"Mind that miserable affair of the necklace," said Talleyrand. "I should be no wise surprised if it should overturn the French monarchy." Marie Antoinette, a bride, young and beautiful, was naturally very fond of dress. Cardinal Rohan, a profligate, luxurious dignitary of the church, by enormous extravagance had become inextricably involved in debt. He had lost favor at court, and loitered around the saloons of Versailles, watching for an opportunity to regain tavor. At the same time there was at Versailles a very beautiful and fascinating, though thoroughly unprincipled woman, the Co ntess Lamotte. Entering Swamp Lands.

The unusual high waters of last Winter has made a vast deal of trouble among a class of settlers on, and near the Sacramento river, in this vicinity. These parties have taken up their claims, put on dwellings and fences, and in some cases, occupied them for the past ten years, each year raising crops of grain and vegetables, and put out orchards, making in some cases very valuable improvements on the land; last winter, however, the water raised, so as to cover for a short time, the greater portion of these farms. The result has been, that outside parties, taking advantage of this circumstance, have gone and made entries of large tracts of this land, which is already occupied and improved, and, the occupants supposing they were on the lands of the General Government, and the first they knew of the matter, they find their farms have been purchased under the Swamp and Overflowed Act, by outside parties-they themselves never supposing lands of this description would be included and considered as Swamp and Overflowed, in fact, as conscientious men, they could not take the oath required before entry, which is, that the land subject to be entered, is swamp or swampy, and subject to overflow during the cropping or harvesting season, so as to endanger or injure the crops, taking an average number of years as a basis prior to 1850. It will be seen that the oath is a very strong one, and also very few, if any of the parties living on the lands were here before the year 1850; but since that time, there has only been two years when the floods troubled them at all, and these years the only inconvenience was washing away of fences, as the water subsided both years, time enough to raise good crops-the evidence of which is now plain to be seen. But the trouble and uncertainty of their title, is a great annoyance to the settlers; for if this land should be granted by the General Government to the State as swamp land, the occupants must inevitably lose their possessions, together with all their improve ment, and the only hope they have is, that it will not eventually be so consided. The State has evidently legislated very loosly, with regard to these lands. There ought to have been a provision in the law protecting actual settlers in their possessions, until after the fact was definately known whether the land was or was not to be considered swamp and over-

The following instructions have been received by J. F. Houghton, Surveyor General, from Frank M. Pixley, Attorney General, relating to contests on Swamp Lands-it will be seen that protests can not be received by the Surveyor General except from parties who desire to enter the Lands in opposition to the ones prodesire to enter the same tract, it is necessary that each should have the land sur-Surveyor General, when he is authorized to decide on the merits of the case between the two contestants, but in no other case can he hear protests.

STATE OF CALIFORNIA, OFFICE OF SURVEYOR GENERAL,

SACRAMENTO, July 28, 1862. -, County S. rveyor, To -County-Sir: I beg leave to call your attention to the following opinion of the Attorney General in relation to contests arising before the Register of the State Land Office :

ATTORNEY GENERAL'S OFFICE,) SAN FRANCISCO, July 12, 1862.

J. F. Houghton, Es ., Surveyor General-Dr. Sir : Your note of June 30th wa received, asking my opinion as to the construction of the sixteenth section of the Act concerning the creation of a State Land Office for the State of California.

Your duties are fully detailed by the law. You are required to is ue "bertificates of purchase" to buyers of lands, upon their having complied with the requirements of the law as prescribed by the statutes. Where locators desire these certificates have taken all the preliminary steps, paid their money, and present themselves at your office, with evidence of the regularity of their proceedings, it seems to me very clear that they ought not to be embarrassed by the protest of persons who are not contesting for the certificate of purchase, or other evidence of title to the same tract or tracts of land.

I regard these "protests" as entitled to very little consideration. They are something which the law does not know or recognize; they have no legal force; they issue from no Court.

You are directed to issue certificates of purchase, upon certain other parties doing certain things. Your powers are not discretionary; you are clothed with no judicial authority, and you have no right to say to the claimant, "True, you have done all the law requires of you, but lying in the pigeon hole of my office I find a protest, reque-ting me not to issue to you your evidence of purchase." You cannot know that this protest is in good faith, or that it comes from parties in actual interest, or that it states facts upon which you have a right to act.

