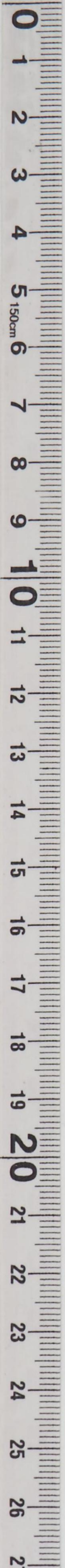

Tokyo, October 19, 1950.

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, refers to the Chinese Mission's memorandum on the subject "Offer and Shipment of Relief Goods from the Chinese Government to the Republic of Korea" dated 10 October 1950 and wishes to state it has been informed that the movement of the three vessels mentioned in the subject memorandum from Keelung, Formosa, to Pusan, Korea, via Sasebo, Japan, has been authorized by the Commander of Naval Forces for the Far East. As discharge of these ships at Inchon, as suggested by the Government of the Republic of Korea, has proved impractical due to the present congestion of shipping at that port, arrangements have been made to effect the unloading of all three vessels at Pusan. The SS Hai Huang is now in Pusan and the SS Chih Hsin at Sasebo is enroute to the same destination.

M/R: The procedures followed by Chinese Govt in this case are not in accordance with standing regulations, but in view of the need for supplies of this nature in Korea G-4 has made an exception.

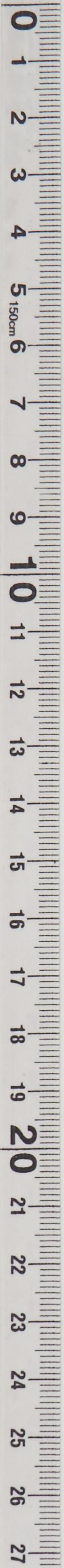

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Chinese Mission in Japan and has the honor to refer to the latter's note no. 740/YWS dated June 17, 1950, regarding the applicability of convertible account procedures with respect to the Mission and its members.

As the Mission mentioned in its note under reference, personnel of accredited diplomatic missions in Japan are considered by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers as occupation personnel and are entitled to the privileges extended by the Supreme Commander to other occupation personnel in Japan. The Mission is informed, however, that the use of military payment certificates in occupied areas is restricted by regulations of the United States Department of Army to United States military personnel and others designated by the Commander-in-Chief, Far East Command. This authorization has been extended to the Chief of the Mission as a courtesy in recognition of his official duties and representational obligations which often require the use of facilities of United States military installations.

The United States personnel authorized the use of military payment certificates are permitted to maintain accounts with military facility departments of American banks in Japan from which military payment certificates may be withdrawn. These accounts, for the purpose of convenience, are represented in dollar balances; however, no United States currency is permitted to be withdrawn for use in Japan.

For the convenience of Mission personnel requiring the use of convertible accounts, these accounts may be established with dollar credits upon application to foreign exchange banks in Japan. It may be noted, however, that there is no SCAP regulation which requires Mission personnel or others to maintain such accounts.

The Mission is further informed that it may maintain a dollar account with the military facility department of an American bank in Japan for official purposes, including the purchase of a limited amount of military payment certificates for use by Mission personnel in accordance with current regulations. The use of these certificates would be authorized only in United States military installations and would not be acceptable by foreign or Japanese banks for deposit by individual members.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

SUBJECT: Request for Monthly Withdrawal of MPC

1. By C/N 1 DS forwarded to G-4 on 3 August 1950, memorandum from the Chinese Mission, addressed to the DS advising that "Ordinary consumption in PX and children's school fees for the members of the Mission, an amount of US \$4,000 in MPC per month is required; and as to meet current necessary expenses of the Mission, US \$1,000 MPC is needed. Kindly direct the National City Bank of New York that a total amount of US \$5,000 MPC per month be disbursed from the account "Chinese Mission in Japan a/c #4."

2. Since C/N 1 was written DS (Mr. Lee) advised G-4 (Lt Col Davis) that the subject Chinese Mission memorandum was in error since the Chinese Mission was already authorized to withdraw \$12,000 MPC monthly. The present request had not been coordinated within the Chinese Mission and it was their desire to withdraw the request since the authorized \$12,000 withdrawal was sufficient.

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Chinese Mission in Japan and has the honor to refer to the latter's note no. 2294/CA (50) dated June 22, 1950, concerning the confiscation by order of a Military Commission of the ss. Hai Lieh, and to previous correspondence on the subject.

As the Mission is no doubt aware, the communications in the premises addressed to this Headquarters on June 15, 1950, by Mr. Thomas Aitken, attorney for the China Merchants Steam Navigation Company, Limited, which were mentioned in the Mission's note under reference, have been answered by this Headquarters.

For the Mission's information, it may be stated that the views expressed in the Mission's note with respect to the immunities accorded government-owned vessels where such vessels are engaged in proprietary functions are not considered in accord with the modern precepts of the international law on this subject. Nothing has been found in the cases cited in the Mission's note under reference to support an argument to the contrary.

The jurisdiction of a military commission to confiscate a vessel used to smuggle contraband is supported by law. Reference to General Orders no. 3, General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, dated February 1, 1950, is applicable to civil matters, and not to cases of a criminal nature.

