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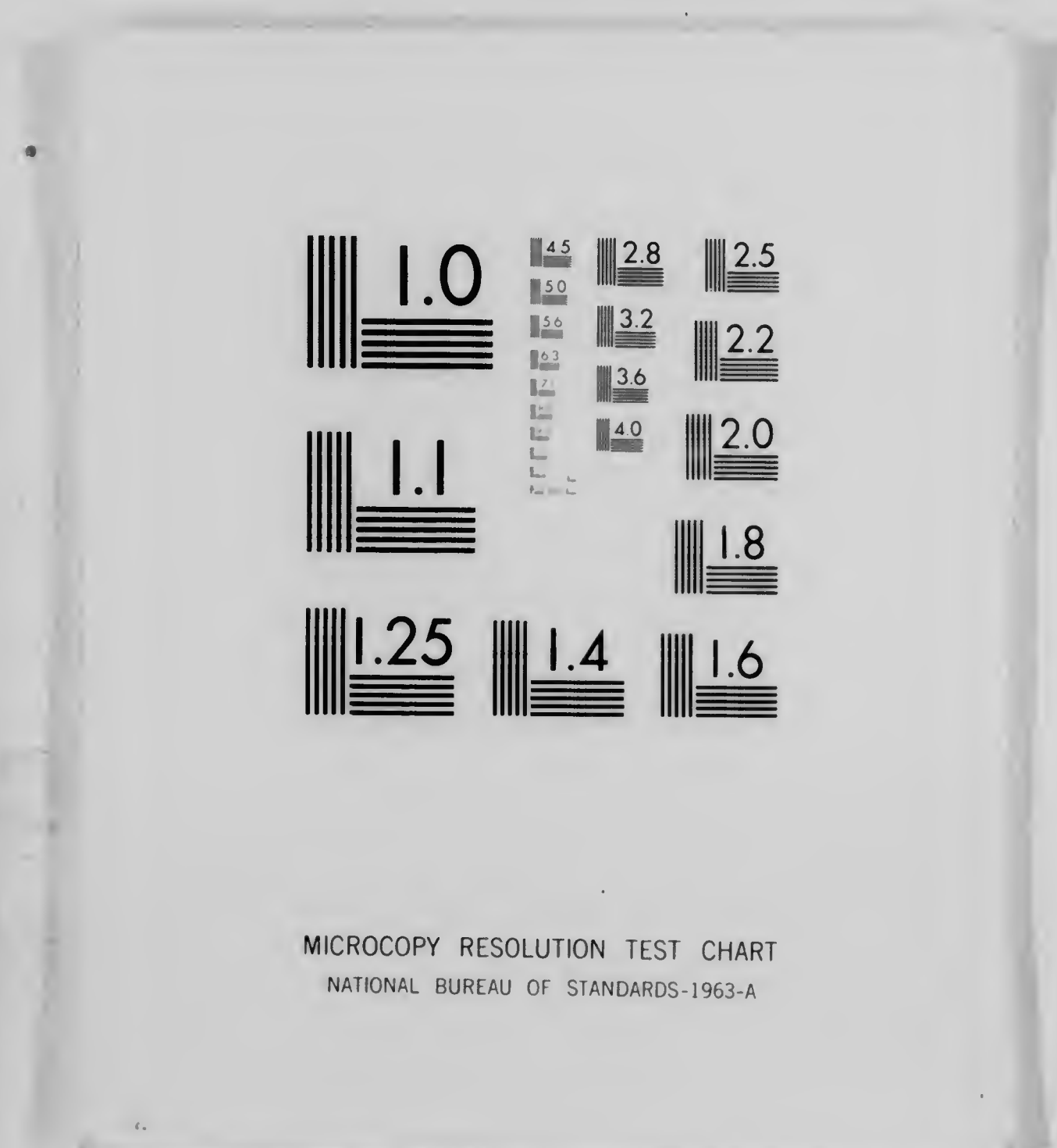

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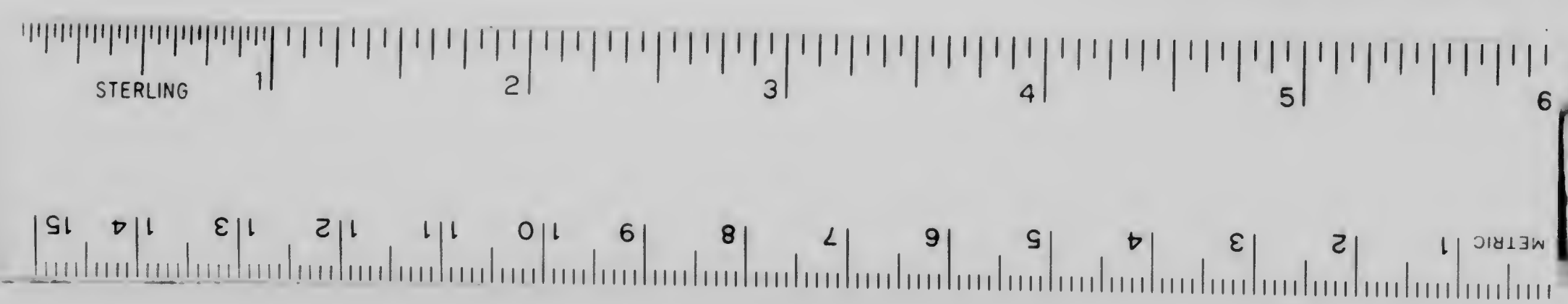

Cow and Ox hides should be of 28 or 30 lbs weight to be of first quality. Bull hides should be avoided as much as possible as they generally sell 1<sup>st</sup> @ 1<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> ¢ lb lower than the Cow and Ox hides. Cow and Ox hides are now worth 9<sup>o</sup> 10<sup>o</sup> 1/2 + 10<sup>o</sup> 3/4 ¢ lb and are in very regular demand, indeed the consumption of them is fully equal to all the quantity which South America can produce - it would be perhaps too much to expect present prices to be supported for a year or two, for they are high; but under all circumstances I certainly expect to see hides not lower than 7<sup>o</sup> to 8<sup>o</sup> ¢ lb for some years to come. California Hides may be inferior to Buenos Ayres Hides, but at all events I should expect 7<sup>o</sup> ¢ lb for them if they arrive sound. Salted hides are also in very regular demand, they should weigh 60 @ 65 lbs of Hides to be equal to Buenos Ayres Hides - they generally arrive in pretty good condition and more free from worm than the dry hides; they are also in every respect less liable to damage. The price of salted Hides from Buenos Ayres is 5<sup>o</sup> to 6<sup>o</sup> ¢ lb. California hides being a new article would probably not bring so much, but I think 4<sup>1</sup>/<sub>2</sub> might be safely calculated upon. Care should be taken that the inside of the hide is not cut or hacked by knives, and free from worm - the dry hides should be carefully beaten before shipment, to prevent if possible a single insect remaining - the salted hides will lose weight considerably during the voyage - if they should weigh 60 lbs when shipped they perhaps would not weigh more than 30 lbs upon arrival here - as a general rule to judge of the quality of hides - those hides may be considered the best which contain the greatest weight in the smallest compass. of course small thick hides are better than large thin ones. -

