SAMUEL A. MILLER was born in Washington county, Tenn., where he was converted, joined the Church, and was licensed to preach. In the fall of 1836, he was received on trial in the Holston Conference, and traveled eleven years. In 1847, he was married to Miss Walls, of Hancock county, Tenn., and at the end of that Conference-year he located, and remained in the local ranks for fourteen years, during which time he was employed four years in the pastoral work within the Rogersville District. At the Conference of 1861, he was reädmitted to the itinerant work, as a member of the Holston Conference, and appointed to the Kingsport Circuit, where he performed a year's faithful and useful labor. At the ensuing Conference, he was sent to the Jonesville Circuit. He entered early and earnestly upon his work on that circuit, and continued his labors until stricken down by typhoid fever. His last days on earth were passed at the house of Mr. William Carnes, in Lee county, Va. Here he received from the kind family every needful attention. Doctors Loyd and Spencer kindly waited upon him, exerting all their skill for his recovery. But his labors were ended, and after an illness of three weeks, he closed his earthly career in great peace. Brother Miller was a devoted Christian, a useful minis-ter of the gospel, a kind husband, and an affec-tionate father. His wife and several children died a few years before him. One daughter, several relatives, and many friends survive to mourn their loss. He died Jan. 11, 1863.

W. W. SMITH was born in Washington county, Tennessee, Feb. 11, 1814. His parents were pious members of the M. E. Church, who taught him the fear of the Lord in early childhood; and in him was exemplified the proverb, "Train up a child in the way he should go, and when he is old he will not depart from it." In early

life he sought and found the Saviour, and continued his devoted follower until dismissed from earthly labor and taken to his glorious rest. He was licensed to preach in 1844, but con-tinued in the local ranks until 1851. In Octo-ber of that year, at the session held in Athens, Tenn., he was admitted on trial in the Holston Conference, and appointed to Pattonsville Cir-cuit, in the Rogersville District. In 1852, he labored on the Taylorsville Circuit, and then was two years on the Watauga Mission. At the Conference held in Jonesboro, November, 1855, he was admitted into full connection, ordained deacon by Bishop Paine, and appointed to the Saltville Circuit. His next field of labor was Sneedville. At the Conference of 1857, he was ordained elder by Bishop Early, and sent to the Tazewell Circuit. From the Conference of 1858, he was sent to the Jefferson Circuit. Webster, North Carolina, enjoyed his labors for two years, viz., from 1849 to 1851. At the conclusion of his labors on that circuit, he was appointed to the Sulphur Spring Circuit. There he performed a successful year's labor, and was reāppointed to the circuit from the Conference at Athens, in the autumn of 1862—a singular coincidence, that his first and last appointments were from Athens, Tenn., at neither of which sessions was he present. He continued his labors during the session of the Conference, and to the people it was a welcome announcement as the preachers returned from Conference, that Brother Smith was to continue to serve them. He was a man of rather delicate constitution, but was constant and faithful in his efforts to do good. He seldom failed to meet an appointment—never when it was practicable to attend. A pious, devoted minister, always cheerfully performing the work to which he was sent, acceptably and usefully. At his third quarterly-meeting he was taken sick, but improving a little, he continued his labors, and nearly completed another round on his circuit. He preached his last sermon at Sulphur Springs Church, June 6, 1863; a chronic diarrhea then set in, from which he never recovered. He suffered uncomplainingly, until Sept. 21, 1863, when he gently fell asleep in Jesus. Two days before his death, he conversed familiarly with his now disconsolate widow of his probable death, designated the place of his interment, and named a minis-ter to attend his burial and preach at the time a funeral-sermon. He contemplated his death with perfect composure, and conscious that the end had come, he distinctly uttered the prayer, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit!"

BENJAMIN T. CROUCH, son of the late eminent minister of the same name in Kentucky, was born and brought up in that State. In early life he embraced religion, and identified himself with the Church. He was admitted on trial in the Memphis Conference, at the session held at Paducah, Ky., in 1851; and after two or three years of acceptable and useful service, he volunteered to go as a missionary to California, where he labored faithfully and efficiently. In California he was married to her who now weeps in lonely widowhood. Subsequently he returned to the regular work in the Memphis Conference, and was diligently and successfully engaged in his ministerial labors, till the inauguration of the fearful war in which our country is now involved, when, actuated by pious and patriotic principles, he entered the service as Chaplain to Lieutenant-colonel Cavalry Battalion, and continued therewith when the command was reörganized as the First Tennessee Cavalry Regiment, under Colonel Jackson, to whom he acted also as volunteer aid in their several engagements with the enemy. Last spring he accom-panied Major-general Van Dorn's command to Middle Tennessee, where he was placed on Brigadier-general Jackson's staff; and while gallantly leading a regiment in the memorable battle of Thompson's Station, he fell, pierced by a ball, and expired in a few moments. His compan-ions in arms buried him decently in the cemetery at Spring Hill, Tenn., where his remains await the resurrection morn. Brother Crouch was of an exceedingly impulsive temperamentardent in his feelings, social in his habits, and much devoted to his friends. He was also remarkable for his bravery, the thickly-flying missiles of death not in the least intimidating him, nor deterring him from the prompt and faithful performance of what he conscientiously regarded as his duty. Brigadier-general Jack-son, who was his warm friend, has formally testified to his consistent Christian deportment, not only in the fatal hour of death, but also during his entire connection with the army. Besides, we learn that on the Sabbath before his death, he attended a quarterly-meeting and partook of the Lord's-supper, and afterward, in a conversation with the Presiding Elder, expressed himself as being better satisfied with his religious experience and prospects than he had crouch was highly gifted. Enjoying the ad-vantages of a liberal education, combined with extraordinary powers of speech, he occupied a prominent position on the walls of Zion. But he has gone to his reward, leaving an affectionate wife and several children, whom we commend in prayer to God and to the sympathy and kindness of the Church.

