BRUCE BROWN CAMPAIGN

"Whether the kaiser or the allies win in the great struggle now going on in Europe may not make much difference to the world a thousand years from now, but the results of decisions that are made for or against Jesus Christ here tonight may be of vast moment by that time."

U. S. MEANS BUSINESS

GRAVE SITUATION AT NACO, IN ARIZONA, WHERE TROOPS HAVE MOBILIZED

NACO, Ariz., Dec. 15.—Gov. Jose Maytorena, Villista commander of the troops besieging Naco, Sonora, late tonight received a lengthy message from Provisional President Gutierrez ordering him to cease his attack rather than "jeopardize international relations until some means can be found whereby firing to the American side can be avoided."

In a statement issued shortly after the message was received, Maytorena said: "I will so order, but will not withdraw my troops, as Gen. Hill will again mine the country surrounding Naco, Sonora."

Both the message from Provisional President Gutierrez, as made public by Gov. Maytorena, and comments made by the Sonora Villista leader are considered here as evasive and vague.

Tense developments are imminent in the Mexican situation. The Wilson administration is exerting itself to the utmost to prevent a crisis, but conditions on the border have forced precautionary measures against contingencies. Orders were given tonight for the dispatch of 3000 infantrymen and artillerymen, fully equipped for the field, as reinforcements to Gen. Tasker H. Bliss at Naco, Ariz. Gen. Thomas F. Davis at Texas City, near Galveston, was ordered to proceed immediately with the Eleventh, Eighteenth and Twenty-second regiments of infantry to Naco. Each of these regiments of infantry will have four machine guns. The troops are to be ready for the field and will carry ten days' rations.

Col. Granter Adams at Fort Sill, Okla., was ordered to send immediately to Naco three batteries of artillery with siege guns. He will send batteries A and B of the Fifth field artillery, armed with 4.7-inch field howitzers, and battery C of the Fifth field artillery armed with 4.7-inch field cannon. This battalion of artillery will also take along portable searchlights. Arrival of these detachments will treble the strength of the forces under Gen. Bliss at Naco.

Maytorena and Hill, the rival Mexican factional commanders at Naco, should have received the instructions Carranza and Gutierrez claim to have sent directing them not to fire shots over the border at Naco. Refusal or inability of the responsible Mexican faction chiefs to train weapons away from the border and continuation of violation of American neutrality and additions to the casualty list, will undoubtedly be followed by vigorous action on the part of the American army at Naco.

It is not the purpose of the Wilson administration to take any aggressive action, nor the purpose or thought of the administration to invade Mexico, but it is believed that the administration has decided to use the army, if necessary, defensively to prevent more bullets falling across the border, even to use the howitzers of the American artillery in firing across the town to shell the Maytorena force out of their positions, if they are responsible for the shots being fired over the border.

The reinforcements will make the American forces superior in actual fighting power and equipment to the combined Maytorena and Hill forces, which number about 5300 men. The force under Gen. Bliss will aggregate about 4170 men. Its composition will be as follows:

Ninth cavalry, Col. John F. Guilfoyle, a company machine gun, men with pack mules and four machine guns and troops A, B, C, D, E, G and H, aggregating about 525 men.

Tenth cavalry, Col. Brown; troops B, C, D, G, H, K and M, aggregating about 525 men.

Sixth field artillery, Col. Edwin St. John Greble; batteries A, B and C, with three-inch field artillery, aggregating about 360 men.

Fifth field artillery from Fort Sill with batteries A, B and C, armed with 4.7-inch howitzers and equipped with portable searchlights, aggregating about 360 men.

Eleventh infantry, from Galveston, Col. Abner Pickering; about 800 men.

Eighteenth infantry, from Galveston, Col. James S. Rogers; about 800 men.

Twenty-second infantry, from Galveston, Col. Charles M. Truitt.

Three companies of machine guns with an aggregate of twelve machine guns accompanying these three infantry regiments.

This will be the largest force concentrated at any single point on the border since the occupation of Vera Cruz. About 5000 men of the regular army, with several thousand marines, were stationed at Vera Cruz.