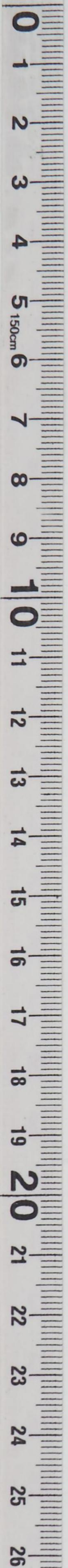
Finally, the provisions of paragraph 54, SCAP Circular 8, 1949, which require that government property will be returned to the government concerned, apply to cases where such property has been lost, stolen, or misplaced, and not to cases where the property has been confiscated.

Under the circumstances General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, does not consider that the grounds offered constitute a basis for any reversal of the approved action of the reviewing authority in this case.

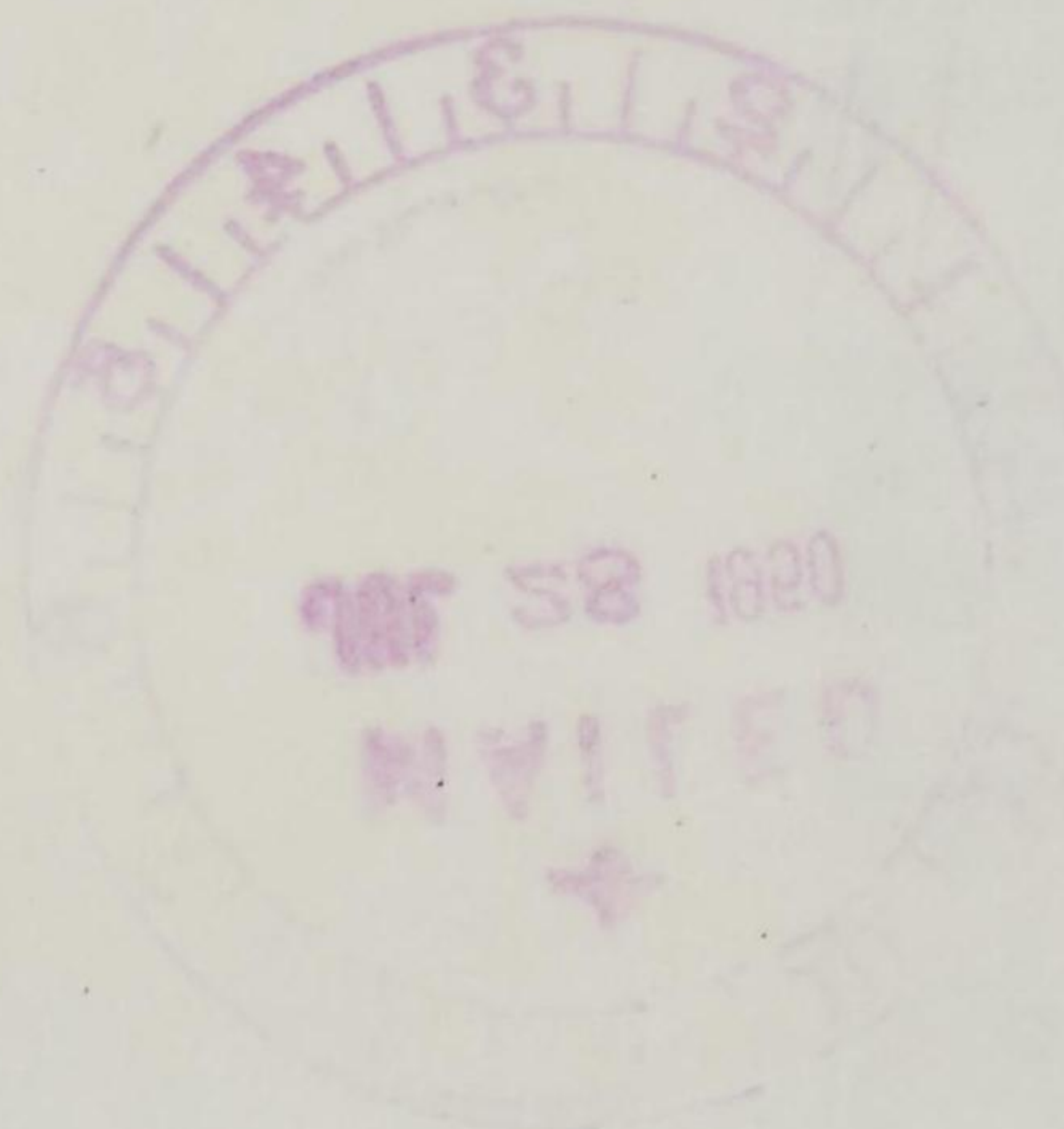

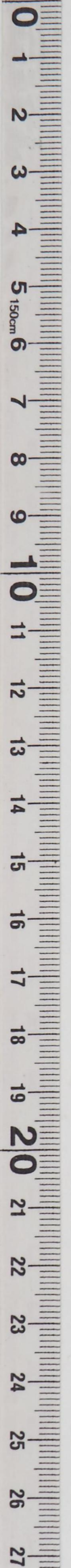

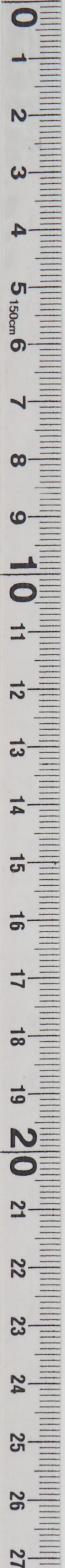

Tokyo, July 24, 1950

Reference is made to the Chinese Mission's memorandum 776/YWS dated July 13, 1950, regarding direct arrangements between the Mission and Standard-Vacuum Oil Company for the purchase of petroleum products.