JOHN H. COOPER was a member of the Memphis Conference for seven or eight years. At the last session, he was appointed for the second year to the Coffeeville Circuit, where he died during last spring after a brief and almost painless illness. Closing his eyes, he went to sleep like a child, and he sleeps in Jesus. Brother Cooper was of a gentle and pleasant spirit. His ability in the pulpit was but ordinary; but his kind and prudent deportment in families, and among all with whom he associated, gave him a good degree of usefulness, and won for him the warm regards of all who knew him. He leaves no family, his wife and child having preceded him to the better land. His pious mother and two sisters are living in Middle Tennessee, being his only near relations.

JESSE S. SMOTHERMAN was admitted on trial in the Memphis Conference in the fall of 1854, at Somerville, Tenn., and continued a member till his departure to the spirit-land. He was a man of great moral worth, solid piety, and un-assuming demeanor, so that he ever conducted himself with becoming propriety, constraining those by whom he was surrounded "to take knowledge of him that he had been with Jesus.' His preaching was plain, practical, and forcible. He dealt not in rhetorical flourishes, but presented the truths of the gospel in their unadorned simplicity, aiming only at the glory of God and the salvation of souls. In the beginning of the present war, he entered the army and served as a private for one year, during which he acted well his part, particularly at the battle of Shiloh. Afterward he returned to the regular work of the ministry. His last appointment was to the Rienzi Circuit. For some time before his death, his health had become quite feeble. Disease made rapid encroachments upon his constitution, but he was permitted to reach his father's house, where, after a season of deep affliction, he calmly passed away as a faithful steward to receive his reward. May God bless his bereaved companion and other loved ones!

WILLIAM C. HASKELL was a son of the distinguished orator and politician, the late William T. Haskell, of Tennessee. He was blessed with a devoted Christian mother, who trained up her son in the way he should go, and her efforts were not lost upon him. In youth, he embraced the Saviour, and remained faithful through life. He was admitted on trial in the Memphis Conference, in the fall of 1861, at Jackson, Tenn., and was appointed Chaplain to the 154th Tennessee Regiment, in which capacity he com-manded the respect of all and labored with great usefulness, exerting an influence for good upon the hearts and lives of those to whom he ministered in holy things. The exposures incident to camp life, and the performance of his duties as chaplain, proved too severe for his comparatively frail constitution. The hand of disease arrested him, and he was soon reduced to such an enfeebled state as only with great difficulty to be able to reach home. At the res-idence of the Rev. D. J. Allen he received from idence of the Rev. D. J. Allen he received from his mother and friends every attention necessary to soothe and comfort him in the final struggle. Death approached; but he was undismayed, and met the last enemy like a Christian philosopher. Brother Haskell was a young man of rare natural talents and uncommon mental attainments, and being of studious habits, he promised much

usefulness to the Church and the world. If he could have been spared, he would perhaps have been one of the brightest lights and one of the most gifted ministers in the Church of God. But He who "doeth all things well" brought his promising career to an early termination.

JOHN THOMSON was admitted on trial in the Memphis Conference, at Jackson, November, 1861. He traveled during part of his first year on the Trenton Circuit, but left his work on account of physical disability. Having been restored to health, he volunteered in the service of his country. He was killed instantly in the battle of Chickamauga, September, 1863—the fatal ball passing directly through his heart. He died exclaiming, "Lord Jesus, receive my spirit!" Brother Thomson was a young man of much promise, deeply pious, of liberal education, and studious habits. Could he have lived, we doubt not the Church would have been greatly blessed by his labors; but he has been called to his reward on high.

GEORGE W. CHARLTON breathed his last, at his residence, in the city of Petersburg, Va., in February, 1863. He was born in Williamsburg, Sept. 26, 1796. Of his early life we possess no authentic information, except that his family occupied an honorable social position. He was converted to God in the city of Norfolk, when about nineteen years of age. He was admitted on trial into the Virginia Conference in 1818, and was appointed to Suffolk and Princess Anne Circuit; and in 1819, to Raleigh City and Cir-cuit. In 1820, he was admitted into full concuit. In 1020, he was adapted and appointed to Cumberland Circuit; and in 1822, to Lynch-burg. In 1822, he was ordained elder, and reappointed to Lynchburg. He located in 1823, was reädmitted in 1824, and successively filled the following appointments: Petersburg, in 1824-5; Raleigh, in 1826; and Shockoe Hill, Richmond, in 1827. He located again, in 1828, and in the following year was united in mar-riage to Mrs. Martha R. Wright, of Greensville, Va., where he remained, preaching at intervals, until his removal to Petersburg, in 1840, where he resided until his death, occasionally fulfilling

the duties of the ministry. During this period he was again reädmitted into the Conference, and was continued from year to year in the supernumerary and superannuated relations, receiving, however, no portion of the Conference dividends for his support, his private means being amply sufficient for that purpose. He was endowed with extraordinary abilities as a pulpit orator. He possessed a happy combina-tion of those higher elements which give a commanding position to a public speaker. He was well-read, and thoroughly conversant with the doctrines of the Methodist Church. He had a refined and elegant taste, and had cultivated in no small degree the graces of polite literature. His presence in the pulpit was imposing, his manner was grave and dignified, his modulations were stately, his conceptions were often gorgeous, and his diction splendid. In his palmy days few surpassed him in the brilliancy of his declamation, the grandeur of his periods, or in those bursts of genuine eloquence which are characteristic only of true genius. The accuracy of these statements will be attested by many now living. In addition to these exalted gifts, he frequently exhibited in the pulpit a talent not always so easily controlled or so felicitous in its display: we mean the power of invective. His satire was bold and scathing: his philippics were startling and terrible. He knew his power, and did not hesitate to hazard its weapons against the manners of the age, whether in circles of high or low degree, at the risk of exciting a commotion amongst the wounded victims. We will not attempt to say that his thunderbolts were always hurled with discretion; but this we will say, upon authority, that during his former connection with the Virginia Conference his preaching was attended with glorious results. Multitudes, through his instrumentality, were brought to the knowledge of the truth, and became distinguished ornaments of the Church of God. He was the honored instrument, amongst others, of establishing the Methodist Church in Lynchburg. A power-ful revival attended his ministry in that place. Many of the principal citizens were converted, were added to the Church, adorned their profession, and have long since entered into rest. Some still survive whose moral and social work add luster both to the Church and to the community. He was a sincere Christian, a firm believer in the vital doctrines of the Bible, a fast friend, and an uncompromising Methodist. He yielded to no one in his attachment to the institutions of the Church, or in the promptness with which he defended them. Yet he was a man of great peculiarities of temperament. His emotions were naturally strong and impulsive, and displayed themselves especially in the vivacity and vehemence of conversation, and in those outspoken sentiments which a more calculating prudence in others induces them to suppress. These susceptibilities were more or less inseparable from the peculiar type of his constitution. and were at times enhanced by a disease which had been for years undermining it. Abating occasional severity, his conversa-

