Language Diversity in India – A historical Glimpse

- Linguistic Survey of India – George A. Grierson (1894-1928)
- Context: After the Great Uprising of 1857, the reestablishment and deeper penetration of the colonial state in India resulted in the systematic collection and codification of knowledge about things and people Indian – Prof. Shahid Amin (2008) *
- 179 languages and 544 dialects in the Indian Empire.
- 1961 Census reports – 1652 mother tongues**

Language Diversity in India

- 122 languages spoken by > 10,000 - Census of India 2011
- Of these the Constitution of India recognizes 22 languages
- About 87 languages used in print media.
- 71 languages used on radio
- Administration in 15 languages
- Media of instruction 47 languages*

People's Linguistic Survey of India

- 780 languages
- 66 scripts (e.g. Konkani)
- Arunachal Pradesh is the richest with 90 languages
- Survey by more than 3,000 volunteers over 4 years
- 35,000-page survey in 50 volumes
- **220 languages died in the last 50 years**
- **150 could die soon**

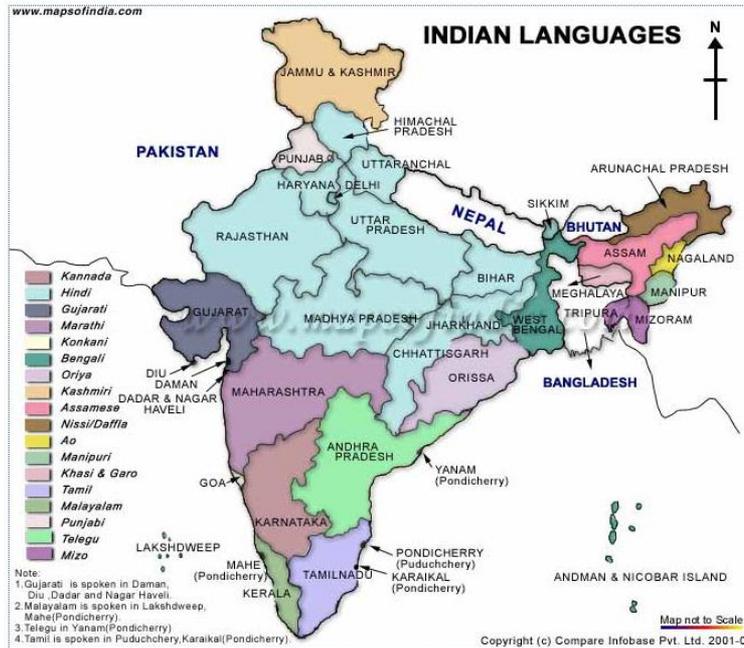

Challenges – Knowledge Production in Indian Languages

- Orality of the language (e.g. Sea in Coastal fishermen's language)
- Knowledge production in Indian Languages (e.g. Urdu)
 - a) individual efforts mostly on creative side
 - b) state funded knowledge production (e.g. Konkani)
- The aspiration of English education
- Relative lack of research/academic standards, which is transferred on to Indic Wikipedias
- Translation challenges (EN-Indic-EN; Indic-EN-Indic; Indic-Indic)
- Regional identity to language (see map)

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Challenges for Wikimedia growth in Indian Languages – Efforts of CIS-A2K

- Technical infrastructure for Indian Languages
 - Inadequate support to Indian scripts on digital environment [Lobbying with tech players and Govt. policy change]
 - Typing a major challenge (too many letters too less keys) [video tutorials; Indic typing at school level]
 - OCR – complexity of Indian Language scripts [Lobbying with C-DAC. Exploring support to tesseract based development]

