In-context support

- Editing is hard
- About 97% of new editors quit
 - This is a problem, but also an opportunity
- Help is most useful during editing, not after editing




Contents

- Makes asking questions while editing easy
- Talk page message to a single dedicated user
- Very slow response times
- No real-time notification of reply
- Reply is on separate page



Discord

- Real-time
- Good UX
- Separate website & user identity
- Non-free, commercial tool: limited control, privacy problems, conflicts with Wikimedia movement values



Best of both worlds

Embed a free-software chat tool into Wikipedia

- Real-time support
- In-context help
- Single user identity
- Under our control
- Aligned with Wikimedia values



Implementation

- <u>Matrix</u> for chat protocol: free software & open standard, community governed, probably most used free-software chat tool, extremely extensible, accessibility & moderation are focus areas)
- <u>Chatterbox</u> embedded chat UI (maybe?)
- Honoroit for mapping 1:1 chats to threads in a "Support" room
- Some sort of <u>chatbot</u> to offer templated help for common questions
- Bridges, so supporters aren't required to use Matrix

Challenges - technical

- Wikimedia SUL login edge cases (non-ASCII names, renames)
- Combining Chatterbox with Wikimedia SUL login
- Combining Honoroit with a chatbot
- Self-hosting
- Most bridges have quality issues

Challenges - social

- Need experienced Wikipedians who are able to think with a newbie's mind
- Way more users seeking help than providing help
- Low retention rate will result in supporter burnout
- Potentially conflicting transparency & privacy expectations (should chat logs be preserved? who can see them?)
- Privacy if externally hosted tools are involved

How can you help?

- Discuss! The idea could use more eyes. (<u>how to contact me</u>)
 - Feedback from people providing support to new users via different means would be especially helpful.
- Technical contributions: see <u>Matrix project</u> on Phabricator, especially <u>T312707</u>
- Once the tool exists (not soon): build consensus on your wiki to deploy it, and find experienced editors willing to provide answers.
