## IMMENSE BULLETINS

Erected By the Winans Advertising Company, of New York.

The Winans Advertising Company, New York, has just completed two of the most striking bulletins on walls that have ever been undertaken. One advertises the Messrs. Shuberts' New York theaters, the Casino, the Herald Square and the New Princess, and occupies the entire south wall of the big Bartholdi Hotel at Broadway and Twenty-third street, being a work of art.

The Casino panel is bright yellow with an enormous cut of "I want to be a lady." The Herald Square panel has a pale green background with an enormous dark green shamrock in the center. The New Princess panel has a Yale blue background with a large six-pointed crown at the top.

The other bulletin wall is at the corner of Wall and Pearl streets, and advertises the Egyptian Arab Cigarette. The head of the Arab is the largest ever painted on a bulletin wall, the face being nearly 30 feet across.

## ANNUAL MEETING

Of Rocky Mountain Bill Posters' and Distributors' Association in Salt Lake City.

The eighth annual convention of the Rocky Mountain Bill Posters' and Distributors' Association was held in Salt Lake City, Utah, Aug. 10-12, in the offices of Owens, Varney and Green. President Edwin A. Haskell, of Grand Junction, was presiding. A. H. Searies, of Denver, acted as secretary, and there were representatives from Denver, Colorado Springs, Pueblo, Victor, Cripple Creek, Salida, Buena Vista, Florence, Leadville, Glenwood Springs, Grand Junction, Laramie, Cheyenne, Albuquerque, Santa Fe, Phoenix, Tucson, Salt Lake, Provo, Ogden, Springville, Heber and Logan.

Denver was selected as the next place of meeting, on May 23, 1903. The principal business was the granting of franchises, and some excitement was afforded by a contest between Heaton & Spear and the Curran Company, of Denver, for the Greeley, Colo., franchise. Heaton & Spear were represented by an attorney, but the franchise was awarded to the Curran people. Franchises for Loveland, Longmont and Evans, Colo., were awarded to the Curran Company; for Florence to the Fremont Bill Posting Company; for Springville, Utah, to J. C. Graham, of Provo; for Goldfield, Colo., to the Qulun Bill Posting Company; for Heber, Utah, to H. L. Mann, and for Ogden to the Utah Bill Posting Company.

The following were elected as officers for the ensuing year: President, Joseph Quinn; vice president, C. H. Eastman, Salida; secretary-treasurer, A. H. Searies, Denver; executive committee, E. A. Haskell, Grand Junction; Robert L. Anderson, Salt Lake, and John A. Coleman, Leadville.

## SEVERAL TOWNS

Added to the Plant of John Donnelly & Sons, of Boston.

John Donnelly & Sons, whose main offices are situated at 97 Warrington street, Boston, Mass., have purchased from W. H. Trowbridge, of South Framingham, Mass., the bill posting plant, including Framingham, South Framingham, Saxonville, Ashland and Holliston.

The entire plant will be remodeled and rebuilt, every board being made of sheet steel. Additional steel boards have already been secured, increasing the capacity of the plant 500 per cent, and the new proprietors announce that they will spare no expense to bring the plant up to date in every particular. In describing the location of the plant, Mr. C. T. Donnelly, a member of the firm, says, in part:

"South Framingham is a very important railroad center on the Boston & Albany Railroad, about twenty-one miles from Boston. Here is located the great plant of the Hennigan Manufacturing Company, employing 2,500 people, the largest manufacturers of shipping tags, labels, etc., in the world. Throughout this territory also lies the Sudbury and Cochituate aqueducts, and the famous water basins which supply metropolitan Boston. It is one of the most interesting places of interest in New England for tourists. At South Framingham is the camp grounds of the Massachusetts Volunteer Militia, the State muster being held here regularly every year."

"The rapid growth of business and the great increase for the necessity of commercial advertising has necessitated the acquisition of this additional territory, and it will be run on the same broad and liberal policy as our Boston plant."

"We are thoroughly equipped already to handle posting orders for this territory, and advertisers will be guaranteed a service thoroughly up-to-date and thoroughly satisfactory."

W. C. Hardin is erecting new boards in Texarkana, Ark., to meet the increase in business incident upon his acquisition of the billing of the local theaters. He will have at least 25 locations on the east side.

Thomas Spelman, the popular bill poster of Hagerstown, Md., has leased all his space to the Robinson Shows, which will appear there the 28th. Mr. Spelman reports very gratifying business during the past few months.

Six members of the No. 2 advertising car of the Great Wallace Shows recently joined the Bills and Billposters Union No. 1, of Louisville, Ky. Some weeks previous ten of the men joined the Indianapolis (Ind.) union, making it a solid union car, the second such in the country.

Judge Coxe, of Buffalo, has issued an injunction restraining the city from dismantling any more bill boards belonging to Flicker & Whitmier, inasmuch as the company is organized under the laws of New Jersey and the Buffalo authorities have no legal right to destroy their property.

"The Billboard" is in receipt of a number of photographs from J. M. Dishon, of Terre Haute, Ind., illustrating several of his hoardings. Judging from the photos, the boards are in excellent condition and are eloquent of the scrupulousness and enterprise of the proprietor. We congratulate Mr. Dishon upon the fine showing of his plant.

