



Among the most valuable resource: of Canada to-day are the immense areas of pulpwood, the fields in Quebec, Ontario and British Columbia heing practically inexhaustible. Relatively speaking, the most that is being made of this invaluable resource is the export of the raw material to the United States, where it is manufac. tured into 'mechanical and chemical pulp. Se well does the export of the raw material pay the owners that 2" -612 cords less were manufactured in Canada during 1910 than in the previous year, and 27,508 cords more exported. The total cut in 1910 was 1,541,628 words, over 60 per cent. of which was sent out of the country without being manufactured into anything more than cordwood.

The apparent reason for this con dition of affairs is that the price paid by Canadian manufacturers of pulp is \$6 per cord for the pulpwood, while the average newspaper that the orthothe American buyers pay \$6.58.
