## Journal of Proceedings.

#### First Day.

The fifty-sixth session of the Florida Annual Conference of the Methodist Episcopal Church, South, convened in the Methodist Church, Monticello, Fla., at 9:00 A. M., December 13th, 1899, Bishop W. A. Candler in the chair.

Opened with singing, prayer by the Bishop, and reading an exposition of Acts, I chapter.

The roll was called and seventy-four preachers and nine lay delegates responded present.

Organization was completed by the election, for the twenty-seventh time, of Frederick Pasco secretary. C. F. Blackburn, E. F. Ley and S. W. Lawler were elected assistants.

C. T. Carroll and J. E. Mickler were elected assistants to the Financial Secretary, J. B. Ley, appointed by the last Conference.

The presiding elders nominated the usual standing committees and, on motion, they were appointed. (See committees.)

Hon. D. H. Mays delivered an address of welcome in behalf of the Church and citizens of Monticello, to which the Bishop responded in behalf of the Conference.

Sundry communications were read and referred.

Question 20 was taken up.

The presiding elders were called. They represented their districts, and their characters passed, viz: A. E. Householder, Tallahassee District; L. W. Moore, Live Oak District; C. A. Saunders, Jacksonville District; T. W. Tomkies, Orlando District; J. P. Hilburn, Tampa District; C. A. Fulwood, Key West Mission.

J. C. Sale was announced as having died during the year, and his district was represented by T. J. Nixon, in charge after his death.

The call of elders was resumed and their characters passed.

Dr. J. H. Pritchett, Junior Missionary Secretary, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

Dr. T. H. Law, District Superintendent of the American Bible Society, was introduced and addressed the Conference.

A committee of trial was appointed in the case of T. G. Blue, with T. J. Phillips as president and E. F. Ley secretary.

The committee on Conference Relations appointed last year, on motion was made permanent for four years. (See Committees)

Vacancies on boards and committees were filled, and sundry visiting brethren introduced

W. S. Richardson was announced as having died during the year.

After various annoucements, Conference adjourned, with the doxology and benediction by J. Anderson

### Second Day.

Conference convened at 9:00 A. M., Bishop Candler in the chair.

J. C. Ley conducted the opening religious service.

The roll was called and six additional preachers and three lay members responded present.

Minutes read and approved.

Sundry communications were read and referred.

The Board of Education presented the following resolution which was adopted:

"The Board of Education having carefully considered the importance of the twentieth century movement in our church, request that Thursday night be designated as the time for an educational rally in the interest of this enterprise."

The Trustees of the Florida Conference College joined in presenting the above.

Question 2 was taken up, and Francis E. Steinmeyer, Thos. I. Hess and Jas. T Mitchell, having stood an approved examination, their characters passed and they were continued on trial.

Japheth N. Weatherford not having been before the Examining Committee, his character passed, and he was left in the class of the first year.

Question 4 was taken up:

Middleton T. Bell, George H. York, Eugene A. Harrison, Emanuel DeLofeu having stood an approved examination, their characters passed and they were advanced to the class of the third year.

Question 5 was taken up, and Benjamin T. Rape and Thomas

J. Evans were re-admitted, being duly recommended.

Question 7 was taken up: W. A. Wier, James L. Pattillo, C. W. White, having stood an approved examination, their characters passed, and they were advanced to the class of the fourth year. R. R. Sprinkle, having failed in one study, his character passed and he was left in the class of the third year. Also J. R. Walker, I. Barredo, H. W. Baker, E. Diaz, R. L. Sumner, not having been before the Examining Committee.

J. Beers, not having been before the Examining Committee, his character passed and he was left in the class of the fourth year.

Joseph B. Trotter, John M. Mitchell, local preachers, duly recommended, were elected deacons.

Sundry brethren were introduced.

S. W. Lawler was added to the Committee on Temperance.

Jesse C. Green, duly recommended and having sent his certificate of adherence to our doctrines and discipline, was recognized as an elder from the Methodist Episcopal Church.

The call of elders was resumed, and their characters passed under Question 20.

After announcements, Conference adjourned, with the doxology and benediction by J. C. Ley.

### Third Day.

Conference convened at 9:00 A. M., Bishop Candler in the chair. Opened with religious services, conducted by T. W. Moore.

Minutes read and approved.

R. A. Edmondson, having stood an approved examination, his character passed and he was elected elder.

The call of elders was resumed under Question 20 and thier characters passed.