W. S. Yerkes, manager of the paint department of the Bill Posting Sign Company, of Philadelphia, is spending a month's vacation at Cape May, N. J. That branch of the business has been very successful during the past year, and at the present time they have but very few bulletin spaces vacant in Philadelphia, Baltimore and Washington.

## BIG DEAL.

### Klaw & Erlanger Purchase New York Theater Property.

On August 20, Klaw & Erlanger purchased from the Sires Bros., the entire New York theater property, including the Criterion theater, for \$2,000,000. Immediately afterward Klaw & Erlanger transferred to Charles Frohman and Rich & Harris the Criterion theater for sum said to be considerably less than \$600,000. The deal is a profit one for the Sires. They secured the house after it had passed from Oscar Hammerstein's hands at a reported cost of \$800,000. They have had it about three years, and step out with a clear profit of over \$1,000,000.

## DOOMED.

### Boston Museum Will Soon Be Razed—Some Events in Its History.

Boston Museum, the oldest theater in Boston, and by far the most famous one, is doomed. It will soon be torn down to make room for a mammoth skyscraper, which will be occupied by lawyers' offices. Boston museum was opened as a theater 60 years ago, and except for an occasional renovation and repairs after fires, it remains about as it looked when new.

On its boards a score of the most famous actors and actresses of a generation ago made their reputations. Among those were William Warren, Annie Corse (who recently died in Chicago), George Wilson, Mrs. J. R. Vincent, Jack Mason, Marion Manoff, Sadie Martinot, Mrs. John Drew, W. C. Colcord, Joseph Jefferson, Mr. and Mrs. E. L. Davenport and E. A. Sothern. In those old days the museum attractions were all presented by a "stock company," and the name of this company and its members was for years international.

Edwin Booth made his first appearance as Tresoer there, P. T. Barnum's Tom Thumb first appeared there in 1851, and John Brougham and Mrs. George Barret won fame on its stage. In the later years came Maggie Mitchell, Matilda Iteron, J. Wilkes Booth, Modjeska and Lawrence Barrett. For more than 20 years R. M. Field managed the house. The last great event in its history was the first production of Herne's "Snow Acres."

## THEATER COMPANY.

Articles were filed incorporating the Louisville (Ky.) Theater Company, with a capital stock of \$10,000, in shares of \$100 held as follows: Max Weber, 45 shares; David B. Weber, 50 shares, and Harry in Chicago; the two first named being the lessees of the new Masonic Temple Theater.

The articles simply state that the objects of the company are to conduct a theatrical business in Louisville and to own and operate theaters.

Manager Hunt, of the Pike Theater, Cincinnati, O., is in New York looking for a scenic artist for his theater.

Sarah Bernhart is to play in Berlin for a fortnight in October at the Royal Opera House, in half dozen of her leading roles. From there she will go to Dresden, Leipzig, Halle and Weimar.

Mrs. Patrick Campbell, James K. Hack-

ett and Mary Manning returned to America Aug. 20, on the steamer Oceanic. Mrs. Manning will appear at the Garden Theater, New York, Sept. 15.

The Marble Fountain Company has been playing to excellent business in Houston, Texas, for the past three weeks under the able management of Jake Schwartz, "U. No. Me," something doing all the while.

Thomas Farren, Jr., a chip off the old block and son of T. J. Farren, of Buffalo, N. Y., will make his mark in a revival of "Chris and Anna," of which Peter F. Baker and John Kenneth will also be members.

William S. Dever, formerly chief of police in New York City, has written a drama in three acts, entitled "Secrets of the New York Police Force," the sale of which he is now negotiating with a Broadway manager.

The Robinson Opera House, Cluckmühl, O., has been leased by Corse Payton and his sister, Mrs. Mary S. Spoerer, of Brooklyn, and will be operated as a stock theater, with vaudeville turns between the acts.

There are at present about 3,000 actors idle in New York, which is due to the fact that new plays which are looked on with favor are such expensive productions that the managers are afraid to send them out on the road.

Messrs. Sullivan, Harris and Woods, managers of Miss Selma Herman, who is to star in "For Her Children's Sake," held their initial rehearsal at the Grand Opera House, in New York, Aug. 20, under the direction of the author of the piece, Theodore Kremer.

The Carvel Clifford Company opened their season at Alexandria, Ind., night of Aug. 18, presenting a romantic melodrama, entitled "The Mahatma." E. J. Carvel is the business manager of the company, and productions are staged under the direction of P. H. Clifford.

Annie Oakley, formerly with Buffalo Bill's Wild West, is to star next season in a melodrama, entitled "The Western Girl." Her play will give her opportunities to exhibit with firearms. One scene in the play will require her to intercept a telegraphic message by cutting the wire with a ball from her rifle.

The Metson twin sisters were compelled to cancel their engagement at Shady Side Park, Louisville, Ky., because of Miss Day's having caught a severe cold. After a couple of weeks' rest at their home, in Cincinnati, they will join Stetson's big double Uncle Tom's Cabin Company, to do double tipsies.

