EGYPT HURTS HERSELF

DEATH HAS FOLLOWED

the wounding of the Sirdar and Anglo-Egyptian relations have very naturally become an absorbing topic of discussion in the Empire's metropolis.

The native press, in common with the attitude of the more moderate elements of the Nationalist Party, is horrified at the turn of events and supports the Government in its immediate decision to apprehend the culprits and mete out adequate punishment.

Realization of Egyptian ideals would not be hindered by Great Britain as long as progress were confined to constitutional lines; but there must never be any doubt about the safety of that trade route to the East which includes the Suez Canal.

Nevertheless as Egypt's economic existence is so wrapped up in the Nile, as it always has been, Britain will protect her investments upon which that economic life depends.

LOG EXPORT

OUT OF A GRAND TOTAL of 2,500,000,000 feet of lumber cut in British Columbia last year only 46,000,000 feet were exported from this Province with the permission of the Government.

After once again reminding the Legislature that the Government could not control the disposal of logs from Crown-granted areas—thousands of acres of which were blithely frittered away by the late regime—Mr. Pattullo quoted the above figures in support of his contention that the present policy assured as much local manufacture as practical and as little export as conditions in the lumber industry demanded.

It ought to be understood by most people by this time that a great portion of the logs which leave these waters for United States mills are not required in this Province. If they remained here a large majority of them would be a drug on the market, while the terebo is notorious for taking what he wants without paying for it.

Many critics cry out for an export duty. They seldom stop to think that if the Dominion Govern-

ment were to consent to such an impost our neighbors across the way would promptly retaliate and ruin a market which means food and wages for thousands of people in this British Columbia. That condition would be produced by a refusal to part with 46,000,000 feet which, for the most part, would rot into a dead loss if the low grade market outside the Province were not satisfied with it.

Nor do the opponents of even this much export seem to remember that not so very long ago a movement started in this Province looking to the removal of the impost duty on American timber coming into British Columbia because of the danger that the present free admission of the Canadian product into the United States might be replaced by a retaliatory measure.

Meanwhile the present policy is bringing many millions of American dollars to this Province.

WOULD WHITE GIRLS PROFIT?

TO PROHIBIT THE EMPLOYMENT of Chinese in homes and restaurants where white girls are also in service is excellent in theory. A measure so designed would probably have the support of most members of the Legislature.

But would it work to the benefit of the white girls or would it prevent many from following an occupation for which they consider themselves to be suited? Who would get the preference on a show-down—the white girl or the Chinese? If there could be a guarantee that those who employ both Chinese and white girls would retain the latter, there would be much to commend the measure under consideration.

PERSONAL PROPERTY TAX

IT WILL BE GRATIFYING to all merchants in the Province that the next session of the Legislature will witness the complete abolition of the personal property tax.

This is by no means a popular tax with the Government itself and it has long been regarded by the commercial life of British Columbia as a most uneconomic and inequitable form of impost.

HARD ON MR. JONES

MR. POOLEY INFORMED the members of the Legislature on Wednesday afternoon that his policy was to aid the fruit-growers of the Okanagan by some such scheme as the remission of interest charges on loans; but he and his colleagues were not quite sure as to what course they would actually take because they had not considered the question in caucus.

This was a naive confession from the Leader of the Opposition. It stood out in striking relief against the destructive criticism which his first lieutenant from the Okanagan had offered to the Government's policy in that part of the Province.

Some of the Old Country Liberals are beginning to leave the Lloyd George ship. The war Premier has not exactly shone politically of recent date.

Minister of Finance—Jakob Ahrer.
Minister of Social Administration—Josef Resch.
The other Cabinet posts will be filled by the same ministers as served under Chancellor Seipel. The new Ministry has received the warmest congratulations from Dr. Seipel and assurances of the Christian and Social Parties' fullest support.