SEVEN GRADUATE

COMMENCEMENT EXERCISES FOR MISSIONARY NURSES ARE LARGELY ATTENDED

Clad in spotless white uniforms and the typical nurses' caps, the 1914 graduating class of the Glendale sanitarium and hospital training school for missionary nurses received their diplomas during the exercises at the Seventh Day Adventist church Tuesday night. The seven members of the class were seated upon the platform. Behind them were seated the members of the faculty. The front seats were occupied by the other uniformed nurses of the institution. A great throng filled the church to its utmost capacity.

The class colors, purple and white, were shown in the beautiful decorations of white chrysanthemums and violets. Across the front of the church hung the class motto, "In His Steps." The diplomas were presented by Dr. Belle Wood Comstock, one of the instructors of the institution.

Dr. V. H. Lucas, business manager of the sanitarium, held the interested attention of the audience as he delivered the address of the evening on "The Medical Missionary's Life and Work." He mentioned the fact that the Seventh Day Adventists have not failed to appreciate the great value of the medical missionary in their evangelistic work. The denomination now has workers of this kind in practically every country which has been entered by evangelical denominations. The Adventists are operating 34 sanitariums and training schools for missionary nurses, of which 19 are in the United States and 15 in foreign countries. Continuing, Dr. Lucas said, in part:

"The Christian labor of the medical missionary nurse is coming to be regarded as more closely conforming to the example and life of the great Teacher than any other method of Christian service. Notwithstanding that modern Christianity has been slow to recognize the value of the medical missionary work, the idea is by no means a new one. It is as old as Christian effort.

"The nephew of the Korean monarch had sustained injuries in the civil war which threatened his life. The native surgeons were endeavoring to staunch the flow of blood by pouring in melted wax, when Dr. Allen, a devoted medical missionary, arrived on the scene. The native physicians stood back in amazement as they watched him clean and disinfect the wound, tie up the arteries and apply proper bandages. The success of this one effort led the emperor to exclaim: 'We must have such men and such surgery!' And as a result he erected the royal hospital, with this young surgeon at its head.

"In China, whose inhabitants comprise more than one-fourth of the earth's population, there are no native hospitals, no native asylums for the blind, no quarantine regulations, no knowledge of hygienic measures, and no knowledge of medicine, surgery or dentistry. How plain it is to be seen that if the untold suffering of the millions of this empire alone is relieved, it must be done through the efforts of Christian medical missionaries. And so we might go around the whole circle of missionary endeavor, to Japan, interior Africa, the East Indies, Central and South America and the islands of the South Pacific.

"Years ago Seventh Day Adventists established schools in connection with their leading sanitariums for the education of missionary nurses and physicians. These, by the blessing of Heaven, have accomplished a noble work in training scores of young men and young women for such labor among the various nationalities of the earth.

"The nurse must have more than abstract knowledge, more than the theory of books—she must possess wisdom and understanding to apply the knowledge of her calling properly, must understand the laws of health and nature of disease, and must be able to apply the science of healing to each particular condition. But better the missionary without the training of the nurse than the nurse without the missionary spirit.

"Your graduation this evening cannot be counted the end of your endeavor. Your efficiency as medical missionary nurses will be measured not only by your knowledge of scientific procedure in the treatment of disease, but as well by the knowledge of the science of missionary service. You must bring to the application of scientific principles the sympathetic touch of divine love.

"In your general deportment be truly noble. Do not get away from life's simplicity. Do not assume the professional tone. Aim to make every life touching yours stronger, purer, nobler. Accept kindly life's discipline. Forget yourself in your

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO IMPROVE A PORTION OF DORAN STREET IN SAID CITY.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do resolve as follows: SECTION 1. That the public interest and convenience require and it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale, State of California, to order the following improvement to be made in said City, to-wit:

First: That Doran Street from the Westerly line of Kenwood Street to the Easterly line of Louise Street be graded, oiled and macadamized in accordance with Map Number 185, Profile Number 286, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 21 for the paving with crushed rock, screenings and asphaltic oil of streets and avenues in the City of Glendale.

Second: That a cement curb be constructed along both lines of the roadway of Doran Street from the Westerly line of Kenwood Street to the Easterly line of Louise Street, in accordance with Map Number 185, Profile Number 286, and in further accordance with Specifications No. 12 for the construction of cement curbs in the City of Glendale, said curb to be of the class designated as Class "B" curb in said specifications.

