

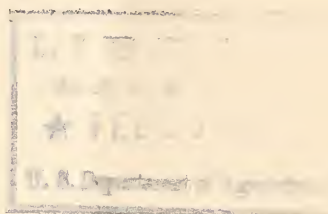

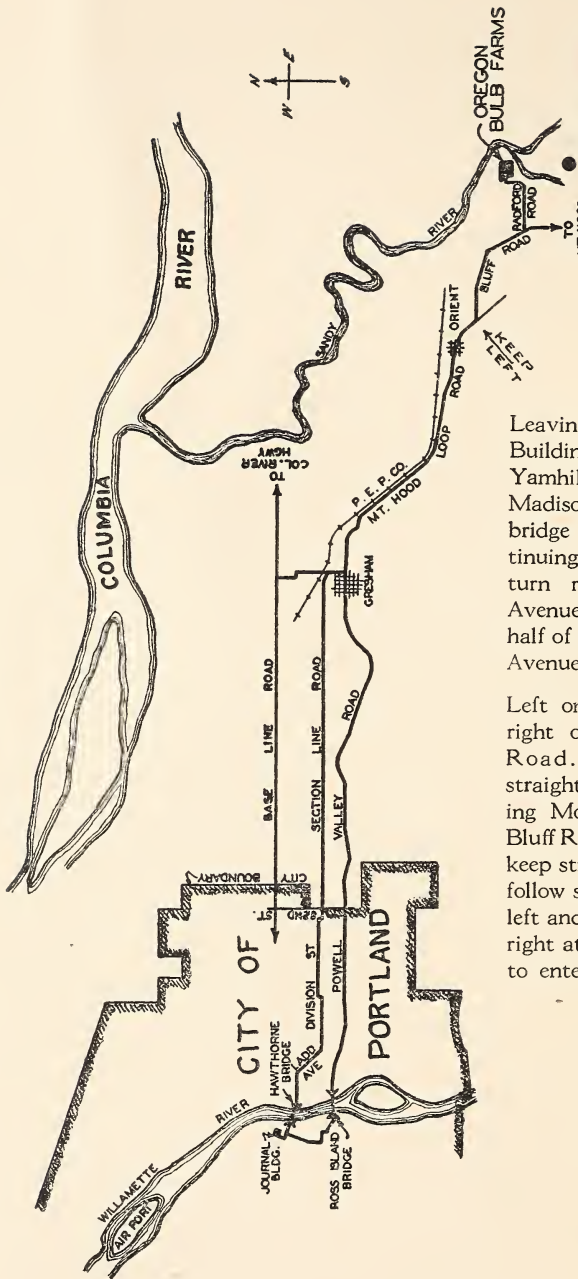

How to Reach the Farm

Leaving our office in the Journal Building, corner of Broadway and Yamhill, go South on Broadway to Madison Street, thence left across bridge to Hawthorne Avenue, continuing East to 12th Street, thence turn right diagonally on Ladd Avenue straight ahead, around right half of circle and continue on Ladd Avenue to Division Street.

Left on Division to 82nd Street, right on 82nd to Powell Valley Road. Left on Powell Valley straight through Gresham, following Mount Hood Loop Road to Bluff Road. Leaving the pavement, keep straight ahead on Bluff Road, follow signs to Radford Road, turn left and follow Radford Road, turn right at gas station and thence left to enter the Oregon Bulb Farms.


This will save you the costly importing charges and risks, and dealers can purchase and sell without restriction.

THE stocks for the Oregon Bulb Farms involved a very heavy investment, and much careful thought was given to their selection. Only those varieties were chosen that passed favorably the severe standards of the leading Dutch and English experts and are internationally recognized as the outstanding successes of the world's best hybridizers.

We have spared no effort to make this list as comprehensive as possible, at the same time avoiding varieties that closely resemble each other. It will be found that each variety we offer has outstanding merits and fully deserves a place in this unique collection.

The most critical and successful growers, such as Barr, de Graaff, Engleheart and others, consider in the first place the fine proportions, substance and color of a flower, and while the vigorous free growing habits of these new hybrids produce very large flowers, size is of minor importance with them. Although many large flowers lacking refinement and other good qualities have been exploited by other firms, their popularity has only been temporary and we did not include them in our collections.

