


A New Race of Double June Flowering Giant Cosmos

Until now we have had the single early and late and the double late flowering. In these NEW double flowered Hybrids we offer a double Cosmos which will begin flowering in June increasing in such a manner that by early August the plants are a mass of flowers fasting till frost. The individual flowers measure 4 inches across, are borne on long stiff stems making them especially valuable for cutting. They shade from white to pink, deep rose, cattleya tints, carmine to deep red. The blooms last a long time in water. The plants are not as tall as the ordinary single sorts but more compact and very sturdy. A valuable NOVELTY.

Spanish Crookneck Miniature

A miniature form of the squash Giant of Naples, early ripening, especially adapted for our climate. Attains a length of 12 inches, is a fine keeper. The small cylindrical part of the fruit is filled up with sweet aromatic orange-colored flesh, the seed cavity being on the large end of the fruit. Trial, 15c.; Pkt., 25c.

Summer Asparagus

Cut and Come Again Vegetable

The most unique new vegetable ever introduced. It is everbearing. The fruit is oblong and green. It should be cut when not more than 4 to 6 inches long. If you allow it to grow longer it loses its flavor, and when one fruit is allowed to mature it checks the formation of more fruit on that plant. Care must be taken when cutting the fruit that the plant is not injured.

Cooked the same as Asparagus. Particularly delicious when cut in small pieces and cooked with cream. If sown early it will fruit from the latter part of June until October. Plant in hills 3½ to 5 feet apart, from latter part of May until July 1.

One package is enough for 3 to 5 hills—1 oz. for 15 hills. Pkt., 25c.