Third: That a cement sidewalk five (5) feet in width be constructed along both sides of Doran Street from the Westerly line of Kenwood Street to the Easterly line of Louise Street, in accordance with Map Number 185, Profile Number 286, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 11 for the construction of cement sidewalks in the City of Glendale.

SECTION 2. All plans and profiles referred to in this Resolution are on file in the office of the City Engineer of said City. All Specifications referred to in this Resolution are on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City. Said plans, profiles and specifications are hereby referred to for a more particular description of said work and made a part hereof.

SECTION 3. The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent assessments of twenty-five dollars (\$25.00) or over for the cost of said work or improvement; said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable by coupon on the second day of January every year after their date until the whole is paid; and the interest shall be payable semi-annually, by coupon, on the second day of January and July, respectively, of each year, at the rate of seven (7) per cent per annum on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal and interest are paid. Said bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of an Act of the Legislature of the State of California entitled "An Act to provide a system of street improvement bonds to represent certain assessments for the cost of street work and improvements within municipalities, and also for the payment of such bonds," approved February 27, 1893, and of all acts supplementary thereto or amendatory thereof.

SECTION 4. The Glendale Evening News, a daily newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in said City of Glendale, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which this Resolution of Intention and notice of the passage thereof shall be published in the manner and by the persons required by law.

SECTION 5. The Superintendent of Streets of said City of Glendale is hereby directed to post notices of the passage of this Resolution in the manner and in the form required by law, and to cause a similar notice to be published by two insertions in said newspaper in the manner required by law.

SECTION 6. The City Clerk of said City of Glendale is hereby directed to post this Resolution of Intention conspicuously for two days on or near the Chamber Door of the Board of Trustees, and to cause the same to be published by two insertions in the manner required by law in said newspaper, and also to mail to each property owner whose property is to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses of said improvement, a postal card containing notice of the passage of this Resolution, and calling attention to the fact that said property is to be assessed for said improvement.

RESOLUTION OF INTENTION NO. 770

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE DECLARING ITS INTENTION TO IMPROVE A PORTION OF EIGHTH STREET IN SAID CITY AND CONSTRUCT AN OPEN CONCRETE CONDUIT LEADING THERETO, IN SAID CITY.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. That the public interest and convenience require and it is the intention of the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale, State of California to order the following improvement to be made in said city, to-wit:

First: That Eighth Street from a line drawn parallel with and twelve feet westerly from the Easterly line of Verdugo Road to a point 1012 feet Easterly therefrom, be graded, oiled and macadamized in accordance with Map Number 186, Profile Number 397, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 21 for the paving with crushed rock, screenings and asphaltic oil of streets and avenues in the City of Glendale.

Second: That a cement curb be constructed along both lines of the roadway of Eighth Street from a line drawn parallel with and twelve feet westerly from the Easterly line of Verdugo Road to a point 1012 feet Easterly therefrom, in accordance with Map Number 186, Profile Number 397, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 12 for the construction of cement curbs in the City of Glendale, said curb to be of the class designated as Class "B" curb in said specifications.

Third: That a cement sidewalk five (5) feet in width be constructed along the south side of Eighth Street from the east line of Verdugo Road to a point 1000 feet Easterly therefrom, in accordance with Map Number 186, Profile Number 397, and in further accordance with Specifications Number 11 for the construction of cement sidewalks in the City of Glendale.

Fourth: That an open concrete conduit, together with the necessary appurtenances thereto, be constructed along and over that certain easement six feet in width secured for that purpose along the east six feet of Lot 20 of Tract Number 1171, as per map recorded in book 17, page 172 of maps, records of Los Angeles County, California. Said conduit to be constructed in accordance with Map Number 186.

SECTION 2. That the said contemplated work or improvement in the opinion of said Board of Trustees is of more than local or ordinary public

benefit and said Board of Trustees hereby declares that the district in the said City of Glendale benefited by said work or improvement, and to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses thereof, is described as follows:

All that portion of the City of Glendale included within the following described exterior boundary line, to-wit:

