Contest types:

- Quality matters
- Quantity matters
- Quality and quantity matters
 - sum: scores of each article added
 - weighted sum: size of article matters

Sustainability

Contest rules should be sustainable:

What will happen if any participant will take any contest rule to the extreme?

Will that be good for Wikipedia?

Internal vs External

In or out of Wikipedia?

Internal contests

- contest rules are accepted by Wikipedia community
- can be organized only when the community agrees

External contests

- contest rules don't violate any WP rules
- the community consent is not required

Internal contest

Internal contest rule example:

 Contest articles should not be deleted (or nominated for deletion) until the contest is finished

External contest

External contest rule examples:

 Wikipedia rules is higher than the contest rules

If an article is deleted (by Wikipedia community) than that article is disqualified

 Whoever gets the bigger number of featured articles in a year – wins

Participants

Contests can be designed for:

Experienced Wikipedians

 such elements as wikification and illustration can be required

Newbies

- wikification doesn't matter that much
- but text should be encyclopedic!

Our contests

Quality

(best articles win)

"WikiBioContest-2013"

56 really good articles!

1,3 Mb of wikitext

23,8 Kb per article

Our contests

Quality-quantitative

(sum of quality scores per article)

- "Gallery of glory"
 - a contest originally organized by Wikimedia RU

4,2 Mb of wikitext (in 3 months)

Our contests

Quality-quantitative (size of articles matters)

- "French Autumn"
- "Writing about charities"
- 2 contests about regions of Ukraine
- "Writing about the EU"
- 2 contest about military and defense (2014)

Usually **2-5 Mb** of wikitext (out of 550 Mb added per year)







How we do it

Basic info

Period:

1 month – 7 weeks

Advertising:

Sitenotice

Prizes:

Laptops, tablets, smartphones

Features: Easy to participate

Targeted at attracting newbies

 Many participants with < 2 years of Wikipedia editing (about half among winners)

Easy to participate

Just add a contest template to a talk page of an article

Chance to improve

- Every article gets preliminary score & feedback
- Finally scored in the end

Features: Newbie friendly

Wikification and images are not required

- Hard for newbies
- Easy to be fixed by experienced users

Features: Easy to organize

Very few requirements

- Find patroller-level wikipedian to be on the jury
- Find a sponsor (sometimes they find us) for the prizes (few thousand dollars)

No need to ask the community

- Rules of contests do not violate any rules of Wikipedia
- Yet, we ask the community to place a "banner" of a contest

Features: Size × Quality

All styles of articles can win

- Some winners win with many smaller articles (50-100 articles)
- Others win with about 10-15 REALLY good or big articles

Basic formula for participant scores:

SUM(Quality of an article * Size)

Features: Clear scoring

Transparent and objective scoring

3 is the basic score (if basic requirements are met)

- +1 original text / topic
- +1 comprehensive / nothing more to add
- +1 very good verification
- -1 obviously not finished / lacking key info
- -1 only one main source / verification issues
- -1 grammar mistakes, other mistakes
- -2 it's a list

Features: Easy to score

Mostly one jury member per article


- Disagreements on scores appear rarely
- Each article is assigned randomly to a jury member
- Articles of one participant are assigned to different jury members as much as possible
 - A possible jury bias influences results very little
- Still a participant may ask other jury members to score his/her articles

Features: Bot automation

Bot makes a list of articles

- Bot checks for basic requirements:
 - New articles should be created during the contest
 - Certain amount of wikitext bytes needs to be added (usually > 3500 bytes) during contest
 - Improved articles should be small before contestant edits (usually < 7000 bytes)
 - Improved articles should be "abandoned" (not edited by a person in a month)

Features: List of the articles



Template computes score per article

- All the jury member needs to do is to put his score (from 0 to 6) into a template
- He can also provide useful advice and notes about his score

Bot fills all the other required template fields