With respect to Horse hides any quantity may be sold here, the present price of Buenos Ayres is at 5<sup>o</sup> 3/4 ¢ hide - the quantity now here is large, but 5<sup>o</sup> would be readily given for the whole <sup>of the good</sup> quality now in hand. A Horse hide when well dried would be called good if it weighed 10 lbs - the more hair the horse hides have the better. Horse hair would sell at 6<sup>o</sup>

of 6 for short hair and is saleable to any extent. it should be quite free from dirt and as little curled as possible. Long horse tails quite free from any number of short hairs is worth 1/6 of 6 but each hair should be at least 18 inches long

Cow and Ox horns are in good demand and almost always sell very readily - the present price is about 40/- of 143 horns, the straight longer and more solid they are the better. Horn tips are about 10/- of 123 and should be not less than 6 inches long -

Tallow has been declining in price for many months except at short intervals, the present price of well rendered Buenos Ayres is 36/4. 38/- of 112 lbs this price is so low I think there is no chance of its being lower - and it is now a matter of opinion whether there will or will not be a war with Russia it is an article of affair speculation import and upon which little loss could be sustained if shipped at 32/- of 99/- Sales at the market price may be always effected to any extent

I observe from Mr McCall's letter that saltpetre is to be had in quantity at Monterey. I therefore give you a quotation of the price of that article. If California saltpetre be equal to the East India it is worth at present 30/- of 600 here - that is rather above an average price and I should think it unsafe to calculate upon more than 23/- of 600 - at that price 500 tons might be disposed of without difficulty - good saltpetre ought to be light coloured - well crystallized and free from small brown particles, but the article from California being new I would advise a very small shipment in the first instance

Dear Hartwell

You will be surprised to see where this is dated from - Two or three days after my arrival in Callao, arrived the Brig Esther from Liverpool on acct. of the house, and as every thing in the way of European goods, are completely at a stand in that Market; Mr. Begg resolved on transshipping two thirds of his Cargo to the John Begg, and sending me, with the same, down to this quarter; however we had a few words previous to my consent to go, as I told him, I would either remain in Lima, and attend to the California business, which would require the whole of my attention, or I would go back to California by first vessel, and remain there to the expiration of the Contract, and if his department was not attended to in Lima, he would have more to blame but himself, and that I was aware it not be done in my absence - At the same time I must allow, he had no person he could send, and as he mentions in his instructions to me, "you are aware our object in sending this property to another Market is not speculation, but an attempt to find a sale for it" - I have come this trip on condition that the moment I get back, which will be in May at the very furthest; as I leave this place in about ten days for St. Blas to take in the proceeds of part of the Cargo left there with Forbes and Atherton on my first arrival on this Coast; (The latter has come as his time is out with Begg; now on his own acct. - ~~It Begg~~ as he has a good deal of goods on board; still he gives every assistance as he returns with me, I expect I will be a Partner in the



concern & establish himself in the Intermedias, when I heard from  
him last he was at Guadalajara, & thought of going as far as Mexico  
Forbes makes me that almost all is disposed of, so that I expect my  
stay at S. Blas will be but short. I take the whole of the  
management of the California business into my own hands, having  
only to consult with him as to the disposal of the Produce. (Chartering  
Vessels &c so that if you play your cards in that quarter, as well  
as we will ours in Peru, and our friends in England, I have no doubt  
we will make a very handsome thing of it; although what has come  
to the Lima market as yet, has been a losing concern —

The Lahu Bages cargo has been sold for twelve Dollars per quintal  
which after paying three Dollars per quintal duty & other charges,  
will leave little or nothing for freight, although I sawed the duties on  
five hundred quintals in passing it through the Customhouse.

Let me tell you Mr. William; there is nothing in the present  
day, will pay so well as hides, therefore exert yourself, and get as many  
of them put together as you can, by the same the contract is set,  
as I expect then you will have some opposition if not sooner,  
however should we find that the hides can be got home in good  
condition, you will have no more to do, than to renew the contract  
with such of missions as should wish to enter, on the best terms  
you can, as we are well assured should they arrive in good condition  
in England, that they will bear an immense profit —

The hides Anderson's took away from California in May last  
which you are aware were the very dregs of the place, he  
sold afloat in Malpauis for three Dollars all round, so  
that may give you an idea, should ours get home in good  
condition, what they are worth to fetch —

I don't know whether he intends visiting you any more or not  
when I left Callao he was at Pisco with the Pro. Treasury  
selling some of Goldies Baskets &c. he has still on board the  
wheat, he brought from California, & will not doubt, have to  
have it overboard — We arrived in Callao in fifty nine days  
from St. Diego, you can't conceive how much Barton improved  
in health, immediately after we left the Coast; John Parson  
Robertson, never sent the parcel, that he was so anxiously waiting  
for, so that I hope it is so much the better for both him  
& us; he left Callao for Chile ten days before I left, and  
requested when I should wish you to remember him —

Have no more dealings with the old Witch up the Hill  
as all her silver turns out to be lead, what I brought with  
me, had not one single particle of silver in it —

Mr. Begg has a schooner in in view, which will be sent down to  
you to remain there, immediately on the arrival of the Helle  
and she will take <sup>such</sup> goods or goods as you may have pointed  
out in your letter for Helle, Mr. B. wish to Chile for a young  
man to go down to you as Bookkeeper, who I expect will go  
in the schooner, The John Puff will be the first to  
take a cargo of hides to England, and by her you may  
expect whatever has been short shipped by the schooner —

Have the goodness to render me my private  
account, per first conveyance, & hope in it you will account  
for what Wearin appeared &c. I left under your charge  
the first voyage — I paid Robertson your last order of 114 Do  
378

give a letter of introduction & by him you will have a  
very good opportunity to visit Peru & me under cover  
to Forbes at Tepic - I have no time to take  
a copy of this, however I will endeavour to make  
up a duplicate the best way I can to send it  
Malari - With Capt. Lincoln's best respects



As you will not likely receive  
letters from any one in Lima excepting Mr. Hays  
I cannot let slip this opportunity by writing  
you a few lines. you would no doubt re-  
ceive letters both from Mr. Bullock & Johnston  
from San Blas - as Mac writes there was a  
small rebel there bound for Monterey. I dare  
say you will by this time know that Lima  
and the Forts of Callao are in possession of  
the Spaniards owing entirely to the misgovern-  
ment of our former rulers and a petty jealousy  
against Bolivar & his troops which caused  
Bolivar to march his forces to Trujillo soon  
after which the troops under the Burens  
Byrcan flag the only regular in Lima got  
dissatisfied with their food and pay. Their  
Chief General Martinez had gambled away  
the money he had received to pay them,  
so quiet which they were marched to cause  
to garrison the forts which they had no  
sooner got possession of than they put all their



officers in confinement and a corporal called  
Mayano declared himself as head of the revolt.  
They held out at first for weapons and vessels  
to carry the troops round the cape which was  
merely a pretence to gain time. As two days  
after Casariego a Spaniard prisoner in Casar  
Mateo made his appearance as assistant gover-  
nador and hoisted the Spanish flag.