tional powers were the charm of the social circle, in which piquancy, wit, and repartee, seldom equaled, played a conspicuous part. Had he been a man of the world, he would have been celebrated for this faculty alone, and his company would have been solicited at the enter-tainments of the rich and great. To his honor be it said, no man was ever more affected by the appeals of suffering humanity, or more ready to respond to them. His last years were saddened by a chronic affection, which gave him equal pain and inconvenience, and totally unfitted him for any public duty. Under its blight-ing influence his once robust constitution grad-ually declined. His visits to the last session of our Conference evinced to all that he was passing away. A little upward of two months, and he was no more. A short time before his death he took his accustomed walks, and then with-drew, never to repeat them. From his eldest daughter have been received the following facts: "He was sick only one week. From the first day of his illness he seemed to be impressed with the idea that he was soon to die, and with a calm and hopeful spirit he looked upon the grave as a sweet repose from the sorrows of earth. His sufferings were very intense during the entire time, but he spent much of it in earnest prayer, often audibly breathed, and many expressions of his resignation to God's will fell from his lips. Twice he asked me if I thought he murmured; said his sufferings were intense, but they would soon be over, and that God's grace was sufficient to enable him to bear them. When so weak that I raised his head to give him water, he said, 'I am weak, but God is strong. The grave has no gloom for me.' He would often look lovingly at us, and say, 'God bless you, my children; I shall soon leave you alone; I shall soon be free of pain for ever.' He finally became, for the most part, unconscious, spoke but little, intelligibly, afterward, and closed his eyes upon the light of this world, to open them, as we doubt not, upon the glories of the world to come." His funeral services were conducted in the Market Street Church, in Petersburg, in the presence of a large and deeply solemn congregation, and his remains were deposited in the old Blandford Cemetery, where they await the summons of the archangel's trumpet. Thus has set one of those stars which formerly shone so resplendently in the horizon of Methodism in Virginia, and whose luster is so well remembered. His widow and three daughters survive him.

JOHN MCOLISTER GUNN was born in Iredell county, N. C., about the year 1801, and died Dec. 31, 1862. The last twenty-four years of his life were devoted to the service of God. Half of this time he spent in the capacity of a class-leader, with almost unparalleled success. The other half he consecrated to the wider sphere of ministerial toil. Three years of his ministry he spent on the Surry Circuit, three years on the Trent Circuit, two years on the Guilford Circuit, two years on the Jones Circuit, two years on the Jonesville Circuit, one year on Fisher's River Mission, and one year on the Wilkes Circuit. Brother Gunn's career as a minister, though comparatively short, was bril-liant and happy. He sought to be useful rather than great, and those among whom he labored will ever remember the vigor and zeal with which he pursued this cherished aim to the end of his life. The most remarkable circumstance of his life was his diligence in searching the Scriptures. In addition to his arduous work as a preacher of the gospel, he read carefully through the Bible forty-nine times, and that within the short space of twelve years. The promises of Heaven were the daily and hourly food of his soul; and with a steady, unwavering, triumphant confidence in these, he passed away to meet the rewards of the faithful.

THOMPSON GARRARD was born in Orange county, N. C., Sept. 5, 1800. He joined the Virginia Conference on trial February, 1818, in the class with H. G. Leigh, Peter Doub, and others. At the session of Conference held February, 1818, he was appointed to the Tar River Circuit, and in 1819, he traveled Brunswick Circuit. Subsequently he filled the following appointments, in the order in which they are named, viz.: Swift Creek, New River, Greensville, Princess Anne, Beaufort and Straits, Suffolk and Surry, Camden, Gates, Sussex, Neuse and Pamlico, Portsmouth and Ocracoke Mission, Currituck and Mattamuskeet, Straits, Chatham, Buckhorn, Plymouth, Mattamuskeet, Stantons-burg, Straits, Topsail, Sampson, and Raleigh Circuit. At the session of Conference held in Greensboro, December, 1847, he was placed in a superannuated relation, which relation he sustained to the day of his death. It will appear from the above synopsis of his ministerial labors, that he was a regular itinerant preacher for thirty years, and sustained a superannuated relation for more than fifteen years. Brother Garrard was a man of medium natural endowments and of limited education, but nevertheless was a sound and useful minister of Jesus. He was modest, prudent, and exceedingly amiable a man of stern integrity and undoubted piety; and during his entire ministerial life, exemplified the excellency of the Christian religion. On Feb. 15, 1863, he was attacked with diphtheria, and died on the 18th day of the same month. His sufferings were intense, but of short duration. He died as he had lived, in the service of God.

