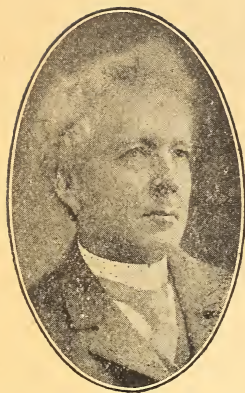

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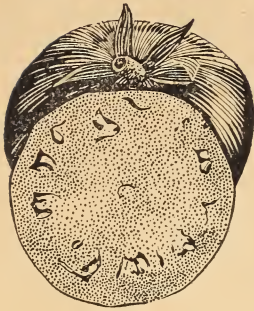

Just a note to let you know what I think of the "Burbank" Tomato in Minnesota; the plants that I handled in the ordinary hotbed were a good ten days ahead of anything else I saw or heard of in this locality; those that I potted and started in the house were three weeks ahead of those produced by our local gardeners.—R. The "Burbank" came into bearing **three weeks** before the "Earliana" and **four weeks** before the "Jewel." I had noticed in your note on the "Burbank" tomato that it fruited some four weeks before other varieties on the Pacific Coast, but had no idea that in the latitude of Michigan there could be any such variation. I want to say that I firmly believe that you have named the "Burbank" Tomato exactly right. Last year I had seed of my own raising and the seed started in the factory greenhouse the same day with four other varieties and the plants all set in the garden the same day and it was the "earliest," ripening just thirty-seven days before any one of the other varieties.—G.