If other parties have a right or title to the land, or if they are to be prejudiced by the issuance of certificates of purchase, they have a legal remedy; they may. by a suit in equity, enjoin the issuance of any certificate to cloud their title; they may, if in possession, stand upon it until title is proved; if out of possession, they may bring ejectment to try title the Courts are open to them for any remedy for injury your office can do in issuing csrtificates of purchase.

I am, then, of opinion that the precedent established by your predecessor in office was a bad one, and that a different practice will be in accordance with law. Yours truly, FRANK M. PIXLEY,

The effidavit is like one of the "thrilling" stories of the New York Ledger, so long, that it may possibly be "continued in our next," while in the meantime we can condense the whole story into the remark, that such a Supervisor ought to be supervised-he will not only bear S. R. watching, but will need it.

BY OVERLAND TELEGRAPH.

The following dispatches are from the Sacramento Union of Aug. 6th:

LITTLE WASHINGTON, Va., Aug., 3 .-A reconnoitering column under General Crawford yesterday crossed the Rapinda, and pushed forward to Orange Court House and took possession of the town, which was occupied by two regiments of the enemy's cavalry, under Gen. Rob. ertson. Eleven of the enemy were killed and 52 taken prisoners. Among the latter were one Major, two Captains and two Lieutentants. Our loss was two killed and three wounded. The enemy retreated in such haste as to leave their wounded in our hands.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 .- The following order has just been issued by the War Department:

It is ordered, first, that a draft of three hundred thousand militia be made immediately it to the service of the United Statec, to serve nine months, unless sooner discharged. The Secretary of War will assign the quotas to the States, and establish regulations for the draft.

Second -That if any State shall not by the 15th of August furnish its quota of the additional three hundred thousand volunteers authorized by the law, the de-ficiency of volunteers in that State will also be made up by special draft from the militia. The Secretary of War will establish regulations for this purpose. The regulations will be presented to the President, with the object of sccuring the promotion of officers of the army and volunteers for galantry and distinguished services, and preventing the nomination and appointment of incompetent persons. The regulations will also provide for ridding the service of such incompetent persons as now hold commissions.

FT. MONROE, Aug. 1 .-- It is rumored and believed here that the new Merrimac will come down as far as Fort Darling. The Federal gunboats have passed up the river beyond Harrison's Landing. Last night, between twelve and one o'clock, the rebels opened fire on McClellan's center, and continued for about an hour and a half, with four batteries of flying artillery, opposite the landing, some above and some below. Not one-third of their shells exploded. Several vessels were struck by fragments of shells. Not one vessel of the fleet was injured. Nine soldiers were killed or wounded After half a hour's delay, our siege guns opened fire, and in forty minutes the rebels were silenced.

NEW YORK, Aug. 4.—A letter to the Herald, dated Hilton Head, July 31st,

says: The rebel's ram, which for a long time has been in process of construction at Savannah, is completed, armed and ready for service. All accounts which come to us represent her as very formidable. She is of light draft and great power, and has a very heavy armamen. Already the rebels are making the necessary sound. ings preparatory to bringing her down the river. Two steamers carrying the rebel flag, which are engaged in the performance of this service, came within range of Fort Pulaski's guns on Tuesday, but were compelled to retreat. Dupont is making every preparation to receive the monster.

HUDSON, Mo., Aug. 3 .- Porter's guerrillas crossed to the north bank of the Missouri river on Wednesday last, and on Thursday night crossed the Hannibal and St. Joseph Railroad, on their way to the northern counties, pursued by Col. Guitar's force. Porter had between 600 and 700 men. Bands numbering 10, 20 and 50, were constantly joining. Another notorious marauder, with an equal number of men, was marching on Glasgow yesterday, where there are less than 200 Federals. The guerrillas of Northeastern Mo. probably nuber 2,000, but it is confidently believed that their operations will be speedily brought to a close by the prompt and efficient measures adopted by our forces. Porter and Poindexter profess to have come from the Confederate Government to raise recruits to join their forces, which are expected soon to be in the State again. WASHINGTON, Aug. 4 .- A special to the New York Tribune says : The Government is now fully prepared for the plots of the border State Secessionists, whether in Maryland or Kentucky, and will instantly crush any attempted t eason. Gov. Magofin of Ky. is watched. Ohio, Indiana and Kentucky will be formed into an independent military department, under Gen Buell's command, with a Commissary General, whose headquarters will be at Cincinnati.