The revolt took place on the 5<sup>th</sup> Feb  
on the 28<sup>th</sup> General Morel entered Lima with  
2000 men accompanied by Agent Rodia who  
is now Governor here. The Congress during  
the revolt declared Bolivar Dictator but  
a great many of them have remained here  
as well as the greater part of the head men  
such as Tom Fagle Berindanga (Minister of State)  
Altaga &c who are treated by the Spaniards  
with the greatest contempt. And of the Peruvian  
Army troops which consisted of about 10000 men.  
I do not suppose there exists at this day 100 of  
them. About one half of them were shot here  
at various times in attempts at a counter re-  
volution. The remainder were marched off to  
Arequipa along with about 200 of the Peruvian

h' caballo who likewise passed over accompanied  
by a strong detachment of Spanish troops but  
they all deserted or were shot on the attempt  
and Lima is completely surrounded by Montano  
who prevents all supplies coming in.

We have had accounts for some time of a  
squadron fitting out in Cadix for the seas  
as likewise in England the Cambridge 90  
Gun ship has already sailed with Consuls for  
Chile & this. The papers talk largely on the  
probability of a war between England France  
and Spain. There has been various attempts  
made by way of petitions from the Spaniards to Bolivar  
to take all foreigners out of this country but  
he seems to be a different opinion, and says  
that when they come forward & pay the foreigners  
the advances they have made and take upon  
themselves paying clothing & feeding of the troops he  
will then think of it. By last accounts  
from the Sierra Cantarac, was said to be in full  
march with all his troops to attack Bolivar  
who with his troops is said to be high spirits  
he has about 8000 Peruvians & 7000 Spaniards.

La Serna to declare for the King although he  
and most of the Chiefs are constitutionalists at  
heart — Little or no business is doing here

