GOLD AND TRADE. Mr. W. F. Thompson, editor and manager of the Yukon Sun, thinks there is greater necessity for an assay office in Dawson City than in either Victoria or Vancouver. He gives very good reasons for his opinion, too, chief of them being the great inconvenience the traders of the North are put to through the use of gold dust as currency. Assay offices should have been established at Dawson and Victoria, the former for the benefit of the people of the North and the latter for the convenience of the diggers of the coast, who have been in the habit of marketing most of their dust here. But we are pleased to know that the energy of the business men of Vancouver has been rewarded with an office there. The chief thing is to retain in Canada all the business that rightfully belongs to us. The report of the director of the United States mint shows that but for Canadian mineral products the institution at Seattle might as well close its doors. Such things should not be, and when we succeed in getting trade diverted to its natural channels in spite of the opposition of conservative bankers who perceive danger to their craft in all departures from established custom, they will not be. The Post-Intelligencer has been telling its readers lately that its country is quite independent of all foreign countries and can raise its tariff to an altitude sufficient to shut out all their goods and laugh at their attempts to retaliate. Our contemporary is surely willfully blind. Seattle would have been a much smaller city to-day and the Post-Intelligencer a very much poorer newspaper but for the trade of the Canadian Northwest.

DISARM THEM. If it be true that the Japs on the Fraser river are going about their lawful occupations armed, the authorities should disarm them at once. The law is powerful enough to protect them and no doubt will protect them in all their rights. By making a display of firearms, of which like all semi-civilized peoples, they are rather fond, they invite a conflict, and men who under the conditions which prevail on the Fraser at the present time go about proclaiming the fact that they are spilling for a fight are fairly sure to meet some one willing to accommodate them. Because one blatherskite who calls himself a union man tells the newspapers that the strikers are about to send men with guns after the gunners in the boats, we are not to assume that the mass of the white men are so misguided as to follow his advice. We have no doubt that the counsels of the wiser men will prevail and hope that a settlement may yet be effected which will be satisfactory to all concerned. But there is no justification for Japs or white men parading around with arms in their hands and the provisions of the law should be set in force against all law-breakers.

PURITY OF TRUSTS. Mr. Borden, the leader of the Conservative party, says the large corporations and trusts must not be allowed to obtain dominion in Canada; they must be curbed and controlled. The Colonist approves of his leader's sentiments in a tentative way, arguing that while in the United States capitalists "dominate legislatures, courts, and even the judiciary to an extent which at first sight seems incredible to an outsider," such domination is not wherewithal to command the services of persuasion possessed by able men, that does it all. Only capitalists possess the wherewithal to command the services of these men of giant intellect; hence the influence of the corporations. We had a splendid example of the potency of eloquence and the persuasive power of applied intellect during the late session of the British Columbia legislature. There was no corruption there. There is never anything of that kind in a British country. But the C. P. R. and its island ally were not heard saying much, and they won hands down. The unscrupulous Americans who would steal our country and all that is therein were most effectually curbed and taught that we shall have none of them here while there are companies which wave the Union Jack when it suits their purposes and run their roads to the other side and wave the Stars and Stripes there again when it suits their purposes, to do their business for them at rates as high as the nature of the business will stand. Unfortunately, however, for the contention of our contemporary, it has been proved that the rule of the corporations is corrupt both in the United States and Canada. Proof of this was furnished by revelations in Philadelphia a few weeks ago and by a dispatch from Montreal which appears in the columns of our contemporary this morning. The men who are rich seem to be filled with an insatiable desire for more riches. In Philadelphia civic franchises worth millions, and for which millions had been offered, were given away for nothing, ostensibly. The aldermen could tell a different story, no doubt. In Montreal the deal was of a smaller character, involving thousands instead of millions. Our old friend Sir William Van Horne was in it, but of course he knew nothing of the means that were being employed to secure the franchise for his company. He comes from the United States, and there the dominion of capital is "not necessarily corrupt."

Filled with righteous indignation because of the treatment he received at the hands of the electors of St. John, Mr. Foster has shaken the dust of the province from his feet and has erected his tabernacle in Toronto, Ont. The Conservative party has long suffered for want of a strong man in Ontario and Mr. Foster thinks, no doubt, that that weakness he can remove. A seat has been offered to the ex-Financo Minister by one of the men who have controlled the destinies of the party so disastrously for the past half dozen years. This has been done without the formality of consulting the electors, either Grit or Tory. The latter are not so meek now as they were in the days when it was at all times a pleasure to obey the behests of John A. They had confidence in their leaders then. Men of the Foster stamp do not win either confidence or esteem. So it is possible that the Tories of Addington may stick to their opinion that it is well to be represented by a local man and that Mr. Foster may have to wait for an opening in Toronto. That he is a strong man and a useful member of the House when he was in it, there is no doubt. When he gets there again, as he surely will, he will be more popular on both sides if he puts a curb upon his tongue. He talks too much and he says things which make many enemies for him even in the ranks of his own party.