The Mission is informed that petroleum products which have been entered into and subsequently withdrawn from Japanese domestic stocks are required to be purchased in yen currency, including taxes which may be redeemable later. It may be noted, however, that this requirement is not applicable to the importation of petroleum products for the Mission's use through private arrangements with a foreign supplier.

The Mission's attention is invited to the provisions of this Headquarters' Circular No. 3 dated February 3, 1950, regarding procedures for the importation into Japan of Mission property exempt of Japanese import duty.

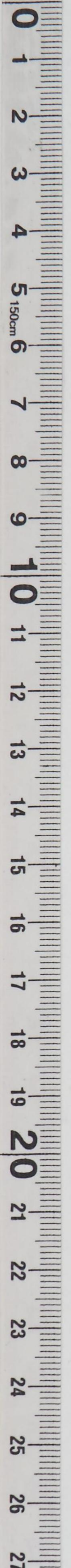

Reference is made to the Chinese Mission's memorandum 716/YMS dated July 13, 1950, regarding direct arrangements between the Mission and Standard-Vacuum Oil Company for the purchase of petroleum products.

The Mission is informed that petroleum products which have been entered into and subsequently withdrawn from Japanese domestic stocks are required to be purchased in yen currency, including taxes which may be refundable later. 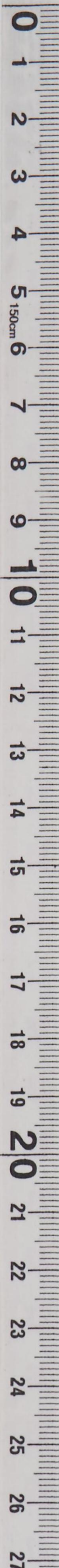

1. For additional background see G-4 Journal No. 7065.
2. Basic is ltr from Chinese Mission in Japan to DS objecting to SCAP requirement that its members convert their dollar accounts to convertible yen accounts. By C/N 1, DS to G-4, COM and ESS (in turn) same subject, 22 June 50, forwards the Chinese Mission's ltr and requests information on which to base their reply. By C/N 2, G-4 to ESS, same subject, 23 June 50, requests comments. C/N 3, ESS to G-4, same subject, 16 Jul 50, suggests reply. It is believed COM should have an opportunity to comment on this case, as desired by DS in C/N 1, and since there were similar objections from other foreign missions in Japan it is believed that G-4 and DS should have the benefit of the opinion of the COM. G-4 recommended action is to forward subject correspondence to COM by C/N 4.

The following information was received by the Chinese Mission in Japan from Ministry of National Defense G-2, Taipei, Taiwan; evaluation C-6.

1. An unconfirmed report indicates that the Chinese Communists are now in the process of training approximately 100,000 parachute personnel in Manchuria. Upon completion of training, these paratroops will be organized into six airborne divisions. About 5,000 radar technicians will also be trained in Manchuria. The USSR will provide the necessary equipment and advisers for this training.

G-2 Comment: Previous reports have indicated Chinese Communist paratroops training in Harbin and Chiamussu, Manchuria. Strength estimates have ranged from one battalion to two regiments.

