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THE WAR IN THE BALKANS.

The following resolutions have been adopted by the Committee of the International Arbitration and Peace Association:

I

This Committee expresses its horror at the fresh outbreak of war resulting in wholesale slaughter in the Balkans, and trusts that the Powers may succeed in persuading the belligerent States to stop hostilities and submit any questions in dispute to arbitration.

The Committee appeals with confidence to His Majesty's Ministers to do their utmost in this direction, and so put an end to further carnage.

II

This Committee deeply regrets that Rumania, in spite of considerable advantages recently gained by negotiation, should without provocation and without excuse, have forcibly invaded Bulgarian territory; and hereby places on record its condemnation of a proceeding contrary to justice and unworthy of a civilised European Power.
