APOSTROPHES

An apostrophe between a single noun (or an irregular plural noun if it does not end in 's') and an 's' to show possession.

Example: This is Kyle's Watermelon. OR This is the excited guy's watermelon.



Use an apostrophe to create contractions from two words. Example: The duck can't (cannot) swim. OR
The duck doesn't (does not) know

The duck doesn't (does not) know we're (we are) trying to help it.



Plural nouns with an 's' at the end take the apostrophe after the 's'

Example: The friends' hats both have bills



DON'T (see what I did there?) us an apostrophe for words that are more descriptive than possessive.

Example: Diners Club, Thieves Guild, Department of Veterans Affairs.