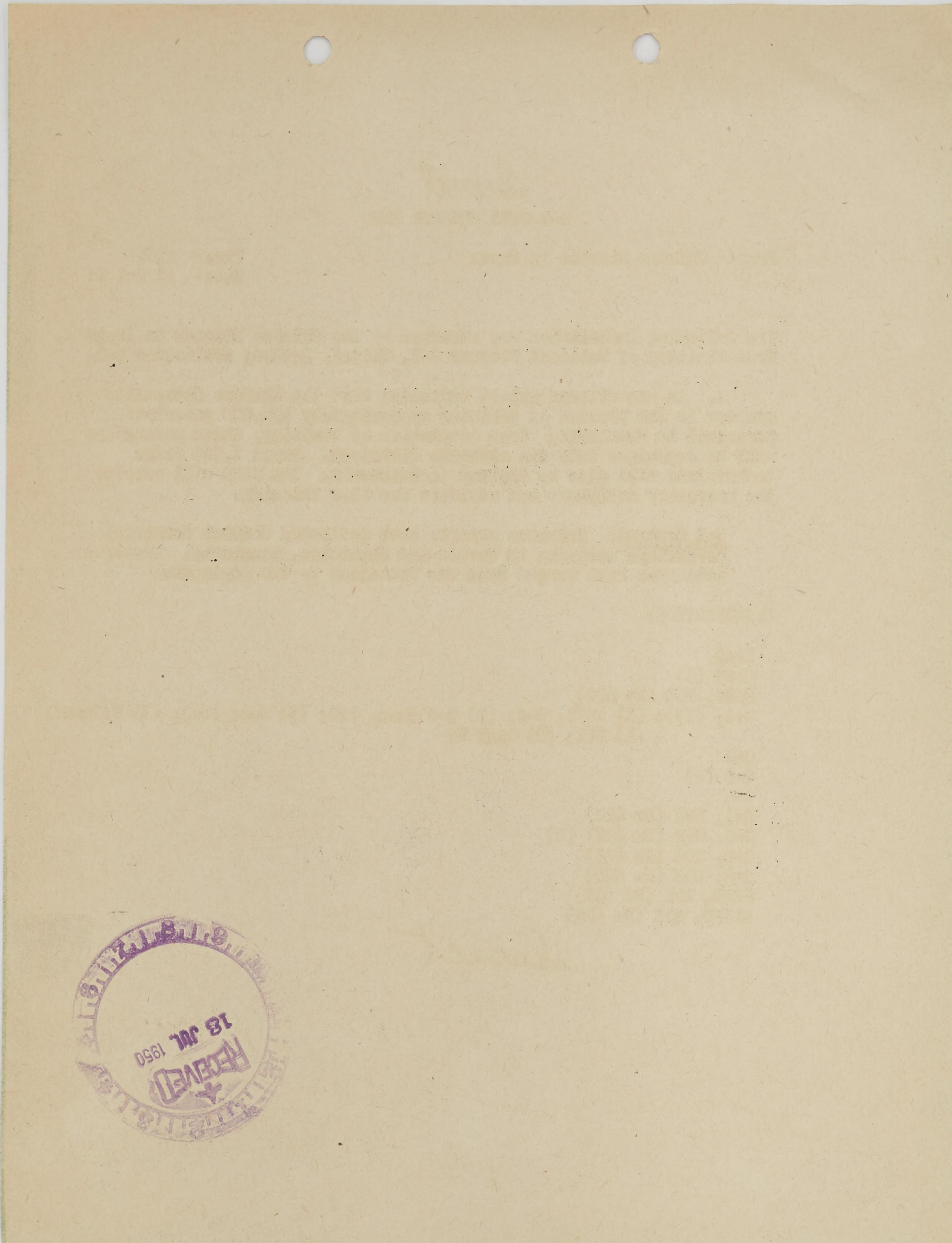
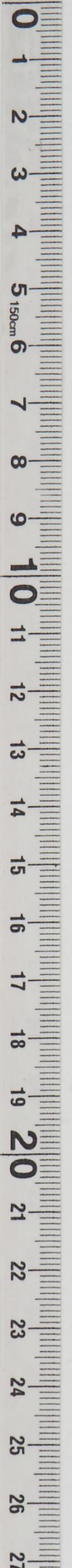

"A survey has been initiated by the military authorities to determine the availability of the subject items in the Far East Command. Upon completion of the survey you will be informed of the results and appropriate arrangements will be made to transfer to your Government such items as may be available and which you may desire."

