PBJ was assigned search of B sector (Iwo Jima to 27-00N, 142-20E thence to 34-45N, 140-00E, search Sagami Nada, Suruga Wan to 34-30N, 138-20E and return to base via Miyake Jima, Hachijo Jima and the Bonins, searching each in turn.)

PBJ made strong radar contact at distance of 8 miles on shipping target in blind bombing zone inside Sagami Nada at 35-05N, 139-38E. Visibility was zero in heavy rain storm and visual contact was not established during any part of engagement. Target appeared to be on approximate heading of 040° from radar indication. Rocket attack was made as follows: course of A/C 000°, speed 180 kts, altitude 300 feet range 1337 yards, time 131502Z.

8 rockets were fired, no individual rocket hits could be distinguished on target, but approximately 4 sec. after firing there was a single violent explosion at the target. Damage was estimated to be serious.

PBJ completed search without further shipping contacts.