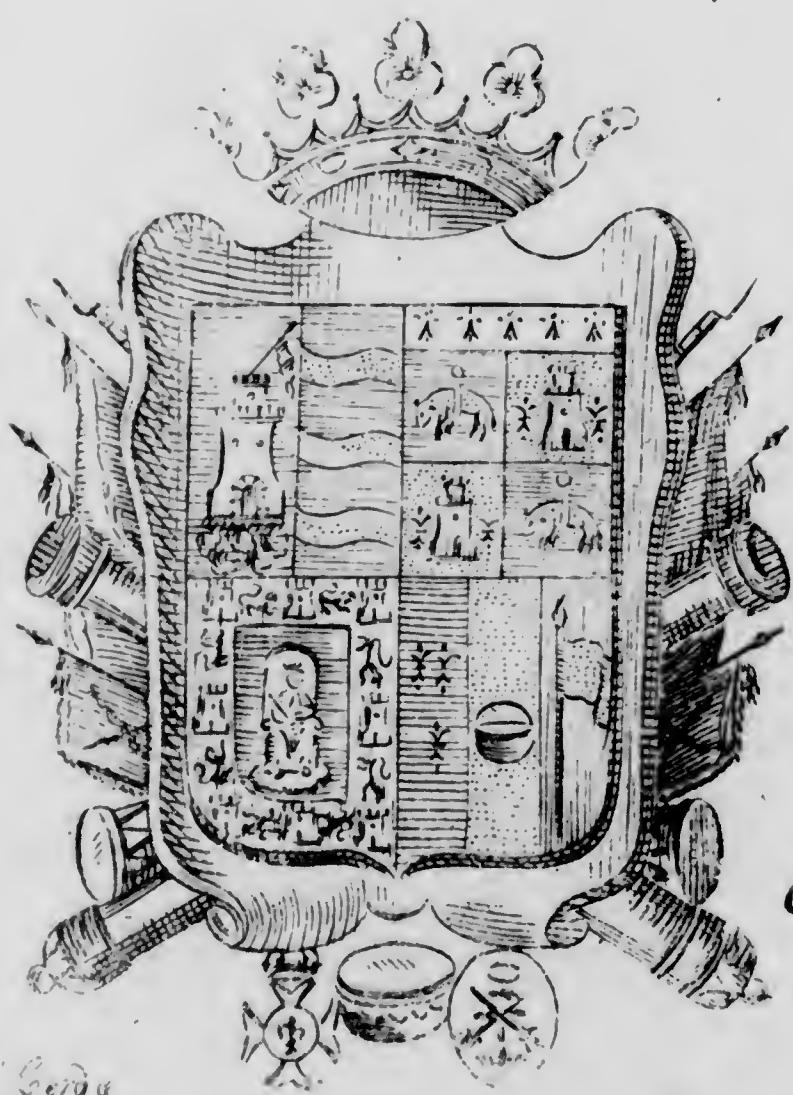

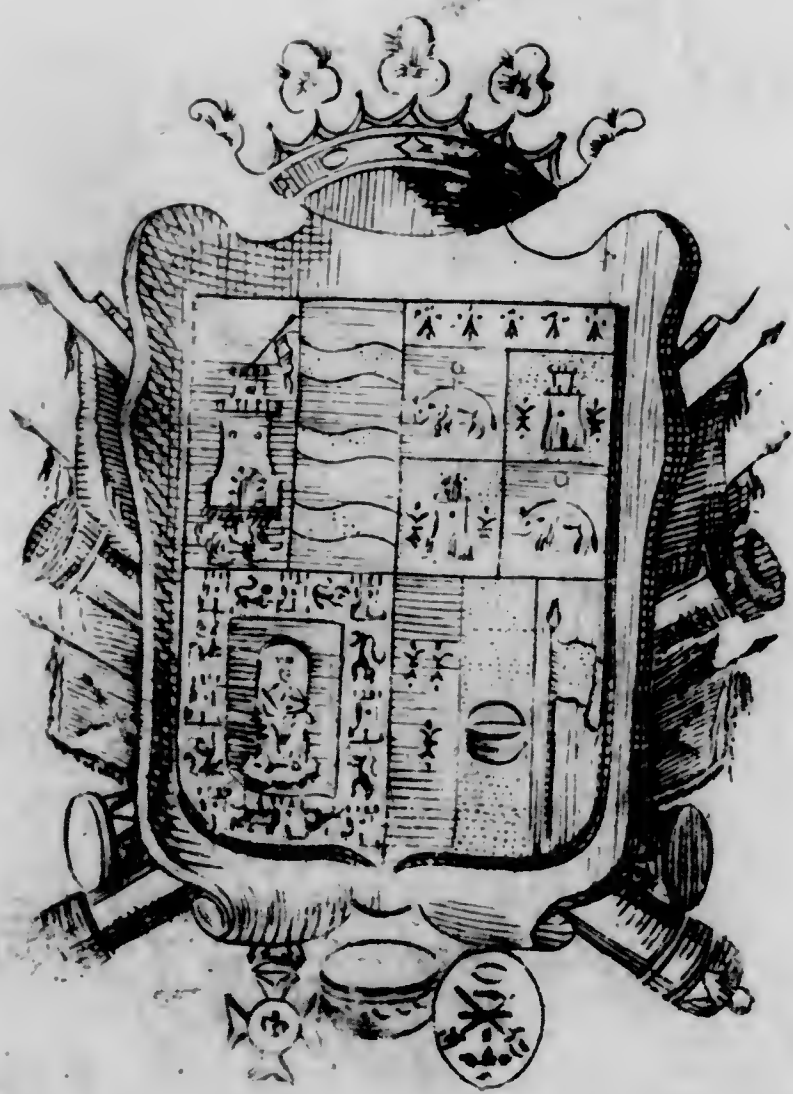



Bricheton & Co Liverpool respecting  
the California Establishment

21 May 1824

Harrison & Co advise us they would dispatch the Bahia Packet in about seven days after the date of their letter (5<sup>th</sup> March) so that she ought to be here - many enquiries are made for her the hide trade are very anxious to see what sort of article is produced from so distant a country. we shall after assorting them and giving good times for the dealers from the country to come to town sell them by public auction by which means we shall obtain the opinion of the trade respecting them - owing to some failures in the hide trade here the market is very dull and purchasers do not to be had but the novelty of California hides will draw all the country trade to see them and we expect to sell them well. But whatever price we get for them all profit will be taken off in expenses the freight will be one half the charge - If we are to make any thing out of this concern it must be conducted upon a very different plan - and the only one we can devise is that you have a depot at Callao for the productions of California and when a sufficient cargo is collected there you can find no difficulty in getting a vessel to take them to England should one from ourselves not be there at the time wanted - and let us have two or three small vessels fast sailers to collect the produce in its various forms with as much expedition as possible taking it to Callao - The Chevy Chase may be well employed in that way and we may send you out another suitable vessel which will not cost much to be employed in the same manner, but it will never answer to charter a vessel at Callao or here by the month to go cruising on the coast of California for six months



and by touching at Rio de Janeiro make a fifteen months voyage besides the great expenses incurred at Rio - we are not aware of anything which could prevent your having a store at Callao for the reception of hides - we suppose they would be allowed to be landed and restocked on a duty of 10 per cent. but if there should be difficulties which we do not know of could you not upon a proper representation to the Government have permission to do so without this can be done we never shall make much of our California Establishment - By this opportunity we send you a master Cooper who is a perfect master of his profession and of the art of curing provisions he takes with him and what is called a cutter so that that branch of the Establishment will be complete - Mr. Luy is also well acquainted with the art of salting hides - The great drawback in this part of the establishment will be ~~complete~~ materials for making casks - If wood was to be had there fit for making them it would be a profitable branch of trade even if hoops could be found there staves might be sent from this at little expense - The staves and hoops which we now send out will stand 7/6 a barrel exclusive of labour so that they will come very high we should think that the climate of California would allow the making of Turk beef if so want not this be a profitable branch it could be shipped to Lima in bulk - and we are informed it is much used north of Peru - Luy says he understands how to make it

We shall sustain very considerable loss by not having had a person to stow the cargo of the Bahia Packet who was acquainted with stowing hides - that vessel ought to have carried at least 12,000 hides - It would be worth the expense and much more for you to get from Buenos Ayres a person experienced in the art of stowing hides - we have sent you by this vessel two sets of apparatus used at Buenos Ayres for that purpose but without you get a person who has seen them applied we fear they will be of little use great care ought to be taken in drying the hides to keep them straight and when folded they should be laid in a pile one above

the other and their own weight by turning them over and over will press them quite flat - Ox and Cow hides may still be quoted at 10 pence for best quality - Horse hides to which we would turn your attention are in very large consumption and if they can be laid down in Spain at 4/4 while any quantity would be safe they are now selling at 5/ - Horse hair is a good article if long and straight - short curled hair is only worth about 2/4 pence the long 10/- we have written to Mr. Cullock & Hartnell on these subjects but you will also communicate this to them - The difficulty of communication with California is very great but we hope soon to have this in some measure remedied - the writer is going just now to attend a meeting of the South American & Mexican Association for the purpose of petitioning government to appoint regular packets between this country and ports in Mexico & Colombia which will be of the utmost service to us in correspondence

The writer has just returned from the meeting and it has been determined that a petition to the above effect be immediately sent off to Mr. Huskisson to be laid before his majesty's ministers, no plan has been pointed out to them, leaving it to themselves to fix upon that which they think best -

When writing upon the California Establishment affairs we omitted to express our surprise at a passage in one of Hartnell's letters that they could not salt hides the carriage was so heavy what they mean by this we are at a loss to know - we may be wrong but we presume the salt is made upon the seacoast - and if it is not it may at very little expense be made where there is the difficulty of drawing the cattle to a place upon the coast where they are to be slaughtered and the beef and hides to be salted? It appears to us if properly managed there can be no difficulty and you will observe that it is of the very utmost consequence for the interest of the concern that that



proportion of hides be settled as will answer to ballast the vessel for a high cargo - for independent of the loss we sustain by improper stowage, in the case of the Bahia Packet we lose 60 tons which is laid up by sand and stones for ballast -

The Bahia Packet has arrived and this day finished the discharge of her cargo and we are sorry to say it has come out in a very bad condition - the whole are more or less warmed and 80 hides were damaged the latter may sell for 3 1/2 lb the others will average about 3 lb - we never in all our experience have been more deceived by report of those hides we were led to believe that they would average 32 lbs a hide but they average no more than 24 lbs - Two thirds of the cargo will go in freight and charges so that there will be no profit and unless some other arrangement is made it never will, the charges at Rio including the time detained there £600 and we are fully of opinion that no good attended it but rather the reverse for from all the information we can get, the worm had not effected any damage when the vessel got there but by beating the hides which we understand were well lined at California and not lining them again put on board at Rio the worm took effect - This shows however that lime preserves them from the worm and deserves your most particular attention, and that also in future if well lined on both sides they may come direct to Liverpool - The ship damage was also from Rio to this port - But we are of opinion that to carry on that branch of trade to good purpose we must have a depot at Callao or near it where vessels may be taken up at an easy freight to carry the cargoes to England & let us have a few small cheap vessels employed taking the produce to that depot there to be collected & shipped for England