JOHN CALDWELL BRENT was born in Rockingham county, N. C., April 20, 1837. His early youth was spent in the county of his birth. He made a profession of religion at Smithville, under the ministry of his brother, the Rev. James H. Brent. He was a student in Smithville Academy when this happy event occurred. Soon after this he entered the University at Chapel Hill, and went through a partial course of study. Leaving the University, he went to Roxboro to act in the capacity of assistant teacher in his brother James's school. At this place, in the month of June, 1858, he was licensed to preach the gospel, and in the fall of the same year was admitted on trial in the North Carolina Conference, at its session is Newbern. His first appointment was to the Onslow Circuit, where he labored one year; his second appointment was to the Straits, where he also remained one year; his third field of labor was North-east Circuit; and his fourth was Whitesville, to which circuit he was returned a second year, and on which he finished his ministerial work. The Rev. Dr. Deems, in an obituary of Brother Brent, He had high ideas of Chris-tian ministerial character. He earnestly wished to do his whole duty in this department, and please the great Head of the Church rather than his brethren. The poor and the servants about him met his earnest desire for their welfare and salvation. He was very cautious and kind in dealing with ministerial reputation, while he held clear and distinct ideas of all the ethics in the case. Of slow but sure development, his greatest usefulness seemed to lie in the future. But God's ways are not our ways. Five years of ministerial life are all the Lord saw fit to grant. He was attacked by fever, and, after two weeks of great suffering, expired at the house of Mrs. Smith, near Whitesville, in Columbus county, Aug. 8, 1863. Sister Smith and other ladies gave him motherly Christian attention, and his sufferings were borne with great fortitude and great thankfulness for the friendship shown him, and he gratefully contrasted his condition with that of our sick and dying soldiers, for whom, from the first part of the war, he manifested a profound and tender in-terest. In regard to his own condition he fre-quently said, "All is well!" His last petitions were uttered in the language of the Lord's Praver, which he proposed in a strong upice Prayer, which he pronounced in a strong voice,

and distinctly adding, "All a man can ask when he prays is in that prayer." He had said before his sickness that he had consecrated himself afresh this year to the work of the ministry. It was a consecration for a higher sphere and nobler rank, and while his ashes sleep at his request among the people of the Whitesville Circuit, whom he greatly loved, and by whom he was loved in return, his spirit is doubtless among the ransomed, the blood-washed, the happy harpers at God's throne. He was such a specimen of robust and healthful manhood, that his death came upon his friends like a shock. His funeral-sermon.was preached before the Conference by Dr. Deems, from Acts xx. 24, and 2 Cor. v, 18-21.

R. C. MAYNARD was born in Surry county, Va., about the year 1815, and died at his residence, in the county of Granville, N. C., Nov. 23, 1863. He became a subject of saving grace and a member of the Church in the morning of life; at an early age gave himself to the Christian ministry, and joined the traveling connection at the Conference held in Petersburg, Va., in 1837. He sustained the different relations of effective, supernumerary, and superannuated preacher. The fields of labor to which he was successively appointed were, as we learn, Trent, Granville, Hillsboro, Tar River, and Raleigh Circuits. His career, as an effective minister of the gospel, was short, being a feeble, afflicted man. Brother Maynard was a man of more than ordinary ability, a very earnest, impressive, pointed preacher, and successful in the conver-sion of souls to God. He was kind, courteous, generous, hospitable—a Christian gentleman. He was for a number of years a subject of the disease which terminated his life—neuralgia of the head-which he suffered patiently and with resignation to the Divine will. His end was peaceful and happy.

MEDICUS H. HIGHT was born in Franklin county, N. C., in 1833 or 1834. A short time after he was brought to a saving knowledge of the truth, in 1847, under the ministry of the Rev. Dr. Harriss, he connected himself with the Methodist Episcopal Church. In the year 1855, he applied for admission, and was received on trial into the North Carolina Conference, and was appointed to the Halifax Circuit, with the Rev. Alfred Norman; and the year following, was sent to the Straits as preacher in charge. At the Conference of 1857, he applied for and obtained a certificate of location, and on Dec. 13 of the same year, was married to Miss Mary E. Nuttall, of Granville, N. C. At the Confer-ence of 1859, held at Beaufort, he was reädmitted into the traveling connection, and was appointed to the Tar River Circuit. In 1860, he was sent to the Tar River Colored Mission; in 1861, as Chaplain to the C.S. Army; and in 1862, received a nominal appointment. In March, 1863, Brother Hight was attacked by typhoid fever, and, after patiently bearing an illness of about four weeks, fell asleep in Jesus.

ARCHIBALD B. MCGILVRAY was born in the Isle of Skye, on the coast of Scotland, came to America in 1806, joined the South Carolina Conference in 1832, and died in Greenville, S. C., June 9, 1863. Brother McGilvray was a modest, cheerful, and agreeable man, a faithful friend, and good citizen. As a minister of Christ, he was holy, laborious, and useful. He suffered long and painfully with dropsy of the chest, which he bore with manly fortitude and Chris-tian patience. The brethren who saw Brother McGilvray during his last illness, found him cheerful, resigned, and waiting for his change. On the day before his death, and in immediate view of that event, he praised God aloud, and so passed away.

LINDSEY CARR WEAVER was born in Spartanburg District, S. C., Nov. 16, 1837, and died at Bishopsville, Sumter District, S. C., Feb. 28, 1863. He was converted and joined the Meth-odist Episcopal Church, South, in 1858, while a student at Wofford College. In July, 1859, he graduated, and in the following December, having been previously licensed to preach, he was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference. In 1860 he traveled the Sumter Circuit, and in 1861 was appointed to Yorkville Station. Here, in the early part of the year, his health failed, on account of which he was compelled to retire from the regular work to a quieter life. At the end of this year, he was elected and ordained a deacon, and granted a supernumerary relation, which relation he sustained until his death. There was in Brother Weaver the promise of much usefulness. He was amiable in spirit, uncompromising in integrity, unflinching in zeal, and abundant in good works, during his short career among us as a traveling preacher. He died in the faith, and his end was peace.

GEORGE W. MOORE was born in Charleston, S. C., Sept. 27, 1799, and was converted in 1819. He was licensed to preach in 1823, and admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference in 1822. From this period up to the close of 1862, except a few years of local relationship, he did the work and shared the joys and sorrows of a faithful itinerant preacher. Brother Moore was faithful, efficient, and successful in the work of his sacred calling. He was one of the first to

enter the mission field among the colored population of our State. In that unpretending and self-sacrificing work he spent many years of his ministerial life. He was a missionary to the blacks when a supernumerary relation was granted him at the Conference of 1862, held in Spartanburg. His remaining days, which were few, were spent in special attention to that class of our population in the above-named

town. The reward of faithfully preaching the gospel to the poor is his. He ceased at once "to work and live," at Providence Camp-ground, Anderson District, S. C., on Sunday, Aug. 16, at three o'clock P.M. He died in the pulpit, at the close of his first prayer, in the afternoon service, with the Bible and Hymn-book as his pillow, and his brethren of the ministry and laity as his mourners. His last words were words of prayer, his last act an act of worship.