Thos. Griffith and G. W. Gatewood were located at their own request.

The following, duly recommended, having stood an approved examination, were admitted on trial, under Question 1: Daniel L. Sintzer, Joseph B. Trotter, John S. Tilley, Austin H. Cole, Oscar C. Tigner, Harry G. Bardwell.

The call of elders was completed under Question 2).

- J. D. Hammond, Secretary of Education, addressed the Conference.
- E. A. Harrison, M. T. Bell, E. DeLofeu, G. H. York were called before the Bishop and, having answered the usual disciplinary questions and been addressed by him, were admitted into full connection.
- J. D. Owens surrendered his credentials as a preacher in the Methodist Episcopal Church, South.

A letter from J. D. Rogers, superannuated preacher, was read and the Secretary was instructed to make a suitable reply.

On motion, resolutions of previous Conferences, fixing Wednesday night for administration of sacrament and Thursday for meeting of Conference Brotherhood, were rescinded.

Reports of Committee on Books and Periodicals and Editor of Conference Minutes were read and adopted. (See Reports.)

Vacancies were filled on Boards and Committees.

- W. A. Huckabee, Agent of the Orphan's Home, addressed the Conference.
- F. A. Branch, former member of this body, now of the South Georgia Conference, was introduced.

After announcements, Conference adjourned, with the doxology and benediction by F. A. Branch.

### Fourth Day.

Conference convened at 9:00 a.m., Bishop Candler in the chair.

D. H. Giles conducted the opening religious service.

Minues read and approved.

The Bishop appointed a committee of nine to confer with W. A. Huckabee on Orphanage. (See Committees.)

The report of the Committee on Conference Relations was read and adopted, giving names of Supernumerary and Superannuated preachers. (See General Minutes.) Rev. B. L. Baker, pastor of the Presbyterian Church, Monticello, was introduced.

Report of J. B. Ley, Financial Secretary, was read, and ordered spread upon the Minutes.

The Committee of Trial, in the case of T. G. Blue, made their report, and he was declared suspended from the ministry for one year.

J. O. Branch, a former member of this Conference, now of the South Georgia, was introduced, and Dr. Price, President of the Columbia Female College.

Reports of Board of Education, Committees on Bible Cause, Temperance and of Board of Church Extension, read and adopted. (See Reports.)

The Bishop addressed the Conference touching Church Extension work, and Mrs. T. Griffith, Corresponding Secretary of the Woma's Home Missionary Society, spoke of the work done by that body.

A resolution was adopted requesting the Bishops to appoint Thursday instead of Wednesday for the opening day of Conference.

Dr. Dowman, President of Emory College, T. G. Lang, President of Florida Conference College and J. P. DePass addressed the Conference.

After announcements, Conference adjourned, with the doxology and benediction by C. E. Dowman, to meet Sunday night in the Memorial Service.

#### MEMORIAL SERVICE.

After a sermon by C. E. Dowman, Conference convened with C. A. Fulwood in the chair, by appointment of the Bishop

After singing and prayer by T. W. Moore, Question 19 was taken up: What preachers have died during the past year?

R. L. Honiker of the Committee on Memoirs read the memoirs of W. S. Richardson, who died at his post in Key West of yellow fever. J. C. Sale, the presiding elder of the Gainsville District and Mrs. Mattie J. Carpenter, wife of W. J. Carpenter, of Tallahassee.

Announcements were made of the death of Mrs. L. M. Rhodes, widow of one of our deceased preachers, and of the wife C. A. Saunders, presiding elder of the Jacksonville District.

Remarks were made by many of the brethren in memory of those so loved.

Conference joined in singnig "Sweet Bye and Bye," and after prayer by B. K. Thrower, Conference adjourned with the doxology and benediction by C. E. Dowman.

#### Fifth Day.

Conference convened at 9 A. M., Bishop Candler in the chair.

H. W. Baker conducted the opening religious service.

Minutes were read and approved.

The Bishop announced the ordinations yesterday. (See General Minutes.)

Question 6 was taken up, and the Bishop announced those transferred to this Conference. (See General Minutes.)

Question 2 was resumed and L. D. Lowe called, and the Examining Committee reporting favorably, his character passed and he was advanced to the class of the second year.

J. P. Pillsbury, being duly recommended and having sent his certificate of adherance to our doctrines and discipline, was recognized as an elder from the M. E. Church.