This day the following Address of the Archbishop, Bishops, and Clergy of the province of Canterbury, in Convocation assembled, was presented to His Majesty by his Grace the Lord Archbishop, attended by the Right Reverend the Bishops of London, Exeter, and Llandaff; Mr. Archdeacon Potts, Dr. Goodenough, the Rev. Dr. D'Oyley, and several other members, being introduced to the King by Mr. Secretary Canning, in the absence of Mr. Secretary Peel:—

“ TO THE KING'S MOST EXCELLENT MAJESTY.  
“ Most Gracious Sovereign,—We, your Majesty's dutiful subjects, the Archbishop and Bishops, and clergy of the province of Canterbury, in convocation assembled, humbly offer to your Majesty the assurances of our attachment and inviolable fidelity to your Majesty's person and Government.

“ The protection which your Majesty has at all times extended to the United Church of England and Ireland, demands our sincerest and warmest acknowledgments.

“ Grateful for the past, we humbly implore a continuance of the same protecting power; for, assuredly, Sir, there never was a period in the history of our Reformed Church that more urgently required it; whether we direct our attention to the avowed enemies of Christianity, or to those who, professing the faith of Christ, sedulously labour to disparage and degrade the Church, of which your Majesty, under God, is the head, and which, we confidently maintain, is formed upon the model of the earliest and purest ages of Christianity.

“ It is our duty, Sir, to vindicate the establishment in the spirit by which it professes to be governed, with temper, moderation, and firmness, seeking to conciliate those who may be opposed to us, not to exasperate them—to convince, not boastfully to triumph over them. But, Sir, with this understanding of our duty, we cannot dissemble to your Majesty the just apprehensions we entertain of the efforts that are now making to arrive at authority and power in the State, dangerous to the existence of the Protestant Constitution of the country, and leading directly to religious disturbance, animosity, and contention.

“ But, Sir, whatever be the danger to which the Established Church may be exposed, we have full confidence in your Majesty's protection, and in the wisdom, discretion, and firmness of your Parliament.

“ We pray God to bless and protect your Majesty.”  
To which address His Majesty was pleased to return the following most gracious answer:—

“ My Lords, and the rest of the Clergy,—I receive with great satisfaction this loyal and dutiful Address.

“ The renewed assurances of your affectionate attachment to my person and Government are most acceptable to me.

“ I rely, with the utmost confidence, upon your zealous exertions to promote true piety and virtue—to reclaim those who are in error by the force of divine truth—and to uphold and extend among my people the preference which is so justly due to the pure doctrine and service of our Established Church.

“ That Church has every claim to my constant support and protection.

“ I will watch over its interests with unwearied solicitude, and confidently trust that I shall be enabled, by the blessing of Divine Providence, to maintain it in the full possession of every legitimate privilege.”



According to your directions we left the port of Monterey on Friday morning, and stood out to sea, where we had nothing but strong gales & a heavy sea, untill Monday morning when it fell to a calmer, at about 10<sup>or</sup> past we got a light breeze & brought up in S<sup>t</sup> Francisco at 5 o'clock. The next morning I showed my papers to the Lieutenant & then proceeded to Dolores, and gave Padre Tomas an account of what goods we had on board, as yet I cannot say whether he will buy any thing or not, at 1 o'clock I started for Santa Clara and arrived there at 8 o'clock. Gentlemen,

We had the pleasure to receive your esteemed favour of 3<sup>rd</sup> April of Neptune. That vessel arrived here on the 19<sup>th</sup> ulto, having touched at Rio de Janeiro.

The cargo is now discharged and upon the whole in pretty good condition. - as follows.

of the Hides used for dunnage. 130 have gone into a thousand pieces by the Worm - of course thrown away. - With this we send you a statement of what this cargo will probably yield by which you will see the relative value of each description of Hides. - It will show you that the Wet salted Hides, at the price you have in this instance paid for them, will barely cover their cost and charges, if they will do that much. - That the Dry Hides which cost 8 reals will pay a very good profit, yet it will not be more than 4<sup>th</sup> of Hide & those at 12 reals by the same calculation only 2<sup>nd</sup> of a Hide. -

The dry salted if they cost the same as the dry will yield a larger profit of from 6<sup>th</sup> to 9<sup>th</sup> of Hide, but as you have not given in your Invoice the price which the Dry salted cost, we have it not in our power to know this. - And besides in favour of the Dry salted the Worm does not touch them, or if at all very slightly. -

We are of opinion that Hides can be Wet salted at a much lower rate than what is charged for



those now received - If they can it would be very desirable to have in every Vessel as many as will ballast her - Those in the Neptune have been very well cured and upon the whole come out in good condition, very few being damaged.

The plan of putting lime upon the dry Hides is a good one, and we have no doubt has in a great measure preserved them from Worm - You will continue this practice, and in future we do not see any necessity for the Vessel touching at Rio de Janeiro, it is only incurring expences, and from what the Captain tells us exposes them more to the destruction by the Worm than during the whole voyage.

We would advise you to pay more attention to the way the Hides are stretched - Many of this Cargo are much drawn out in width, if drawn at all it ought to be in length: but to have them properly stretched they ought not to be more than when covering the beast - The thicker the Hide is the more valuable, so that it is kept smooth. - But after all unless other arrangements be made by you in collecting the Cargoes it is a business which will yield no profit, the whole is swallowed up in freights. The Neptune from the day she sailed from Lima has just been eighteen months and one day over the voyage - Nine months of which was spent upon your Coast - Nothing can stand such mismanagement as this - You have now we understand erected Stores for the reception of produce and you are supplied with a small Vessel to collect at the different Missions; we therefore think that if due exertion is made by you you would be so prepared as to be enabled to dispatch any Vessel in two months from the time she arrives on your Coast. - In this item alone we consider there is a loss of £12,000 which by your better arrangements may be saved. - And unless this is attended to the Establishment must be given up, it occupies a large Capital with which we could do much better with here. - We have repeatedly written to Messrs

John Begg & Co and to yourselves that Hair was an article you ought to look after. Curled Hair is worth from 7<sup>s</sup> to 10<sup>s</sup> of the lb. - long straight Hair is worth 10<sup>s</sup> & 13<sup>s</sup> of the lb. - Hairs we have also pointed out to you, there is always something wanted for dunnage for which purpose they would answer well for the bottom of the Vessel - and you may we should suppose have them for next to nothing: and they are worth here just now 40<sup>s</sup> & 50<sup>s</sup> of the lb. - 123 Hairs - this is certainly worth attending to.

