THE PAVING OF THE CITY .- Yesterday we giffled at the measurements: very careless manner adopted for paving the streets of New Orienns: for we had minutely inspected for some days past an modes operand; and had visited some of the streets recently paved. Some of these not finished more than 6 or S wooks are now (to use the words of Mr Caldwell in the city coincil) in a dilapidated state; and absolutely require repairs. If the paving is thus so trifling and temporary, it might not be too harsh to say that the finances of the city are embezzied; that the citizens for whose immediate benefit the paying is executed, are imposed on; and that the paying contractors have not performed their duty.

It is high time that the city council should investigate this reatter; and now more particularly incumbent and opportune adian the renewal of the contract with the paving comparty yards at 33 50 each; and to recuve in payment the mantestions of it which he exhibited. colle of the city hearing interest at six per cent per annum. and not redeciable in less than forth years. This would prevent Messra Minturn and Phelps from distating to the city council what they must have; and what they will not accept—as they did very imperiously at the last sitting of the council, when they absointely went so far as to assail the credit or faith of the city

Paying cannot be properly executed in New Orleans unles a bed for the stones he prepared by some kind of grading, to the depth of some inches approximating feet: for the soil is so marshy that a simple covering of sand or dried mud-as is now done-cannot be more than a very temporary expedient. Hence the paving lately and now in progress cannot cifilure more than a few weeks; and must repeatedly require repairs which must eventually drain the city treasury of those resources essential for other improvements. This is palpably evident by the enormous exactions already made on the finances for paving—the account of which more than ledge of the public. We have therefore, no scruple in stating trebles that of any other item in the city expenditures? what we know of it. Where is now the patriotic energy attributed to the paving committee, with Alderman Caldwall as its chairman? and why slumbers the wholesome control which the members of the city council should preserve over the city treasury?

To THE GOVERNOR, etc.- The inhabitants of the 3d judicial district of this state have been compelled to take the excution of the law-by means of Lynch's code-into their own hands, in consequence of the malversation or neglect of the prosecuting attorney of that district. We have heard the conduct of that attorney reprobated in the severest terms as being disgraceful to the administration of justice.

Py advices from Liverpool of the 11th ult, and London of the 10th, it appears that many unsuccessful attempts were n ade to form a new ministry in England. Earl Gray declined, but sought to form a ministry of which Lori Melhourns should be premier; and Melbourne in his turn is rail to have declined. There is therefore a declination of the whig luminaries with the setting of the sun of toryism;however it may shortly be a mere matter of moonshine who shall be the prime minister; for the English people will dictate radical measures of reform to whatever ministry may

The Atlantic seaboard line from New York to New Or leans is now in a fair state of being commenced. A comriany of capitalists from Boston has obtained a charter from the legislature of Florida, to construct a railroad route across that territory from St Augustine on the Atlanti ocean, to the mouth of the Suwannes river flowing into the gull of Mexico. Merchants of New York and Charleston will employ steam packets or ships to the latter city; thence a company will continue similar conveyances to Savannah and St Augustine; and capitalists of this city will continu the route through the gulf of Mexico to New Orleans.

So ir therefore as regards the trade with the Atlantic cities, a grand desideratum will be obtained; but we confess we are sufficiently selfish for the interests of New Orl to require as a concomitant or prefer as a substitute lines of packets or steamships to foreign countries, to wnich we could export the commodities of the valley of the Mississippi and from which we would impert exchange articles requis. to for interior consumpt ion. Without such a system, New Orkans will eventually become a dependant on New York for most of her imports; and whether it is preferable for our merchants to have importations direct from foreign countries at prime cost; or to have them thence via New York of Charleston with additional expenses, may demand the serious attention and circumspect action of our own citizens.