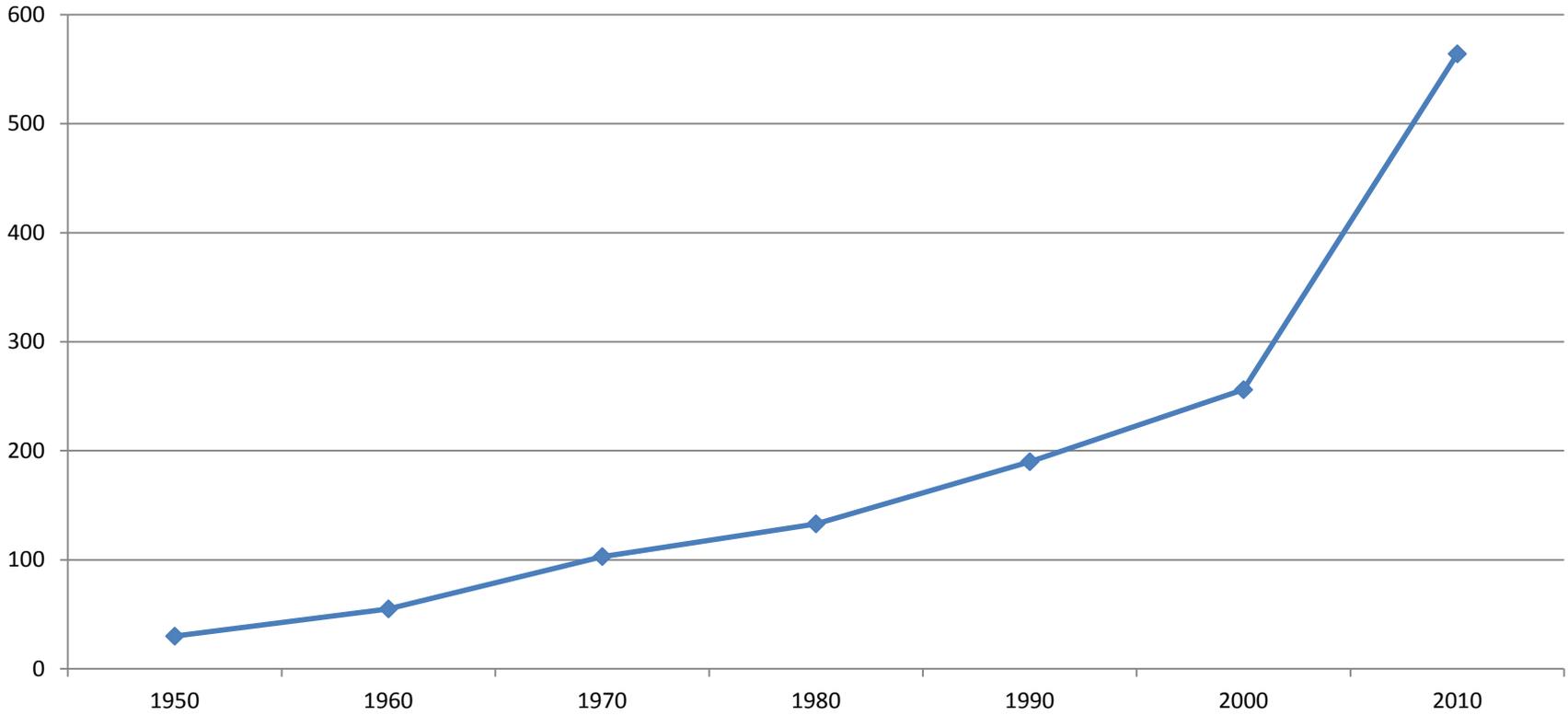
Challenges for Wikimedia growth in Indian Languages – Efforts of CIS-A2K

- Dearth of quality content available in digital format. [Digitization of Encyclopaedias and re-releasing under CC; Konkani Encyclopaedias with Goa University partnership; Kannada Encyclopedias]
- Different standards/formats/generations (Gov.in/DLI)
- Inadequate knowledge sharing culture on the internet (e.g. bit torrent)
- Insularity – Niche Communities (TA WP vs. OR WP) [Focus on diversifying users by bringing thematic experts]