Owing to the number of companies using the name "National Stock," J. W. Leigh will, hereafter, call his company the Clare Jenkins Stock Company, to avoid conflicts in bookings, and all contracts will be filled under the new name. Miss Jenkins is making a hit in the new version of Camille, and business is beyond expectations.

Chas. A. Wade, of Auburn, Mich., has on his farm ten pigs, all born of the same mother, and not one of the ten has any hind legs. The location of the tails of the little animals are either on their backs or on the side of their hindquarters. The porkers are living and getting around very well.

Katherine Willard, Edward C. White's new star, opens her second season under his management in "The Power Behind the Throne" at Keeue, N. H., on Sept. 6. Manager White has gotten up an entire new scene production for Miss Willard, also a new complementation of costumes. The supporting company will be of the same excellence as last season, as nearly all the old members have been re-engaged.

There will be great doings at the opening of the Wildwood Theater in Kansas City, when Amelia Bingham presents "A Modern Magdalene" with the cast which appeared at the Bijou in this city last season. O. D. Woodward, manager of the new theater, has invited the Governors of Missouri, Illinois, Kansas, Iowa and Texas to be present at the first night, and four of them have signified their intention of accepting his invitation. The Governor of Texas is yet to be heard from.

## PLAYHOUSES.

Hartfield, Mass., is to have a handsome new playhouse.

The new opera house at Hamilton, O., is to be ready for the opening Dec. 15.

Work on the Weller Opera House, on N. Third street, Zanesville, O., is progressing nicely.

The new Grand Opera House at Lafayette, Ind., will be opened Sept. 1 by the Howard-Dorset Company.

The Faust Opera House Block, Lima, O., has been purchased by John D. Rockefeler. The theater will be completely renovated.

Herman, the magician, will open the Lyceum Theater, Memphis, Tenn., early in September. He will be followed by Al G. Field's Minstrels.

Lew Wiswell, formerly of Cincinnati, O., has been selected by John Havlin to manage the Auditorium Theater, Philadelphia, which is one of the Star-Havlin chain of theaters.

The Great Buffalo and Wild West Show closed at Galena, Ill., Aug. 18, on account of the inclement weather. The show opened at Missoula, Mont., July 4, and traveled East. It encountered rain, wind and mud almost continuously from its opening. The Messrs. Simon, who are wealthy men, and Manager Geo. L. Hutchins finally closed the show in sheer disgust.

ABSCONDED.

Claimed that Wm. Morrow Gets Away with Jewelry and Money.

On the night of August 26th it is alleged that Wm. Morrow, the porter on B. E. Wallace's private car, entered the state rooms occupied by Mr. Wallace, Al. Martin and C. E. Cory. He secured two valuable diamond studs, a diamond collar button, a solid gold Howard movement watch, and about \$600 in money. It was Morrow's second season with the show, and he was trusted implicitly by everybody. Morrow is about 25 years of age, 5 feet 10 inches tall, weighs 130 pounds, has dark complexion, is very quiet in manner and talks with a decided Southern accent. He is a native of Virginia. Many of the members of the Great American Water Circus, which quit business at Gallipolis, O., have joined the Harris Nickel Plate Shows.

William Sells spent a few days in Kansas City, Mo., recently and engaged eight men to go in opposition to the Campbell Bros. and Buckskin Bill Shows in Kansas.

Fred Beckman, who was general agent of the Sipe Show until its closing a few weeks ago, has resumed his old position ahead of Jacob Litt's "In Old Kentucky."

Tom Powell, an attache of Gentry Bros. Show, was attacked and severely beaten by eight men of the same show. He left the aggregation and secured work in Galion, O.

Thus, Ryan and wife have closed with the Sells-Downs Shows, and Mr. Ryan has accepted the management of Buckskin Bill's side-show, to which he has added many new features.

The Jenner family of equilibrists, acrobats and contortionists closed a sixteen months' engagement with Long's Palace Shows on Aug. 16 and joined Howe's London Show, Aug. 20, at Republic, Mo.

Wm. Pace, formerly of the Forepaugh-Sells Circus, is visiting his old fellow trouper, John Richardson, at the latter's home in Cambridge, O. They are having an excellent time exchanging experiences under the white tents.

Mr. Bailey last week brought Mr. Lewis E. Cooke from San Francisco to New York for an hour's conversation. Mr. Cooke made the trip across the continent in the unprecedented time of three days, twenty-one hours and twenty-five minutes.

On Aug. 29, while in Louisville, Ky., six of the boys of No. 2 advertising car of the Great Wallace Shows joined the Billers and Billposters Union No. 1, of that city. Sometime ago ten of their men joined the Indianapolis (Ind.) union. It is now a solid union car and the second such in the country.

At Mt. Vernon, O., a man upon whose lot the Robinson Shows held option attached a horse and buggy belonging to the aggregation, claiming that he had not been paid the price of option, the grounds not having been used, another lot being given the preference. He would not accept bond and the case will come to trial.

They revoked the license which the agent had obtained, and informed Messrs. Morris and Rowe that they would have to abandon the heart-of-town lot selected, move out to the circus lot and pay \$200 license per day. Upon inquiry it was found that even this could not be done, as the consent of 75 per cent. of the householders adjacent to the lot must be obtained before license could be granted. As this would take two or three days the show was abandoned.

