

Japan is the place, where the Chrysanthemums originated, about two thousand years ago, and where they are accepted as the national flowers. Gradually they have made their way to Europe and America, where they are welcomed by the flower loving people, and where they are producing many handsome new varieties every year. Yet, Japan is not equaled by any other country in the production of wonderful new varieties.

The varied colors and shapes of these novelties, can hardly be imagined. BLUE, BLACK and GREEN chrysanthemums, long sought for, have been already produced in Japan Beside these, several distinct varieties OF MRS. ALPHEUS HARDY style and many other magnificent specimens are coming to this country.

Recently I bought and imported from Japan, two wonderful varieties of blue chrysanthemums, one of black, several of hairy kinds, and many other magnificent specimens for exhibition and sale, next season.

A FEW WORDS AS TO CULTIVATION.

To obtain the finest chryanthemum flowers, the plants should be placed in a deep rich soil, in a sunny location. sheltered by trees or fences from heavy winds, though they grow and bloom beautifully in almost any kind of soil and any location, under good cultivation and careful attention.

Plants grown from cuttings in a light sandy soil, during April and May will produce the finest and largest flowers in fall. As the cuttings are rooted, they should be planted in beds, prepared for them by digging the ground quite deep, and fertilizing it with well-rotted manure.

Pinch the tops any time between the 15th of June and the 15th of July. After this time, carfull and regular attention should be paid to keep the plants growing continuously, giving water enough whenever they need, and removing all unnecessary branches and suckers.

If very large show flowers are desired, selectone or two of the most prominent and perfect buds on each shoot, as soon as they are advanced to the size of peas and remove all the others. About this time and until the flowers are commencing to open, regular applications of weak manure water will be very beneficial.

NEW CHRYSANTHEMUMS.

These new varieties are all my importations from Japan last year, (1890), and I recommend them as the largest and the best ever introduced to the United States. KING OF CHRYSANTHEMUMS. The best bronze variety ever produced, superior to any existing kind of same shade; a magnificent flower of immense size, with broad and incurved petals; eolor brownish maroon, reverse reddish gold. A free bloomer, of grand habit, suitable for all purposes.

GOLDEN GATE Deep golden yellow, shaded with buff and amber; large spreading flowers, slightly incurving, of whirled center; petals immense both in width and length. A good grower, of fine habit, holding flowers erect on stiff, stout stems. An excellent variety for cut flowers.

MRS SENATOR HEARST Pure white; of soft feathery appearance; petals resemble satin ribbon; large perfect

shaped flowers, with silky threads, verging from the center. A wonderfull variety.

MISS. GATELY. Very delicate shrimp pink, with a lighter shade at toothed tips of long, blead retals; large incurved flowers, with whirling center.

MASTER OF GARDEN. A grand flower, of broad, long petals incurving in a graceful manner, color waxen white, with delicate pinkish pencilings.

MRS. WM. S. TEVIS. The brightest golden yellow ever produced; large full flowers, beautifully incurved; of solid petals, and of heavy texture.

H.YOSHIIKE One of the largest varieties; the flowers often measure one foet in dameter; petals tubular, spathed at tips with glandular hairs on reverse; color brownish gold shaded with topaz, a rare color in chrysanthemums. JESSIE BARSTOW Pale pink, shaded with lilac, reverse silvery white; a beautiful flower of immense size, with long, flat, toothed petals, forming a large ball or mass of countless florets.

DR. JULES CALLENDREAU. Brilliant canary yellow, without shadings; large incurved flowers, with whirled center; petals broad and long,

MRS. GEORGIE COLE. Garnet purple, reverse silvery white; large glittering flowers, very double and refrexed, of long, flat petals; distinct in color and shape.

WHITE STAR Creamy white; with fine tubular petals of varying lengths; large star shaped flowers, with high' center; very double and distinct.

EMPEROR OF TURKEY Rich brilliant scarlet, reverse a shade lighter; an elegant flower of long flat petals.

