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


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



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#### REPORT

OF THE

## BOARD OF DIRECTORS.

#### PHILADELPHIA, April 27th, 1905.

The Board of Directors of the Zoological Society of Philadelphia presents to the members and loanholders its thirty-third annual report, for the year ending February 28th, 1905.

The species not previously exhibited in the collection were as follows:—

#### MAMMALIA.

1. Felis planiceps Vig. & Hors. Rusty Cat.

Hab., Malacca.

A specimen of this rare and beautiful species was purchased on April 10th, but like many of the very small cats it did not thrive in captivity, and lived but a short time.

2. Spilogale ringens Merr. Snarling Skunk.

Hab., Georgia and Alabama.

One example of this species, a representative of the little striped skunks, was received from Baker County, Georgia, on February 9th.

3. Mellivora indica (Kerr.) Indian Ratel.

Hab., India.

This near relative of the badgers has never before been offered for the collection. One specimen was purchased on April 10th.

4. Spermophilus beecheyi (Rich.) Beechey's Spermophile.

Hab., California.

Two examples, from Santa Cruz County. Purchased.

5. Hystrix longicauda Mars. Malaccan Porcupine.

Hab., Malacca; Sumatra.

A porcupine received at the Gardens in 1903 has remained in such poor external condition that it was only lately that satisfactory identification become possible.

6. Bos depressicornis (H. Smith.) Anoa.

Hab., Celebes.

This species, which is a dwarf representative of the Indian buffalo, not much exceeding three feet in height at the shoulder, has long been desired at the Gardens, and an adult male was finally purchased on April 18th. Through the summer it was kept in the cattle pens, but late in the autumn it showed much susceptibility to cold and was placed in the Antelope House for the winter.

7. Thylacomys lagotis Reid. Rabbit-eared Bandicoot.

Hab., western Australia.

One example of this curious marsupial. Purchased May 11th.

#### AVES.

8. Monticola erythrogaster (Vig.) Chestnut-bellied Rock-thrush.

Hab., India.

One specimen. Purchased April 16th.

9. Myiophoneus temmincki Vig. Yellow-billed Whistling-thrush.

Hab., southern Asia.

One specimen. Purchased June 11th.

10. Garrulax albigularis Gould. White-throated Jay-thrush. Hab., India.

One specimen. Purchased April 16th.

11. Pyctoris sinensis (Gm.) Golden-eyed Babbler.

Hab., India; Siam.

Two specimens. Purchased April 10th.

12. Tanagra darwini Bp. Darwin's Tanager.

Hab., Bolivia; Ecuador.

One example, received in January, 1904, has been heretofore unidentified by reason of incomplete plumage.

13. Munia pectoralis (Gould.) White-breasted Finch.

Hab., Australia.

Two specimens. Purchased November 5th.

14. Poëphila personata Gould. Masked Grass-finch.

Hab., Australia.

Two specimens. Purchased April 19th.

The series of these beautiful weavers has been almost complete, five out of the six known species having been shown in the collection.

15. Melopyrrha nigra (L.) Cuban Bullfinch.

Hab., Cuba.

Two specimens. Purchased April 5th.

16. Spizella pallida (Sw.) Clay-colored Sparrow.

Hab., western United States.

Six specimens. Purchased May 12th. From Seymour, Texas.

17. Cassidix oryzivora (Gm.) Rice Grackle.

Hab., South America.

One specimen. Purchased September 22d.

18. Xanthocephalus xanthocephalus (Bp.) Yellow-headed Blackbird.

Hab., western North America.

Five specimens. Purchased May 12th. From Seymour, Texas.

19. Icterus parisorum Bp. Scott's Troupial. Hab., Texas; Mexico.

One specimen. Purchased April 9th.

20. Icterus bullocki (Sw.) Bullock's Troupial.
Hab., western United States; Mexico.
One pair. Purchased April 9th.

21. Garrulus lanceolatus Vig. Himalayan Jay.

\* Hab., Himalayas.

One specimen. Purchased April 16th.

22. Megalæma virens (Bodd.) Great Barbet.Hab., China; Japan.One specimen. Purchased April 16th.

23. Rhamphastos ambiguus (Sw.) Doubtful Toucan. Hab., Colombia; Peru.

One specimen. Purchased May 11th. 24. Pteroglossus aracari (L.) One-banded Toucan.

Hab., Guiana.

One specimen. Received in exchange April 2d.

25. Conurus wagleri G. R. Gray. Wagler's Conure. Hab., Venezuela; Colombia.

One specimen. Purchased September 21st.

26. Accipiter atricapillus (Wils.) American Goshawk.

Hab., Canada; northern United States.