JAMES HUNTER died Dec. 10, 1862. Of his early life, conversion, and call to the ministry, we have no account. In 1806, he was admitted on trial in the South Carolina Conference, and traveled until 1815, when his name disappears, to be seen again in connection with the Alcove Circuit in 1829-30. In 1831-2, he was assigned to the Monroe Circuit; to Fayette, in 1833; superannuated in 1834; traveled Newnan in 1835; Hamilton, in 1836; superannuated six years; was appointed to the Greenville Circuit in 1843; Thomaston, in 1844; and superan-nuated, finally, in 1845. Of this venerable man we would say but little: let his works praise him. Seeking as he did the honor of God, and having no ear for the adulations of earth, we shall tread softly on his sleeping dust. Among his chief characteristics were gentleness, meekness, temperance, patience, industry, unflinching opposition to sin in its most specious appearance, and a constant, ardent attachment to the doctrines, polity, and usages of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South. In spirit, he was ever present with the Church, whether assembled for prayer and praise, or deliberation and aggression. During the last session of the Georgia Conference, he contracted his fatal illness, and returned home to linger a few days—to set his house in order—to die. Those who knew Brother Hunter will not pause to inquire of his last moments. "Having served his generation, by the will of God he fell on sleep, and was laid unto his fathers."

ALEXANDER GORDON was admitted into the Georgia Conference in 1835, and appointed to the Liberty and Darien Circuit. His fields of labor, subsequently, were Ogeechee Mission, in 1836; Canoochee Mission, in 1837; Ogeechee Mission, in 1838-40; and Cherokee Hill, in 1841-2. His name does not occur in the Min-1841-2. His name does not occur in the Min-utes of 1843. He was superannuated in 1844. For the most part, he was continued in this relation until his death. Brother Gordon was a simple-hearted, fervent old man, always cheerful, always ready to do what he could to pro-mote the cause of Christ, preaching, sometimes, when he was not able to stand more than ten After an illness of about six months, minutes. he died Jan. 4, 1863, "strong in faith, and giving glory to God."

JOHN STRICKLAND was an acceptable, laborious, successful minister-one who was consecrated to God, filled with the Spirit, constrained by the love of Christ, and whose highest ambition was to save his own soul and the souls of others. With such preparation, it is not astonishing that he was ready for the most difficult and uninviting fields, and not unfrequently exchanged for months the pleasures of home for the privilege of winning souls. Nor is it sur-prising that he triumphed over the disadvantages of a defective early education, and made an annual report of two hundred accessions to the Church. "He was a good man, full of the Holy Ghost and faith; and much people were added to the Lord." His entire career, including conversion, call to the ministry, and subsequent success, affords a sublime commentary on the achievements of grace. Brother Strickland achievements of grace. Brother Strickland joined the Conference Jan. 10, 1850; was Chaplain to the Fortieth Georgia Regiment, and attended Bragg's army in the memorable Kentucky campaign. His last illness was contracted on his way home, and was aggravated by a failure to secure shelter. A few days after his arrival, he died in great peace, assuring his family that all was well.

THOMAS H. JORDAN died in Savannah, July 29, 1863. He commenced preaching when quite a young man, and joined the Conference in 1849. He has filled some of the most important and prominent charges in the Conference—always with great acceptability, and sometimes with much success. He was greatly beloved by all who knew him, and was a special favorite among his brethren in the ministry. He possessed a strong and vigorous intellect, with fine pulpit powers; and was a man of much more than or-dinarily noble and generous impulses-ardent, devoted, and impulsive in his temperament, entering enthusiastically into every undertaking of life; and also bold and fearless, determined and courageous, in the performance of duty. He served in the army, both as chaplain and cap-tain. During the last months of his life he preached often and most usefully to his own command, and his labors were blessed with a gracious revival of religion among them, in which he was zealously laboring up to the day he left for his home, on a sick furlough, obtained at the earnest request of friends, to recruit his own health, and also to obtain recruits for his squadron. The day he reached his family he told his wife that he had come home to die, and, continuing in this persuasion, he began calmly and industriously to put his house in order, and arrange all his temporal affairs, as if confident of his change. Some five days afterward, he was suddenly attacked with the cholera, and in about thirty hours died in great peace. Although he suffered most intensely during his illness, he was patient, calm, and met death with the greatest possible composure-yea, triumph. When it was known that he must die, he was asked what was the state of his mind and prospects in view of his probable end. He replied, "All is bright and clear; not a cloud between me and my God. I now trust alone in the merits of Jesus Christ, and feel the presence of the Holy Spirit now with me-no fear, no doubt." He then sent messages of love and affection to his brethren in the ministry, the Conference, and beloved ones away. A little while before his death, while prayer was being offered around his bedside, he was filled with rapture and praise, shouted aloud, and declared that, though he was passing through the valley of the shadow of death, he feared no evil, saying, "For thou art with me; thy rod and thy staff, they com-fort me—they comfort me;" and then raising and clapping his hands, already cold in death, he cried with a loud voice, "Triumph! Triumph! Triumph! Victory!" which were his last words, for soon after he pecceful fills also. for soon after he peacefully fell asleep in Jesus.

ELIJAH N. BOLAND was born in Muscogee county, Ga. He embraced religion about the close of the Mexican war, and was admitted into the Georgia Conference, at La Grange, in 1855. He served successively the colored missions in Talbot, in Columbus, on the Chattahoochee, and in Georgetown. His education was limited, but, being studious, he was rapidly improving as a preacher. He would work hard all the week, study at night, and preach on Sundays. He enlisted as a private in the Forty-sixth Regiment Georgia Volunteers, expecting to be made chaplain to the regiment. In this expectation, however, he was disappointed. He was faithful in his country's service, and maintained his Christian walk. He died in one of the hospitals of the city of Fome, in September last, with no Christian friend near to minister to him and receive his dying message; but his life gives us the best assurance of his peaceful, happy end.