Word reaches us that several attaches, the chief clown and one of the acrobats, connected with the Harris Nickel Plate Show were arrested at Portsmouth, O., for crap shooting. One of the city officers happening around and his ears catching the suspicious words, "come seven, come eleven," he at once notified several of his brothers of the force and they raided the game, arresting five men, who gave their names as Thomas Martin, Frank Johnson, Vaughn, Earl Jewett and Fletcher Mortimer. The last two proved to be spectators and were dismissed, but they others were fined \$2 each, a midnight session of police court being held. At the request of the manager of the show the mayor was hauled out of bed to sit in judgment upon the crap-shooters.

The warm feeling of fellowship which show people have for one another and for those with whom they were once associated is shown by the following little episode, which occurred during the visit of the Forepaugh-Sells Show to Columbus, O., recently. Duffield Lewis Leonard was formerly one of the clowns traveling with the above show, and while at Ashland, Ky., about two years ago he was stricken with paralysis. He is a native of Columbus and since his affliction has made his home there with relatives. While the show was at Columbus some of his old associates remembered "Duffield Lewis," and a purse was once gotten up for him. Lewis Sells started the subscription by giving a pony, and Peter Sells followed with a gift of \$50. Each and every performer contributed to this noble act of charity and the entire sum of \$411.75 was raised.

Lowery Brothers No. 1 Show slipped into Philadelphia two weeks ago and have been doing such a big business since that they will remain until cold weather. The cars have been sidetracked and the show is now hauled from lot to lot by "gilly" wagons. Week stands are being made. The performance given is a clean and bright one and pleases the large crowds that attend. Following is the roster of the company: Lowery Brothers, owners; George B. Lowery, manager; Phil. Mr. Mills takes the enterprise in hand with several years of experience and a chain of unbroken successes in managing some of the best shows in the West.

Notes from the Scott County (Mo.) Agricultural Society: This being our first annual county fair, nothing is being left undone. Some of the finest buildings south of St. Louis are being erected, and our prizes and purses are the largest in southeast Missouri. We expect to have all kinds of attractions, and our fair is thrown wide open to all manner of privileges.

B. W. Parks, secretary of the Bourbon (Ind.) Fair Association, writes as follows: "Running-horse posters are not suitable for fairs. They have no runners to speak of, and want none. We leave that to clowns and gamblers. A fair must be run clean, or it will go bankrupt. We cater to the

best moral and intellectual element, and have great success. Fairs that have used running horses and gamblers are dead or dying."

The Hamilton County Fair closed at Carthage (near Cincinnati) Friday evening, Aug. 22. It was the biggest success in the history of the association. More than 12,000 people attended the last day of the fair, and the officials were in high spirits. The total premium awards amounted to \$8,000. The removal of the fair grounds was discussed freely among the directors, and the opinions regarding their future varied radically.

Much interest is being taken in the Bowling Green (Ky.) Horse Show and Race Meeting, which will be held September 11-14. Bowling Green is fast becoming an important horse market in the state of Kentucky. The premiums have been increased and will no doubt bring a big string of the best horses in Kentucky to the meeting. On account of the many applications for stall room for horses, new stables have been built under the amphitheater to accommodate fifty additional horses. The meeting is being advertised extensively and will certainly be attended by large crowds.

Also, Madam Marius Lijens, high diver, and aquatic artiste; the Four Rianos, animal imitators; Willie Hale & Francis, cimb experts; International Cycle Whirl; Nelsons, grotesque acrobats; the Pantzer Trio, and Lily Bletssoe, of Toronto, lady cornetist.

### STREET FAIR AND CARNIVAL NOTES.

There will be no street fair at Clinton, Ia., this year.

Murfin, Tex., will have a street fair September 15-18.

Jacksonville, Ill., will have a street fair September 22-27.

Farmington, Ia., is to have a street fair September 10-12.

Carrollton, Mo., will hold a street fair. J. E. Dickson is chairman.

Minonk, Ill., will give one. A. Von Nordheim is the man at the helm.

H. L. Leavitt closed with the Trades Connell at Birmingham, Ala.

A. C. Babenhausen is heading the street fair movement at Jacksonville, Ill.

The Millie Christine Show is taking big money at the Elks' Carnival, St. Joseph, Mo., this week.

It appears that Hagerstown, Md., will not have a street fair this year, both Bostock and Sturgis having failed to promote it.

On the night of August 17 fire destroyed nearly all the booths at the Jeffersonville Elks' street fair, entailing a loss of \$2,000.

The great Halle joined Layton's Carnival Company at Portsmouth, Va., to do his novelty wire and balance trapeze acts as free attractions.

Palestine, Tex., is to have a street fair some time in September. William Branagan is secretary and treasurer of the Festival Association.

The Flying Baldwin quit DeKreko at Lexington, Ky., and is booking fairs and street fairs independently. He has some open time in September.

The street fair at Mansfield, O., was a big success. The Gaskill-Mundy Carnival Company furnished the attractions, and report big receipts from all the shows.

