city manager was instructed once more to send a notice to the P. E. Railway company that it must observe the city's ordinance restricting the stopping of cars to the rear side of the street; violations of the ordinance having been noticed repeatedly. The city attorney mentioned the question of continuing the bond of the Glendale & Eagle Rock Railway company for the faithful performance of the conditions of the franchise. This is the bond originally entered into by E. D. Goode and since annually renewed by the railway company, which now asks to be relieved of the obligation. Mr. Evans said that while the franchise itself might be sufficient warranty, the bond was part of the contract with the city and should be continued, and it was so ordered.

Trustee Thompson presented a bill of the city engineer for preparing center line maps, with "ties," of the city of Glendale. These maps having been prepared from certain original field notes in the hands of the city engineer and co-mingled with records of his own, on motion of Trustee Tower the city engineer was instructed to draw up an agreement covering the right of access to and the use of said original notes, as part of the purchase of these maps. On motion the city manager was instructed to see that all original records of new subdivisions and other field work taken hereafter be kept and preserved in books to be owned by the city of Glendale. Adjourned.