THREE-HOUR DEBATE FAILS TO SETTLE HOUSE ON P.G.E.; MAY BE SPECIAL SESSION IN 1925

Oliver Appeals to Members to Forget Party Politics and Help Him to Solve Riddle of Government-owned Line; Opposition, With Some Liberals Evidently Behind it, Demands That Legislature Ratify Sale Pact With Extra Session if Necessary.

With Premier Oliver appealing to the House to forget party politics in attempting to settle the Pacific Great Eastern Railway problem and the Opposition demanding just as vigorously that the House itself dictate the terms of a railway settlement instead of giving a "blank cheque" to the Government, three hours of debate failed yesterday to bring the Legislature appreciably nearer an agreement.

Apparently the House must wade through more hours of discussion before the question even gets to committee stage when the lines along which the P.G.E. would be sold will be considered. Meanwhile it is evident that the members are split on the one big question which developed in to-day's long discussion—whether the Government shall enter an agreement for the sale of the P.G.E. itself or negotiate a settlement and then ask the House to endorse it. Premier Oliver already has declared in favor of a Government settlement but Liberals on the floor of the House indicated yesterday that they would not support any scheme under which the Government would hold a "blank cheque."

A special session of the House in the middle of next year or even earlier in the year, called for the purpose of ratifying a P.G.E. sale, therefore, loomed up as a distinct possibility to-day.

Opposition charges that he was evading his duty of bringing down a definite P.G.E. bill were vigorously denied by the Premier who wound up yesterday's debate. He charged the Opposition with "playing politics" on the P.G.E. problem.

"As Premier, not appointed by the Legislature but by His Majesty's representative, and speaking as his representative, I come to this House and ask for its advice on this problem," Mr. Oliver declared.

The Premier quoted the records of the Canadian House of Commons to show that the procedure of the Government in the P.G.E. question was quite proper.

"The whole course of the debate to-day has been directed to party position rather than to the solution of this problem," he declared.

"I ask the members to withdraw that!" exclaimed R. H. Pooley, Opposition Leader, springing to his feet. "The Premier insisted that the Opposition was jockeying for political advantage and refused to withdraw his statement."

SEEKING ADVICE
"I think the same people will back me when I say that under present conditions, with no party in a majority, the Government is justified in asking the Legislature for its advice," the Premier declared amid applause.

When Mr. Pooley declared that he was willing to waive Constitutional rights on certain conditions the Premier flashed back with, "I want to say that the time has not arrived when he can dictate conditions in the House."

Mr. Oliver reiterated that the Government's procedure was quite constitutional.

BIG LIABILITIES
The Premier admitted that it probably would be impossible for the Government to negotiate a settlement by which British Columbia would be relieved of all its P.G.E. liabilities.

"I would have no hope of reaching such an agreement," he said.

"I am appealing to the House to put aside partisan considerations," the Premier went on. "Let us try together to reach the best solution of this problem."

Mr. Oliver agreed that the House should have the knowledge of all the concessions which it was planned to make to aid the sale of the P.G.E. The Federal Government, he pursued, evidently intended to frame a policy of Peace River development before the next session of Parliament. When the British Columbia representative took part in the negotiations preceding the termination of this policy they should be able to talk business and be authorized to make an agreement, he urged. Otherwise a special session of the House would have to be held to ratify the settlement. He proposed, instead, that the House outline in detail the terms of a settlement and then allow the Government to negotiate an agreement.

"I don't think we can negotiate an agreement unless we can make a definite agreement," he asserted. He added, however, that he would accept the House's decision on this point.

WANTS LINE SOLD
The Government's plan to sell the P.G.E. without securing the ratification of the House was not the policy of the McBride Government nor the policy adopted by the Liberals in 1918—the "only constitutional policy," Mr. Pooley declared in opposing the Premier's P.G.E. resolution.

The P.G.E. had been a political football for all parties for years, he went on.