The Two Hewitts' flying dog "Dan" has entirely recovered from his fall at the Rochester Fair, and is again doing his dive in the act with the Hewitts, with the Wright Carnival Company.

Boston's carnival opened Aug. 25 at Crescent Beach Park. It will be on for two weeks. Balloon ascensions take place each day and many other interesting features are on the program. The whole beach front (about one and one-half mile) is illuminated brightly.

Owing to bad business for several successive weeks, culminating in Lexington, Ky., the DeKreko Bros.' Roman Carnival and Exposition Company disbanded in Cincinnati, O., August 20. All the DeKreko people will hook independently the remainder of the season.

Frevoll, the magician, brought suit last week against W. E. Williams and H. W. Wright, of the Wright Carnival Company, for alleged salary due, and was given judgment for \$81.86. The case was appealed by the defendant and will come up some time in September.

Dana Thompson, high diver, formerly with the Morris-Berger Company, left the latter at Tiffin, O. He quit high diving altogether for his wife's sake, who could no longer endure the thought of his dangerous act. He was in the business four years, and in this time has earned a snug little sum.

The main features of the Garbrill-Mundy Carnival Company, which is furnishing attractions for the Fall Festival at Ft.

Wayne, Ind., this week, (Aug. 25-30) are as follows: Four bands, trained animals and 200 performers; Hagenbeck Trained Wild Animal Show, Trip to the Moon, Major Mundy's Dog and Pony Show, Japanese Village, Johnstown Flood, and the Haunted House.

Dr. Foster is hunting rattlers in Mexico, and expects to have a big supply on hand in a couple of weeks. Madam Foster, who is secretary and treasurer of the firm of Foster & Slim, has been putting in her spare time training a troupe of wild bears, and next season will go on the road with them. She is also training a troupe of cat animals, consisting of wild cats, catamounts and Mexican lions, which she will have ready for the road next season.

Mr. Victor D. Leavitt writes as follows, viz.: "The proceedings of the Grand Lodge of Elks at Salt Lake City, Utah, is only what I expected, and should have been done a year ago. This will cut out some of the snowflake carnival companies, but will not hurt the legitimate ones; only make it harder for the legitimate promoters, who will have to work under the auspices of the citizens and business men, and the sooner all fraternalism is cut out, and we get down to a business proposition, all the better for the towns and the legitimate carnival companies."

The following letter is from W. H. Rice: "The Elks' Carnival at Sault Ste. Marie was a success in every sense of the word. The notoriety that this lodge attained through the man who purchased the gaming privileges materially helped business. The strong graft advertised for was able to run but four hours. The Elks' contracts called for twenty-five-cent games with a dollar buy-back. The privilege people were led to suppose that anything and everything would be allowed to go. The loss of time and money must have been considerable, as there were over two hundred privilege men in the town Monday night. My fair at Flint, Mich., was only fairly successful. The five parades given were all very creditable and crowds were all that could be asked, but the capacity of the pocketbooks was limited. I am now at South Bend with Mr. Sam Haller, the Bostock-Ferari representative, endeavoring to make this the banner of all enclosed carnivals. Mr. Haller has posted over 20,000 sheets of Donaldson paper within a radius of 200 miles, and distributed 200,000 pieces of small stuff. The citizens have erected 24 electric arches, marking the pathway to the carnival grounds as bright as day. Mr. Haller has organized one of the largest parades ever attempted for a street fair, to take place on Labor Day, and consist of every labor union within a radius of 150 miles, an industrial parade of over 200 floats, including the world famous Studebakers, Oliviers, Singers, South Bend Chilled Plow Company, Standard Oil Company, Birdsall Manufacturing Company, with all the smaller concerns of the city, and in addition to this will be all the unformed secret bodies of this section and the society people's decorated vehicles. My next stand will be Milwaukee, Wis., where I will assist the city in putting on America's most famous Jahr market."

Three aeronauts narrowly escaped death as a result of a balloon bursting at Courtland Beach, Omaha, Neb.

The Ponce de Leon Springs, near Atlanta, Ga., are prospering under the management of the street railway company, who recently purchased the grounds. Great improvements are planned for the place. A landscape gardener from New Hampshire has been engaged and he will lay out a new plan for the springs.

The summer theater at Woodland Park, Lexington, Ky., has been closed by Manager James Banta for the season. He says that his expenses were too heavy, but next year he thinks he will be in a position to renew his attempts in the summer theater line. High-class vaudeville was run exclusively by Mr. Banta.

Electric Park, Kansas City, Mo., will close the most successful season in its history early in September. This resort has had more than its share of rain, but in spite of this handicap the profits are far ahead of previous seasons. The advent of trolley parks into the amusement field has come to stay, but they must supply their patrons with novelties. Wherever this rule has been carried out, it has been successful.

## BERT YOUNG.

Five years ago Bert Young, a very faithful likeness of whom is produced on our front page this issue, was selling peanuts for Colonel Hopkins around Forest Park Highlands, in St. Louis. His bright intelligent face gave promise of better things, but it was then little dreamed that he would in a few short years rise to the position of treasurer for one of the most popular houses in the South.

But Bert had brains and he knew how to use them. Furthermore he had the "push" and push is better than "pull" any time.