H. O. Moore was announced as withdrawn from the church.

James B. Roach, being duly recommended and having sent the proper certificate, was elected elder under Question 14.

Reports of No. 3 Board of Education, joint Board of Finance, Committees on Epworth Leagues, District Conference Records and Orphanage read and adopted. (See Reports.)

By motion, the secretaries of the various boards were required to furnish assessments to the districts to the Florida Christian Advocate for publication in the first edition issued after adjournment.

Questions 21-44 taken up and answered. (See General Minutes)
Reports of treasurers of Board of Education and of Sunday
School Board read and adopted.

Report of Trustees of Preachers' Relief Fund read and ordered spread upon the minutes. (See Reports.)

J. B. Ley was re-appointed Financial Secretary and F. Pasco Editor of the Minutes.

A resolution, condemning the seating of B. H. Roberts, congressman elect from Utah, was read and adopted, the secretary being instructed to forward a copy to our representatives in Congress.

On motion, the Bishop was requested to re-appoint R. H. Barnett Colporteur.

A. D. Penny and G. D. Turner were located at their own request.

The following resolution was adopted:

Resolved. That, as a Conference, we re-affirm our action taken at the last session, in which the methods used by our agents in collecting the war claim were condenined, and that we leave the matter to be adjusted by the next General Conference.

A resolution was adopted requesting the membership in the various charges'to purchase their literature through the Conference Colporteur.

The usual resolution of thanks was adopted.

On motion the editor was requested to publish the journal of proceedings in the minutes.

The Bishop proceeded to the ordination of James B. Roach as elder.

Minutes were read and approved.

The Joint Board of Finance and the Visiting Committees were announced.

After singing and prayer by W. M. Poage Question 46 was taken up and the appointments read. (See Appointments.)

Conference then adjourned sine die with the doxology and the benediction by the Bishop.

### Reports.

#### COMMITTEE OF THE BOARD OF EDUCATION.

We record our profound gratitude to Almighty God for His presence in and His blessings upon, the educational enterprises of our Church and Conference. During the year now closing our institutions of learning have been, as of yore, fountains from whence have issued healing and blessing both for those in contact with their gracious opportunities as well as for those within the sphere of their influence. The Bible and the text book constitute the palladium of both mental and spiritual enfranchisement, and only as we are true to the purpose of Jesus Christ in these may we hope for the results for which our prayers are offered, our labors given, and our means laid upon this altar of devotion.

The report from Emory College shows gratifying results. This institution has been more fortunate in securing men eminently qualified in head and in heart to fill the various professorships. With the best equipments and a constituency of over 200,000 Methodists, it commands the admiration of all our people. We are glad to learn from the report of the President that the enrollment for the Fall Session is 286. Of this number thirty five are sons of ministers of the gospel, who are receiving without charge for tuition, the advantages of this school of uncorrupted learning. We commend this institution for its adherence to this honorable tradition, and trust our people will patronize, more and more, this generous institution which has done so much for our Methodism and for the spread of the gospel around the world. Those who feel constrained to educate their sons out of our State will find unsurpassed advantages at Emory College.

We note with pleasure from the report of the President of Wesleyan Female College that this grand old foundation is in a prosperous condition. Its usefulness increases with its years, and a long honorable past is the guarantee of still greater efficiency in the years to come. The pressing need of the Wesleyan College is an ample endowment; this once secured, the way will be open to perfect the plans which are in abeyance until this shall have been secured. This institution is to be congratulated that it owes no floating debts—the total amount of its indebtedness (which is in bonds,) being only \$14,000. The assets of the College, stated in round numbers, are \$259,000. This is most encouraging, and we congratulate the Trustees upon this excellent showing.

To those Florida Methodists who feel that they must educate their children out of this State, we suggest, may recommend, that under such stress of conditions which may make this an imperative, that they give their patronage to our own approved institutions. They want and need the best education to be had for their children—then let them see that their patronage and influence are given where the best results are to be secured. Long may this venerable foundation of learning remain among us to bless our land with its labors in behalf of a consecrated and fully equipped womanhood.