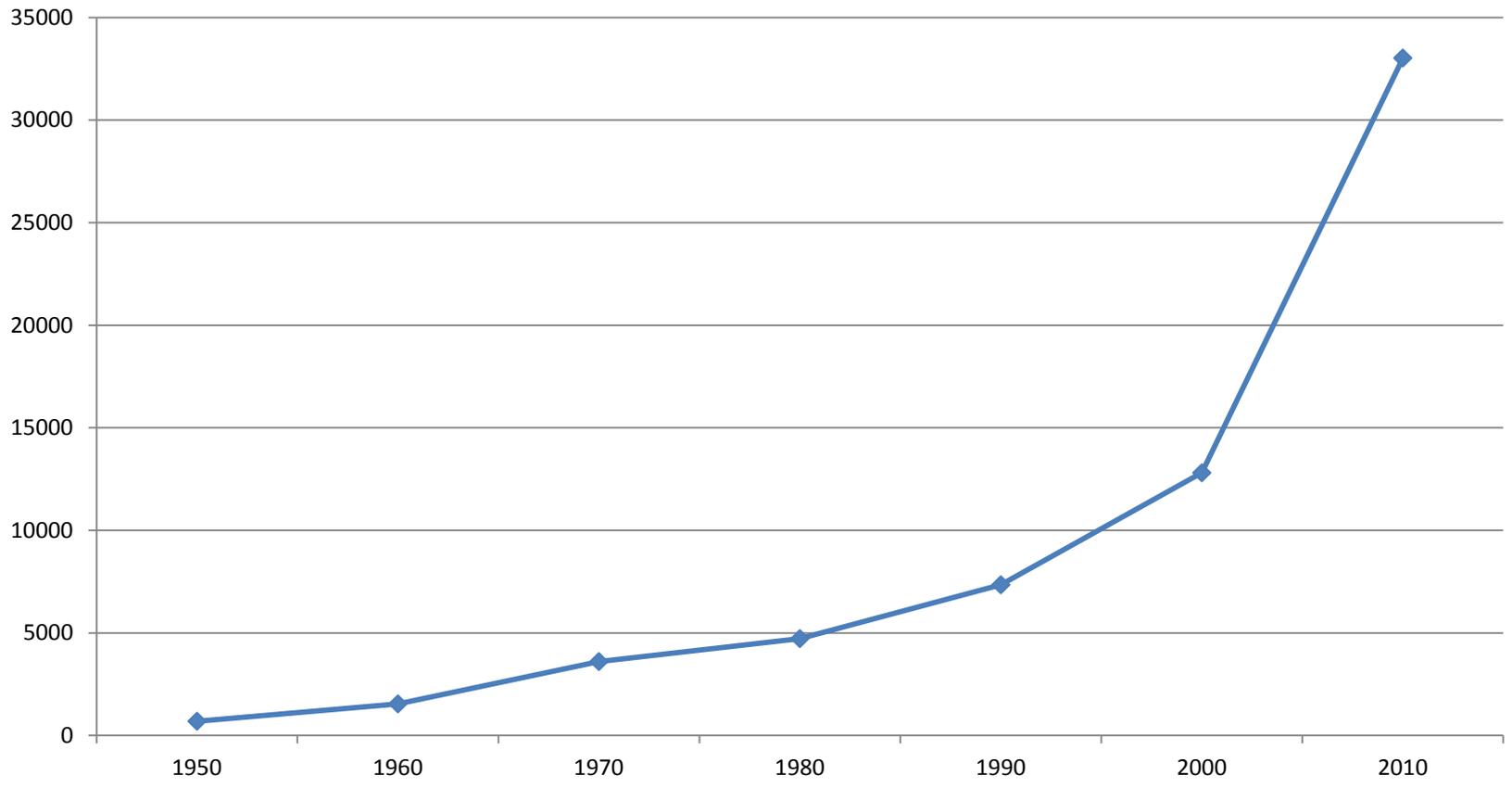
Opportunities

- Leveraging the three-language policy of Education (e.g. Kerala model) – creating future Wikipedians/knowledge producers in Indian languages
- Boom in Higher Education
 - Harnessing student time
 - Integrating Wikipedia into the pedagogy than add-on [Christ University Partnership]