There was a little streak in his character by which he remained undaunted. He worked throughout the entire Hopkins circuit of Chicago, St. Louis and New Orleans in every capacity, from a Roman soldier in "Julius Caesar" to the exalted position he now does credit to.

Mr. Young is a prominent member of the Fraternal Order of Eagles No. 69, and is held in high esteem by his legion of friends who look to his future with great expectations.

## TEMPLE OF ART

### Is Kansas City's New Playhouse Plan of Construction.

Kansas City, Mo., Aug. 23.—(Special.)—From all indications the new Willis Wood Theater will probably open on schedule time, Aug. 25, with Amella Bingham and her company in "A Modern Magdalene." For the opening night the house is entirely sold out at top-notch prices, and a heavy sale for the balance of the week is announced. Manager O. D. Woodward is deserving the greatest praise for giving to this city one of the most magnificent theaters ever erected in this country.

The designs and decorations of both the interior and exterior are of the Augustan period of the Roman empire. The auditorium of the new theater is like a shell, the side walls merging into the ceiling in great arches, a dome surmounting the whole. Aside from the beauty of the arches and panels the curve brings the greatest number of people to an equal focus and lends itself to the law of acoustics most admirably. The innovations in this modern "Temple of Thespis" begin at the floor and end only with the great air shaft that towers over the roof. The floor is of Portland cement, and no wood is to cover it. The cement floor is at once a fire and sanitary precaution.

From the first floor to the dome ceiling is 100 feet. The rear seats are 65 feet from the stage, and there are only two small columns to break the view. The greatest distance from the first row in the balcony to the stage is 40 feet.

Fresh air is supplied the building through a large shaft, and when heat is necessary it will be forced over coils of hot steam pipes from the cellar. All light, heat and power is carried to the theater in pipes and wires from the Hotel Baltimore, across

the street, thus giving the house practical immunity from fire danger. In the decoration thousands of electric lights and colors are used to bring out the shadows and projections in the architectural lines. It requires more than three thousand of these lights to illuminate the auditorium.

There are twenty-four dressing rooms, in four tiers, and all are above ground. The stage is 40 by 100 feet, with a forty-foot proscenium opening. From the floor to the roof is 100 feet, leaving room for entire settings to be suspended ready to be dropped to the stage in only a moment's time. Above the stage are the two skylights set on rollers on inclined planes and are held in place by a rope. In case of fire the rope would burn, permitting the skylights to slide back and form a great line, 15 by 30 feet, through which the flames would be sucked out, taking them away from the front of the house. An asbestos curtain hangs rolled up above the front of the stage, held in place by a fusible link, which melts at about 110 degrees. When the temperature reaches that point the link melts, the curtain drops and the front of the house is shut off from the fire on the stage.

All in all the new house, as it now stands, is one of the finest structures of its kind. Only the highest class of attractions have been booked for the coming season, and in all probability the same success will attend this venture that has so far met all of Manager Wood's various operations in the theatrical business.

## PECULIARITIES.

### Of a Musician—Some Facts About Creatore.

Ever since the night in July of his opening at Hammerstein's, on Broadway, Creatore, the Italian band leader, has been the talk of New York. Many other leaders have been known there for years, but Creatore became a favorite in a night. The papers are filled with illustrations and stories about him, and the music lovers have gone mad over the grand playing of his band and the energetic manner in which he conducts it. Creatore is so natural and so unobtrusive that ordinarily he would not attract much attention, but he is magnetic, and when leading his band becomes so interested in his work that he forgets all else and throws his whole soul into the task. The roof garden where he plays has been crowded from the first night. Not only is the audience interested in the music, but the wonders at the remarkable acrobatic gestures of the man who is so wrapped up in his art that he never notices that an audience is listening to or watching him. Certain it is that he thrills his audience and furnishes a topic for conversation in all circles of the city. Few other personal successes have been so great since the days of Carmenita, Fregoli and Chevalier in New York, and Manager Oscar Hammerstein is making a fortune out of this lucky engagement.

## CROP REPORT.

Following is the general summary of crop conditions issued weekly by the Department of Agriculture:

The week has not been favorable for the rapid maturing of crops in the northern districts eastward of the Mississippi valley, where it has been abnormally cool, while hot and generally dry weather prevailed in the Southern states, and the protracted drought continues in the middle mountain districts. Drought has been relieved in Washington, and generally favorable conditions prevailed in the Pacific Coast states, although the week was unreasonably cool in that region, and showers interrupted grain harvest in Oregon during the fore part of the week.

Corn continues in very promising condition in the principal corn state. In the northerly portions of which, however, it is maturing rapidly under the low temperatures which prevailed during the week.

The reports indicate that early corn over the northern portion of the corn belt will be safe from frost by Sept. 10-15, and the late crop from Sept. 15-Oct. 1, while over the southern portions of the corn belt early corn is already matured, and the late will be safe by Sept. 15-23. Spring wheat harvest is nearly finished in the Dakotas, and has progressed under favorable conditions in northern Minnesota, but was interrupted by showers in the southern portion of that state, in which the crop generally has revived slowly and unequally. In Iowa, wheat in shock has been injured, and a large percentage ruined by wet weather. Wheat harvesting was also interrupted on the Gulf Coast, but is well advanced in Washington.

