Care of Plants. If not ready to plant for a few days, bury the roots in cool, moist ground, partially shaded, being careful to firm the ground well so as to come in contact with the roots. When ready to plant puddle the roots well in thin mortar of clay and water and keep from sun and wind while planting. In setting Strawberry Plants, be careful not to get water on the foliage as it is sure to rot them.

Note—When the plants are first set out the flowers should be carefully picked off and none allowed to produce fruit until the plants have become well established which will be six to eight weeks.

It is important to set out the plants early in the spring, so do not delay ordering them.