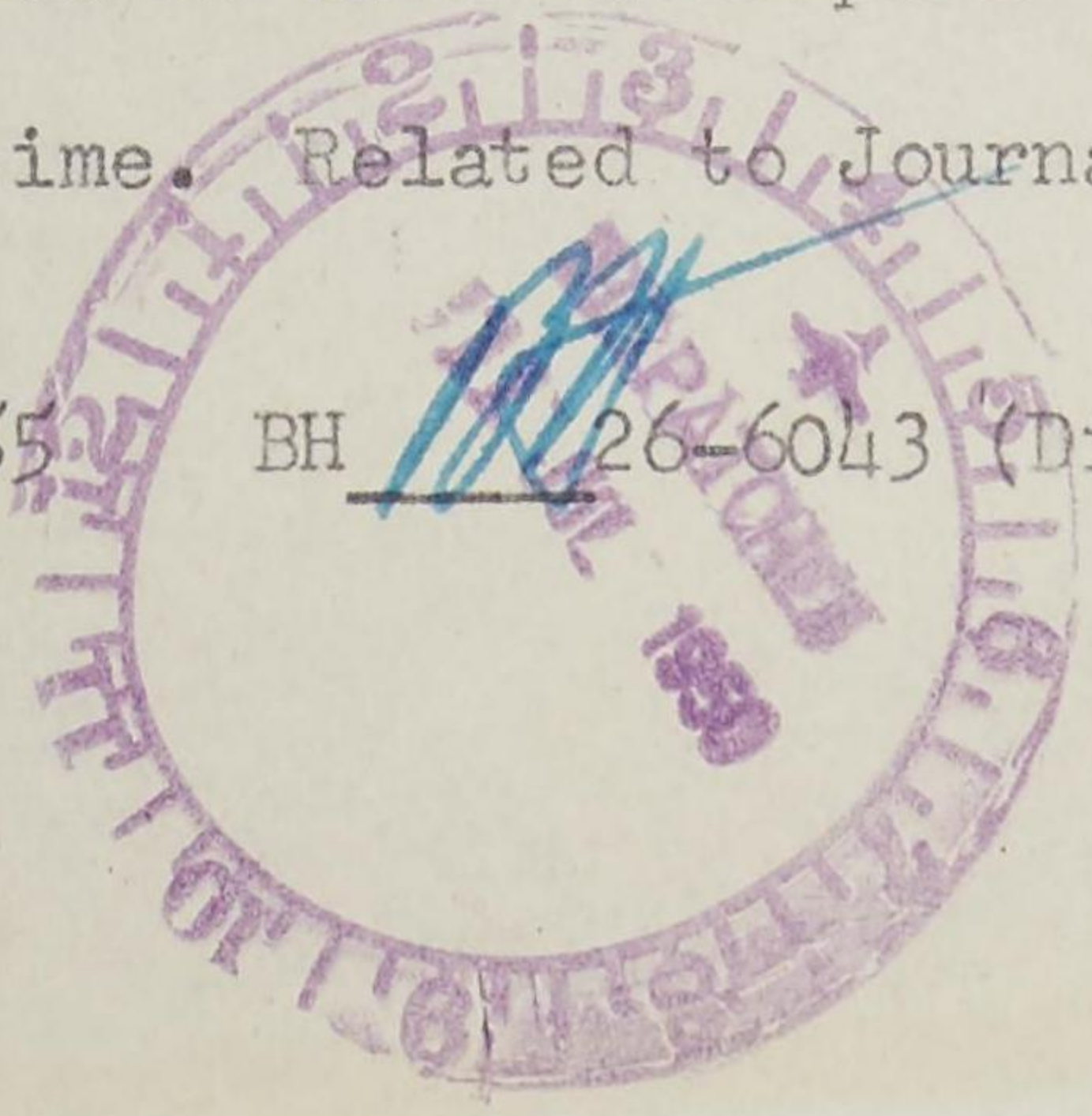

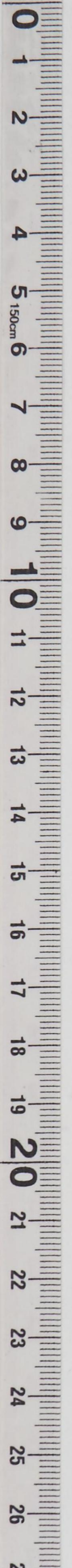

- 1. By ltr dtd 27 Jun 50 and addressed to AC/S, G-4, the Chief of Chinese Mission in Japan inquired re availability of parts and accessories for light tanks and motor carriages plus M8 armored cars and M3A1 scout cars.
- 2. Col Li of Chinese Mission subsequently called on G-4 Sup (Lt Col Akin) as a quick follow-up on the ltr. He was advised that the proper procedure was to make known their needs thru diplomatic channels. This was apparently done, as DA msg WCL 31634, 8 Jul 50 refers to Col Li and requests that CINCFE inform DA re availabilities. Msg states funds are available for transfer to China.
- 3. Instant C/N fwds ltr from Chinese Mission to DS for reply thru diplomatic channels, fwds copy of DA msg WCL 31634 for info and provides DS with basic para to be used in making reply.
- 4. No further G-4 action required at this time. Related to Journal Action 7886. Action closed on G-4 Journal 7319.