ROBERT N. COTTER, the son of J. V. and M. Cotter, was born in Hall county, Ga., April 11, 1826. When he was six years old, his father removed to Murray county. The country was then new, and education but little attended to. In the seventeenth year of his age he joined the Church, and commenced praying in public before he enjoyed the comforts of religion, which he realized not long afterward. For several years he was class-leader and exhorter. In 1854, he was admitted into the Georgia Confer-

ence, and appointed as junior preacher to the Hamilton Circuit. In 1855, he served the Stewart Circuit in the same capacity. He was appointed to the Jacksonville Circuit in 1856, during which year he was married to Miss Caroline McRae, of Telfair county. He was returned to the same circuit in 1857. He was appointed to McIntosh Mission in 1858-9; to Swainesboro Mission, in 1860; to Mount Vernon Mission, in 1861-2; to Swainesboro again, in 1863, where he died of typhoid fever, May 6, perfectly resigned and willing to die. Brother Cotter was a simple, earnest preacher, dwelling more on Christ as his ministry drew to a close. He never was known to complain of his appointment, but was willing to labor anywhere in his Master's vineyard. He has fallen asleep in Jesus, but, thank God, it is not a "sleep which knows no waking."

CHARLES MOUZON SMITH was born June 28, 1841. He was the son of Robert S. Smith, of Washington, Ga., and the nephew of the Rev. Whitefoord Smith, of the South Carolina Confer-He joined the Church under the ministry ence. of the Rev. J. O. A. Clark, in Washington, Ga., when he was sixteen years old, and engaged at once in the duties of a Sunday-school teacher, having a large class of colored catechumens. He was licensed to preach in 1859, and entered the traveling connection at the Rome Conference. He was appointed junior preacher on the Rich-mond Circuit. The next year he was assigned to the Isle of Hope. In 1862, he was appointed junior preacher on the Waynesboro Circuit. The Rev. Robert B. Lester, preacher in charge, being a chaplain in the army, could not enter upon his work until the month of May, and in the meanwhile the whole work of that large circuit devolved upon Brother Smith. It was too much for him, and, being exceedingly zealous, he fell a sacrifice in the cause of his Lord and Master. While engaged in prayer, in the spring of that year, he was taken with a violent hemorrhage of the lungs, from the effects of which he never recovered. Just before this, he had been married to Miss Florence Harris, of Richmond At our last Conference he was placed county. on the list of superannuated preachers. He continued to be a great sufferer, and died of consumption, at the house of his father-in-law, Oct. 9, 1863. Brother Smith was a young man of great promise, and regarded as one of the best preachers of his age. He was devoted, zealous, pious. He fell in the early dawn of his man-hood, but conquered when he fell. His end was peace.

WILLIAM C. D. PERRY was admitted on trial in the Conference in 1859, and was appointed to the Watkinsville Circuit; in 1860, to Elberton Circuit; 1861, Stewart Circuit; 1862, Starkville Mission; 1863, Clarksville Circuit. 'He was exposed to small-pox, in the early part of the year, and became infected with it, and, after great suffering, died in the latter part of March last. He was a man of deep, consistent piety, modest and diffident to a fault. He was zealous and useful on his work, and death found him not unprepared for his change. God was with him in consoling power, enabling him to triumph over death. Not a cloud was left to throw a shadow over the closing scene.

JOHN K. LEAK was born in Newton county, Ga., in 1834. He embraced religion when quite young, and gave himself with remarkable assiduity to the cultivation of his mind and heart. Indeed, he is said to have been a student from his very childhood; and his early application to grave and serious subjects, and especially sub-jects pertaining to godliness, justified the fond expectations entertained by kindred and friends that his would be a long, honored, and useful life. This expectation strengthened as youth developed into manhood. He graduated at Emory College with distinction, in 1856, and shortly after studied law, and was admitted to the bar. About this time his health failed, and for a year or more he was alike disqualified for business and study. From the period of his conversion he had labored under a strong persuasion that it was his duty to preach the gos-pel. It now matured into clear and solemn conviction, and he resolved to shape his future course in reference to the studies and responsibilities which it involves. Accordingly, with returning health, in 1858, he was licensed to preach, and with characteristic modesty and self-distrust entered upon the work of a local preacher. During 1859-60 he presided with great efficiency over the Carrolton Female In-stitute, and at the same time labored with encouraging success as a minister. In 1861, he was employed on the Greenville Circuit, and at the close of the year was received into this Con-ference. In 1862, he was stationed in Newnan and Palmetto, and the present year he was ap-pointed President of Andrew Female College, and junior preacher on Cuthbert Station. He had barely entered upon this work, and made his arrangements for the year, when he was in-terrupted by the appearance of small-pox within the bounds of his charge. Not being aware of the fact that he had been in contact with this dreaded infection, he went into Houston county, on a visit to his wife's relatives, and while there the fatal disease was developed. His sufferings were severe, but of short duration. Cut off from the kindly visits and ministrations of friendsattended alone by his wife and her grandfather, the Rev. Howell Cobb-he encountered the last enemy, death. He was patient and resigned under all his sufferings, and often triumphant. On Feb. 7th, the final hour came. It found his mind clear, and his spiritual sky cloudless; and in undoubting faith and holy serenity he passed away. Seldom is the Church called upon to mourn the death of one so gifted, so cultivated, and full of rich promise of usefulness; but we would bow with meek submission to Him whose ways are just and counsels wise.

