In today's Columnist there is a highly eulogistic description of the work contained in the report of the department of mines. And it is all true. The illustrations are beautiful. The printing is of a very high order indeed.

But all these things are beside the point. The question before us is the practical one of the encouragement of home industry. There are engraving establishments in British Columbia capable of doing good work—quite good enough, we should say, for the purposes of the government.