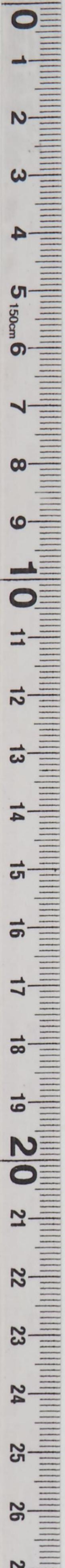

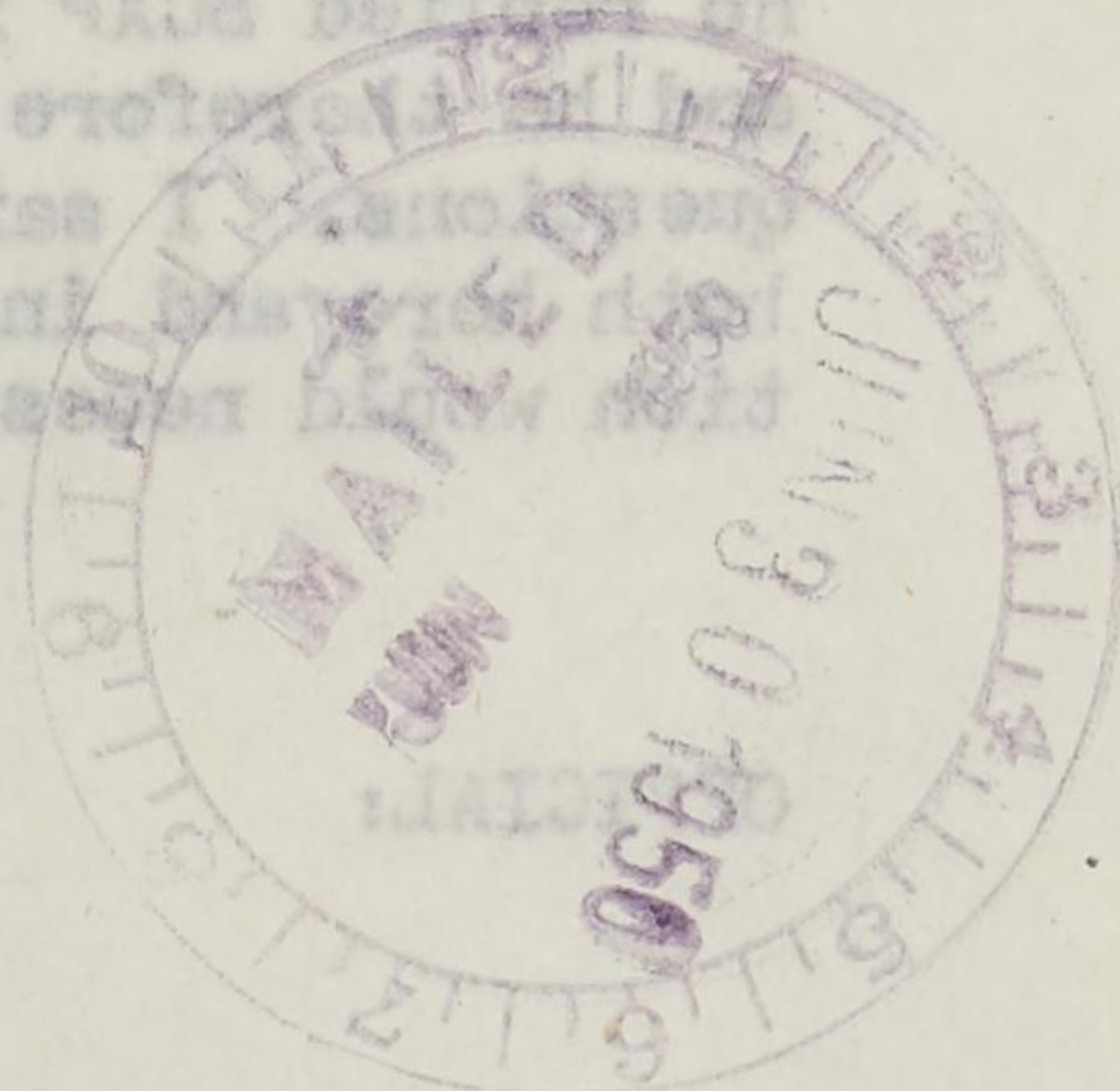
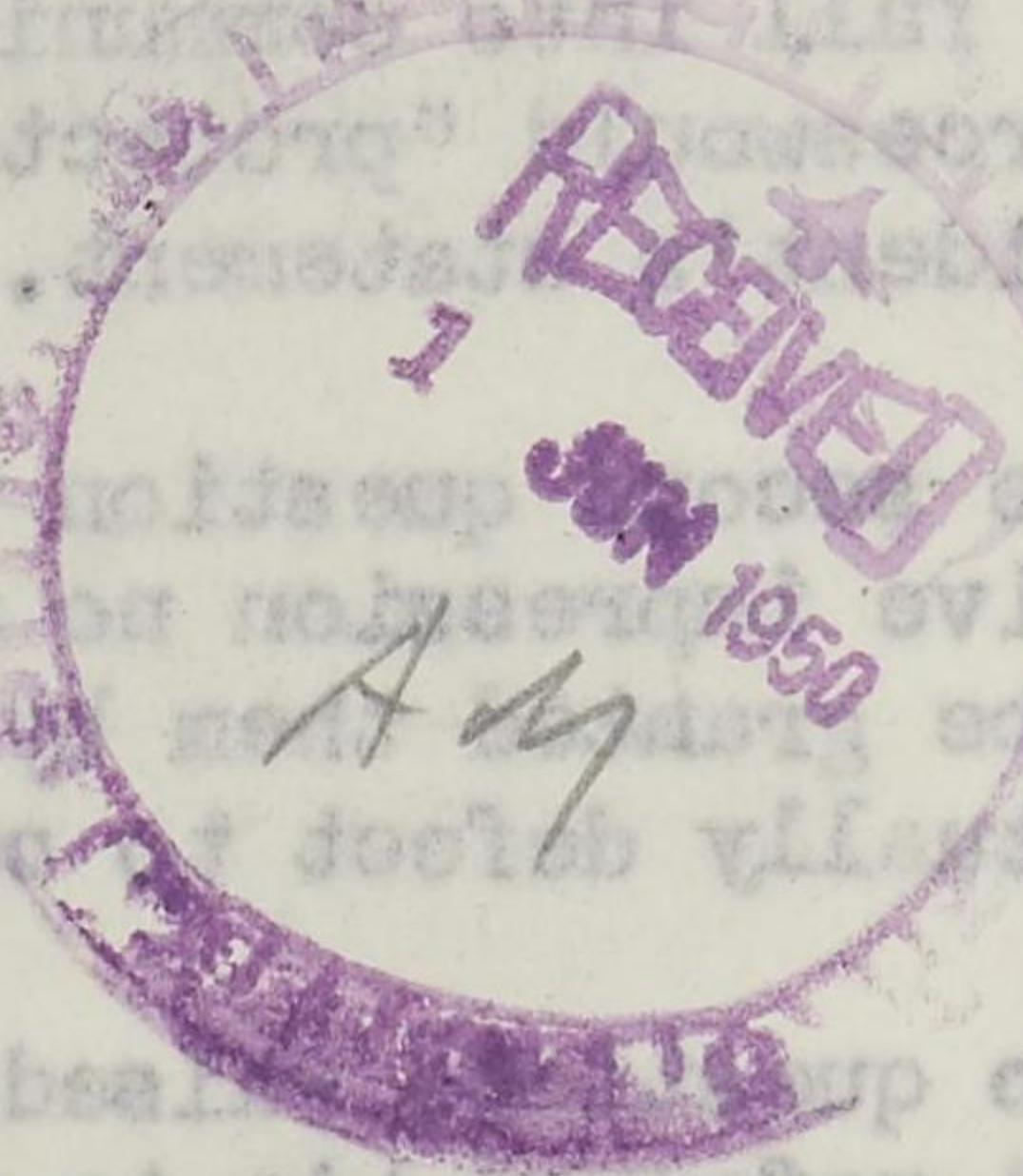

