The number of young
men aided by the Ed. Soc
during your last financial
year, is 12. Of these, one
graduated in the last term,
two have found other means
of support and do not now
ask for aid, one felt com-
pelled to leave College on
account of the failure of the
means of support, and one
has joined the army, is a
Lieutenant in a Co of Cavalry.

The remaining seven
are still receiving aid from
the Society. They have been
embarrassed by the failure
of the Society to pay the full
appropriation. Eighty dollars
a year, paid in quarterly ap-
propriations, is the usual
amount paid to each bene-
ficiary, but from scarcity of funds
during the last year, the quarter-
ly appropriations have been,
10—5—10—20; in all \$45.

The scholarship of the young
men is good— all are respect-
able, and some stand very
high.

I hope you will have a
good meeting at Norwich,
am sorry that I can not
be with you.