EBENEZER HEARN was born in Montgomery county, N. C., in 1799, and was converted at the early age of seven. At seventeen he felt called to the ministry, but endeavored to stifle the im-pression. In the fall of 1815, he attended the session of the Tennessee Conference, when he resolved to confer no longer with flesh and blood. Having been duly licensed, he attended the next session of that body, and received his first appointment. For four years he remained in con-nection with that Conference, and was then transferred to Mississippi. He retained his connection with the latter until the year 1832. Upon the organization of the Alabama Conference he became a member of it, which continued to be the field of his labor until his death. During his ministry, comprehending a period of forty-six years, he served the Church in almost every capacity known to her economy, having been twenty-six years Presiding Elder, delegate to several sessions of the General Conference, and an agent for La Grange and Centenary Colleges, in all of which he displayed the zeal and faithfulness for which he was so much distinguished. Commencing his itinerant life without much education, by study and entire devotion to the one great work of preaching the gospel, he rendered himself one of the most useful preachers of the Church. He possessed true nobility of character. He was by nature a gentleman. There were united in him the simplicity of the child and the genuine dignity of the man. He was a genial companion, devoted friend, kind husband, and affectionate father. As a Chris-tian, he was deeply versed in the things of God. He had strong faith, lively hope, and burning love. As a minister, he was laborious, energetic, and zealous. He never betrayed any trust committed into his hands. His punctuality in filling his appointments was proverbial, having never failed to meet them except when providentially prevented. At the last session of the Conference it was deemed best to give him a superannuated relation. Several days after the beginning of the session he was taken sick. At the close of the Conference he was too sick to leave for home. In compliance with medical advice, and his own wishes, he was carried on Sunday, 21st December, to the city of Montgomery, where he remained until he expired. Upon being asked if his trust was still in Jesus, he replied, "All is well; there is not a cloud." Thus lived and died this noble servant of God and the Church.

ALEXANDEE McBeyDe, long known and beloved in the Alabama Conference, laid down his armor of the gospel and went to his reward in

heaven, Dec. 22, 1862. He was born in Marl-boro District, S. C., June 23, 1816, and joined the M. E. Church in 1837, was licensed to preach and recommended to the Annual Conference, Nov. 13, 1841, and admitted at the ensuing session of the Alabama Conference. Piety, humility, and usefulness adorned his ministerial life. and endeared him to the people wherever he went. His influence was not confined to the pulpit, but at the fireside and in the social circle his piety shone forth with peculiar luster. His record is in all the circuits and missions where he has labored, and many servants and masters gone before have welcomed him to that rest to which he first pointed them. He was eminently qualified for the work of our colored missions, and labored for many years with fidelity and success on such fields of ministerial toil, both in Mobile and on plantations. No man labored more for the prosperity of Zion, or rejoiced more in her success than he. In the altar with those who sought Jesus he was perfectly at home. In 1862, he received a commission as chaplain in the army, and entered with much earnestness into his new field of usefulness. He spent some months in the army, when enfeebled health induced him to resign, and accept the appointment of hospital chaplain. For this, his sympathy and kindness, combined with his earnest piety, eminently fitted him, and for some months during the summer of 1862, he visited the hospitals along the Mobile and Ohio Railroad from Okalona to Quitman, preaching and exhorting, and comforting the sick and wounded soldiers, and distributed among them many books and tracts, which preached on when he was far away. By these and many other good works "he being dead yet speaketh." Last December he repaired to the seat of our Annual Conference at Auburn to mingle with the brethren he so much loved, in their annual reunion, where he was appointed Presiding Elder of the Gadsden District. Soon after the close of Conference he left for his work, not well, but by no means seriously sick. He reached Montgomery and then took the cars for Mobile, and died suddenly on the train that day. Swifter than the tread of the iron-horse, the angels bore his spirit home to God, while his mortal remains were borne to the home of his heart-broken wife and orphan boy for burial.

FREDERICK G. FERGUSON was born in Spartanburg District, S. C., April 4, 1809; converted at Mountain Spring Camp-ground, in Lawrence county, Ala., July 28, 1828. He was licensed to exhort Jan. 8, 1829, and in the fall of the same year was licensed to preach, and recommended to the Tennessee Annual Conference held at Huntsville, where he was admitted on trial and appointed to the Lawrence Circuit. He filled various appointments in that Conference, one of which was among the Cherokee Indians, with acceptability and usefulness to the Church. He was transferred to the Alabama Conference, and after several years spent as Principal of the Macon Female Institute, he entered upon the regular work of the itinerancy, traveling extensively, and laboring with great zeal and fidelity. His last appointment was the Montgomery District, which he filled with his usual diligence and earnestness, caring for and watching over the interests of the Church. The cause of God lay near his heart; the wants of the poor called forth his active efforts for their relief, and the claims of his country always met a ready and cheerful response. His piety and his patriotism were indissolubly connected, and for both Church and country he was always rcady to give his labor, to pray, to suffer, and to Returning from a quarterly-meeting on die. the 31st of August last, he was taken violently ill with congestion, and after suffering greatly for four days he slept in Jesus, and went home to heaven. When told that he must die, and asked how he felt, he replied instantly, "Sweet peace!" "Blessed Jesus!" "O sing to me of heaven, when I am called to die!" His entire illness was a continued triumph, and though toward the close his mind wandered, it was still on his work. He called sinners to come to Christ, he went through the invitation to the Lord's table, or repeated some lines of the sweet songs, wherewith he had so often cheered and enlivened the people he served. He honored God in his life, and was honored of him in his dying hour.

JAMES W. HOLSTON had been a member of the Alabama Conference for many years, several of which were in appointments in the vicinity of Summerfield. He afterward removed to the coast, and served several charges in the Mobile District, with acceptability and usefulness. For several years he sustained a superannuated relation to the Conference. Some time in June last he told a friend that he would not last long, and that he was making his arrangements to depart and be with Christ. He was taken suddenly ill with apoplexy Aug. 19, 1863, and died in a few hours. He told his family the day previous that he was ready to go at any time.

EZEKIEL T. NABORS died Aug. 21, 1863, at the house of Robert Bowling, near St. Stephen's, Ala., aged about thirty-two years. He was born in or near Montevallo, and received his education at Summerfield, where he learned something higher—the way to the feet of Jesus. About ten years since he was admitted on trial in the Alabama Conference, and was subsequently appointed to the Perryville Circuit, where he labored with great zeal and success, and made many friends. He was also stationed at Hamburg, but his health failing, he removed to the coast near Pascagoula, where he spent several years in a superannuated relation. Here he lost his excellent wife, whom he had married at Summerfield a few years previously. In 1860, his health improving, he was appointed to Fish River Mission, in the Mobile District, where he moved among the people, white and colored, like an angel of light, infusing his own genial and earnest spirit into all around him. Many in that charge will rise up in the final day and call him blessed. At the last Conference he was appointed to the St. Stephen's Circuit. He went

to that work, filled every appointment, and in August, 1863, feeling a premonition of his approaching end, "set his house in order," and at his post sweetly feel asleep in Jesus.