The Seal Skins sent pay a duty of 3/4 of Skin besides South Sea duty & other charges and the most we have offered here is 1/2 of a Skin - We shall send them to London to try what they are worth there, as this is not a market for such things.

What you call Fox Skins are called Wolf Skins here and are worth nothing.

We are happy to see by our prospects are better for this year and we hope your expectations will be fully realized.

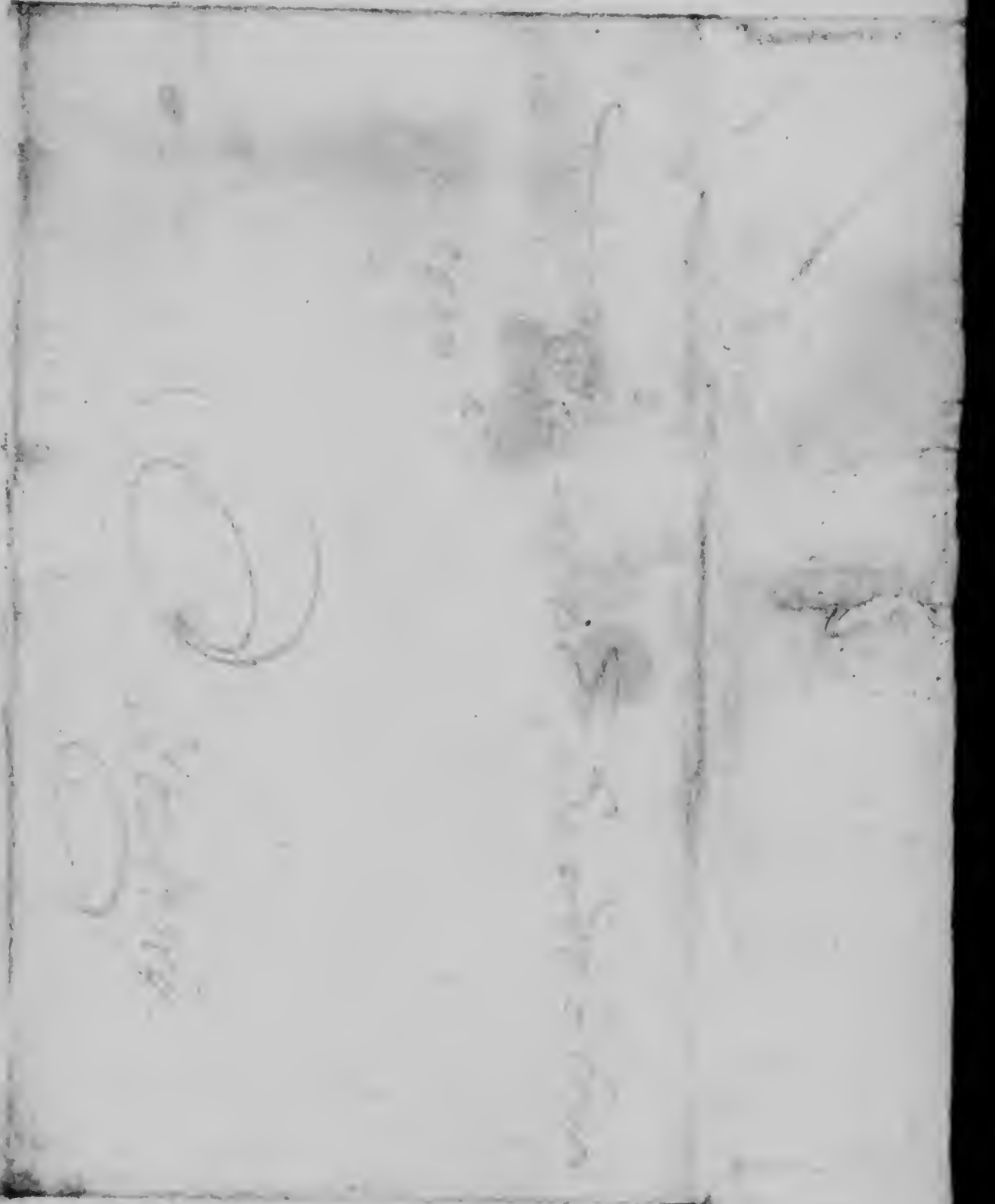

Your esteemed favor of 27<sup>th</sup> Nov<sup>r</sup> last came to hand, and note its contents - Some ere this reaches, I trust you will be in possession of most of the encargoes for the Missions; and as I am of opinion, that the greatest part of the articles are laid in very high, I hope you will make your remarks on them in your letters to Brotherton & Begg.

As I was to leave, at the time the Esther sailed for your quarter, it was not likely that you could hear from me, but before my departure I told Mr. Begg, that the only way he could check that vessel would be providing there was not hides enough to fill her up, that she should come up here with Talbot, and until the arrival of the Pizarro I knew nothing to the contrary.

I embrace this opportunity of writing to you as I have very other one that as offered but am sorry you have been so sparing on your part. The Genny Tarter arrived here on Saturday last with 3780 Hides they were all discharged yesterday in good order except about 40 which is not fit to come on Board we shall have them all on Board by the middle of next week and stowed, making altogether some 8400. we have received from this Mission 728. We now want upwards of 2000 to fill up therefore your presence on orders is very necessary either for dispatching the Genny Tarter



for more Hides or Dispatching us  
to England I sincerely hope the latter  
will be your determination. I cannot  
say who is to blame for our long detention  
on this Coast six Months but can assure  
you had I been aware of it no inducement  
should have made me under-  
take the Voyage. You are now on the  
point of getting a partner therefore perhaps  
will feel what I already do a long disappoin-  
ment of meeting my Wife and Friends  
who I believe are now very unhappy &  
not knowing where I am. Sr. Arguila  
Arguila has had some Words with Cap:  
Smith. I am sorry my Countryman  
was in the wrong you I hope will settle  
all. I have received very kindness and  
attention from him since my  
arrival indeed more so than from  
your Agent who God knows is of little

use being without Money or Marbles.

Dear Sir

Your favor of the 26<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup> I duly received, and am happy you have received your papers & when the man appeared, so soon in Monterey I think I could have eaten him alive if he was. you are well aware of my diffidence in Spanish but I think I give him as many Carajus as made him tremble in his skin.

Mr Sny arrived here on Friday last. he seems to be quite delighted with the firm and says it will answer his purpose well.