The Florida Conference College, our own institution, and specially dear to our hearts because of the value of its work to our Conference and people, commends itself to the Methodists of Florida, as well as to Christians of other communities. At this fountain of knowledge the youth of our State, as well as those from the more rigorous climate of the northern portion of our country, may receive a full equipment for the serious and practical duties of life. The Faculty has been selected with care and discrimination, and the work done at this institution is self evidencing by its reality and thoroughness. Hampered by a lack of endowment and by a meagre patronage, it has, nevertheless, gone on from the day of its beginning with increased usefulness. Just how such splendid results have been secured as mark its history only God and the faithful men and women know who have wrought in the heat and burden of the day of its necessity. Nevertheless, we congratulate the Conference and the College that, despite the disasters of the past year, the patronage has gratifyingly increased, and the release of all claims against the institution has been secured. Our thanks are due President Lang for his efficient and successful work in bringing this result to pass.

With feelings of pardonable pride we note the opportunity afforded our people to give expression of their appreciation of the best and highest and most productive education by the Twentieth Century Thankoffering Fund. As yet, the returns from this providential movement have been below the dignity and resources of our great Church, but we are constrained to believe that the signs are favorable for awakening to the value and importance of this enterprise which shall fill our treasuries with the means so much desired and so greatly needed.

We request the Bishop presiding at this Conference to appoint T. G. Lang and H. A. Bardwell to The Florida Conference College; F. Pasco to the State Institute for Deaf and Dumb Children; J. R. Walker and J. S. Tilley, students in the Conference College and in Vanderbilt University and Rev. T. G. Lang Conference Secretary of Education.

The following resolution is published for the information and benefit of all concerned:

Rseolved, That we look to each presiding elder for a thorough canvas of his district early in the year in the interest of the 20th century

educational movement, and suggest the appointment by him of one or more men in his district to co-operate with him in distributing literature and arranging for educational meetings within the district.

That we especially recommend to our pastors the holding of circuit or inter-circuit educational mass-meetings.

That we look to our College President to arrange for educational mass meetings in our centres; for suggestions as to plans and methods as to carrying out our part of the movement; for literature to be used in forwarding the movement; and we will welcome him among us as far as he can visit us to help us in this work.

#### COMMITTEE ON TEMPERANCE.

Your committee on temperance notes with pleasure that the Methodist Church is relentless in her warfare upon strong drink, the enemy of God, the Church of his Son, our homes and civilization.

Since our last Conference the saloons in some places have been closed, but in their places have sprung up the domestic wine shop, which wine under our present law is manufactured and sold without restraint.

So great is this evil becoming, so potent upon the morals of our state, be it ordained—

1st. That as pastors we will be more diligent in the administration of the Discipline at this point.

2nd. That we will preach at least once during the year upon this subject and in any other way possible endeavor to create public sentiment against the manufacture, sale and use of intoxicating liquors.

3rd. That we hereby request the pastors and laymen of our Church to circulate among the people for the purpose of getting as many signatures thereto as possible, a petition directed to the Legislature of the State of Florida requesting such legislation as will place domestic wine under the same class as other intoxicating liquors.

#### COMMITTEE ON BIBLE CAUSE.

Never has there been such wide-spead and deep interest in the Book of God as we now find among his people; and as also is shown by those who, hitherto, have been blind to its truths and unmoved by its wonderful power. While the Christian preacher and teacher go forth using it as the sword of the Spirit, the sin-sick soul among the heathen and lost sinner at home are finding it to be the balm of Gilead, which restores them to life and health. In the plentiful and cheap supply to us of the Word, we are apt to forget that millions are yet without it and strangers to its blessed teachings. The printed Word is a necessary instrument in all successful Christian work, lies at the base and is the source of all Gospel preaching and teaching; and no missionary effort can succeed or be permanent where it is not disseminated, read and obeyed. This turns our thoughts to the human agency which is, to us, the source of supply for the Book—that great fountain from which is pouring the streams that are refreshing and gladenning the world-The American Bible Society.

We have not time to recount the blessings it has brought the world and the help it has given the churches in its nearly sixty six millions of books put in the hands of the people, often free of cost; in the thousands of destitute homes visited, supplied and helped by its workers, and its efficient corps of colporteurs and missionaries sent into cheerless home and foreign fields during its eighty-three years' existence. This past year alone, it issued 1,380,000 copies of the Word, and to foreign fields made grants amounting to \$156,509. What would missionary effort be without this help? Especially would we call attention to its work in the recently opened fields of Cuba, Porto Rico and the Phillippines, where its past and present efforts have made missionary success possible. Do we, as a church or conference, appreciate this great institution and are we helping it in any fitting degree in supplying the needy with the Word of Life? This year, in the Florida Conference, only fifty pastors have reported amounts raised for the Bible Cause, and only \$23.21 contributed. Do we let our people know of its work and give them opportunity to help it?