SUBJECT: Conversation with Lieutenant General HO Shai-lai,
Chief of the Chinese Mission in Japan.

PARTICIPANTS: Lieutenant General HO Shai-lai
Chief of Chinese Mission in Japan

Mr. William J. Sebald

General HO called for the purpose of ascertaining whether it would be possible for me to clarify certain questions arising out of President TRUMAN's recent proclamation. The questions which he posed are the following:

1. In case of attack, or Chinese communist concentration for attack, against the Chinmen Islands, Mochu Islands, Taichen Islands, and the islands in the vicinity of Hong Kong, what would be the attitude of the United States Naval forces in view of the fact that these islands are west of Formosa Strait?

2. Would it be possible to obtain some clarification regarding the attitude which the Nationalist Government should take regarding its guerrilla forces on the mainland?

Regarding the first question, General Ho said that the various islands are garrisoned by some 100,000 Chinese troops and that unless the Nationalist Government is in a position to assist them with naval and air forces in case of attack, the islands would fall into communist hands. He wondered, also, whether United States Naval forces would "protect" these islands in case of attack, basing their authority upon the President's recent statement.

With regard to the second question, General Ho said that if the guerrilla forces on the mainland receive the impression that no further assistance and support will be granted to them by the Nationalist Government, it should be obvious that they will lose hope and eventually defect to the communist forces.

In response to General Ho's questions, I said that these were matters which would, of necessity, have to be clarified in Washington and that for the moment I could only refer him to President Truman's statement. General Ho rejoined by saying that SCAP is in fact implementing the President's announcement and that he therefore was of the opinion that SCAP would be in a position to clarify the questions raised. I said that thought would, of course, be given to these matters both here and in Washington but that the final decision and clarification would necessarily be made by higher authority.

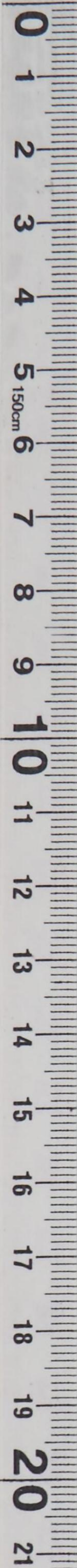

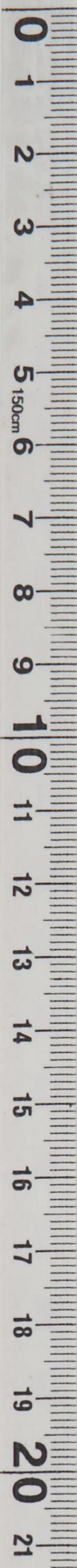

The Diplomatic Section of General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, presents its compliments to the Chinese Mission in Japan and has the honor to refer to the latter's memorandum no. 1089/CA dated March 30, 1950, and to previous correspondence concerning disposition of the ss. Hai Lieh.

The sentence of the United States Eighth Army Military Commission which ordered the confiscation of the ss. Hai Lieh for its participation in criminal activities has been approved and ordered duly executed by the Commanding General, Eighth Army, the reviewing authority, who has ruled that disposition of the said vessel shall be made as directed by the Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers. This action is in accordance with legally established procedures and finalizes the formal proceedings of the Military Commission.

For the Mission's information, General Headquarters is prepared to dispose of the vessel by sale to the highest bidder, subject to any outstanding legitimate claims against or interests in the vessel, with reservation as to price and purchaser.

General Headquarters, Supreme Commander for the Allied Powers, does not share the views of the Chinese Mission with respect to the immunities accorded to government-owned vessels where such vessels are engaged in proprietary functions of a mercantile nature, since such views are not in accord with the modern precepts of the international law on the subject.

Subject: Request for Authorization to Purchase Medical Supplies by
Chinese Mission

1. Memo fr Chinese Mission requested authority to purchase drugs for their dispensary, (Streptomycin, Benadryl, Santonin, Sulfadizine) with reimbursement to be made in U.S. dollars at time and place directed by GHQ.