We were very much alarmed at the arrival of a Spanish Brigate who arrived in this port on the 26<sup>th</sup> ult<sup>o</sup> accompanied by a small brig. both under the American flag, after leaving Callao, there was a proposal made of taking some or other of the ports in California but on acct of the Captains refusing to pay the money of course mutiny arose, they all joined and put the captain and officers on shore upon the Island of Marianas. appointed another captain and sailed for Monterey, where they have all sworn to the Independence



and hated the Mexico flag. they are to be despatched to Acapulco in a few days to receive further orders (the captain who now takes command has been in Monterey before in the mercantile line, and was formerly acquainted with Dr Luis & Dr Mariano, and a great friend to Amestie -

I am extremely sorry I am under the disagreeable necessity of stating the conduct of Allan, since you left Monterey about two weeks ago finding him always absent from the house and paying attention to nothing I called him aside in a friendly manner and pointed out the necessity of his attention, that I thought his conduct far different from what it was in Mr St's presence. he gave me little or no reply but told me he should go better for some time to come. finding him inclining to get worse every day I was obliged to tell him my mind freely (but thank God I kept my passion gauged for once) he immediately demanded his wages and said his intention was to leave the house and likewise mentioned he was going to get married when he would have a house of his own. On Sunday night when waiting at the table (after being absent as usual all the afternoon) Mr Levy observed a sword hanging by his side. when he immediately told me. I asked Allan the reason he had

it. he said it was to defend his person and would not quit it he showed until I threatened to go for a party of soldiers and put him in irons, and likewise insisted he should tell me who he was afraid of and I would give him every protection and satisfaction. he at last said the butcher was drunk and he thought he intended to shoot him. the butcher was immediately sent for, who declared he had no such intentions nor knew nothing of the matter. what quarrel has been betwixt them I know not, except it be jealousy as the butcher has been abusing some of his relations. For my part I certainly am at a loss what method to take. if the house were my own I could soon settle the matter. But I am determined (and have told him so) if he ever appears in such like breach of manners again. I will immediately put him in irons until you return and stand all law or reproof for it. his only excuse is that he was drunk, which I am certain (his being so for three nights running) but no such excuses will account for my life or the life of others. We are doing pretty well as to the inside of the house, and you may depend upon it being ready for the reception of our long looked for and welcome mistress. But I can say but little as to our progress with the new building it looks rather gloomy, wishing now many happy days together and safe to your own fire side. I am your obedt

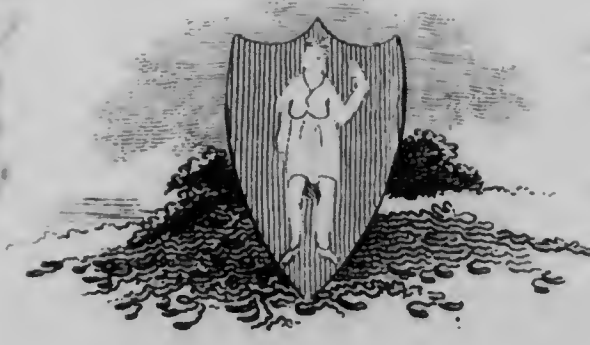

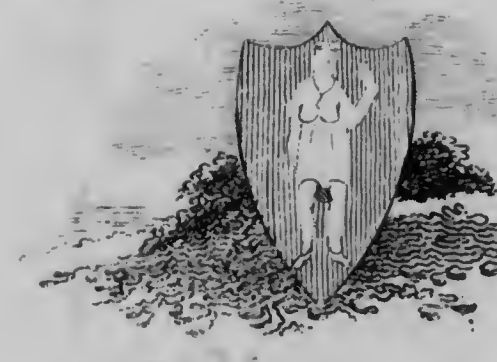

I believe Mr. Catt goes by this conveyance & would whether she does or not, that I omitted to mention for Pizarro that the House advanced her seven hundred Dollars, when she thought of going in the Spanish vessel, I know she has acquainted her husband of having received that amount, therefore I trust you will have no difficulty in recovering the same; with my best respects to all my friends in that quarter I remain yours most truly

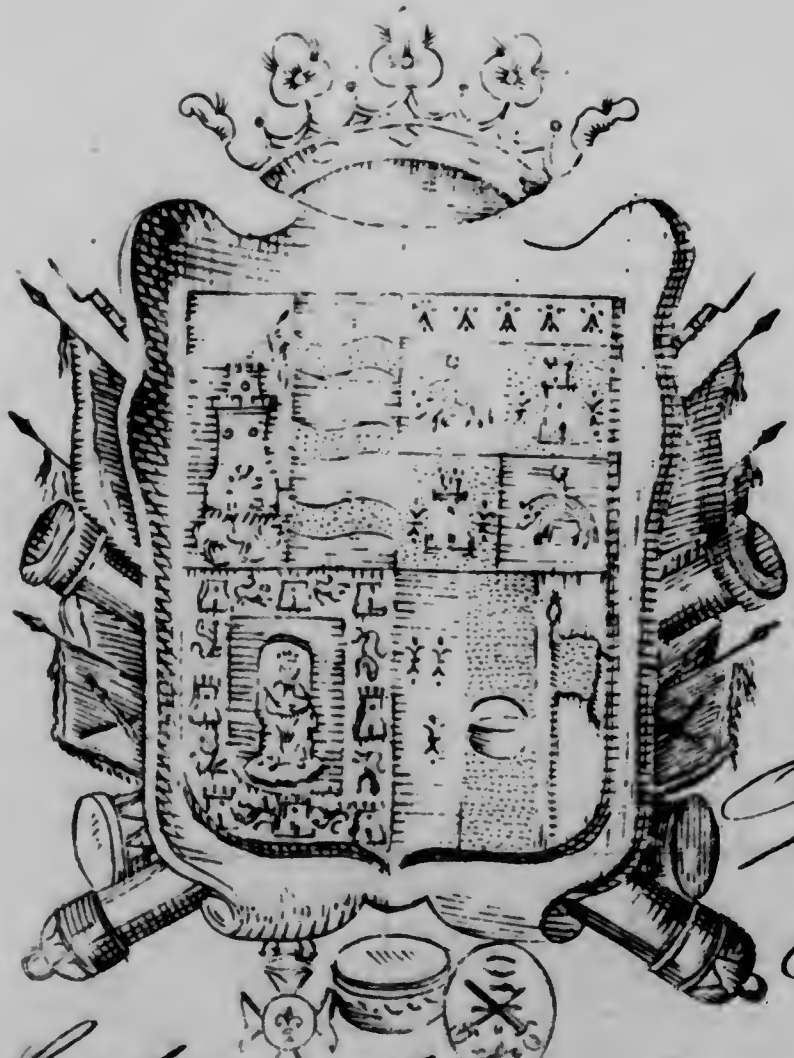

We are sorry you should still have  
to complain of vessels being sent you with-  
out your having cargo ready for them -  
but the funds in your hands are so con-  
siderable and your shipments so com-  
paratively small that your Mr Maculloch  
agrees with us that you should have  
had always ready for the either on  
his arrival and as we got to him at a  
low rate of freight we considered it well  
to send him down when we did - In



future we shall be guided by your orders  
in the vessels we send from this. We  
are a good deal surprised that you say  
nothing of the Hides you must have in  
store of this year. The season we are  
informed was favorable and the quan-  
tity you would be able to collect would  
be considerable. We hope that next  
year your shipments will not be less than  
30,000 unless having no vessels waiting for  
Cargoes you relax in your exertions. You  
will be pleased to hear in Mexico that  
in 18 years your remissions of Hides have  
been under 40,000.