Competitive shows all over the United States, where varieties of our selection won Blue Ribbons and Special Mention, clearly indicated the trend of public taste and visitors to our farms marvel at the perfection of our flowers, as they retain their coloring and form due to their great substance and inherent superiority under most severe weather conditions, and do not fade in sunlight.

In undertaking the distribution of these valuable novelties, we wish to make it plain that their aesthetic appeal has a substantial supporting commercial background, and we consider it not only our responsibility but a pleasurable obligation to direct the purchaser to the best of our knowledge in the selection and culture of bulbs of the varieties and types that are recognized as having the greatest commercial possibilities.



IN addition to the varieties offered here we grow a large number of the very best and latest novelties of English and Dutch hybridizers. As in most cases we only have one or two bulbs of these varieties, the price often exceeding \$100 for each bulb, we do not quote them in this price list.



ALL daffodils and other bulbs offered are grown by us on our own Farms at Dodge Park, Oregon, under the personal supervision of Prof. M. B. McKay. As they are grown in a very cool climate they are particularly hardy which makes them especially adapted for Northern gardens. The long moist Spring and the dry Summer months of Oregon provide an ideal growing season and our customers will note that either forced or grown in the garden our flowers stand out through greater substance and larger size as compared to bulbs grown in warmer climates and they are not subject to bulb or basal rot.

All bulbs are guaranteed to be free from diseases and pests and are officially inspected and certified before shipping.


Daffodils and Narcissi for Naturalizing

OUR mixtures are specially made up from named varieties and are greatly superior to the cheap mixtures frequently sold. We do not grow any mixed daffodils and we only select varieties that are specially adapted for naturalizing. They may be relied upon to give an abundant supply of flowers over a long period.

The New Trumpet Daffodils

THOUGH the tremendous improvements in Daffodils are more noticeable to the general public in the red cupped varieties, the real daffodil connoisseur and all those taking an interest in harmony of lines and color will delight in the perfection of the new trumpet daffodils we offer.

We have picked for introduction in America only those varieties that come up to the high standards set by the most discriminating judges.

The difference between a King Alfred and a King Lear may not be obvious to the casual spectator when studied in the field, but when bunched for the market the greater refinement and substance as well as the better formed perianth stands out at once and shows why these improved trumpet varieties are taken up so readily by Dutch and English growers for stock purposes.

These new Hybrid Trumpet Daffodils, mostly seedlings of King Alfred, form an advanced group, superior in substance, coloring, refinement of form, vigor of growth, length of stem and flowering qualities.

White Trumpet Daffodils

SINCE Madam de Graaff, the first white hybrid trumpet daffodil was brought out in 1884 from a cross between Albicans and Empress, made by Mr. S. A. de Graaff, this firm has been foremost in the perfection of White Trumpet daffodils. All the de Graaff seedlings show perfect proportions of flower and plant and their charm and gracefulness is irresistible. One of their outstanding successes is Jungfrau.

We obtained a very fine collection of the best de Graaff novelties, also those Mrs. R. O. Backhouse has produced. These latter show a marked difference in that they have a Leedsii parentage. They have an unusual substance and a marked uniformity. Their color and form are excellent, and we can very strongly recommend such flowers as La Vestale and Lovenest as exceptional show-flowers.

Both de Graaff and Mrs. Backhouse have been working towards the production of a daffodil with a red trumpet. While de Graaff was first in the market with such attractive flowers as Athalia, and Sirene, Mrs. Backhouse with the flower named after her, brought out an entirely different strain. We are offering several of her hybrids as well as de Graaff's latest productions, Jim, a dark apricot colored trumpet, and Veronica, a Leedsii with a shell-pink cup. (For Veronica, see Page 18.)

NARCISSUS—*Incomparabilis*

WE can safely say that the outstanding development in daffodils of recent years is the astonishing increase in the number of varieties having red crowns, also in the greater depth and brilliance of the color in these cups, and the coming of the Giant *Incomparabilis*, with large red or orange cups.

At the 1922 Daffodil Show of the Royal Horticultural Society in London, the last personal appearance of the late Mrs. R. O. Backhouse, she brought three big red-cupped flowers that created a sensation—almost consternation among the growers. The varieties shown were Red Cross, Stella Pratt and Franciscus Drake.