Vicksburg confirm the reports of another rebel gunboat being built up the Yazoo river. They also say there are a number of rams nearly completed.

FT. MONBOE, Aug. 3 .- The following advices from Spencerville were recived to night: Quite a strong Union senti-ment has been manifested by many citizens. The wives of several wealthy planters visit our sick soldiers in the hospitals almost daily, and send them luxuries

About 400 citizens, residing within the lines of Gen. Sigle's corps, had tak n the oath of allegiance. Seventy have been arrested, and are now in charge of lines being required for military purposes. the Provost Marshal.

Twenty rebel prisoners who were taken by scouting parties within the past two weeks were parolled to-day.

A brisk skirmish took place yesterday a short distance beyond Madison Court House. Several of the enemy were wounded, and only one of our men hurt. enemy's pickets.

Reports are current among the rebel sympathizers that the enemy have evacuated Richmond.

JACKSON, Tenn., Aug. 3.-The cav-alry which have been in pursuit of the rebel Jackson's force have returned, and report that in all their fights they only had three killed and eight missing.

Jackson is now south of the Hatchie river, and is being pursued by cavalry from Bolivar. These rebel raids, of which this is probably the last, are supposed to be intended to cover the real movements of the main body of the rebel troops, though the object of the latter is known to be to attack Buell. The rebel forces concentrated south of the lines of our atmy are said to be in motion in the direction of Stevenson and Chattanooga, and the rebel cavalry, which have been making demonstrations in Kentucky and Tennessee is believed to be now making for the rear of this movement. There is now no direct overland communication between Grant and Buell, all communication between them being sent via Cairo.

ST. LOUIS, Aug. 4.-The order releasing prisoners from enrollment, on the payment of \$10 has been revoked. Another order has been issued, directing the enrollment of all loyal citizens into comparies. Secessionists are not permitted to enter the militia, but are required to give all their arms to the nearest military post.

FT. MONROE, Aug 3 .- One division of Gen. Burnside's corps has left the Roads, sailing in a direction quite the opposite of James river and Harrison's Landing. Other divisions are embarking and will sail very soon. Great secresy has been observed in making this movement.

NEW YORK, Aug. 5.- A letter to the Tribune says:

McClellan sent a large force across James river on Saturday-mostly from Fitzjohn Porter's command. The number is said to be 15,000.

WASHINGTON, Aag. 5 .- A dispatch from Pope's headquarters, dated yesterday says:

Information from various sources tends to confirm the belief that the enemy have evacuated Richmond and taken up the south bank of the James river as the new line of defense. The rebel cavalry, under Gen. Robertson, is believed to have been withdrawn from the Shenandoah valley, leaving that portion of the country to the defense of guerrillas alone. It has been believed here in some quarters for several days, that the enemy have been evacuating Rici mond. There is reasonable suspicion that a postilence has broken out in that city. ST. LOUIS, Aug. 5.—Dispatches re-

Orders have been received to prepare complote rolls of the rebel prisoners now confined at Camp Norton, with a view to a general exchange. Nearly 4,300 are here, among whom are 2,100 Tennesseeans, who refuse to be exchanged, and desire to take the oath of allegiance. They prefer to remain prisoners to being exchanged, claiming to be citizens of the United States.

WASHINGTON, Aug. 5 .- The Secretary of War has issued orders exempting from military duty all persons actually employed in constructing or operating telegraph lines, in consequence of the

MEMPHIS, Aug. 2 .- The enemy is reported in force eight miles from here, under Bragg. Two regiments of infantry and sou.e cavalry and artillery went out a few miles to day. As the advanced pickets have not yet returned, it is expected that they have engaged with the

The rebel attack on Bloomfield a few days since was unsuccessful. Information from Glasgow, Mo., says that 150 Federal troops at that place are in danger from a large band of guerrillas under Poindexter Should the report prove true of a strong rebel force deing in that vicinity, the garrison will probably retire to the other side of the river.

In the northeastern part of the State the town of Newark was attacked by a large force of guerrillas on Friday last. Only two companies of State troops were stationed at the outskirts, who were driven into the town by superior numbers. A regular skirmish took place-the State troops firing from behind houses and fences. At dark they were compelled to capitulate. The Federal loss was 4 killed and 4 wounded. The rebel loss, according to their own statements, was 73 killed and a number wounded.


