# APPEAL TO THRONE UNLESS B. C. WINS RAIL RATE FIGHT

Premier Oliver Back After Strenuous Argument Against High Freight Rates Before Canadian Privy Council.

Premier Oliver returned to Victoria this afternoon from his fight before the Privy Council at Ottawa for removal of freight rates discriminatory to this Province.

On his arrival he issued this statement:

"I am more hopeful of a favorable decision with regard to lower railway rates for British Columbia than I was when I went to Ottawa. I do not think there is a shadow of a doubt that on the werits of the facts and on the merits of the arguthat, on the merits of the facts and on the merits of the argument that we are entitled to everything that we asked for."

Premier Oliver does not look for an immediate judgment, and stated that a decision would be delayed for a month or more because of the necessity for transcribing the evidence and exhibits.

# **BALDWIN WILL MEET** POINCARE TO TALK OVER RUHR PROBLEM

British Premier, Recognizing Futility of Continued Exchange of Lengthy Notes, Prepared to Discuss Whole Reparations Question With French Leader

London, Aug. 23.—Recognizing the futility of a further exchange of lengthy notes on the reparation issue, Premier Baldwin has decided to meet Premier Poincare on the former's return from his vacation at Aix Les Baines, it became known to-day. The British Premier will not formally ask his French colleague for an appointment, but will make known quietly through second parties his readiness to discuss the whole reparations problem in the light of the French Premier's latest note. Profit by Suggestion

The British Premier feels that while in France he should profit by the suggestion contained at the end of M. Poincare's note that France was ready to discuss the indemnity problem verbally. It is thought possible Lord Curzon. Secretary of Foreign Affairs, may participate in the conference, since he plans to remain for some time at Bagnolles, where he is at spesent recuperating.



Exemption of improvements is a small part of the philosophy. Hence the use of the words "single tax" is a misnomer.






