
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

PARCEL POST AND EXPRESS INFORMATION

Goods forwarded by Parcel Post are delivered quickly, and for short distances the charges are less than if sent by Express.

Parcels weighing 70 pounds or less can be forwarded by Parcel Post anywhere in the first three zones, and parcels weighing 50 pounds are delivered all over the country. Parcels going by mail must not exceed 84 inches in measurement all around and height included. This means that the distance from one end to the other added to the number of inches around the thickest part of the package must not be more than 84 inches, or 7 feet.

If you do not know what parcel post zone you live in, ask your postmaster.
Packages weighing 8 ounces or less can be sent at 1c. for 2 ounces

to any part of the country.

A Visit to the Home and Garden of John Howard Payne "HOME, SWEET HOME"

COUNTRY road, now wooded and again giving glimpses of the blue waters of the Atlantic; now showing green meadows stretching to right and left, reaching to far blue hills! I note with pleasure each changing phase of the road!! At last the old house, covered with wistaria, its white-curtained windows greeting me with kind eyes; and when the white front door, embellished with a brass knocker opens, and I pass the threshold, it seems to embrace me and bid mc stay within its quiet peace.

So this is the adorable little house that inspired John HOWARD PAYNE to write his immortal song; the house

where he spent his boyhood days. For two hundred and ninety years! it has been a home; its handhewn timbers held together by wooden spikes, and its sturdy shingles nailed with hand-wrought nails, a permanent memorial to the sacred love of home which is the cornerstone of the nation. At the back of the house I note the site of the old garden. Probably in the early days the flowers shared it with the vegetables; but-now the latter are banished and the flowers have full possession. It is June, and there is an abundance of roses; sweet brier, too, and moss roses. Pansies lift their bright faces from borders of sweet alyssum, dusty miller, marvel-of-peru, coleus, forget-me-nots and

mignonette. Iris, lemon lilies and ribbon grasses nod in the soft breezes. Peonies, red, white, and pink, sway gracefully above their rich green leaves. A little later the garden lilies, amaryllis, tuberoses, and other sweet-smelling things, hollyhocks, foxgloves, sweet peas, gladiolus, lady slippers and gay poppies will make the garden a riot of beauty. Then later flowers; nasturtiums climbing the fence to peep at the road; dainty cosmos, sturdy zinnias, crimson woolflowers, asters, white, pink, lavender and purple, followed by everlasting flowers, chrysanthemums and autumn foliage. I can imagine winter laying new beauty over this garden. The apple tree, the tall lilacs, the rose bushes and the small shrubs will be all decked out in diamonds and ermine almost too fair to seem real in their white purity; and nestling amid the whiteness the old house glowing with the warmth and welcome of home.


Then what must it be when spring comes and calls the sleeping flowers. The crocuses are the first to answer the call. Then the snowdrops shake their white bells, and the golden daffodils answer; the hyacinth too, comes forth, and the tulips vie with one another in brilliance. Soon the first yellow rose opens to the sun, and this is the signal that summer has come. So the year goes round.

The sketch on this page is one of the replica of the house of JOHN HOWARD PAYNE, author of "Home, Sweet Home," which was erected recently near the White House at Washington.

This modernized version of "Home, Sweet Home" is the permanent headquarters of the General Federation of Women's Clubs, and was built to further the aims of the Better Homes in America Campaign. It was constructed under the supervision of Donn Barber, the well-known architect.

It was officially opened on June 4th, 1923, by President Harding, ground having been broken for it several weeks before by Herbert Hoover.

The general plan and dimensions of the original have been closely followed except that a window has been added onto the front both upstairs and down, making the entrance hall exactly in the center of the building. Also concrete blocks stuccoed, and

a black slate roof have been used instead of shingles.

Our Back Cover

We show on the back cover of this catalogue a picture painted specially for us of the original "Home, Sweet Home" at Easthampton, L. I., now owned by Mr. G. H. Buik. This beautiful old home was built in 1660 in the style characteristic of the period and in easily available materials cypress shingles covering a wooden frame. Donn Barber describes it as "A simple shed-roofed two-gable house, rectangular in plan, with a small ell at one side of the rear dignified, direct and practical."

The charm of the old garden indicated in our picture cannot, of course, be duplicated in the Washington copy, but quite suitable plantings have been made around it.

That there is an analogy between the radiant energy of sunlight and that of an incandescent electric light because the plants receiving the additional electric light were decidedly more vigorous and of a richer green color than those not receiving it. (see the illustrations on this page). In each case the larger plant shown was subjected to the electric light, thus demonstrating its stimulating effect.

2. That plants having a broad leaf surface were stimulated more than others.

3. That light should be applied only in carefully chosen hours.

EXPERIMENTS WITH BULBOUS PLANTS

Continuing work along these lines we have placed one of our large Testing House's on Arlington Ave., Jersey City, at the disposal of the stinghouse Co. for a still more complete experiment with bulbous plants such as Easter Lilies, Narcissus, Tulips, Hyacinths and other flowers raised by Florists to meet seasonal demands.

