



Celery delights and thrives best in a muck land, but can be grown in any good garden soil, with proper cultivation. However rich and "mucky" the land may be, it is positively essential to good crops that it be annually fertilized with about two inches of well-rotted stable manure, carefully plowed under. Ample moisture must also be provided for.

Sow the seed in the open ground in April, or as soon as ground can be worked, for general crop; for early fall crop in hot beds or house, in February or March. Prepare the soil well, and sow in drills a quarter inch deep and about ten inches apart, taking care to firmly press the soil over the seed.

When about two inches high, after careful hardening, thin and transplant to two inches apart each way. Later dig broad trenches 4 feet apart and 4 to 6 inches deep, or they may be set on level ground, and when large enough, trim off the tops (to render stocky) and enough of the roots to admit of straight planting, and set in the trenches 6 inches apart, covering to the crown only.

Thickness, rather than length of stalk, indicates the proper time for transplanting; the increase being mainly in height after that process is begun. Close the stalks carefully, and draw the earth about one third the height of the plant and firm it, taking care that none falls in upon the heart. Repeat the process every few days thereafter until the leaves are reached. When weather is warm enough to cause rusting of the stalks in banking, boards may be used for blanching purposes. Always use a cloudy day for transplanting, but never work among plants when wet.

To store for winter, select thoroughly drained ground and dig trenches one foot wide and as deep as the celery is high. Into this set the celery, lifted roots and all, in an upright position; set closely, but do not crowd. When severe cold weather comes, cover with leaves, hay, or straw. Place boards on the top to keep out the moisture. Or for more convenient use it may be put away in a light, dry cellar, covering all but the tops with sand.

Tile blanching is a favorite method for early use. A section of ordinary three-inch tile is used to cover the plants. Dirt should be drawn around the tile to hold it firm. By taking a heavy sheet of paper two or three inches longer



MUSHROOMS.

Considering the ease with which the great luxury of fresh mushrooms may be obtained, it is only a question of time when mushrooms will be as common as onions. They may be grown in an ordinary house cellar, shed, or out-of-the-way place. Caves are well adapted to the purpose.

Take fresh horse manure, and use nothing but the fine portion of it, shaking out the straw, Mix this with fresh loam, one part loam and two parts manure, and turn every day to keep it from burning, until the fiery heat is nearly all out of it. Prepare the bed about four feet wide, and as long as required. Put in the preparation about eight inches deep, making it very solid as it is put in. Let it remain in this condition until the temperature has become reduced to ninety degrees. Make holes two or three inches deep, into which put the spawn, in pieces about as large as an egg, and at a distance of twelve inches apart each way. Cover the spawn and let it remain for eight or ten days. Then cover the whole bed with fine loam to the depth of two inches, making it firm with the back of a shovel or spade. The bed must be in a covered situation, and the prepared soil kept dry from the commencement, and in a dark place, with the temperature about fifty degrees. If everything is favorably done, the mushrooms will appear in from six to eight weeks. After the bed has been spawned, do not water unless quite dry, and, when necessary, use lukewarm water only.

A fine, dry, sandy loam, enriched and made light with well-rotted manure and a liberal dressing of salt is best adapted for the purpose, all heavy soils producing directly the opposite results from those desired.

CULTURE.—For early crops, prepare gentle hot-beds in February, covering with loam to a depth of 8 inches for the long-rooted and of 4 inches for the turnip-rooted varieties. Select the early sorts and sow immediately in drills 6 inches apart and ½ inch deep, thinning to 2 inches—watering sparingly—allowing free ventilation to prevent running to leaves, and in severe weather protecting the sashes with matting or carpeting at night. For open air culture of the early varieties, sow early as the ground is workable, in drills one foot apart, thinning to 2 or 3 inches. Use invariably when young and brittle. For succession, sow every 10 to 15 days.

The late winter crop may be planted from middle of July to middle of August; thinning 4 to 6 inches apart, and, in dry weather, watering often and copiously. Harvest before frost and pack in earth in a dry cellar. The roots should be plunged in cold water for an hour or so before using.



A few of the finest leaf stalks may be used not too early in the second season; but from the third year, with good care, gatherings may be made with entire freedom for 10 to 15 years. In removing, be careful to pull off close to the roots instead of cutting, as the sap flows more freely from a square cut.

Soil and Culture. While Strawberries do well in any good soil, a liberal appliance of manure or fertilizer is essential for the production of large berries. For field culture set in rows 3 feet apart, 15 inches apart in the row; for garden culture, 15 inches each way. It facilitates cultivation and picking if a pathway is left every third row. The season of fruiting

may be prolonged by planting varieties of different time of maturity.