YOSEMITE FALL. Pure white; a large airy flower, of thin thread-like petals, turning to one side in a shower, forming a beautiful cascade.

THE DAWN. Soft clear pink; large beautiful flowers, of tubular petals; outer florets slightly drooping, center ones whirling and intermingling.

TWILIGHT. Greenish white; large incurved flowers,

with flat surface, of long piped petals.

The Monarch. Bright Pink, reverse covered with silvery sheen that fairly glisten in the sunshine; flowers large and graceful of narrow incurved petals.

The Queen. A large globular flower. of perfect shape; color delicate rose pink. Considered the most beautiful specimen in this line of color.

Golden Crown Bright golden yellow; large incurved flowers, with flat surface; petal tubular, spathed at tips.

EMPERIAL Castle. Large incurved flowers, with high center; color delicate blush, turning to pure white as the flowers mature. An excellent variety for specimen plant

The Capital Clear bright yellow; one of the largest incurved flowers, of long, broad petals.

MountFuzi. Snow white, slightly shaded with blue; large compact flowers, of perfect shape; beautifully incurving, with broad petals.

Mrs. L.L. Baker. Light pale yellow; very double high centered flowers, of narrow petals, forked like elk's horns.

Morning Mist. Greenish white; very large fullflowers of fine tubular petals, slightly spathed at tips.

Black Prince Dark velvety red, reverse chocolatc; as the flowers mature the flat petals wrap over, forming beautiful ribbon-like balls.

THE CATHEDRAL. Waxen white; large incurved flowers, very double; petals broad and solid.

SILVERBROCADE. Deep purplish crimson, reverse silvery white: large spreating flowers, of grand habit, with long, broad, pointed petals.

MORNING OF SNOW. Snow white, shaded with delicate pink; large straggling flowers.

SAN RAFAEL. Garnet pink, suffused with wine; large spherical flowers, of long piped petals, twisting and intermingling in a peculiar manner. A very late bloomer.

MOUNT SHASTA. The best white chrysanthemums ever produced; very large perfect shaped flowers, on stiff stout stems, belonging to the incurved Japanese section. This is a seedling of Robert Bottomly, crossed with the pollen of H. Cannel.

GOLDEN WEST A brilliant shade of rich golden amber suffused with carmine; this is the color long sought for by chrysanthemum cultivators; large, bold flowers, of broad pointed petals. A free bloomer, of good compact habit.

COCHINEAL A striking shade of dark crimson, very slightly touched with gold on reverse; a magnificent incurved flower, of long, broad petals.

MARIPOSA. A most curious variety; large spherical flowers, of piped petals; a few outer rows of florets are recurving, and all the others twisting and intermingling toward the center, in a strange manner; color fresh at opening, as the flowers mature changes to pure white.

AUTUMN NIGHT. A fine combination of different colors; the ground color is white, suffused with yellowish pink, and here and there streaked with a bright lemon color; large flat flowers of rosette shape.

QUEEN OF PACIFIC. Pearly white, suffused with delicate pink; large incurved flowers. of solid, cup-shaped petals. A fine compact grower.

INDIAN PRINCESS. Chestnut maroon, slightly with gold on reverse; an elegant flower, with beautifully incurved petals.

HARVEST MOON Bright yellow, without shadings; very

showy flowers of feathery appearance, with narrow_ twisted petals.

THE ORANGE. Bright orange color, reverse pale chrome yellow; magnificent ineurved flowers, of broad, long petals. A strong grower.

THE PAECH Another grand novelty of a clear peach color; very lovely, rosette shaped flowers.

SOUSRITO. Pale pink, reverse silvery lilac; large incurved flowers, of broad long petals.

ECUADOR. A grand novelty of immence size, with long broad petals, beautifully incurving; color terra cotta reverse brownish yellow. A compact grower; of fine habit, with dark green foliage, of leathery texture.