This experiment will be practical in its nature and will demonstrate whether or not it will pay commercially to grow these plants by the aid of electric light. Peter Henderson & Co. will plant and grow the bulbs in the usual way on both sides of the testing house, but when the electric light


is turned on one side will be shielded from it.

The Westinghouse Co. will install and operate the electric plant necessary, and make notes of the results, publish them in the press and in various magazines about March 1st next. We, ourselves will also publish the results in the next edition of this Catalogue.

NATIONAL GARDEN WEEK-April 20th to 26th.

This movement was initiated last year by Mrs. E. D. Wangner of the Garden Magazine, and was subsequently taken in hand by the General Federation of Women's Clubs.

The Governors of many states fell into line and issued proclamations urging its observance and this year an even greater number of states will be interested in its observance. The date this year has been fixed for April 20th to 26th. It is of course impossible to fix a date that will be suitable to all states, because as everybody knows, seed sowing and planting begins in some sections much earlier than in others, but seeds, tools and garden requisites should be provided for in January or February to save loss of time when the ground is ready

It will be found that all of these may safely be planted in the summer

years. It will be found that all of these may safely be planted in the summer and early fall.

Succession sowings should be made of most vegetables throughout the Summer and early Fall to supply the table, but when vegetables are wanted for canning purposes or for storing it is better to sow seed late in the summer. Then, as the crops mature late, they keep longer.

Vegetables maturing in the late Fall are hardier and therefore better for storing in winter. Below we print a list of vegetable seeds suitable for sowing in June, July, August and September in the latitude of New York.



NOTE ON CULTURE

Although Cauliflower may be grown as easily as Cabbage, many, through lack of knowledge of the best methods of cultivation, may meet with failure. We urge those who are not familiar with its cultivation to read earcfully the pamphlet we have prepared on Cabbage and Cauliflower growing, wherein we have tried to point the way to success. We may say here briefly, that success depends on growing a large plant, and that, as Cauliflower is essentially a cool weather plant this cannot be done in the hot summer months. therefore, the plant, this cannot be done in the hot summer months, therefore, the earliest outdoor crop must be grown from seed sown under glass in February, so that the crop will mature by June 1st; for fall use, it should be sown late in May, so that best development may be made during the cooler weather of September and October.

Cow Peas

Cow Peas are more tender than Canada or Field Peas and should not be sown until Corn-planting time. Cow Peas, being of very rapid growth during the warm weather, can be sown a late as the middle of July with reasonable assurance of a profixable crop, either for harvesting or plowing under.

The early varieties of Cow Peas are quite extensively encucessfully grown for forage and soiling as far north as Massachusetts, but so far north the crop may not ripen seeds. As a soil renovator and enricher Cow Peas are very valuable. A crop of Cow Peas collects nitrogen from the air in large quantities and fixes it in the soil, thus adding this expensive element of fertilizer to the land without cost, and leaving it richer and in splendid condition for the future crop. 

SEED SOWING

Most cases of failure of seeds to come up are due to unsuitable soil conditions. It is mechanically impossible that young seedlings can define shoots upwards through soil which is hard and packed, neither can tender rootlets pierce downward in such soil. The result is an abortive effort grow. So let the soil, either in the cold frame, or the permanent bed, be well dug and pulvertized. Fine soil should be sitted on top to at least an inch in 5th, and if heavy or clayer, lighthened with sand. Smooth down the surface with a piece of board about 8 in. square, to the center of which a small block is been nailed to hold on by. Then with a pointed stick mark out the rows, letting me run the narrow way of the frame or box. Stick in a name label at the end of each viandthen drop the seeds in a little pinch at a time, taking care to spread it so that it does lie in lumps (see engraving). Very small seeds should be sown broadcast on a square ce, and the label stuck in the center. Sow large seeds one by one, an inch apart, tearth over all to cover them as deep as twice their diameter, and then press down and again with the board. Hard shell seeds like Ipomoeas, Cannas, etc., should be ked in water 24 hours to soften before planting. Lay over the bed a piece of thin cotton cloth, and water with a fine spray. When the seeds come up, remove the cloth. After this do not let the soil dry out, and raise the sash or pane of glass, as the case may be, to admit air on warm days.

Seed sowing in permanent beds is accomplished in the same way, but of course is not done until May 10th to May 15th, with some exceptions already noted. Note that when seeds are sown out-doors they should be covered more deeply than if sown indoors or under glass. Cover to fully three times the diameter of the seed. Some gardeners lacking a cold frame plant all t





10th to 15th or whenever the weather is settled. Water the seedlings and is settled. Water the seedlings and also the ground they are to be transplanted to, the day before, so that soil conditions are equal. Separate the seedlings with a sharp stick, and if they are growing thickly together place a clump of them in water to soften the soil. Transplant when 2 or 3 "true" leaves appear. (see energing).