The Field Agent, Rev. T. H. Law, D.D., Spartanburg, S. C., stands ready to supply pastors with literature concerning the work of the Society; to aid in securing grants of books to supply destitute persons, and assist in putting a Bible in the hands of every Sunday School pupil at half the regular price. Shall we not put ourselves in communication with him and the Society, and thus not only help him and it, but let them help us? Shall we not inform our people as to the work of the Society and give them opportunity to contribute to it? In order to

further this great cause we present for adoption the following resolutions:

Resolved, That we rejoice in the increasing prosperity and continued usefulness of the American Bible Society;

Resolved, That we will heartily co-operate with it in its efforts to supply the destitute with the Word of Life by bringing the cause prominently and specially before our people; by taking annual collections for the Society, and by hunting out and supplying with the Word those who are without it.

Resolved, That we constitute the present committee as a permanent one for four years, to consist of one from each district, the chairman, Rev. H. E. Partridge, being authorized to fill vacancies during the year, so that each district be represented, said committee to do all in its power to promote the interests of this great cause during the year.

#### COMMITTE ON EPWORTH LEAGUE.

The report of the General Secretary shows a most encouraging condition of this department of the work of the Church. Five hundred and eighty new chapters have been organized this year, adding 24,440 new members, which bring the aggregated membership to about 300,000. With proper attention to this work and more activity upon the part of the ministry this membership could be increased another 100,000.

We would recommend that the pastors use their Leagues to aid them in securing any deficits that may occur in their Conference collections. This is known as the "Holsten plan," and commends itself to our judgment. This matter will doubtless receive further attention at the State Conference.

The Epworth Era has a circulation of nearly 14,000. It is a clean, well-edited and deservedly popular paper, and should be in the hands of all our young people. The paper occupies a large place in our work and is almost a necessity to the advance which we should make in our work with the young.

It is the judgment of the committee that a Southern conference of our Leaugue would inure to a better understanding of the work and to any advance movement that may be enterprised.

We would respectfully urge our presiding elders to co operate with the district chairmen in holding and magnifying the district

League meetings. Experience has clearly shown that these meetings are the most important of any we hold. In this connection the committee would take special pleasure in commending the State Conference and ask the hearty co operation and attendance of our pastors and presiding elders.

Second—This committee shall consist of the following members: R. M. Evans, H. Hice, W. N. Sheats, I. S. Patterson, B. F. Mason, J. A.

Hendry, E. A. Harrison, H. E. Partridge, W. B. Fresca, and their successors in office, all vacancies being filled by the Conference, on the nomination of this committee.

Third - The officers of this committee shall be president, vice president secretary and treasurer, to be elected annually by the committee.

Fourth—Five members shall constitute a quorum for the transaction of business.

#### COMMITTEE ON BOOKS AND PERIODICALS.

Inasmuch as our people are thirsting for knowledge, and whereas there is such a vast amount of light and trashy literature, calculated to poison the minds of our young people, filling them with false and dangereus conceptions of life, we hail with gladness the interest that is being manifested in the church to supply this want in books and periodicals suited to sowing the seeds of gospel grace in the hearts and consciences of our young people. And inasmuch as oftentimes the poison is concealed under the adornment of beautiful language and rounded periods, we your committee, would urge our brethren to press the use of our own publications which have passed under the critical eye of our own book editor, that our children may not be poisoned.

We note with pleasure the fact, that the Publishing House, amid so many disturbing circumstances, shows such a good financial balance and also for the hopeful prospects for the incoming year.

In this connection we note with great pleasure the vast good done by our worthy colporteur, Rev. R. H. Barnett, in distributing so many good books from our Publishing House, by his untiring zeal in this worthy cause.

We would suggest, if it be possible, that our publications be reduced in price, so as not only to compete with the cheap literature of the day, but even at a lower price, as christian character is of far more value than money.

In view of the fact, that our business men are so engrossed in this fast age with worldly affairs that they do not take time to read good and useful books, but use the daily papers and magazines for their mental food, and consequently carry to their homes some of the secular dailies filled with scandals and sensational items, which ought not to be published, your committee thinks if the central organ of our Methodism could be made a daily, it would overcome this evil, and we would cease to see our homes defiled with these instruments of death.