Commencing at the southeast corner of Rock Glen Avenue and Verdugo Road. Thence Southerly along the East line of said Verdugo Road to a point situated 563.70 feet North from the South city boundary line of the City of Glendale. Thence Easterly parallel with the Southerly city boundary line to an intersection with the Easterly boundary line of said city. Thence Northerly, Westerly, Northerly, Easterly and Northerly along the boundary line of said City of Glendale to a point 552.70 feet Northerly from the North line of Colorado Street. Thence Westerly parallel with the North line of Colorado Street 1008.84 feet. Thence due South to the North line of Tract Number 1171, as per map recorded in book 17, page 172 of maps, records of Los Angeles County, California. Thence West along the Northerly line of said tract to the Northwest corner of Lot 6 of said tract. Thence Southerly along the Westerly line of said lot and the Southerly prolongation thereof to the South line of Rock Glen Avenue. Thence West along the South line of Rock Glen Avenue to the point of beginning, excepting therefrom any portion of any public street or alley included within the above described assessment district. This description is general only. Reference is hereby made to Map Number 186, adopted for said work, in which the assessment district referred to is shown within blue colored border lines.

SECTION 3. The City Engineer is directed to make a diagram of the property affected or benefited by the proposed work or improvement as described in the Resolution of Intention and to be assessed to pay the expenses thereof. Such diagram shall show each separate lot, piece or parcel of land, the area in square feet in each of said lots, pieces or parcels of land, the relative location of the same to the work proposed to be done, all within the limits of the assessment district.

SECTION 4. All plans and profiles referred to in this Resolution are on file in the office of the City Engineer of said City. All Specifications referred to in this Resolution are on file in the office of the City Clerk of said City. Said Plans, Profiles and Specifications are hereby referred to for a more parti-

cular description of said work and made a part hereof.

SECTION 5. The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale determines that serial bonds shall be issued to represent assessments of twenty-five (\$25.00) dollars or over for the cost of said work or improvement; said serial bonds shall extend over a period ending nine (9) years from and after the second day of January next succeeding the date of said bonds, and an even annual proportion of the principal sum thereof shall be payable, by coupon, on the second day of January every year after their date until the whole is paid; and the interest shall be payable semi-annually, by coupon, on the second days of January and July, respectively, of each year, at the rate of seven (7) per cent per annum on all sums unpaid, until the whole of said principal and interest are paid. Said Bonds shall be issued in accordance with the provisions of an act of the Legislature of the State of California, entitled "An Act to provide a system of street improvement bonds to represent certain assessments for the cost of street work and improvement within municipalities, and also for the payment of such bonds," approved February 27, 1895, and of all acts supplementary thereto or amendatory thereof.

SECTION 6. The Glendale Evening News, a daily newspaper of general circulation, published and circulated in said City of Glendale, is hereby designated as the newspaper in which this Resolution of Intention and notice of the passage thereof shall be published in the manner and by the persons required by law.

SECTION 7. The Superintendent of Streets of said City of Glendale is hereby directed to post notices of the passage of this Resolution in the manner and in the form required by law, and to cause a similar notice to be published by two insertions in said newspaper in the manner required by law.

SECTION 8. The City Clerk of said City of Glendale is hereby directed to post this Resolution of Intention conspicuously for two days on or near the chamber door of the Board of Trustees, and to cause the same to be published by two insertions in the manner required by law, in said newspaper, and also to mail to each property owner whose property is to be assessed to pay the costs and expenses of said improvement, a postal card containing notice of the passage of this Resolution, and calling attention to the fact that said property is to be assessed for said improvement.

A RESOLUTION OF THE BOARD OF TRUSTEES OF THE CITY OF GLENDALE ORDERING CERTAIN IMPROVEMENTS TO BE MADE ON A PORTION OF CANADA BOULEVARD AND IN AND ALONG A PORTION OF VERDUGO WASH IN SAID CITY.

The Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale do resolve as follows:

SECTION 1. That the improvement herein described is required by the public interest and convenience, and the Board of Trustees of the City of Glendale, State of California, hereby orders the improvement to be made on a portion of Canada Boulevard and in and along a portion of Verdugo Wash by the construction of a steel and concrete bridge and grading and protection work described in Resolution of Intention Number 760, to which said Resolution reference is hereby made for a description of said work.

Said notice shall require all proposals or bids offered to be accompanied by a certified check or bond, either, as prescribed by law, and for an amount not less than ten per cent of the aggregate of the proposal. Said City Clerk is also hereby directed to publish this Resolution for two days, in the manner required by law, in said newspaper designated for that purpose, as aforesaid.
