After that the holder of the policy will pay \$5,50 per month until the whole \$1,000 is paid up. The payments all go towards the principal except 50 cents monthly, which may be considered as interest at the low rate of ½ per cent. Dec. allum.

Grand Forks, N. D., July 30.—Late reports show that the storm of yesterday was probably the most widespread and destructive of any that has ever visited this state. An immense wave seems to have traversed the northeastern part of the state, devloping centres here, and this wave visited various localities with wind, hail and rain. Danuage was done in Pembina, Walsh, Grand Forks, Hamsay, Trail, Nelson and Cavalier counties, the losses being so numerous and so widespread that it is as yet impossible to give an accurate estimate of the total foss. Hall belts, varying in width and severity, are scattered everywhere, and the damage 45- wind and lightning is considerable. The section which appears to have suffered most is that in a belt crossing the Great Northern line near Michigan City. Along the road from a few miles east of Niagara to west of Mapes the crops are literally pounded into the ground. The belt is fully ten miles wide. The insurance men are bray figuring out their losses, but refuse to hazard a guess at the aggregate. The storm will make a bad hole in the crop, and will materially affect implement dealers' sales.

BELONG TO HONDURAS.

Great Britain Has Withdrawn All Claims to Sovereignty Over a Number of Islands,

(Associated Press.)

New Orleans, La., "July 30.—The steamer Condor, which has arrived here from Huerto Cortez, Honduras, brings the news that the British government has withdrawn all claim to sovereignty over the bay islands of Utna, Ruatana, Bonacca or Guanja, Elina and Barbarat, and acknowledges that they belong to the Kepublic of Honduras. Great Britain's formal acknowledgement was carried to the islands by the cruiser Psyche, which sailed from Havana under sealed orders on July 17th. The British residents at Ruatana were assembled, and a precelamation was read to them by the debts at Ruatana were assembled, and a preclamation was read to them by the captain of the Psyche, declaring that under treaties made between Great Britain and the United States in 1850, and with Honduras in 1800. His Majesty's government could no longer regard the islands as a British possession, and would henceforth withdraw all jurisdiction or claim to the allegiance of the captain to the continuous states who have recently come in English is the only language spoken. The islands do a large fruit trade, mainly with New Orleans. The United States government is the only one having a sconsul in the islands.

MONTREAL AND THE FAST SERVICE

WANT TWENTY-THREE KNOT STEAMSHIPS

Over Eighteen Thousand Harvesters Are Required in Manitoba-Canadian Notes.

Meatreal, July 29.—A general meeting of the Board of Trade was held today to discuss the fast Atlantic service. A resolution was proposed that the contract should not be given to any railway company or combination of railways, but to some steernship company. In amendment the fo'lowing was moved: Whereas the estail is lunt of a fast Atlantic steamship line from a Canadian port to a port in Great Britain would assist trade in the Dominion; would increase our export trade, especially in perishable products; would add greatly to the volume of a seenger travel through Canadian channels; would give an imputus to shiphelicing in Canada, and would, with the aid of our transcontinental railways, bring the different portions of the Empire more closely together. Be it resolved, That steamers employed in such service should have a speed of at least 23 knots an hour; that speed should be the first consideration in the selection of ports of call, and that in the conduct of the enterprise the Dominion government shall have sufficient control to enable them to fully safeguard the interests of our trade and commerce that the Canadian ports for such service be Quebe and Montreal in summer and Halifax or St. John in winter; And be it further resolved, that this meeting would respectfully urge upon the Dominion government the importance of carrying out as quickly as possible all necessary improvements to navigation to make the St. Lawrence route from Montreal to the sea safe for the class of vessels that would be required under th's general resolution, and further, that this meeting does not favor the subsidizing of freight steamers. This amendment was carried by a large majority, and in consequence the first motion was not acted upon. The feeling of the meeting was that the Canadian Pacific was the proper company to handle the project and make it a great success.

Kitchener's Final Dispatch

London, July 20.—Many pages of the Gazetta to-day are filled with Lord Kitchener's final dispatch on the Boer war, and his mention of officers and men who distinguished themselves while he was in command in South Africa. The same issue announces the general's new title as "Viscount Kitchener, of Khartoum, and of the Vaal, and of Asphall, in the county of Suffolk."

In his last dispatch Lord Kitchener said of Lord Milmer, the British high commissioner: "In many difficult situations it was, always the greatest relief to me to feel that I could always rely upon his unfailing sympathy and ungrudging assistance."

Referring to the deep obligation of the army to the colonies, the writer said, no request of his had ever been refused by the colonial governments, and their consideration and generosity orly equalled the character and quality of the troops they sent to South Africa or raised in that country.

Lieut-Col. Girouard, a Canadian officer, is warmly praised, Lord Kitchener saying that he is an officer of brilling ability, and wishing him all success in his new capacity as head of a great civil department.

Almost all the leading generals were commended, including the writer's brother, General Fred Kitchener, who was described as an exceptionally keen and energetic officer. General Lord Methuen, Lord Kitchener said, had done more than most officers towards maintaining the high standard of personal courage, modesty and humanity which characterized the British army. "I share his own deep regret," said the dispatch, "that his wounds prevented, him from remaining in the field till the conclusion of peace."

THE CORONATION.

Fixing Cerement for August 5th.

London, July 29.—All accounts continue to state that the King is making excellent progress. There is no suggestion of a second postponement of the coronation. The apprehension that King Edward would be unable to stand the strain of the coronation ceremony has been greatly lessened by the amouncement that His Majesty is now permitted to use his feet, and with the aid of a stick has done a little walking. While the King was testing his ability to walk two stalwart jackles stood at his side. After his experiment, which boded well for his fulfilling the necessary coronation function at Westminster Abbey, King Edward sat smoking on the deck of the royal yacht and watched the races of small yachts off Cowes.

The Gazette to-night contains a royal proclamation fixing August 9th as the date of, the coronation, which, it says, "We were constrained to adjourn to a day in August," and adding, "which we have resolved by the favor and blessing of Almighty God to celebrate on the aforesaid date."

According to the present arrangement, King Edward and Queen Alexandra will leave Cowes either on August 6th or August 18th, when the entire fleet will pass before King Edward and salute him, thus making a second naval review. After his return to the yoyal yacht to yapath some some weeks at Balmoral, where preparations for the arrival of their Majestics have already been commenced.

Sir Joseph C. Dimsdale, the lord mayor of London, expects King Edward to visit the city of London the week ending October 11th, when a great luncheon will be held in the Guildhall.



To the Editor.—I am reported in the Colonist this morning as having said at the Voters' League last night that "I wished to complain that the E. & N. railway, if not by actual deed, at least by their method of dealing with their land grant, prevented the development of the Island." HAVE NOT LOCATED THE LOST STEAMER

SEARCH STILL BEING MADE FOR ISLANDER Dakota.

French Railroad Representative Here Buy Material for a Road in China.

Word comes from the north that thus far att efforts to locate the wreck of the steamship Islander have proved unsuccessful. FIRES ON YUKON,

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
