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

G-2 GHQ SCAP-FEC PLAN FOR EMERGENCIES CONTEMPLATED
UNDER "TOLLBOOTH" OPERATIONS

I. 441st CIC DET PLAN

1. GENERAL

a. Paragraph b, Section I of "Tollbooth" Basic Outline Plan for Action of Occupation Forces in Japan In Event of Civil Disturbances as issued by General Headquarters, SCAP, 31 July 47 states that one of the two general objectives provided for in that plan is the maintenance of Security of the Occupation Forces and their installations. It is toward the accomplishment of this objective that the 441st Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment will direct its efforts.

2. OPERATIONAL DIRECTIVES

a. At all times the operations of Counter Intelligence Corps Detachment will be in accordance with the provisions of War Department Letter AG 322 CIC (31 October 44) OB-S-B-M and Circular No. 72 GHQ FEC dated 20 June 1947.

3. STATEMENT OF MISSION

a. Paragraph 3 Circular No 72 GHQ FEC dated 20 June 47 is herewith quoted:

"3. Mission. a. General. The mission of the Counter Intelligence Corps is to contribute to the successful operation of the United States forces in the Far East Command and occupied areas through the detection of espionage, sabotage, treason, sedition, disaffection, and other subversive activity within the armed forces, the military establishment and affiliated agencies, and in occupied areas by Japanese or foreign nationals; to apprehend enemy agents or otherwise nullify their activities; to cooperate with police, law enforcement, and surveillance agencies, viz., Provost Marshal, Military Police, Military Government; to inform proper authorities regarding deficiencies in the instruction in security of military personnel in the field and during operations, and, in combat areas, to assist in insuring necessary security of captured enemy installations, documents, and materiel; and to intensify security surveillance.

b. Occupied Areas. The general mission of the Counter Intelligence Corps has been expanded in the Far East Command to include the surveillance of subversive activities by individuals or ideological movements, national or foreign, that have an adverse effect on the purposes and objectives of the occupation in the Philippines-Ryukyus Command, the Marianas-Bonins Command, Korea, and Japan, and to intensify security surveillance under the general intent of counter-espionage."

b. In order to best accomplish this assigned mission the 441st CIC Detachment has established throughout the four main islands of Japan a counter-intelligence network which includes units in all prefectures.

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c. In the ability to detect and give adequate warning of potential subversive activity on the part of individuals or organizations lies the greatest service of the CIC and it is toward the accomplishment of that service that this organization concentrates its efforts at all times.

4. OPERATIONAL POLICIES AND RESPONSIBILITIES DURING PERIODS OF TOLLBOOTH EMERGENCIES

a. Minor Emergency.

- (1) Disturbances Directed Against Occupation Forces or Their Installations.
 - (a) Provide self-security for personnel and records.
 - (b) Effect liaison with S-2's of nearest tactical units, Military Government units, and Provost Marshals.
 - (c) Carry out the mission assigned to CIC as refers to the identification and apprehension of ring-leaders responsible for uprising.
 - (d) Make such recommendations to S-2's of tactical commands as are deemed necessary by the CIC unit commander to insure the protection from sabotage of systems of communication and other vital installations both civil and military.
 - (e) Determine through investigation the who, what, why, when, where and how involved, concerning the disturbances and to keep tactical commanders completely informed at all times.
- (2) Disturbances Between Elements of the Civil Population or Directed Against the Japanese Government.
 - (a) Immediately place into effect such policies as are enumerated in preceding paragraph with the single exception of par c. In an uprising involving only Japanese subjects and interests, whether individual or governmental, the responsibility for the identification and apprehension of ringleaders is a proper function of Japanese authority and becomes a matter within the jurisdiction of CIC only when actions are directed against the Occupation Forces or their installations. CIC will, however, gather information on ringleaders for future reference.
 - (b) Disturbances directed against policies of SCAP being implemented by the Japanese Government will be reported by the most expeditious means through CIC channels to G-2 GHQ for determination of further action to be taken.

b. Limited Emergency:

- (1) If SCAP should declare a state of Limited Emergency to be existant in a certain area of Japan the resultant actions and policies of CIC will be:
 - (a) CIC personnel and equipment in the affected area at the discretion of the Commanding General, Eighth

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U.S. Army, will be temporarily attached to tactical units in the sensitive areas. The Commanding Officer, 441st CIC Detachment will maintain close liaison with G-2 Eighth U.S. Army and, if requested, will arrange for augmentation of CIC personnel in the areas so designated.