Further reports to damage to oats in shock are received from the Rio and Upper Mississippi regions. Harvesting is unfinished only in some localities in the more northerly portions of the New England and Middle Atlantic states.

Late cotton has improved in the Carolinas, Mississippi and Louisiana and in portions of Missouri and Tennessee. In Alabama and Florida a light crop is indicated, and in Georgia the outlook is so varied as to range from excellent to almost a complete failure.

Rust and shedding are very generally reported throughout the belt, with premature opening in portions of Alabama, Georgia and South Carolina. In Texas, cotton is opening rapidly, and picking is becoming general, but the crop has deteriorated on account of excessive heat, shedding and ravages of boll worms and weevils. While some damage has resulted from the dry, hot weather in Oklahoma and Indian Territory, where the crop is maturing fast and picking in progress, a large crop of good quality is indicated. Cutting and cur-

ing of tobacco progressed favorably, and the crop has generally done well. While bestrifited by late rains in Kentucky, the crop in that state has been permanently injured by drought in some sections.

The reports respecting apples are favorable from New England, Michigan, Kansas, Oklahoma and portions of Illinois, Ohio, Virginia, and the outlook in Wisconsin is improved, while in Missouri the prospects are less favorable, and variable reports are received from New York, where a generally light crop is indicated.

Flowering for fall seedling has progressed favorably over the northern portion of the Southern states and portions of the Middle Atlantic states, but dry soil has retarded this work in portions of the Ohio Central, Mississippi and Lower Missouri valleys.

## INDUSTRIAL REPORT.

The oracle of industry is actually wearing a smile these days. At least that is the effect of its utterances. Times are generally good with the single exception of the district of the hard coal and circumstances are gradually adjusting themselves thereto, though it will be several years before manufacturers can safely book that section.

Reports from the various branches of industrial enterprise show that each is in a very flourishing condition, especially the iron and steel industry, of which for several years the output will be severely tested by the demand.

Few even insignificant strikes have been reported during the week just passed, and the outlook for manufacturers is brighter than it has been for a number of years.

Managers can count on twelve months of general prosperity at the very least.

Miss Emma Galles (professional), formerly of Cincinnati, was married to Frank W. Smith (professional), on July 16 at Savannah, Ga.

Herbert Salinger and Odette Bordeaux, of the Rorick's Glen Opera Company, Elmira, N. Y., were married in that city Aug. 13. Both have been engaged for "Morocco Bound" this season.

Marlon Stone, a popular member of the James Nell Stock Company, was married on Aug. 19 to H. McKay, of the Western Union Oil Company, San Francisco, Cal. The couple will reside in San Francisco.

Marion G. Cullen, formerly leading lady of the Shore Acres and Paradise Alley Companies, was married on Aug. 19 to Pereival C. Jones, son of Mayor Samuel M. Jones of Toledo, O. Miss Sadie Cullen, a sister of the bride and also a member of the Shore Acres Company, was maid of honor.

George Lea, who for forty years conducted theaters and other places of amusement in various parts of this country, died Aug. 21 at his home in Port Jervis, N. Y., aged 84. He was a native of France.

Querita Vincent, who was well known as a singer of coon songs throughout the country, died recently of consumption at her home in San Francisco. Miss Vincent traveled with The Rays for several seasons.

### NEW YORK.

**Robert Emmett Scores at the Fourteenth Street Theater.—"The Wild Rose" Plays at Mrs. Cornelius Vanderbilt's Newport Residence.**

The Garrick Theater will open Aug. 25 with a new English farce, entitled "The New Clown," in which the principal parts will be taken by Jessie Hinsley, Margaret Gordon and Jameson Lee Fluney. Mr. Finey, as the clown, (a fashionable Londoner in disguise), will have to do several acrobatic "stunts" with a donkey which has been in training for some time. The principal scene is a circus ring. Eva Tringay and Julius Witmark will also appear in the cast.

Robert Emmet will appear again at the Savoy in "Soldiers of Fortune." He will, as Robert Clay, make love to his own wife, Ellen Hung, who is to return to the stage to play the role of Hope Langham.

"Robert Emmet" scored a hit at the Fourteenth Street Theater last Monday night, when British redcoats and wearers of the emerald green met in battle. It was for this house the first new play of the season, and slurs of omission and commission were disregarded by the folks in the orchestra, while the gallery went into ecstasies over the platitudinous speeches, cheered the hero and hissed the villain. "Robert Emmet" is like most all Irish dramas. The hero loves a girl, is beset by enemies, and triumphs over them at various stages of the play. Flowers were handed over the footlights, and a building inspector was wondering whether the foundations of the theater could stand the pounding of feet. "Robert Emmet" is an attractive sort of hero. He has the pleasing faculty of always arriving at the right time, which obviously makes him a fine fellow, and so the gallery is quick to appreciate him. The comedy Irishman helps to fill in the blanks, and so all are satisfied. The author, Brandon Tynan, played the title role, and did not overact his part. The audience called the players before the curtain at the close of each act.