Three examples, taken from the nest by Mr. Otto Behr, of Lopez, Sullivan County, Pa., and presented by him on June 14th, are of interest, the breeding records of the species in this State being few.

27. Falco vespertinus L. Red-footed Kestrel.

Hab., southeastern Europe.

A male and female of this beautiful falcon were presented on September 20th by Mr. P. Scheffler, second officer of the steamship "Energie." They were taken by him on the Black Sea, twenty miles off the Roumanian coast.

28. Falco subbuteo L. Hobby.

Hab., Europe; Asia.

One specimen. Purchased December 1st.

29. Falco sparverioides Vig. Cuban Sparrow Hawk. Hab., Cuba.

One specimen. Purchased September 21st.

30. Columba gymnopthalma Temm. & Kn. Bare-eyed Pigeon. Hab., Venezuela.

One specimen from Curacao. Purchased May 11th.

31. Goura sclateri Salvad. Sclater's Crowned Pigeon. Hab., New Guinea.

A pair of this fine species. Purchased May 11th.

32. Larus philadelphia (Ord.) Bonaparte's Gull. Hab., North America. One specimen. Purchased November 21st.

33. Ajaja ajaja (L.) Roseate Spoonbill. Hab., tropical America.

One specimen. Purchased August 24th.

34. Plegadis guarana (L.) White-faced Glossy Ibis. Hab., tropical America.

One specimen. Purchased August 24th.

#### REPTILIA.

35. Uromastix spinipes (Daud.) Egyptian Mastigure. Hab., Egypt; Arabia. One specimen. Purchased August 23d.

36. Gerrhonotus burnetti Gray. Burnett's Lizard.

Hab., California.

A number of these lizards were received during the autumn from Santa Cruz County.

37. Ameiva exul Cope. Wandering Lizard.

Hab., Porto Rico; St. Thomas.

One specimen from Porto Rico. Purchased September 28th.

38. Lacerta muralis tiliquerta Gm. Greenish Wall Lizard. Hab., southern Europe. Six specimens. Purchased February 2d.

39. Eutaenia butleri Cope. Butler's Garter Snake.

Hab., Indiana to Michigan.

A number of specimens of this snake have been recently collected by Mr. A. G. Ruthven, of the University of Michigan, and the study which he has made of them goes far towards establishing this rather anomalous form as a distinct species, which up to the present time has been found only in a few localities from southeastern Indiana to southern Michigan. Through Mr. Ruthven's kindness two of his specimens were added to the collection.

40. Dryophis mycterizans (L.) Long-nosed Snake.

Hab., India; Burma; Ceylon.

One specimen. Purchased August 5th.

41. Vipera aspis (L.) Asp Viper. Hab., southern Europe.

42. Vipera russelli Shaw. Russell's Viper. Hab., India; Burma; Ceylon.

43. Cerastes vipera (L.) Cerastes Viper.

Hab., north Africa.

Examples of the three vipers named above were purchased in August.

#### BATRACHIA.

44. Rana esculenta (L.) Edible Frog.

Hab., Europe.

Three specimens. Purchased October 4th.

45. Rana draytoni B. & G. Drayton's Frog.

Hab., Oregon; California.

One specimen from Santa Cruz County, California.

46. Rana virescens brachycephala Cope. Western Brook Frog. Hab., western United States.

Eight specimens from Seymour, Texas. Purchased.

47. Bufo boreas B. & G. Pacific Toad.

Hab., Washington; California.

Two specimens from Santa Cruz County, California.

48. Bufo compactilis Wieg. Short-bodied Toad.

Hab., Texas; Mexico.

Several specimens from Seymour, Texas.

49. Leptodactylus albilabris Gunth. White-lipped Frog. Hab., Antilles.

One specimen from Porto Rico. Purchased.

50. Chorophilus triseriatus (Wied.) Clarke's Tree Frog. Hab., Texas.

Several specimens of the Texas form sometimes separated as *C. clarkii* B. & G., were received from Seymour on July 4th.

51. Scaphiopus couchi Bd. Couch's Spade-foot Toad.

Hab., southwestern United States.

Several specimens received from Seymour, Texas, in May. These curious toads usually escape capture owing to their subterranean habits, and are not common in collections.

52. Diemyctylus torosus (Esch.) Warty Newt.

Hab., California to Alaska.

Six specimens from Santa Cruz County, California.

53. Chondrotus microstomum Cope. Small-mouthed Salamander.

Hab., Mississippi Valley.

Four specimens from St. Clair County, Illinois. Presented April 25th by Mr. Julius Hurter, St. Louis, Mo.

54. Chondrotus tenebrosus (B. & G.) Mottled Salamander.

Hab., Oregon; California.

One specimen of this large, fine species, from Santa Cruz, was purchased on December 25th.