De Graaff, who was the first to introduce red-cupped daffodils in Holland, at once realized the immense commercial value of these hybrids and secured the complete stocks of Mrs. Backhouse's best seedlings, and at the same time acquired the most outstanding novelties of other English hybridizers, such as Copeland, who raised John Evelyn, Engleheart, Williams, the Brodie of Brodie, and others. From these de Graaff raised several entirely new types of *Incomparabilis*, the Giant Croesus type such as Mercurius, the Giant John Evelyn such as Jocunda, Mrs. George Chandler and others, and the Giant Bernardino type such as Adler.

These new hybrids are a great step forward and far superior to any of the English Hybrids of recent introduction. They will be shown for the first time in England at the Daffodil Show of the R. H. S. this Spring and we are very proud of the fact that at the same time we can show them to our friends in America.

Heretofore only a limited list of red-cupped varieties have been offered, but we now grow large stocks of such splendid medium priced varieties as Bernardino, Croesus, Will Scarlet and others, also the latest novelties in a wide range of varieties, listing them on about the same price basis as Holland and English stock, with the added advantage that they are free from quarantine restrictions.

Cyclamineus Hybrids

Cyclamineus blood like that of Triandrus, imparts such a distinct form to daffodils, that a separate division has been made for its hybrids, which have trumpets rich yellow, straight and tube-like and perianths reflexed as in a Cyclamen, very early flowering.

THE two Cyclamineus hybrids offered, apart from being a most welcome and hardy addition to the rather small group of rock garden daffodils, through their extreme earliness open up a field for hybridizers that has been entirely neglected. These charming little flowers prolong our flowering season almost a month and we firmly believe that their seedlings, if crossed with a suitable parent so as to produce different types of flowers, may retain the earliness and prove very valuable for forcing purposes.

Jonquilla and Jonquil Hybrids

NARCISSUS—Poeticus

ALL Narcissi in this group have snowy-white perianths and a small flattened eye or crown, yellow or lemon edged more or less deeply with scarlet or crimson, sometimes almost self-scarlet. This last year some seedlings were shown with coffee-colored or primrose petals, one of which we offer in this list. All are sweetly scented and produce a lovely effect as border plants and naturalized in grass by themselves. The earlier flowering varieties are well adapted for forcing and we recommend especially the new *Ornatus Maximus*, of which we have a fine stock.

Early planting is specially recommended for this group, and to obtain best results they should be grown in a rich deep soil not too dry. Left undisturbed for two or three years they will give fine large flowers on tall stems and grow more vigorously. They are one of our hardiest Narcissi and should be included in every collection.

Of late years a group of large-flowered medium priced novelties have become available, of which we recommend *Edwina* and *Snow King*.

Miniature Daffodils for the Rock Garden

THE following are charming little subjects for rock work, where their dainty flowers are seen to perfection. They should be left undisturbed for years, and if happy will soon establish themselves and afford a lovely picture in early Spring. All the *Bulbocodium* (except *monophyllum*) and the *Cyclamineus* like moisture, and should therefore be planted at the foot of the rockery. *Bulbocodium monophyllum* flourishes in a warm dry sheltered situation planted in almost pure sand; when coming into bloom give water freely. *Triandrus albus* (Angel's Tears) and *Juncifolius* delight in partial shade and a light gritty soil, and should be given a well drained position.

Iris Tingitana Hybrids

THE two Tingitana Hybrids we offer are a distinct improvement over the French Tingitana Iris in that they can be depended upon to flower and in that they are hardier. Recent winters have shown us, however, that considerable care should be taken in planting these bulbs outdoors and we recommend them only for greenhouse forcing. Plant the bulbs in deep pots as soon as received, plunge the pots in beds and cover with a 2-inch layer of pure soil. If necessary, cover this with straw or litter as a frost protection. Bring the pots in the greenhouse towards the time frost can be expected and keep them cold but frost-safe (40-45° Fahr.). As soon as the buds are palpable, the temperature can be increased gradually to 55° Fahr. It should be kept in mind that Irises want more water than any other bulbs. For very early forcing only the top size bulbs should be used.

Earlham Large Flowered Hybrid Montbretias

THESE are the magnificent New Montbretias which have attracted so much attention the last year or two at the Royal Horticultural Society's Shows in late Summer and during Autumn and gained the Gold Medal. They are a completely new race of flowers the result of hybridization successfully carried out by the late Mr. Sydney Morris of Earlham Hall, Norwich. They represent an enormous advance over the ordinary Montbretias in commerce, being generally much taller and more robust in growth, and having flowers of great size and beauty, some measuring 3 to 4, or more inches in diameter. These Montbretias make first-class border plants and are of great decorative value for cutting.