ANNUAL FLOWER SEEDS. These complete the cycle of their existence growing from seed to seed in one year. Some require to be sown in some sheltered situation such as a greenhouse, cold frame, or window box about a month before they may be planted outdoors. By sowing thus early, the growing season is proportionately prolonged. Others may be sown where they are to stand, but require careful attention for the first few weeks. Annuals offer a large field for selection, embracing plants of all kinds, from the modest Swect Alyssum to the gorgeous Salvia, the majestic Ricinus, and dainty Cosmos. They are found in every conceivable shade of color, and are adaptable for growing as single specimens, or planting in clumps or masses, while others are well suited for making borders. While there is no class of plants that will survive better under rigorous conditions, yet in order to achieve the best results they should be planted where they can obtain ample sunlight, and may be easily watered. It is almost needless to urge the importance of careful weeding, as weeds usually grow more rapidly than the seedlings. If the rows are carefully marked when sown it will be easy to distinguish the weeds.

A continuity of bloom may be secured by occasional sowings of many sorts, such as Eschscholtzia, Sweet Alyssum Phlox, Zinnia, etc. In the latitude of New York these sowings may be made as late as June 15th.

Their continuous-blooming qualities, ease of culture and independence of heat and drought, and pure, bright colors, should entitle them to a permanent place in gardens. Although perennials in the South, they do splendidly when grown as annuals in the North; spring-sown seed produces flowering plants by July, which continue to bloom in increasing profusion until frost. The flowers are nearly double the size of the older sorts. An effective bed may be formed by planting the center with the tall varieties and the outer rows with the semi-dwarf; planted in a combination of separate colors the effect is very beautiful—although even a "Mixed" bed is a feast for the eyes; the plants should be placed 9 inches apart each way. Pinching out the tops—although it delays the beginning of flowering—forces the plants to branch low and ultimately gives better results. (See engraving.)



The old favorite Hollyhock can seldom be flowered from seed before the second year, and as the young plants frequently winter-kill, it has limited the cultivation of Hollyhocks to those willing to g,ve the young plants special winter care. The plants from early-sown seed set out in May commence blooming in July, the May-sown in August, and in either event they flower profusely until frost.

The flower buds, borne in clusters, vary in maturity from the developing bud to the expanding flower; this characteristic accounts for the remarkably long flowering period, and, besides, the plants continuously push outside branches as well as new spikes from the base, all of which also develop their quota of flowers almost ad infinitum.

The diversity of forms and colors among the flowers affords many delightful surprises. Some plants produce densely double flowers without guards, others with guard petals; there are semi-doubles with Anemone-flowered centers, some with smooth-edged petals, others flounced, fringed, etc., and all flowers are usually very large, some measuring five inches across. In colors there is also great variety, some richly brilliant, others dainty and exquisite, then there are colors and tints in charming combinations. There are maroon, black, pink, chamois-rose, apricot with garnet throat, crimson, canary-yellow, pink with claret throat and veins, blush with carmine lacings, cerisc, white, scarlet, blush with white throat magenta, apricot with buff margin, wine-red with white edge, etc., etc.

The plants are of vigorous and healthy growth and naturally branching in habit. The center spike, if not pinched, attains a height of from 8 to 10 feet, after which, if permitted, the side shoots from the base commence to lengthen, growing candelabra-like, 3 to 5 feet long. Gladiolus Primulinus Hybrids

A few years ago the wild "Primulinus" Gladiolus was discovered near Victoria Falls, South Africa. As we know the modern garden varieties of today it was inferior-but what was important it was rugged, floriferous and bore the purest yellow flowers known among Gladiolus. In consequence it was taken in hand by several Galdiolus hybridizers who crossed it with various allied species and choice garden varieties; although the strong, wild blood of Primulinus predominates these hybrids, yet the opposite parents have had so much influence that we describe the hybrids as follows: Flowers of medium size, borne profusely; colors, bright and varied with an undertone of yellow-as pure yellow, chamois, orange, buff, copper, yellow shot with orange, buff with orange-rose, orange-red, some with soft orange or golden throats, etc., growth vigorous, from 3 to 5 feet high; spikes long, graceful and well furnished most graceful and beautiful for vases.

With proper management, fresh vegetables may be had from the garden, almost from the beginning till the end of the year.

The era of high prices for vegetables is still with us, therefore the garden should be made to produce its utmost. We wish to make it generally understood that the possibilities of the garden have by no means been exhausted after the first crop is produced. Sowings may be made all during the summer, till well into fall. The dates given apply for the

OCTOBER

Spinach, Corn Salad and Radish may still be sown in the cold frame during the early part of the month. As heavy frosts are usually due about the end of the month the vegetables should be dug and stored for winter use. NOVEMBER

Rhuharb roots if set out now will bear a crop next spring. Parsnips and Salsify are very hardy, and may be left outdoors all winter.