Among other arrivals of special interest the following may be noted:—

An emperor boa (Boa imperator) from Curacao, and a young puma from Colombia, presented in April by Mr. William Bartels and Mr. F. Mitchell, of New York. Specimens of the fishing cat (Felis viverrina) and Bengalese cat (F. bengalensis), purchased April 10th. A female echidna was purchased on April 16th. This animal has gone through the winter in good health, and after a year's captivity appears to be thriving. A male concave-casqued hornbill (Dichoceros bicornis) was purchased in April, being the first of this species possessed by the Society since 1880. By a fortunate chance a female was secured in May, and the presence of a pair of these fine birds in the Aviary has attracted much attention. At the same time a pair of Asiatic white cranes were received.

A number of rare batrachians were presented in April and May by Mr. Julius Hurter, of St. Louis, among which were examples of the long-tailed salamander (Spelerpes longicaudus),

the small-mouthed salamander (*Chondrotus microstomum*) and Brimley's newt (*Desmognathus brimleyorum*).

On May 24th Mrs. Harry Nuding presented specimens of wood ibis, tree ducks, red-breasted guan and white-eye-browed guan, from Brazil.

A low-crested iguana (*Cyclura baelopha*) and a swift snake (*Dromicus angulifer*), both from New Providence, Bahamas, were presented on October 1st by Mr. F. Mitchell, of New York.

A red-faced spider monkey (*Ateles paniscus*) from Guiana, was received on October 17th as a gift from Miss E. Adele Sproat. The species has not often been represented in the collection.

A pair of Brazilian tapirs were received on November 17th from Mr. Harry Nuding, of Para, who has made many valuable gifts to the Society. They were accompanied by a capybara, a collared peccary and three red brockets.

On February 26th a pair of Bactrian camels were purchased. These animals came from the Kirghiz Steppes, Siberia.

The last annual report referred to the proposed erection of a Pathological Laboratory and Infirmary at the Gardens. This was completed before the end of the year, a large part of the cost being met by the appropriation of \$5000 from the City Councils. The building is 72 by 32 feet in size and contains a receiving room, an infirmary, an operating room, and a laboratory. A cold storage vault and an incinerating furnace are connected with it. The laboratory was opened for work on February 11th with a full equipment of apparatus, which the Society owes to the generosity of one of its Directors, and it is proposed that as far as possible, all animals dying in the Gardens shall be submitted to thorough examination of all morbid conditions which can be detected. Some lines of experimental work in the direction of preventive treatment of communicable diseases are already in progress.

As far as is known, no such institution containing equal facilities for the study of disease in wild animals exists in a zoological garden elsewhere.

The only other new work undertaken was an extension of the series of owl cages on the cross-walk south of the Deer Park.

Under the present plans it is hoped that before the end of the summer the facilities for outdoor exhibition of native mammals and birds may be very considerably increased.

147. Black-eared Marmoset (*Hapale pencillata*). Probably an acute infection.

148. Musky Lorikeet (Glossopsittacus concinnus).

Acute catarrhal enteritis. Adeno-carcinoma of lung.

149. Anubis Baboon (Papio anubis).

General tuberculosis.

150. Sooty Mangabey (*Cercocebus fuliginosus*).

Tuberculosis of lungs, spleen, and mesenteric lymph glands.

151. White-eared Conure (*Conurus leucotis*). Acute catarrhal enteritis.

152. Cactus Conure (*Conurus cactorum*).

Pathological examination negative.

153. Common Marmoset (Hapale jacchus).

Acute infection. Suppurative myocarditis. Acute splenitis. Adenoma of skin of scrotum.

154. Patagonian Conure (Conurus patagonus).

Pathological examination negative.

155. Globose Curassow (*Crax globicera*). General tuberculosis.

156. Muis Deer (*Tragulus memmina*).

Pathological examination negative.

157. Blood-breasted Pigeon (*Phlogænas luzonica*).

Peritoneal hemorrhage from rupture of the spleen.

Broncho-pneumonia. Toxic nephritis.

158. Yellow Baboon (*Papio cynocephalus*). General tuberculosis.

159. Red Fox (*Canis vulpes pennsylvanicus*). Perforating wound of abdomen.

160. White-crowned Pigeon (Columba leucocephala).
General tuberculosis.

161. Black Lemur (*Lemur macaco*).

Interstitial nephritis. Catarrhal enteritis.

162. Yellow Baboon (*Papio cynocephalus*). General tuberculosis.

163. Rhesus Macaque (*Macacus rhesus*). General tuberculosis.

164. Ring-tailed Coati (Nasica rufa).
Pulmonary and renal tuberculosis.

165. Rhesus Macaque (*Macacus rhesus*). General tuberculosis.

166. Texas Rattlesnake (*Crotalus atrox*). Pathological examination negative.

167. Raccoon (Procyon lotor).

Pathological examination negative.

