


INFORMATION

This price-list No. 24 cancels all previous lists and is to be used in connection with our Descriptive Catalog No. 12 edition of "TREES, SHRUBS, VINES AND PLANTS," a copy of which we will gladly mail you on request. If you have on file a copy of No. 12 general catalog, use it for descriptions only.

PLACE YOUR ORDERS EARLY—Last season we were unable to fill all orders received, owing to adverse weather and the unprecedented demand, and early placed orders of course will be filled first. Owing to Federal Prohibition of importation of nursery stock, the supply in the entire United States is short and it will require several years growing before the American nurseries can take care of the normal demand.

Our business was established in 1887 and for the past 36 years we have been growers of general nursery stock, specializing in fine ornamental trees and shrubbery. We are practical horticulturists and glad to assist with advice concerning commercial fruit plantings as well as to assist in improvement of home properties.

LOCATION—General office, packing and sales department are in Portland, corner Second and Salmon streets. Nurseries are at Durham, 11 miles south of the city. All inquiries should be addressed to the Portland office.

During planting season a general stock is carried at the city yards and replenished by daily truck service from the nursery. Visitors are welcome at all times to yards or to nurseries for personal selection of specimen plants.

PLANTING SEASON—Stock should not be planted until dormant in the fall nor after growth starts in the spring. Under ordinary weather conditions digging and shipping season commences in mid-October and continues until early April. Early fall planting is preferable as a rule, as roots form during the mild winters and plants are ready to grow when warm weather begins. Early spring planting is also perfectly satisfactory.

PRICES AND DELIVERY—It is my aim and intention to give good value to all purchasers. Prices in this catalog are net for stock f. o. b. Portland or nursery shipping station. Unknown correspondents should send cash with their order or arrange for terms.

GUARANTEE—I guarantee that all plants sent out will be delivered to the carrier in first-class condition and they shall be true to name and if through error any should prove untrue to replace them without charge. It is obvious that I cannot guarantee that customers will make them live, as I have no control over conditions surrounding them and the care they will receive after they leave my hands.

DECIDUOUS ORNAMENTAL TREES

The following list of deciduous trees (those that lose their leaves in autumn) embraces a selecton for all purposes. For street planting, the Norway Maple probably leads in general suitability, with several other varieties of Maples, Elms, Birches, Horse Chestnuts, Tulips, Mountain Ash and others, all favorites; while for lawn and park planting this varied list covers trees of every characteristic in outline and habit, color of foliage and floral diversity.

These trees have been grown from seedlings in my nursery, have been transplanted each a number of times, according to size, will transplant readily and take vigorous hold and grow well when moved to permanent locations. DECIDUOUS ORNAMENTAL SHRUBS

Flowering shrubs take predominance in all plans for landscape decoration, grounds large or small. Without shrubbery no landscape can be created, but with a careful selection, properly planted, any property can be enhanced in beauty and value. If care is given in selecting, flowers can be had from early Spring to late Fall. It is my aim to produce everything in flowering shrubbery that is useful, hardy, and worthy of cultivation in this climate. I have been bringing in, trying out and rejecting different shrubs for many years past, adding to my list only those of proven merit in the Pacific Northwest. My stock is large, well grown, every plant oeing bushy and well furnished in proportion to its height and with exceptionally fine root system. Where no sizes are quoted, prices are for large, well grown shrubs, that will give immediate effect and flower the first year after planting.