- (b) CIC personnel, under the general supervision of the G-2 or S-2 of the unit to which they may be attached will carry out the CIC mission as stated in paragraph 3.
- (c) At all times CIC will maintain close liaison with G-2, Eighth U.S. Army, AGM and office of the Provost Marshal.
- (d) When CIC Detachments are attached to tactical units of Eighth Army, all instructions from the 441st CIC Detachment, other than routine administration matters such as promotions, etc., will be passed through the AC of S, G-2, Eighth Army.
- (e) CIC operational reports will be submitted to the AC of S, G-2 or S-2 of the unit to which attached. Information copies of operational reports and all administrative reports will be forwarded through CIC channels, in accordance with par 8, Circular 72, GHQ, FEC, Subject: "Counter Intelligence Corps", dated 20 June 1947.

c. Major Emergency:

- (1) The Commanding Officer, 441st CIC Det, upon declaration of "Major Emergency" by SCAP, which authorizes the conduct of full-scale military operations under the provisions of FM 27-10, "Rules of Land Warfare" in order to quell widespread serious disorders by (1) an organized or quasi-organized ~~or quasi-organized~~ enemy or (2) a general uprising among the inhabitants, will:
 - (a) In full coordination with G-2, Eighth U.S. Army, effect such re-deployment and reinforcement of CIC personnel and equipment as is deemed necessary in defense of the five strategic areas which must be retained at all costs. See Annex 3b (3) (d) to Basic "Tollbooth Plan" as published 31 July 1945.
 - (b) Will temporarily attach CIC personnel in the sensitive areas to tactical units.
 - (c) Will, through channels, supply such information as is secured through CIC sources to the Commanding General, Eighth U.S. Army, in order to assist him in the preparation of his weekly report to SCAP, relative to the extent of civil disturbances progress in quelling civil disturbances, estimate of probable duration of the emergency and other significant matters of CIC nature.
- (2) Duties in Theatres of Operations.... Pursuant to the general plan of the Theatre Commander the operational duties of Counter Intelligence Corps personnel include: (as directed by AG 322 CIC (31 Oct 44) OB-S-B-M)

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(a) Primary Duty in Forward Combat Areas. The primary duty of Counter Intelligence Corps personnel is in securing counter-intelligence targets in the area of the objective. Foremost among these targets are:

1. Known enemy and suspect enemy agents.
2. Known enemy collaborationists, sympathizers, and other persons whose presence menaces the security of the Allied Forces.
3. Offices formerly occupied by the enemy intelligence services or enemy police organizations and any documents they contain.
4. Offices of local semi-military organizations and collaborationist bodies and their records.
5. Centers of Communications.
6. Buildings, billets, and installations known or suspected to contain documents of counter-intelligence value.

(b) Secondary Duties in Forward Combat Areas.

1. Making security checks in cooperation with the Military Police who are marshalling refugees and other civilians arriving from enemy occupied territory.
2. Contacting local authorities and persons known to be friendly to the allied cause in order to secure all possible counter-intelligence information.
3. Advising upon and assisting in securing against sabotage all public and private installations, the continued operation of which is essential to the Allied Forces.
4. Checking upon the observance by civilian population of all security provisions contained in the proclamations and orders issued by Civil Affairs detachments.
5. Assisting in the discovery and collection of any hidden armaments or equipment which have not been surrendered or reported in accordance with ordinances.
6. The seizure of Civil communications and plans for their protection against sabotage until taken over by authorized Signal Communications personnel as provided in operational orders. The records of such installations are of prime importance and should be secured, guarded, and turned over to the proper authorities.
7. Seizing and impounding all civilian and captured enemy mail.
8. Advising on the immediate establishment of guards at all captured ordnance and ammunition dumps, especially those which may be accessible to the local

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population.


9. Stopping publication of newspapers and other periodicals.
 10. Taking measures necessary to prevent looting and destructions of enemy documents and material by our own troops.
 11. Transmitting to Civil Affairs, Provost Marshal and Military Police personnel all information on matters within their purview, such as civilian controls, adequacy and extent of cooperation of civil police, and the extent of disorder, looting and sabotage.
- (3) Counter Intelligence Corps Personnel will at all times govern their actions as directed by Army Regulations and orders issued by Commanding Officers of the tactical units to which they may be attached. CIC personnel are at all times encouraged to use their initiative to the fullest extent in the fulfillment of the Counter-Intelligence Corps mission.