168. Spotted-tailed Dasyure (Dasyurus maculatus).

Primary cancer of the small intestine, with metastatic nodules in liver, spleen, lungs, and peritoneal lymph glands. Small abscess in the lung from streptococcus infection.

169. Red-necked Wallaby (*Macropus ruficollis*). Pathological examination negative.

170. American Otter (*Lutra canadensis*).

Pathological examination negative.

171. Cinereus Eagle (Haliatus albicillus).

Malignant endocarditis. Atheroma of heart valves. Miliary abscesses of liver and spleen.

172. Brown Cebus (Cebus fatuellus).

Hemorrhage into medulla and upper part of cord.

173. Douroucouli (*Nyctipithecus trivirgatus*). Pathological examination negative.

174. Black Swan (*Cygnus atratus*).

Pathological examination negative.

175. Common Marmoset (*Hapale jacchus*).

Interstitial nephritis. Emphysema of lungs.

176. Kinkajou (Cercoleptes caudivolvulus).

Tape worms from one to two inches in length in stomach and intestines. Fatty degeneration of liver.

177. Green Monkey (*Cercopithecus callitrichus*). General tuberculosis.

178, 179, 180. Three Hellbenders (*Menopoma allegheniensis*).

Post-mortem degeneration too great for pathological examination.

181. Entellus Monkey (Semnopithecus entellus).

Dilatation of the stomach. Dislocation of liver, with division of liver into five lobes.

182. Brant Goose (Branta bernicla).

Peritoneal hemorrhage of unknown origin.

183. Rhesus Macaque (*Macacus rhesus*). General tuberculosis.

184. Indian Python (Python molurus).

Large number of tape worms from three to eight inches in length in the large intestine. Resulting ulceration of the colon.

185. Red-fronted Amazon (*Chrysotis vittata*).

Acute enteritis. Necrosis of the liver.

186. Echidna (Echidna aculeata).

Pathological examination negative.

187. Rhesus Monkey (*Macacus rhesus*). General tuberculosis.

188. Common Macaque (Macacus cynomolgus). General tuberculosis.

189. Black-handed Spider Monkey (Ateles geoffroyi).
Miliary abscesses of liver.

190. Green Jay (*Xanthura luxuosa*).

Pathological examination negative.

191. Gray Parrot (*Psittacus erythacus*). Acute enteritis.

192. Black Bear (*Ursus americanus*). Gastric ulcer. Gastro-enteritis.

193. Sooty Mangabey (*Cercocebus fuliginosus*). General tuberculosis.

194. Gray Wood Rat (*Neotoma micropus*).

Tumor of the pelvis of undetermined character.

195. Anubis Baboon (Papio anubis).

Follicular enteritis. Purulent pneumonia (non-tuber-cular).

196. Moor Macaque (Macacus maurus).

Chronic obliterating pleurisy. Emphysema. Cardiac hypertrophy. Parasite in submucosa of intestine.

197, 198. Pale-headed Parrakeets (*Platycercus pallidiceps*). Pathological examination negative.

199. Pig-tailed Monkey (*Macacus nemestrinus*). General tuberculosis.

200. Gray Wolf (Canis lupus mexicanus).

Pathological examination negative.

- 201. Three-banded Douroucouli (*Nyctipithecus trivirgatus*). Pathological examination negative.
- 202. Rhesus Macaque (*Macacus rhesus*). Broncho-pneumonia (non-tubercular).
- 203. Black Bear (*Ursus americanus*).

  Medullary cancer of the breast, with metastasis to the lungs.
- 204. Mongoose Lemur (*Lemur mongoz*). General tuberculosis.
- 205. Red-necked Wallaby (*Macropus ruficollis*). Chronic gastritis with acute exacerbation.
- 206. Red-necked Wallaby (Macropus ruficollis). Pathological examination negative.
- 207. White-nosed Monkey (*Cercopithecus petaurista*). Follicular enteritis. Beginning interstitial nephritis.
- 208. Gray-cheeked Mangabey (Cercocebus albigena).
  Chronic enteritis with acute exacerbation.
- 209. Black Lemur (*Lemur macaco*). Acute enteritis with enlarged follicles. Emphysema of lungs.
- 210. Sulphur-breasted Toucan (*Rhamphastos carinatus*). Acute enteritis.
- 211. Japanese Macaque (Macacus fuscatus).

An acute infection. Moderate enteritis, acute splenitis, enlargement of peritoneal lymph glands, local necrosis of the liver.

- 212. Common Macaque (Macacus cynomolgus). General tuberculosis.
- 213. Gray Parrot (*Psittacus erythacus*). Pathological examination negative.