We would especially call your attention to our central publications: The Christian Advocate, carrying the news from all our connections; the Methodist Reviews, devoted to religion and philosophy, science and literature, which should be read by our preachers and laymen that they may keep abreast with the times; the Review of Missions, which we can not see how a Methodist preacher can do without; the Epworth Era, which should be in the hands of all our young people.

And above all, we would call your attention to our Sunday school literature, so fully adapted to the wants of our children, and especially the Sunday School Magazine, as being the best of its class.

We come now to notice that publication which is dearest to the hearts to our Florida christians. Somehow or other we always appreciate the most the touch of the gentle hand of our dear ones at home, so we think the Florida Christian Advocate is the best paper of all the papers for the Florida conferenceman, and we heartily endorse and submit the editor's own report, as follows:

"To the Bishop and Members of the Florida Conference:

"Dear Brethern—As the Publisher of The Florida Christian Advocate," which is your paper, it is my duty to submit to you an annual report, and I do so now with special gratitude to the great Head of the Church for grace and providential help through the year. It is a great privilege to work for my Lord, and it is with thankfulness that I record His blessing upon my labors. The testimonies of a great many show how greatly the "Advocate" has been blessed to their souls.

"This has been a year of much financial depression in this state, Many have left the state and many have have moved from one place to another, the result of disappointed hopes in business; and it was feared that the 'Adocate' would suffer more than in former years But on the contrary collections have been better, and the 'Advocate' stands higher than for some time past.

"In July a serious illness, brought on by exce sive labor, prostrated the Editor, but it pleased God to raise him up and restore him to health, and the paper has continued to make its weekly visits. There is an increase of new subscribers and renewals, and a considerable falling off in discontinuances. The receipts since December 9, 1898 from subscriptions and advertising have been \$2,888.15; and the expense of getting out the paper and mailing it has been \$2,312.36, making a net gain of \$575.79, which is the salary of the editor and publisher for the year; a better result than was obtained last year, but still small.

"In conclusion, your servant, the publisher, begs leave to remind you and the Church of that part of the contract which promises moral support and working assistance in obtaining subscribers and looking after the interests of the paper. Let this be fulfilled and the Advocate will succeed.



# MEMOIRS



### Memoirs.

#### REV. W. S. RICHARDSON.

Rev. W. S. Richardson was born on Cape Fear River, Bladen Co., N. C., January 21,1833, and finished his earthly pilgrimage at Key West, Florida, Sept. 14, 1899. In early life he was deeply impressed on the subject of religion, and, while yet in his boyhood, he was much given to private meditation and prayer. Of this peroid he writes:

"I was from childhood strongly impressed on the subject of religion. I have distinct remembrance of the conviction for sin, and earnest desire to be a Christian. I felt a mysterious tendency or drawing toward the Christain ministry."

When, in the presence of God, death invades our circle and removes a friend, our thoughts naturally turn back upon the life that is closed, and comtemplating that life across the the chasm of the grave, we are likely to see its characteristic in a clear and truth revealing light. This fact may have given currency to the poetic aphorism—"Blessings brighten as they fly." There are, however, some lives of such noble mould, and transparent purity as to compel recognition and elicit the commendation of all good men. Such a life was that of your late pastor, Rev. W. S. Richardson.

His supreme desire was to be and do good; and through riches of grace in Christ Jesus, this desire was fulfilled in large measure. He was distinctively referred to among his brethren—both clerical and lay—as "eminently pious, thoroughly consecrated; a man full of faith and the Holy Ghost."

He was fortunate in being sent, at a critical period in life, to Bingham school, in Orange county, N. C., where he was surrounded with excellent educational and religious influences. It was here, when nineteen years of age, at a revival meeting that he found pardon and peace in believing. Of this experience he says:

"I retired to a grove near by before school hours and while engaged in prayer, a holy calm filled my soul, and peace reigned within. All nature seemed touched with supreme beauty and all praised God. While sitting quietly and peacefully contemplating the scene, I realized a distinct and unmistakable call to preach the gospel. How glad I would have been to have responded obediently to the Divine call; but being very timid—excessively and painfully so—also posses-ing no confidence in my ability. I kept the knowledge of the call to myself alone—I felt it would be presumptuous even to acknowledge it to any one. The idea of my preaching was too much for my bashful, self-distrusting nature.

