Uncle Sam's Forest Rangers!

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
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THEME

THROUGH A LITTLE GOOD TURN BY Uncle Sam's Forest Rangers, trees from our great National Forests in Alaska may soon be growing on the bare snow-swept hills of Iceland. Recently, The regional office of the United States Forest Service in Juneau, Alaska, sent to the government of Iceland fifty-five pounds of tree seeds - fifty pounds of Sitka spruce seeds and five pounds of white birch—— For a thousand years the sturdy little democracy of Iceland hasn't had enough wood even for fuel. Lumber and the many other timber articles so important to comfortable living in any country have to be brought in at high cost. So, while Iceland today serves as an important out-post in the present defense against aggression we hope that this little gift from America's foresters will flourish mightily in Iceland and add to the comforts and economic welfare of its people in years to come.


