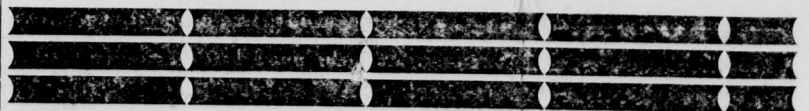

You may have as much legislation and appoint as many inspectors as you like, but the same state of things will go on as long as an industry is a question of private and not PUBLIC profit.

In spite of everything President Roosevelt can do, the only safe prophecy is that at the end of a few years a number of the beef inspectors will be able to retire on ample fortunes. Then perhaps there will be another outcry and ANOTHER SET OF INSPECTORS will be given an opportunity of amassing wealth.

Testimony For the Grange.

Miss Martha Van Rensselaer of Ithaca, N. Y., is supervisor of the farmers' wives reading courses of Cornell Agricultural college. It is not simply the farmer who is keeping pace with the thought of the day as respects his work, but the farmer's wife is keeping up with her work, and the children are being educated for life work."

GROSS FRAUDS APPARENT.

The Ross-Langford Contest Develops Some Startling Irregularities.

(East San Jose Post)

The past week has developed some startling revelations in the Ross-Langford contest. Gross frauds have been unearthed in the recount which did not appear at the time of the Campbell-Free contest a few weeks ago. At the first trial there appeared to be a slight clew to irregularities when East San Jose precinct gave Free 29 more votes than the official count. No thought was entertained, however, that the election board was anything but an honest one and that there must have been some other cause for the discrepancy than a deliberate attempt at fraud. Now there are many precincts in the same fix, among them being Palo Alto, Mayfield, Mountain View, Los Gatos, etc. In fact there were gains in some precincts for Ross running close to fifty, so that today Langford's 312 majority is overcome and some 60 to spare.

Ross claims that at least one official in each of these precincts were induced to misread the ballot on sheriff. Langford claims that the ballots have been tampered with since the Campbell-Free contest. And there you have it. No doubt something definite will soon be known in regard to the matter, and may the guilty ones be severely dealt with.

Attorney Howell C. Moore, chief counsel for Langford, yesterday announced his belief in open court that the ballots had been tampered with since the election.

"We claim," said Attorney Moore, "that some evil-minded person has had access to the ballots. Evidence of two forms of stamps being used on the ballots has been discovered. Many Langford votes have been given to Ross by a unique trick which some designing person has worked. In many instances the voter placed a cross in the circle at the head of the Democratic column. According to the Australian ballot law, such cross indicates that the person votes the straight Democratic ticket. But, strange to relate, in many cases where a straight Democratic ticket has been voted in this manner a cross has been stamped opposite the name of Ross for Sheriff in the Republican column.

We claim that the cross in most cases, in most cases observed, was placed after Ross' name by some person who had access to the ballots since the election returns were canvassed. We have carefully compared the stamps affixed and noted that they are not identical. To our mind this shows that the mark after the name of Ross was made for fraudulent purposes. This ruse is comparatively easy to work.

"It has the effect of voting the straight Democratic ticket except as to the candidate for Sheriff. Judging the ballot from its face, it would thus read that every candidate on the Democratic ticket was voted for except Langford. The cross in the space reserved for Ross in the Republican column would show that the voter preferred Ross for Sheriff."

Superior Judge Welch allowed these disputed ballots to be counted for Ross, but reserved his opinion as to the alleged fraudulent nature of the stamp used for Ross. Many other disputed ballots were counted blank.