"But," he added, "we think it is too serious a matter to remain on that basis any longer."
The Opposition, he said, favored the sale of the line, but it wanted to know exactly on what terms the sale was to be made before it supported the plan.

The Government, he charged, was seeking to evade its duty of bringing down a bill covering the sale of the railway. The Government, he asserted, should negotiate an agreement for the sale of the line and then submit it to the House for approval.

"If necessary let them call a special session!" he declared amid applause from the Opposition benches.

"Who are you speaking for?" demanded Major Richard Burde, Independent, Alberni.
"I speak for the Conservatives in this House!" Mr. Pooley retorted.

BURDE HOLDS UP HOUSE
Major Burde then proceeded to

hold up the business of the House for five minutes by demanding that Mr. Pooley declare whether he was speaking as Leader of the Opposition or as private member. He kept jumping up and down demanding that the Speaker Backham rule on this point and in vain the Speaker instructed him to sit down.

Finally the Speaker warned the Major that he would have to be removed if he didn't behave himself. "If you want trouble you'll get it right on the floor of the House!" the Major shouted loudly demanding that his point of order be decided. "There's a rule for Leaders of the Government and another for us poor guys in the corner!" he cried, pointing to the Labor Independents.

After continual delay Mr. Pooley was able to proceed and the Major left the House in disgust.

OPPOSES BLANK CHEQUE
Mr. Pooley strongly opposed the idea of giving the Government a "blank cheque" for the sale of the P.G.E.

"We want this business to be transacted so that there will be no scandals of any kind," he said, adding that the House must understand full details of the sale scheme before it was completed.

Premier Oliver declared that Mr. Pooley's amendment was not being brought in at the proper stage. He quoted the rules to support his contention. Mr. Pooley's resolution should be introduced in committee, he said, and he asked Mr. Pooley to withhold his motion until the House had reached the committee stage.

POOLEY FIRM
Mr. Pooley protested the Premier's contention and stood by his assertion that his amendment be considered immediately.

While he did not retire from his contention, the Premier agreed not to press his point. Mr. Pooley, he said, must take responsibility for the delay that would follow his course.

"We can't waste too much time on the P.G.E.," Mr. Pooley declared. "If necessary we must stay here three months to settle it!"

Finally the Premier waived his point of order and N. C. Perry, Liberal, Fort George, got his first opportunity to speak. Mr. Perry declared that the Premier's resolution should be considered first and Mr. Pooley's amendment afterwards. He urged the discussion of such an important matter on a non-partisan basis.

Mr. Pooley: Do you favor a "blank cheque to the Government?"

Mr. Perry: Not to this Government nor any other.

He referred to the "patient" settlers along the route of the Government railway, and said they had almost come to the conclusion that they might as well wait for the Angel Gabriel to blow his horn as expect the completion of the line.

LAND GRANTS
Touching upon the proposal of the Government to make a land grant in order to dispose of the line, Mr. Perry vented the opinion that if the Pacific Great Eastern Railway had had a grant of land and could have profited from its sale there would be no deficit in the operation of the railway.

Mr. Perry urged the Government to complete the line to Prince George even if a sale of the railway were not consummated.

"The Great Northern Railway considers every settler worth \$500 to the railway," said the speaker. "The C.P.R. places the figure at \$114. If we placed 1000 settlers, they would be worth \$500,000 per year to the P.G.E. Railway."

PEACE RIVER RICHES
He then turned his attention to the Peace River country. That district was the richest in British Columbia or Western Canada he declared, and was capable in the opinion of experts of producing at least \$100,000,000 bushels of wheat annually.

He told of how the C.P.R. had lost \$200,000 last year in operating the E.D. and B.C. Railway. It cost the Province of Alberta \$400,000 to pay interest on the bonds of that railway.

"So the question is a national one," declared Mr. Perry. "It is a problem of the welfare of all the people."