Montbretias are of easy culture, preferring a light loamy soil well enriched with leaf mold but no manure or chemical fertilizer should touch the roots. A little bone meal can be used and a light dressing of lime may prove beneficial. The moisture supply should be good and they thrive in the partial shade of borders or shrubbery as well as in full sunlight. If planted in the Fall, mulch lightly with peat or litter but not manure.

In severe climates, Spring planting is best and they can be given the same treatment as Gladioli.

NO flowering bulbs give more richly colored or beautiful flowers. Highly recommended for greenhouse decoration. Pot up as soon as received and plunge in cold frame, withholding water until the foliage appears, then giving it sparingly at first. Bulbs for outdoor planting in colder climates should be stored during the Winter in soil or peat, not quite dry, away from frost until March, and then be planted in sunny positions in the flower-border or in beds in sunny positions in well-drained soil, the bulbs being surrounded with sand.

Beds of Tigridia's make a gorgeous picture during July, August and September and should find a place in all gardens. The flowers are formed by three broad petals extending from a central cup. The bulb is of about the same habit and hardness as the Gladiolus. In mild climates they can, however, be left undisturbed for years and can stand a small amount of frost.

The *Ladies Home Journal* recently had an illustrated article about these attractive flowers from which we quote:

"This brilliant silken triangle unfolds from its long slender bud and bursts into sharply contrasting tints of fire, leaping from bright yellow to molten orange and vivid scarlets and is eagerly sought as a rare but sturdy garden novelty."

Classification of Daffodils of the Royal Horticultural Society of England

The eleven divisions are as follows:—

DIVISION 1.—TRUMPET DAFFODILS.

Distinguishing character—Trumpet or crown as long or longer than the perianth segments.

- (a) Varieties with yellow or lemon-colored trumpets, and perianth of same shade or lighter (but not white).
- (b) Varieties with white trumpet and perianth.
- (c) Bi-color varieties, i. e., those having a white or whitish perianth and a trumpet colored yellow, lemon, or primrose, etc.

DIVISION 2.—INCOMPARABILIS.

Distinguishing character—Cup or crown not less than one-third but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.

- (a) Yellow shades with or without red coloring on the cup.
- (b) Bi-color varieties with white or whitish perianth, and self-yellow, red-stained, or red cup.

DIVISION 3.—BARRII (INCORPORATING BURBIDGEI).

Distinguishing character—Cup or crown less than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

- (a) Yellow shades, with or without red coloring on the cup.
- (b) Bi-color varieties with white or whitish perianth and self-yellow, red-stained, or red cup.

DIVISION 4.—LEEDSII.

Distinguishing character—Perianth white, and cup or crown white, cream or pale citron, sometimes tinged with pink or apricot.

- (a) Cup or crown not less than one-third but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.
- (b) Cup or crown less than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 5.—TRIANDRUS HYBRIDS.

All varieties obviously containing *N. triandrus* blood, such as *Queen of Spain*, *Moonshine*, *Pearly Queen* and *Agnes Harvey*.

- (a) Cup or crown not less than one-third but less than equal to the length of the perianth segments.
- (b) Cup or crown less than one-third the length of the perianth segments.

DIVISION 6.—CYCLAMINEUS HYBRIDS.

DIVISION 7.—JONQUILLA HYBRIDS—All varieties of *N. Jonquilla* parentage, such as *Buttercup*, *odorus*, etc.

DIVISION 8.—TAZETTA and TAZETTA HYBRIDS.—To include *N. Tridymus*, *poetaz* varieties, the Dutch varieties of *Polyanthus Narcissus*, *N. biflorus*, *N. Muzart* and *N. intermedius*.

DIVISION 9.—POETICUS VARIETIES.

DIVISION 10.—DOUBLE VARIETIES.

DIVISION 11.—VARIOUS.—To include *N. Bulbocodium*, *N. cyclamineus*, *N. triandrus*, *N. juncifolius*, *N. gracilis*, *N. Jonquilla*, *N. Tazetta* (sp), *N. Viridiflorus*, etc.
