MATTAWAN, N. J., July 14 .- The terribly mangled body of Lester Stillwell, the 12-year-old boy, who was seized by the maneating shark in Mattawan creek, was recovered today. The shark had torn the body into shreds. There were great jagged holes in the abdomen where the shark had torn pieces from the body. The breast had been mang'ed in similar fashion and the marks of the tee from Tropico in regard to matshark's teeth were all over the body. Mattawan creek is sixteen miles from the open sea. Panic prevails at all the beaches.




