BRITISH OPPOSE SUBMARINE PLANS

Ask Nations to Abolish Naval Weapon

Arguments Laid Before International Conference

Washington, Dec. 22.—An 8,000word communique issued by the
armament committee of the International Conference after to-day's meeting was in the form of a paraphrase
of the statement made by the delegation of each power with respect to
the British proposal that submarines
be abolished as a naval weapon.

The argument of Lord Lee, of the
British Admiralts, stated the view of
the British Government to be "that
what was required was not merely restriction of submarines but their total
and final abolishment."

He presented the following estimates of existing submarine tonnasc:
United States, 83,500; Great Britain, 80,500; Japan, 32,000; France,
23,360; Italy, 18,250.

He pointed out that under the
American proposal of 90,000 tons
each for Great Britain and the United
States, and 54,000 for Japan, the
United States could build 6,600 tons,
Great Britain 9,500, and Japan 21,809,
with the other two countries in proportion.

He felt bound to say, the paraphrase continued, that it seemed to him very strange to put before a conference on the limitation of navailarmaments proposals designed to foster and increase the type of war vessels which, according to the British view, was open to more objection than surface capital ships.

He said friends of the submarine contended that it was a legitimate weapon of weaker powers and an effective and economical means of defence for coast lines and maritime communications. Both contentions grounds, and "were clearly disproved by recent history," the paraphrase said.

He declared that methods of location, detection and destruction of submarines had proceeded much farther than the development of submarines, and greatly reduced the value of the submersible against modern war craft. He said he believed Germany had used 375 U-boats in the war, of which 205 had been sunk, and that the "accomplishment of the U-boats in lesitimate naval warfare had been almost insignificant."

Not Stopped.

"No less than 15,000,000 British troops had crossed and recrossed the English Channel, and not one man had been lost from the action of submarines except on board hospital ships," the paraphrase declared.

"Later, some 2,000,000 United States troops had crossed the submarines had proved equally powerless."

In their case, he added, is proved "the fact that the U-boat, whether considered as an offensive or defensive weapon against any sort or organized naval force, had proved almost contemptible."

Taking up the argument as to coast lines, Lord Lee pointed out that the British Empire alone had almost as much coast to defend as all of the other powers at the conference combined. In addition, he added, the British Empire had the longest trader outes to protect.

It was partly because the experience of the British had shown that they were not effective that they were ready to abandon submarines, he said. The war had made it abundantly clear that the greatest peril to maritime communication was the submarine, and that peril was especially great to a country which did not possess command of the sea on the surface. Hence it was to the interest of any such power to get rid of this terrible menace.

Opposition to abolition of the submarine was offered, by the other naval powers. Albert Sarraut, Senator Schanzer and Vice-Foreign Minister Hanihara, speaking respectively for France, Italy and Japan, all held that though submarines must be held more closely within practices of humane warfare, their abandonment would remove an important element of national security. They maintained that the submarine was of particular value as a defensive weapon.

United States.

Mr. Hughes read a report of the United States advisory committee recommending retention of the under-surface warships under proper regulations. He suggested that the regulations. He suggested that the conference might consider the possibility of bringing the submarine operations against merchant vessels within the well-established principles of search and selzure under international law, and might even consider the advisability of forbidding the use of submarines against merchant vessels under any circumstances.

AUSTRIAN TAXATION.

Vienna, Dec. 22.—With the ostensible intention of ascertaining the extent of the taxable fortunes in Austria, the National Assembly to-day passed a law requiring natives and foreigners to report immediately and in full their holdings of foreign moneys, drafts, cheques, bank deposits and claims abroad. The law provides imprisonment for evasion.

Figures Issued at Ottawa; People Dying by Thousands, Says American

Riga, Dec. 22.—"The famine situation has become absolutely ghastly," said Colone: Haskell, airector of the American Relief Administration work in Russia, on his arrival from Moscow. He is on his way to London to confer with W. I. Brown, European director of American relief.

"Where a few months ago," he continued, "the people were dying by hundreds, they are now dying by thousands. In a few weeks they will be dying by hundreds of thousands. In the Saratov district they are dying so fast that bodies are literally being hauled away by the cartload."

The American Relief Administration will be feeding 1,200,000 children after the first of the year, according to Col. Haskell.

A Statement to the Public

IN fairness to the Public, the Company's employees and the Company itself it is essential that the main facts of the recent award of the Board of Conciliation appointed to consider the wages paid to the employees of the B.C. Electric should be fully understood by the Public and the Employees themselves

THIS Board of Conciliation appointed under the Lemieux Act sat for a period of three weeks and exhaustively considered all the phases of this question. It was appointed with the full approval of the representatives of the men, who agreed in the selection of the Chairman, rendering it unnecessary for the Authorities at Ottawa to take any part in the appointment.

The Majority Award States:

"That the Company was justified in asking for a 15% reduction," but in consideration for the men recommended only a 10% reduction.

The list of wages as published below speaks for itself and the Company has no hesitation in claiming that this list of wages, together with the working conditions and concessions accompanying it, constitute the most generous basis of employment offered to the men by any street railway company in Canada.

To anyone conversant with the rates of pay at present in force to Unionized labor in this community, the above list will appear at once to be on a very generous basis and in excess of most of the rates now in force in this city, especially when it is remembered that each of the employees of the Company receives concessions in the shape of free transportation, reduced light and gas rates and reduced fares for families living in the suburbs.

To make two comparisons only—Machinists and other mechanics under the Award receive 72c per hour plus the concessions, whereas the standard rate of pay for machinists in this town to-day is only 67½c per hour. Common labor under the Award would receive 54c per hour with concessions, whereas the standard rate for common labor to-day is approximately 40c an hour, rising in some cases to as high as 45c.

It should be borne in mind, in making comparisons, that the men working for our Company enjoy the privilege of practically continuous employment which, in most cases, justifies a lower rate when compared with the very intermittent employment in the case of many other industries.

The following are a few observations from the Report itself:

Decreased Cost of Living

"We believe that the Company has established beyond a doubt the fact that there has been a very considerable reduction in the cost of living, not only in Vancouver, but throughout the whole of Canada. According to the Labor Gazette, the peak of living costs was reached in June, 1920, since when there has been a steady decline until August of this year, when there was a slight upward tendency. The net decrease during the period between June, 1920, and October of this year amounts to 27 per cent."

Wages paid locally for a like class of labor

"Statements and evidence submitted by the Company, as well as a certain amount of local information gathered by the Board, convince us that the general trend of wages is downward, and that other industries in this city are paying a considerably lower scale of wages for all classes of labor, from skilled mechanics downward to common labor."

An erroneous statement has been made that the changes in working conditions constitute a reduction in wages of an additional 7%. This is untrue, as the effect of the changes in working conditions over all classes of labor involved is not more than $2\frac{1}{2}\%$, and the working conditions even as amended are in favor of the men to a degree which is almost without precedent on this continent.