II. CIVIL CENSORSHIP DETACHMENT PLAN:

1. In the event of a civil disturbance in Japan as envisaged under "Tollbooth" Operations, the facilities of civil censorship will be utilized in accordance with the seriousness of the situation to control postal, telecommunications, press, pictorial and broadcast channels and media throughout Japan to:

a. Obtain through public information media fields and communications, auxiliary information pertaining to the identity, location, plans, and objectives of insurgent or dissident leaders and elements in conformance with targets set by the Theater Commander to enhance overall intelligence and thus assist SCAP to suppress the disturbances and enforce Occupation objectives.

b. Curtail or expand the flow of information as necessary in order to exercise control of the disturbances by:

- (1) Preventing undesirable information from being transmitted through postal and telecommunication channels.
- (2) Preventing information and materials from entering the area of disturbance which would give aid and comfort to those personnel or groups inciting the unrest.
- (3) Eliminating the possibility of disseminating objectionable material through press, pictorial and radio broadcast media.

2. The provisions of JCS Directive 878/3, dated 12 November 1944, apply to the treatment of control of civil communications and informational material under any emergency during the presence of U.S. Forces in an occupied territory and will be placed in effect in conformance with the seriousness of the disturbance and, in general will be accomplished in the following manner:

a. Postal and Telecommunications Facilities:

(1) Minor Emergency:

- (a) All mail from the area of disturbance will be examined.
- (b) All telegrams terminal to or originating in the area of disturbances which terminate in or transit any point where there is a District Telecommunications Station will be given priority in examination. All telephone trunks to or from the area of disturbance which terminate in or transit any point where there is a District Telecommunications Station will be monitored on a 24-hour schedule.
- (c) The District Station, Civil Censorship Detachment, located nearest the area of disturbance will be placed on a 24 hour schedule.
- (d) Personnel in Communications Division, Civil Censor-

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ship Detachment Headquarters, will be placed on a 24 hour schedule for the purpose of coordinating and disseminating information received.

(2) Limited Emergency:

- (a) All mail from the area of disturbance will be called in for processing and given priority over other mail in examination.
- (b) All telegrams terminal to or originating in the area of disturbance which terminate in or transit any point where there is a District Telecommunications Station will be given priority in examination. All telephone trunks to or from the area of disturbance which terminate in or transit any point where there is a District Telecommunications Station will be monitored on a 24-hour schedule.
- (c) The Civil Censorship Detachment Headquarters and District Stations will be manned on a 24 hour basis.

(3) Major Emergency:

- (a) Civil Censorship Detachment Headquarters and District Stations throughout Japan will be placed on a 24 hour basis.
- (b) Mail will be selected on a control basis consistent with the nature of the emergency. External telecommunications will be pre-censored on a 24-hour basis. Telephone trunk lines will be monitored on a 24-hour basis to the full extent of the monitoring equipment available and coverage of local lines to the extent dictated by the nature of the emergency.
- (c) Under the most extreme conditions if it becomes necessary to halt civil communications, except for official communications only, Civil Censorship personnel will be utilized to effect the control.
- (d) Reports will be made and processed only on information related to the emergency, unless it is possible to carry out additional functions.
- (e) Personnel that can be spared from duties incident to service functions will be employed to process mail and telecommunications.

b. Press, Pictorial, and Broadcast Media:

- (1) In the event of a civil disturbance in which all elements of Japanese communication and transportation systems are in operation and under the normal control exercised by the Occupation Forces, Press, Pictorial and Broadcast Stations in the areas concerned will execute a stringent policy in suppressing the dissemination of material defiant or critical of the objectives of Occupation Forces or of such a nature as to enhance the intentions of those groups fomenting the disturbance. The control would be exercised by:
 - (a) Transfer of all press and publications media, (to include news and photo services, newspapers, and magazines), normally on a post-censorship status

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which may merit scrutiny prior to dissemination for publication, to a pre-censorship basis in order to eliminate objectionable material from these media and increase coverage on sources of informational material.