After the lapse of thirty-eight years and in the full maturity of his ministerial life and usefulness he recurs to his first distinct call to the ministry. Of it he writes:

"Looking back to that happy morning, I am filled with regret that I was not obedient to the call. Every advantage lay before me. All to gain and nothing to lose—if I could have so seen it."

And then adds this reflection: "How much better for the young—the old—all—to submit their all ways to Divine guidance."

Failing to get full consent to avow his call to the ministry and commit himself to the work of preparation, he gradually drifted buck to a worldly life.

A few years later an event occurred which, under God, settled his future course. He was married to Miss Annie E. Foxworth, of Sumpter county, South Carolina, a woman of superior qualities of mind and heart, and withal, devotedly pious. It was not long after this union before, at a gracious revival meeting, he was wonderously reclaimed and the joy of salvation restored. With restoration to the conscious favor of God there came a distinct renewal of the call to preach the go-pel; and now again, as the first instance, he was involved in a conflict—a struggle. His exalted conception of the sacred office and the work of the Christian ministry on the one hand, and the humble views which he entertained for himself and his abilities on the other, greatly discouraged and depressed him. Nevertheless, he was firm in adherence to the purpose formed—to follow what seemed to be the guiding hand of Divine Providence. He at once fell into line of such church work as came to hand. He rendered efficient service as steward, class-leader and Sunday school superintendent and meanwhile thought, studied and prayed with reference to that broader field of Christian activity and usefulness which he was destined to occupy.

In due time he was licensed to preach. As a local preacher he was earnest, diligent and faithful. Having been (as he considered it) tardy in beginning the work to which he was divinely called, it appeared as though he would, if possible, make amends for misspent time and lost opportunities by extraordinary zeal and activity. A year or two in the ranks of the local ministry convinced that in that relation he could not make full proof of his ministry. He could not preach effectively and at the same time give attention to secular business, and besides, he felt

that his call was to the work of pastor as well as preacher. After prayerful consideration he decided to seek the pastoral relation, and it seems to have been his original purpose to apply to the South Carolina Conference for admission into the traveling connection, but that body was overcrowded at the time, and in the good providence of the great head of the church, his attention was turned to Florida.

His first wife having died in 1892, he married Miss Mattie Blalock, July 31, 1895, with whom he lived in an ideal union until the close of his useful and devoted life.

Learning that Florida was a field "white unto the harvest" and that more laborers were needed, he responded with eager haste and a burning zeal, and took his place as one of the prerchers of the Florida Conference.

He was admitted on trial into the Florida Canference at Gainesville, Nov. 15, 1878. Having stood approved examinations on the courses of study from year to year, lie was duly elected and ordained to the eldership in 1882.

From the time of his admission on trial into the Florida Conference in 1878 to the close of his life as a pastor, his walk and conversation were in harmony with the sacredness and dignity of the ministerial office. His pastorate—first and last—embraced a large number of charges. They all with one accord bear testimony to his worth as a man and Christian minister. In every field in which he labored believers were won to Christ. The church were he is known will honor his name and cherish his memory.

Mrs. Laurinda McClary Rhodes was born in Yorkville, S. C., August 26, 1822, and died in Jefferson county, Florida, April 16, 1899.

During the second year of her residence in Monticello her husband, pastor of that charge, passed from earth to the joys of the redeemed in heaven. A stranger, widowed and alone, God raised up friends to her and her children, and she realized the fulfillment of the promise that the righteous should not be forsaken, nor should their seed beg bread.

A friend who knew her long and intimately writes: "Truly sister Rhodes was a blessing to every one that knew her, and her loyalty to her friends, her church and her God was beautiful beyond description. Blessed with devoted friends and loving children, her last days were crowned with many marked blessings—special outpourings of the Holy Spirit which were foretastes of the home beyond where she fondly hoped to meet the loved ones gone before."

This brief record portrays but feebly the worth of this pious life on earth. It is the prerogative of nobler natures that their departure to higher realms exercises a no less blessed influence than did their abode in the flesh. They shine upon us from above like stars, by which we steer our course to the heaven of the good on high. Of this departed saint it may well be said, she pleased God and was beloved of him. When the obscurity of death shall be done away we shall awake and remember and understand that we shall be ever with the Lord. Those who have gone from us in the faith that saves have planted the seed of future harvests, and in the glad day of resurrection their labors shall appear in the souls won by their patient continuance in well-doing. And they, for a time, rest from their labors, and their works shall follow them and abide.

#### MAGGIE B. CARPENTER.