JEFFERSON BOND was born in New Hanover county, N. C., April 8, 1801; converted and joined the M. E. Church in Tallahassee, Florida, in 1828; was licensed to exhort in 1831, and to preach in 1833; admitted on trial in the Alabama Conference in the city of Montgomery, From that time until his December, 1838. health failed he labored faithfully on hard circuits and missions, in different parts of the Conference, from the seaboard to the mountains. He was never married, and had no settled home. Of limited educational advantages, yet by diligent reading and study he acquired considerable information. His preaching powers were not brilliant, but useful and instructive-a man of great humility, modesty, meekness, purity, fidelity. For several years of the latter part of his life, he was superannuated. Wherever he went he found a welcome. Shortly after the last session of Conference, held in Auburn in December last, at the house of a kind friend, he fell asleep in Jesus. His life was holy and his end was peace.

PEYTON PIERCE SMITH was born Jan. 12, 1812, in Franklin county, Ga., and dedicated to God in baptism by the Rev. Lovick Pierce. He was religiously trained from his childhood; joined the Methodist Episcopal Church, Sept., 1826, and professed religion about a month afterward; was licensed to preach by Gwinnett Circuit Quar-

terly Conference, Nov. 12, 1831, and recommended to the Georgia Annual Conference. At the next session of this Conference he was admitted into the traveling connection, and, with all the ardor of the youthful itinerant, started to his great work, provided with a horse and saddle, a five-dollar watch, and five dollars in money-all his earthly possessions. During a ministry of thirty years, characterized by zeal and ardor in the building up of the Redeemer's kingdom, he filled every station, from the hum-ble missionary to that of delegate to the General Conference, to which office he was four times consecutively appointed. In 1863, he was returned to Madison District, and entered upon his work with his accustomed zeal, laboring faithfully until the first Sunday in May, at which time he held his second quarterly-meeting at Lake City—preached twice on Saturday and three times on Sunday, with much fervor and solemnity, all of these sermons being connected with the subject of death and the future This was the last work he performed on state. his District. The next week he visited Fulton county, Ga., for the purpose of being present at the preaching of his father's funeral-sermon, delivered by the Rev. W. J. Parks. After the exercises were over he gave notice that he would preach at night, and also preach a funeral-ser-mon the next Sabbath. He preached at night, according to appointment, and remained in good health until the following Thursday, when he was very suddenly attacked with congestion of the entire system, and died in about twenty-four hours, without saying a word, as he was speechless very soon after the attack came on him. On the following Sabbath the Rev. James B. Payne, of the Georgia Conference, preached his funeral-sermon at the same time and place he was to have preached himself. Thus closed the life of this good man, who was in "labors more abun-dant," as appears from the following summary, taken from his Journal. He was a traveling preacher for thirty years and four months, and during that time preached 4,414 sermons, baptized 1,529 persons, made 5,979 visits, wrote 4,941 letters, and traveled, chiefly by private conveyance, 103,623 miles. Brother Smith was one of the oldest and most efficient members of this Conference, and, as a minister of the gospel, eminently successful — always gladly received and welcomed by the people to whom he was sent. Many of those who have gone up to their reward will hail him in the great day, as being the humble instrument, in the hands of God, of their salvation. As a husband and father, he was kind and affectionate, and the wounded hearts of his wife and six children will be long in recovering from the poignant sorrow occasioned by his unexpected death. He was permitted to preach his last sermon at the same place where, many years before, he was happily converted to God, and his earthly remains were buried by the side of loved ones who then lived and worshiped with him.

JOHN J. RICHARDS was born July 16, 1816, joined the Methodist Episcopal Church in his

thirteenth year, and a short time afterward embraced religion. For several years he filled the offices of class-leader, Sunday-school teacher, and exhorter; and in 1837, when about twenty-one years old, he was licensed to preach. He was admitted on trial in the Georgia Annual Conference in 1839, in which connection he remained until 1844, when he was transferred to the Florida Conference. In this field he labored until 1860, when, his health having failed, he was superannuated, which relation he sustained until the time of his death. The disease, from the effects of which he suffered most intensely for three years, and which finally terminated his life, was cancer. Commencing in his face, and extending down through his throat and breast, it seemed at last to permeate his whole system. He died Sept. 4, 1863, at his home in Madison county, Fla., leaving a widow and five children. Brother Richards was a holy man, and entirely devoted his time and talents to the service of God and the Church. As a preacher, he was sound and practical, and, though not possessed of the most brilliant talents, was a successful minister of the gospel. During his protracted illness his faith was strong and unwavering, and when at last the messenger of death came to release him from his earthly sufferings, he was enabled to meet him as a conqueror-died triumphantly, and has gone home to wear the conqueror's crown.

JOSEPH A. W. JOHNSON was happily converted to God in July, 1847, at the old Mosquite Church, in Gadsden county, Fla., and united with the Methodist Episcopal Church at the same time. From this date he lived a very consistent and devotedly pious life. He was admitted on trial in the Florida Annual Conference, Jan. 2, 1856, where he labored until 1862, when his health failed, and he was granted a superannuated relation, which he sustained until about July, 1863, when he was called from his labors upon earth to the reward promised the finally faithful in heaven. His disease was consumption, and for many months he was compelled to linger and suffer, but his sufferings were all borne in the true spirit of Christian resignation. His death was very triumphant. A short time before he died the Lord's-supper was administered to him, and he received the emblems of the broken body and shed blood of our blessed Lord and Saviour with the most exultant joy. Brother Johnson was a young man of deep and unaffected piety, and, as a minister of the gospel, very successful and useful.
