




Sowing the Seed. A good rule to follow is to cover seed three times their depth. If sown too thickly always thin out. You gain nothing by crowding. The richer the soil the better the results.

Helpful Flower Garden Hints

Annuals. These head the list for general use on account of their habit of blooming and reaching their full growth in the same season as sown. According to class they are used in every conceivable location, for masses, borders, baskets, window boxes, with perennial flowers and shrubs. The slower growing plants as the Snapdragon. Salpiglossis, Verbena, Scabiosa, etc., should be started in the house or cold frames during January, February, and March. The annual Larkspur, Stocks, Asters, are best started in April. The quick germinating varieties, Alyssum, Clarkia, California Poppies, etc., do very well started out of doors and may be planted as late as the middle of June in the latitude of New York.

Perennials. As the garden fever is at its height in the spring, we recommend the sowing of Perennial seed at that time. Perennials are valued for their habit of growing and blooming year after year without resowing. They produce the earliest blooming and are usually the last in flower before freeze up. They are the best for permanent backgrounds and borders.

Shrubs. The best part of two years is gained by buying our two-year-old shrubs. The flowering types bloom the first season and grow in volume and splendor with each succeeding year.

Window Boxes. The most effective means for adorning the exterior of the house and porch.

Color Combination. See page 1 for best means of selecting your flowers and shrubs according to colors. Quality. A half-century experience is behind every seed we sell. Guaranteed to be the best possible to obtain anywhere, or your money refunded.

The Seed Flat. A good size for a box is 16 or 18 inches wide, 24 or 30 inches long, and 3 or 4 inches deep. Fill to a depth within $\frac{1}{2}$ inch of top with finely sifted soil, best composed of part soil, part sand and part fertilizer or humus. Good topsoil from woodland or pasture will suit. Level the soil by passing a ruler or straight stick across it. Make furrows about 2 inches apart, by pressing the sharp edge of ruler into the soil; sow to a depth of 3 times the size of the seed. Label the end of each row with the name of seeds you sow. After sowing and covering with soil, place several thicknesses of newspaper over the soil until young plants begin to come up. Keep the soil moist, also try to maintain a temperature above 60°. After the seedlings begin to push through the soil, the paper may be removed.

Abutilon (Flowering Maple) Grows rapidly from seed and is soon in bloom. This may be used as a garden annual; but it is better kept in the house in a pot or window box. Handled like Geranium or Fuchsia it is of the earliest culture. The large drooping flowers range from yellow to orange, salmon, pink and white. A charming plant. Why not raise your own? It's easy.

Achillea (*Sneezewort*) A hardy herbaceous 2 feet high, blooming all summer long and specially good for cutting and in vases or mixed bouquets.


Alyssum (Sweet Alyssum) A hardy, free - flowering annual, one of the most popular for low borders, edgings, pots, baskets, window boxes and rock work. Sow thickly as early in the spring as possible and every three or four weeks thereafter; August sown plants may be lifted and taken indoors for winter flowers. A plant that seems to be petering out, if cut back to the ground will usually make new growth.

How To Grow **Famous** Asters

The main essentials to insure fine Asters are a rich soil fair cultivating, and plenty of room between plants and plenty of water. When wanted for cutting with long stems they should be set out not closer than 12 inches apart in rows, and two feet between the rows. When wanted in mass effects in beds they may be planted nine inches

apart each way. For early flowering, the seed should be started in the house in early March. or in the hot bed in April. transplanting when all danger of frost is over.

A delightfully cool looking plant, especially fine combined with yellows, and for table decorations.

Antirrhinum (Snapdragon)

The Snapdragon is really a perennial and with a little protection or in a sheltered place will generally last for several years. But it will bloom well the first season from seed. Be sure to have some in your borders. The plants themselves are handsome; the sturdy, upright flower spikes of many colors give an air of aristocracy to the garden over a long period; and when cut they make unsurpassed decor-ative material. Their erect independence lends real character to the vase or basket arrangement in which they are used.

Sow the seed not too thickly and when transplanting the seedlings firm the soil around them well. By nipping back the growing plants from time to time you can induce bushiness without hurting the blooms—in fact it will tend to make them denser and larger flowered, too. The two types offered, namely, the tall and the half-tall sorts—both with large, perfect flowers-give one a chance to secure the most exquisite effects under a variety of garden circumstances.

The Calendula or Marigold is the classic "gold flower" of the ancient Greeks, used at their greatest festivals. But we needn't envy them, for we can have it in our gardens in abundance and in far greater perfection, with no trouble at all.

Calendula Shakespeare knew it as "Mary-gold," but probably as a much smaller, less effective flower than anyone can now raise from the improved seed offered. One of the easiest of annuals to grow, the seed starting quickly when sown outdoors either in midspring or (for winter house plants) in August; the plants transplanting easily and blooming until the heavy frosts and the double and semi-double flowers presenting a shimmering mass of yellow and orange gold. A light but rich soil is best, but results can be secured anywhere. Pick the flowers before they go to seed.



Fortunately you can have them in abundance if you will provide a deep, cool. friable seedbed, rich in humus and rotted cow manure. Start seed early to get the benefit of the cool weather; and plants should bloom by July. Or sow in midsummer in a lightly shaded bed kept moist; winter in coldframe and early the next spring set out to bloom where there is plenty of light and air.



What is more delicious than fresh cut Asparagus from your own garden? A good bed is a treasure to have, and you can easily have one if you take a little care in planting it.

To plant an Asparagus bed, first dig a trench about $2\frac{1}{2}$ ft. deep, fill in with 6 inches of well rotted stable manure, cover this with 4 inches of rich soil. Then plant the Asparagus roots. Be sure that the roots are carefully spread out, resembling a spider. Cover this with three inches of soil. Then, as the Asparagus grows, keep filling in a little soil at a time until you have the bed level. It will take a year before you have filled in your trench.

Keep the bed well cultivated. Each fall put on a good quantity of well rotted stable manure and dig in in the spring. After the Asparagus is up in the spring, sprinkle on the bed some common pulverized salt.

sprinkle on the bed some common pulverized salt. Never cut too closely. The roots need the benefit of some foliage. Also they will weaken and die. Use paris green or air-slaked lime to kill slugs. **SEED.** Sow the seed thinly in rows 1 foot apart

SEED. Sow the seed thinly in rows 1 foot apart during April or May. Four pounds to the acre or one ounce to a 50 ft. row. Later thin out to 3 or 4 inches in the row, saving only the strongest.





Tender BEETS and How to Grow Them

While Beets may readily be grown in any kind of soil, they prefer a deep, rich, loam, free from stones.

Seeds are sown as early in the spring as the ground can be properly prepared, the gardener **should walk over the rows**, setting one foot before the other, as shown in illustration alongside. Walking over the row after seeds are sown will press the soil in firm contact with the seeds and accomplish the desired result.

Sown in rows 18 to 24 inches apart, and should be covered with about $\frac{1}{4}$ inch of soil. Now here is the second detail to watch:—As soon as the seedlings are 4 inches tall they should be thinned out to stand about 4 inches apart in the row. 

Briefly, for green vegetables, lettuce is the all

American dish the year around, and can be grown by anyone from the earliest spring until freeze up. The proper selection of varieties is the prime factor. Great Crops of Fine TOMATOES

The uses of Tomatoes in the diet continue to spread and multiply with such rapidity that its range of usefulness is destined to be the largest and most varied of the vegetables. Tomatoes are especially rich in vitamines, that great essential for normal growth in children and continued health and strength in children and adults.
