Cancer Drive Gets Under Way On Coastside

HALF MOON BAY, April 6.—Mrs. Roger Duncan of Half Moon Bay, county commander for the American Cancer Society drive, today announced the 1954 drive is under way with some 33 solicitors working on the coastside area during the cancer month of April. The drive for funds and distribution of educational cancer literature will be carried out on a house to house basis.

Funds collected during campaign will be used to support the American Cancer Society's year around program of cancer research, education and service. A major objective of the campaign, however, is to acquaint the public with the need for the early detection and treatment of cancer. Mrs. R. D. Borley of Half Moon Bay, district chairman, stressed. To help promote recognition of cancer's earliest symptoms, the society hopes to place a copy of cancer's seven danger signals in every home on the coastside.

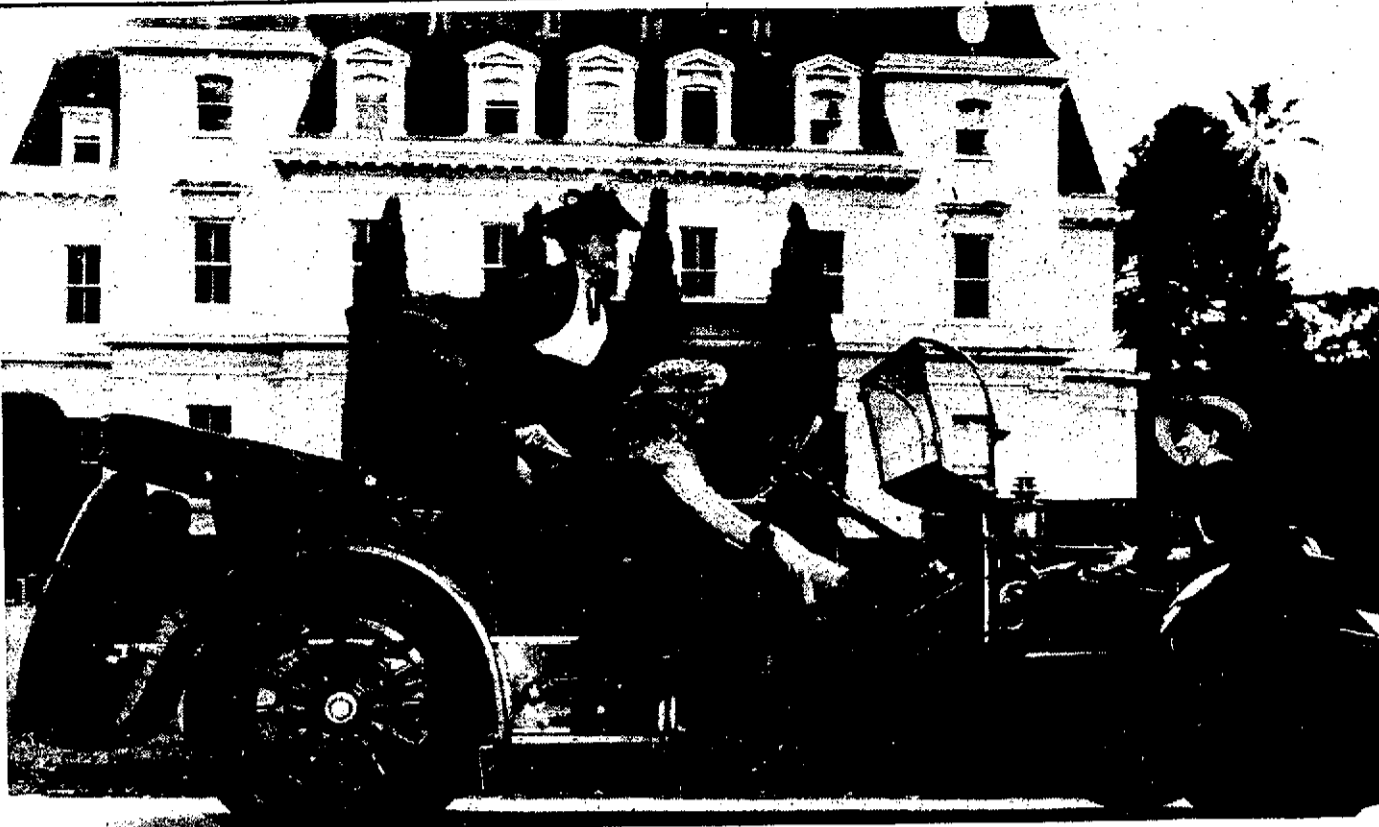

Varian makes his home at 24 Aliso way here.

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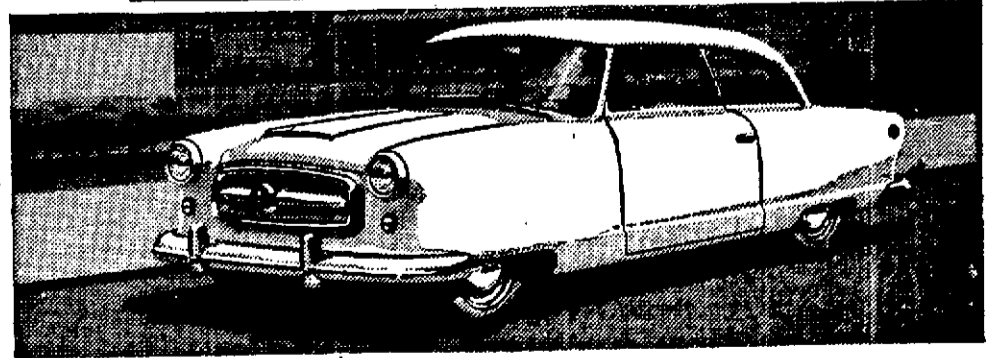
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