The John Bull put into Rio 24  
May when she was loading her cargo  
in rather bad conditions. We have  
no exact information as at the date  
of Wm Harrison & Co. letter she had

not opened her Hatches. By an American  
whaler left there just 4 June she was  
seen there and we hear that the Hides  
were very much damaged. The detention

You say you have taken a farm

I have now the pleasure of acknowledging your sundry favours of furs & fizarro and beg to remark on their contents. In reference to Mr Begg's opinion on the Salt beef, I have satisfied him, and am perfectly convinced myself, that I shall have no difficulty in disposing of 1000 Barrels yearly. The Tallow of fizarro, as you will see by the enclosed note, has sold well, and I flatter myself with the hope of henceforth having a steady demand for this article on account of the working of the Mines being in action; should I not always find a wholesale merchant, it is my intention to retail that, as well as any thing else you may send; having every convenience, from an extensive new Store which I have just finished and got into play. For your government in the making of Soap I herewith send you a pattern of the size of each piece and color, suitable for this market, which if you can equal, have no doubt but it will sell to advantage; Bundles if a good white and well packed would do better.

From the reasonable terms on which the vessel I now write by is chartered, I believe you will agree with me, in thinking, that it is a preferable plan to purchasing one for ourselves. Mr Begg wanted to sell me the furs, but we could not come to terms and for our mutual interest and better arrangement of the Californian trade, I expressed to him my resolution of always chartering vessels to suit your convenience in point of time, wherever they could be had on the most reasonable terms, if answerable for our purpose, but should any of his be in port, a preference would be given at the same rate as others.

Mr Begg is far from being reconciled to the taking of this new Farm, the Capital requisite for stocking it seems to frighten him, and all I can say in favor, is of no avail it will be necessary for conviction, that you write him giving the particulars of what you anticipate as its result.

The Tallow from some of the Missions



has been sent in a shameful state which you will please to advise them of, and in future should like you to put some kind of mark upon the produce of every different mission, in order that we may be able to know from whom such has been received

Our Soked Beef has turned out so bad that no sale of it can be made and although we have been at the expense of landing, shall be under the necessity of throwing it into the sea

Now that our establishment begins to assume a favorable appearance, you may lay your account with soon finding opposition as there are always plenty ready to speculate where they see a probability of profitable returns, and as I have always advised, bury up every Skin of Tallow and hide you can lay your hands on, so that should any attempt it, they may find a clear coat and being once disappointed they will not be likely to repeat the same - we will require to keep all our Irons in the fire for some time yet to bring matters to the right side, but from your exertions I expect soon to find it otherwise - meantime, believe me





than I wished.

There is no news in India except the



Sir.

We have to acquaint you with the arrival of the Brig Esther, Capt Davis on the 10<sup>th</sup> ult. and at his request we have taken charge of the vessel & cargo - according to the instructions Capt D had rec<sup>d</sup> from your house at San Diego it was not his intention to have touched at any Port in Brazil till his arrival off the Abrothos when he encountered very heavy weather and the vessel sprung some of her Stanchions and Covering boards which caused a leak and in consequence he put in here to repair. The worm had also increased rapidly and after holding a survey we deemed it necessary to have the cargo discharged & cleared which is now accomplished and we hope to send her to sea tomorrow - from the incredible number of worms we were fearful much mischief would have been done to the cargo, but we are happy to say with the exception of 900 damaged by salt water they have turned out very well we think the Lime sprinkled amongst them has been of service and we have adopted this plan in the restowing. Kindly advise of the damaged Hides we were under the necessity of throwing into the sea & the remainder were sold by Auction at 80<sup>ths</sup> of the Certification & we will forward in Orig. duplicate to Messrs J & Brother & Co who have been regularly advised with our proceedings since the arrival of the Esther - Not having got in all the accounts we cannot state the amount of the Expenses but we think they will not exceed £350. - including 3 @ 400\$ paid Capt Davis. The Transit Duty, Consularage & have of course been avoided and getting a Lay vessel to receive the cargo



and render every assistance at the low rate of  
£5 per day, many heavy expenses & detentions  
have been avoided. The Prince of Wales  
left from Guayaquil had also put in  
here lately and had been here down  
her detention was two months and the expenses  
incurred very heavy

Our last was dated 21<sup>st</sup> Inst by this conveyance  
the detention of the Packet affords us another opportunity  
of addressing you, to communicate the distressing loss of  
the Brig *Bitter* at *Dungarvin Bay* on the Coast of *Wales*  
ford on the evening of the 20<sup>th</sup> Inst, at 11 o'clock on Monday  
morning (the 19<sup>th</sup>) a tremendous sea struck the Brig, which  
carried away the larboard bulwork, - and swept the decks,  
carrying overboard poor Capt. *Davies* and three of his  
crew - on Tuesday night the Brig got into *Dungarvin*  
*Bay*, and was boarded from a boats crew from the shore  
but before they could render any assistance - the Brig struck  
the second stroke carried away her rudder and long  
before now she must be in pieces, *Lloyds Agent* has  
written to us that he had saved 2000 Hides & expected to  
have about 500 more, but they were in a very wet state  
and will fetch little or nothing - the discharge could  
only be effected at low water - You have been al-  
ready informed that we effected Insurance on her cargo  
as Interest may appear to the extent of 18000 hides  
valued at 18 $\frac{1}{2}$  each & Tallow at 40 $\frac{1}{2}$  flors and we have by  
two nights post written to our broker in London, to give  
notice of abandonment to the Underwriters but we think it  
doubtful whether they will accept of it - *Messrs*

to mention that we have not received a single line from  
McCutlock Hartwell & Co nor have we received our letters  
from Harrison & Co at Pernambuco and consequently have  
neither neither Invoice nor Bill of Lading to prove our  
loss - The correspondence for ourselves must have first  
been put under poor Davis charge & no doubt will be  
found in his Desk or Trunk - we have written to  
Glasgow Agents & the Mate to open them and make a search  
for our letters