William H. Thompson, the veteran character actor, again distinguished himself in the role of Michael Dwyer, an outlaw. Francis Powers was an acceptable villain, and Angela Russell an attractive heroine. The best character in the play was Jimmie Noonan, played by William Elton. It was a hard character to assume—that of an informer. Even the gallery admitted Elton's merits, and that is merit in Fourteenth street. The manager, Mr. Rosenquist, offered an excellent setting for the play. The mounting of the second act, showing the Wicklow Mountains, was charming, and Mrs. Carter and David Belasco, who were in a box, applauded heartily.

"The Sweet Girl" is worthy of her name. She came to the Cherry Blossom Grove and covered herself with glory. The one-act musical comedy tells of a girl with "lighted" securities, who wants to be loved for herself alone. She is, and that gives opportunity for bright lines. The music of "Bloomin' Lize" in "The Chaperons" made a success, and this music Ben Jerome has taken and incorporated in "The Sweet Girl," which May Vokes and Frank Doane sing to a comic duet about "Coutting Ties."

"She's the Homeliest Girl in Harlem," "Dear Old Pipe," "I'm Through" and "Trouble" are some of the other catchy numbers, and with such a cast as Frank Doane, Maudie Allee Kelly, Sydney Dean, May Vokes and Edgar Ely, "The Sweet Girl" is entitled to all that is coming to her.

"A Jolly American Tramp" was to be seen last week at the Third Avenue Theater—a play intermingled with comedy, pathos, "sensation" and vaudeville turns, and this week "Coon Hollow" promises to retain the bumper houses this theater has been favored with since its opening date.

"Sally in Our Alley," the new musical comedy written by George V. Hobart, with score by Ludwig Engländer, will open a new theatrical season on Upper Broadway next Thursday night at the Broadway Theater. The new production is being staged by George W. Lederer, under whose management it will be presented. Comedians among the principals are Dan McAvoy, Marie Cahill, Louis Wesley, Richard F. ## CINCINNATI.

### Three More Theaters Open Big Season Promised.

Sunday marked the opening of three more local playhouses—Heuck's, the Walnut and the Lyceum.

At the Walnut, "Zig Zag Alley," a new trick farce-comedy, was presented to an appreciative audience in the afternoon and an equally enthusiastic and larger audience at night. Owing to the company's arriving an hour late the audience was kept in suspense for that length of time and the general impatience was expressed in the sounds of disapproval that emanated from the gallery. But when the curtain did rise the long hour of waiting was paid off. "Zig Zag Alley," an extravagant representation of a New York district, is put on by an unusually large and efficient company, many of whom produce most entertaining specialties. Especially is this true of Zeb and Zarow, the features of the show, who are well known as expert cyclists.

Biddle & Mack's burlesque troupe, "The World Beaters," began a week's engagement at the People's Theater to the usual packed audiences Sunday. The show opened with a burlesque entitled "The Matrimonial Club," which proved a very laughable conception, and introduced the members of the company to advantage. The scenic equipment of this company is first-class, and the performance throughout was satisfactory.

Hailey's Masterful Minstrels, under the direction of Will Nankeville, opened the season of 1902-03 at Heuck's Opera House Sunday very auspiciously. Two large audiences assembled at the matinee and night performances and listened to the music of the vocalists and band and the jokes of the end men with apparent relish. Under its present management the Hailey organization has met with great success. Last season the troupe, after opening Heuck's season, went to San Francisco, playing at all the more important cities en route. This season the same territory will be traversed, as the company is booked for return dates at all of the places where it appeared last year. The veteran entertainer, and one of the "old guard" of minstrels, Mr. George Wilson, is the star of the aggregation, and is apparently just as popular as ever. The Hailey Mastodons gave an old-time minstrel show, to the immense delight of their Heuck's patrons. The funny end men were there, and they "blacked up" and told their jokes in the same old way. Then there was the song and dance team, the quartet, the monologue, the Hailey choir, the acrobats, the band and orchestra. Something of a novelty in the way of a stage setting for the first part was exhibited. It was a view of the waters of old Venice, and was painted and arranged by Moses & Hamilton, the New York scenic artists. The performance

gave excellent satisfaction. Wednesday night will be the last performance given by the minstrels, which will be followed Thursday matinee by the new melodrama, "The Way of the Wicked."

Everything in and about the cozy playhouse has an attractive and inviting appearance in fact, the theater never looked better. The play was well received and deserved the liberal applause which was given it without stint by both the afternoon and evening audiences. "The Scout's Revenge" is above the average melodrama seen at the Lyceum in point of literary merit. The plot (and there is a plot, and well defined one at that) is ingeniously worked out. The cast is good, and those who stood out prominently by reason of their work were Frank La Rue, T. T. Rook, Harry E. Humphrey, Olga Bowen, Eleanor Worthington, Miss Adele Lane and Mrs. Fanshawe. The play is handsomely mounted and compares most favorably in this respect with the melodramas that have been seen at the Lyceum in the past. The Barlow Minstrels, at the vaudeville theater, opened their second week's stay in a very successful manner. The fireworks on the lake in the afternoon and evening delighted immense crowds Sunday.

It includes a number of handsome Shetland ponies, dogs, monkeys and trickeys, and the animals display marvelous intelligence.