- (b) Transfer of all indigenous broadcast material (to include short- and medium-wave and radio-telegraphic broadcast service) to a complete pre-censorship basis utilizing broadcast censorship installations operative at Sapporo, Sendai, Tokyo, Matsuyama, Nagoya, Hiroshima, and Fukuoka as pre-censorship control and enforcement agencies.
- (c) Shift of trained censorship teams engaged in post-censorship of press and publications media in PPB Division (Tokyo) to establish two central pre-censorship control and enforcement agencies, the first in Tokyo, the second in Osaka. Personnel shifted to Osaka will be implemented into Civil Censorship Detachment District II installation; this action will expedite pre-censorship operations and make translations of informational material immediately available.

- (2) In the event of a civil disturbance in which normal Occupation control has been abrogated and communications and transportation facilities are not in operation, control will be accomplished by the issuance of a directive, by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers per authority contained in JCS Directive 1380/15, dated 3 November 1945, directing that all material to be initiated and published, broadcast or exhibited in Japan will be transmitted to appropriate Civil Censorship Detachment District Station prior to dissemination for publication, broadcast, or exhibition. The control would be accomplished in two phases:

- (a) Initially, all indigenous public informational media would be submitted for pre-censorship scrutiny to PPB Division (Tokyo) and Civil Censorship Detachment District Station installations located at Sapporo, Osaka, and Fukuoka, according to physical location of indigenous media establishments.
- (b) Shift of trained censorship teams engaged in post-censorship of public informational media in PPB Division (Tokyo) to Civil Censorship Detachment District Stations at Sapporo, Osaka, and Fukuoka to implement broadcast censorship staffs and establish centers for the pre-censorship control and enforcement of all indigenous public informational media.

3. District Stations in areas outside Tokyo will be governed by instructions from CGD Headquarters, and the provisions of this plan.

4. Administrative:

a. Administrative requirements necessary to fulfill the above-mentioned operational mission for Civil Censorship Detachment in the Tokyo area will be obtained through authorizations contained in Headquarters and Service Group Emergency Plan, dated 10 September 1947.

b. Administrative functions of Civil Censorship Detachment Stations

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in regions outside Tokyo will be in accordance with plans developed jointly between the Civil Censorship Detachment Units and Occupation Force units in the respective areas.

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

III. ATIS PLAN:

1. In the event of an emergency, with Japan, as declared by the Supreme Commander, for the Allied Powers in accordance with the plan for "Tollbooth" Operations, that comes within the purview of Par 3, Sec III, Cir 62, GHQ, FEC, 2 July 47, ATIS as the Theater Linguist Agency, will function as outlined in subsequent paragraphs:

a. When a state of emergency is declared as existing in Japan, all United States Army Linguists therein engaged in the production of operational intelligence from captured documents and prisoners of war will be assigned to ATIS. This will include all Linguist Detachments assigned to Eighth Army and its subordinate commands and the Headquarters Linguist Detachments currently at the Ports interrogating repatriates.

b. Linguist personnel so assigned will be attached to Eighth Army as follows:

- (1) All Headquarters Linguist Detachments now assigned duties at the interrogation ports (four detachments, each consisting of eight (8) officers and twenty-three (23) enlisted men) to be attached to Eighth Army for duty with the four divisions thereof.
- (2) Linguist Detachments (seven detachments, each consisting of three (3) officers and eight (8) enlisted men) now with Eighth Army units to be reallocated and attached to Corps and Army (each to have seven (7) officers and (18) enlisted men).

2. In the event that it should become necessary to supply Eighth Army with additional linguist personnel, ATIS will attach and dispatch by organic transportation to CG Eighth Army an advance echelon of ADVATIS, consisting of six (6) Translator Teams and six (6) PW Interrogator Teams for intelligence duties, each team to consist of one officer and three enlisted men, as per roster maintained in ATIS. Linguist personnel in above teams will be equipped with full field equipment, three days rations plus one days emergency rations and one unit of fire per weapon by ATIS. Upon receipt of instructions that Phase "A" or "B" plans are in effect, they will be formed into teams as listed above. They will be dispatched via train or the most expeditious means available to join the appropriate RCT (this information would have to be furnished ATIS). Upon arrival at an RCT, they will be attached to the RCT as a reinforcing language team. They will be under direct control of the RCT for strictly G-2 linguist duties.

3. Should the situation be of such a grave nature that additional linguistic support is necessary, ATIS will dispatch ADVATIS, a self-contained unit, less the twelve (12) teams mentioned in par 2 above, to the CG Eighth Army for intelligence duties (see T/D ADVATIS, Incl 2).