He declared that support should not be given the proposed Brule Lake line; that if such a link were built it would mean that not an acre of British Columbia land would be improved and that one British Columbia settler would be benefited.

Mr. Perry begged for support of the Premier's resolution, so that Hon. Mr. Oliver would be able to go to Ottawa with the backing of the Legislature and be in a position to "get somewhere."

WANTS ACTION
A. E. Munn, Liberal, Lillooet, in his maiden speech, urged all members to get together as business men to solve the P.G.E. problem. He referred to the great resources of the P.G.E. country and declared that the people living along the line did not know whether to remain or not, pending some real action on the future of the railway.

While the Government was trying to sell the line, he said, it should be completed to Prince George and to North Vancouver. If necessary the Government should borrow money to continue construction, he urged.

When Major Burde bobbed up with a motion to adjourn the debate, Mr. Perry, who was in the chair, urged

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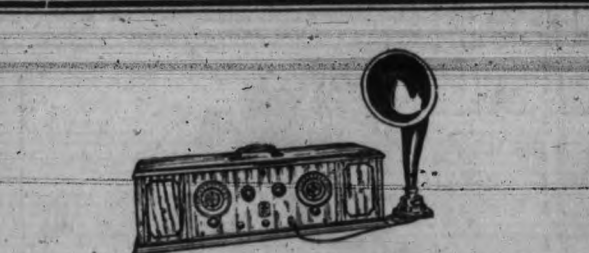

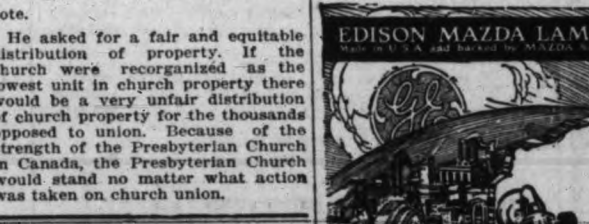

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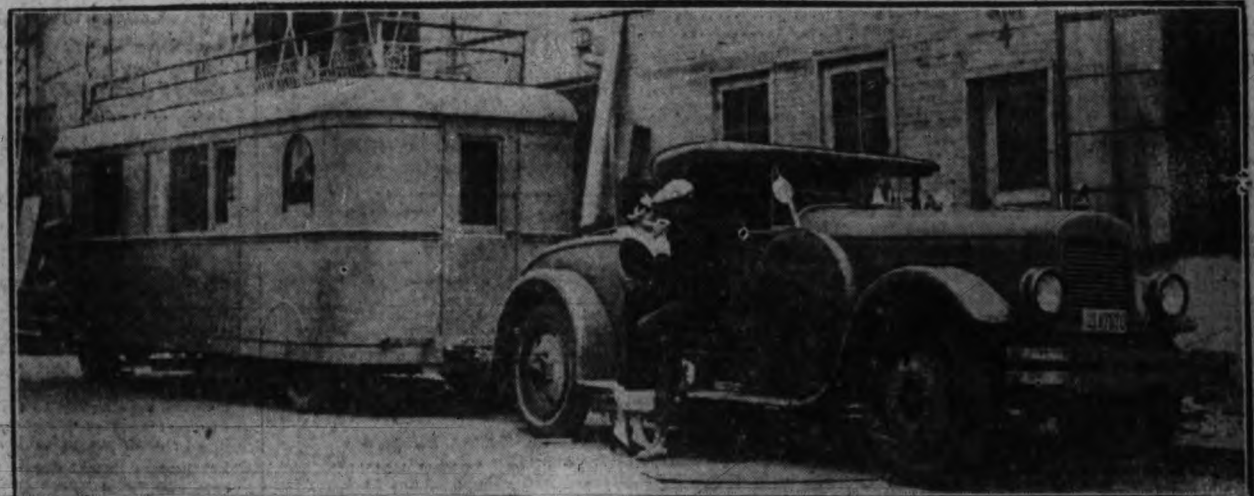
