

High School Educators To Visit RIT Campus

Business faculty and guidance personnel from Greece Arcadia High School will visit the RIT Campus Thursday, April 13, as part of a six-session field study program to learn new procedures and to give businessmen and educators an opportunity to exchange ideas on the training of business students.

Overall purpose of the field study is to discover ways to improve the business education curriculum. At RIT, the group will explore how RIT staff may be used as resource personnel for classroom activities.

William E. Beatty, associate professor in the College of Business, said the RIT visit is being co-sponsored by the Institute and the Administrative Management Society (AMS), sponsors of the six-session tour.

Dr. George Demopoulos, assistant professor in the College of Business, participated last month in a panel discussion on "The Present International Monetary Situation and Its Implications for the Second Development Decade," sponsored by the Center for Development Planning, Projections and Policies of the United Nations, in New York City. Professor Demopoulos, who was invited along with other economists from various universities and the UN, discussed the degree of confidence of an international monetary currency and the adjustment mechanisms related to policy-making actions and the market demand and supply.... Dr. Norman R. Coombs, associate professor of history in the College of General Studies, recently published an article, "The West African Past," in the journal "The Other Side." This study is a condensation of the first two chapters of his forthcoming book, "The Black Experience in America," which will be published by Twayne Publishers.... Homecoming '72 will take place on the weekend of Oct. 13, 14 and 15, according to Clarence E. Smith, Mechanical '40 alumnus, chairman of the Alumni Association's Homecoming Committee. Dr. Nabil M. Kaylani, associate professor of history in the College of General Studies, recently published an article in the "International Review of History and Political Science." The article is entitled, "Great Britain and the Franco-Spanish Conflict Over Morocco 1909-1912."....A "Jam Festival" will be presented by section aqua of the freshman Art and Design class in Bevier Gallery on Tuesday, April 11, beginning at 10:30 a.m. The festival will consist of musical jams depicting the history of American music from the 16th Century until the present; it will be accompanied by visuals, posters and refreshments, and admission is free....Dr. Norman R. Goldblatt of the Physics Department of the College of Science, will study the behavior of electron clouds in the Earth's upper atmosphere during the July 10 solar eclipse. He and Dr. David D. Miesel of the State University of New York at Geneseo, will conduct the project using the high-power shortwave transmission facilities of Radio Canada, located near Sackville, New Brunswick. The two scientists hope their joint study will provide a valuable link between the rocket probe data and more conventional techniques of measuring eclipse related changes in the Earth's upper atmosphere.... Rochester Telephone, said the Institute
invited the company to hold its 1972 meeting on campus last Spring.

"While Rochester is the focus of our 2,300 square mile service area and serves as our headquarters, we have been exploring the possibility of holding our annual meeting in different communities within our territory, with the objective of exposing more of our share owners and customers to it," Beinetti said.

"Thus, the Institute's invitation was not only timely but offered other possibilities as well: One was the opportunity for share owners to visit the Institute's beautiful new campus and its marvelous facilities. And, secondly, and this one particularly interested us, we felt a meeting on campus would give students an opportunity to participate in a corporate meeting, to see business at work in their own environment."

RIT students, faculty and staff members have assisted in planning the arrangements for the meeting. Photographs, which will be on display in the Union Lobby the day of the meeting, were produced by the Institute's School of Photographic Arts and Sciences, and a special audio-visual presentation, to be shown during the meeting, was developed by students, faculty and staff from the Department of Communication Design and Media Design Center.

Parking will be provided for share owners' cars on campus, and bus service will be available for others, from Midtown Plaza direct to the campus and back. The Institute also is arranging special tours of the campus for both share owners and a number of high school students, who are being invited by the company to attend the meeting.

Rochester Telephone and RIT have been closely associated for a number of years. Many of the company's employees are graduates and dozens of others are currently enrolled in evening courses through the College of Continuing Education. In addition, last year, in commemoration of the 50th anniversary of its organization as a company, Rochester Telephone established an Institute-wide communications professorship, in memory of William A. Kern, the company's president from 1959 to 1964 and a former RIT trustee.

(near Elmira) in 1953. He was a member
of the class of 1957 at RIT where he
received his B.S. degree. He was awarded
his Ph.D. degree from Iowa State University in 1960, and in 1960-61 was a
National Science Foundation Post-Doctoral
Fellow at Harvard University.

Dr. Pasto co-authored the text book Organic Structure Determination, which was published in 1969 by Prentice Hall.

His research work in the field of organic chemistry has been sponsored by grants from the National Science Foundation, the National Institute of Health, Petroleum Research Fund of the American Chemical Society, and the Alfred P. Sloan Foundation.
