

ARTICLE 7. To determine when all Taxes shall be collected and paid into the Treasury the year ensuing, and to fix the compensation of the Collector of Taxes for collecting the same.

ARTICLE 8. To see if the Town will raise and appropriate one hundred and fifty dollars towards defraying the expenses of Memorial Day.

ARTICLE 9. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to take charge of all legal proceedings for or against the Town.

ARTICLE 10. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to enforce the payment of all taxes due to the Town prior to 1893 or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 11. To see if the Town will authorize the Selectmen to pave a portion of Main Street, raise and appropriate any money therefor, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 12. To see if the Town will vote to increase the pay of the Assessors to \$3.50 per day for each Assessor.

ARTICLE 13. To see if the Town will authorize the Assessors to publish a report of valuation and taxes, other than polls, of the Town of Milford for the year 1898, appropriate any money therefor or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 14. To see if the Town will vote to locate a hydrant on Fruit Street Extension, and appropriate money therefor or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 15. To see if the Town will vote to reduce the number of Constables to be elected at the annual meeting from 15 to 3, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 16. To see if the Town will authorize its Treasurer to execute and deliver in its name and behalf, a deed releasing and quit-claiming to Alonzo E. Rhodes, the mortgagee of said premises on payment by him of the amount due said Town and interest, whatever interest it may have acquired under and by virtue of a tax deed from Monroe A. Goldsmith, etc., to said Town, dated October 31, 1896, and recorded with Worcester District Deeds, book 1520, page 639.

ARTICLE 17. To see if the Town will authorize the Overseers of the Poor to shingle buildings at the Poor Farm, appropriate any money therefor, or take any action in relation to the same.



ARTICLE 18. To see if the Town will vote to instruct the Selectmen to locate an electric light at some suitable point on North Bow Street and appropriate money for the same.

ARTICLE 19. To see if the Town will appropriate \$300 to repair Beaver Street from the Norcross Bros. sheds on East Main Street to the Medway road, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 20. To see if the Town will vote to build a concrete sidewalk on the easterly side of Sumner Street, appropriate \$500 therefor, or take any action in relation thereto.

ARTICLE 21. To see if the Town will vote that all public work in the town be done by the day and that none but citizens be employed.

And you are hereby directed to serve this Warrant by posting up attested copies thereof at each of the Public Meeting Houses and at the Post-Office in said town; also cause an attested copy to be published in The Milford Daily Journal, Milford Daily News, Milford Gazette, and Milford Times, newspapers printed in said Town, Two Sabbaths at least before the Time set for said meeting.

Hereof fail not, and make due return of this Warrant with your doings thereon, to the Clerk of said Town, at the time of meeting aforesaid.