2. SCAP memo, AG 400(10 Jan 48)GD, subject: Reimbursement of Supplies and Services from U.S. Military Sources, 10 Jan 48, refers to reimbursement by foreign missions to U.S. only for emergency supplies or services. FEC Cir 16, 26 Feb 49, par 6, authorizes medical service to personnel of such missions on a pay-patient status. This circular further modified by interpretation in ltr GHQ, FEC, AG 701(3 Nov 49)MD-PO, subject: Medical Attention for Non-Occupation Personnel, 3 Nov 49, which states that such service rendered must be: of emergency nature; mandatory in opinion of physician; accompanied by certificate from physician or hospital that required equipment, supplies or skill is not available at recommended indigenous facilities. Ltr SCAP, AG 701(15 Apr 47)PH, subject: Medical Service for Personnel and Dependents of Chinese Mission, 15 Apr 47, disapproves request for mission to establish own dispensary and to appropriate certain bed space in local Japanese hospitals and further states that U.S. Army medical facilities will be furnished such personnel when required.

3. Medical Section (Lt. Col. Partin, Maj Irving) states that previous purchases by this mission from 385th dispensary had been made on 11 July 49, 20 Sept 49 and 23 Feb 49. Authority for such issues cited as par 5, SR 730-5-10, 20 Apr 49, and radio ZX-49533, 18 May 48 and ZX 12804, 8 June 49. SR prescribes method to be used for logistic support furnished by Army to non-Army agencies and non-military activities in overseas commands. Par 5 states that in occupied areas only DA recognizes added responsibility for furnishing logistic support and services to other than U.S. Government agencies who are directly assisting overseas commander in accomplishment of occupation mission. However, supplies and services will be furnished on a reimbursable basis and only when they are assential for minimum day-to-day operating or maintenance needs, and cannot be obtained locally or imported from other sources in sufficient time to meet immediate requirements; and, further, only those supplies and services will be rendered which in the opinion of overseas commander are urgently required, and may be furnished without detriment to troops of command during the time required for replacement. Radios prescribe theater price policy for supplies sold to other than U.S. Army Agencies.

4. No authority nor record of previous similar ^{activities} can be found for such authorization. SR and radios not termed applicable.

5. CN to DS requests they inform Chinese mission of approval of this request to avoid undue hardship, but that future requests will not be favorably considered. Amounts requested are not excessive and are available at dispensary, but Med Sect states that items are also readily procurable from indigenous or other commercial sources.

6. Coordination: G-4 Supply (Col McLemore); Med Sect (Maj Irving).

7. Approval follows previous actions. Disapproval of future requests within policy.

FEAF states that USAF Regulation 55-20, subject: Use of USAF Bases Overseas by Civil Aircraft, 7 Jan 49, authorizes the provision of mechanical services to civil aircraft only in the event of an emergency. The term "civil aircraft" is interpreted to mean "any aircraft other than USAF." The Deputy for Materiel, FEAF, stated that the inspection of the CAF, C-54 would necessitate the pulling of a USAF C-54 from the maintenance and overhaul line at FEAMCOM. FEAF C-54's which have returned from the Berlin airlift are now being processed, and FEAF maintenance facilities are saturated.

3. The Foreign Liaison Section, this headquarters, requested information of the Chinese Mission as to the work to be performed by these laborers and was advised that they were required for handling of coal, porter service and miscellaneous labor duties around the mission.

MEMORANDUM FOR RECORD

Subject: Japanese Labor for Chinese Mission

1. C/N from Hq Comdt dated 15 June 49 forwards a request from the Chinese Mission for 20 additional indigenous laborers.

2. The Chinese Mission's justification for this request indicates that the 10 laborers presently authorized their Mission is not adequate and the additional laborers are required for handling of coal, porter service and miscellaneous labor duties around the Mission.

3. Although the present manning tables authorized the Chinese Mission indicate a possibility of an excessive number of employees in certain facilities, without physically inspecting these facilities, the overall ratio of indigenous labor to the number accredited in the Chinese Mission compares favorably with other Allied Missions as indicated below:

MEMO FOR RECORD:

SUBJECT: Entry Clearance into Japan for Dependents of Members of the Chinese Mission

1. G-1 C/N to C/S, 25 Jan 49, subject, "Entry Clearance into Japan for Dependents of Members of the Chinese Mission" recommends that in response to a Chinese Mission request for entry clearance for 9 dependents, that the mission be informed that in view of the large number of dependents previously granted clearance into Japan, and since those clearances constituted the maximum quota of dependents, the request for entry of additional dependents is not favorably considered; however there is no objection to substitution on a one for one basis of individuals included in present request for individuals previously cleared, but who have not yet arrived in Japan.
2. Mission stated that of the nine dependents four were members of one family which it was desired to substitute for a family of two previously cleared or 4 for 2 basis. Personnel will be quartered in Osaka Consular Affairs Branch Office. No logistic support will be required. Chinese Mission facility in Osaka consists of 6 story bldg utilized as offices and billet. There are five apartments in the bldg all of which were occupied when last informed report was obtained from the Chinese Mission.
3. G-1 points out that as directed by the C/S the Mission was informed that the ceiling in numbers of dependents had been reached. Over 125 dependents have been cleared since the political and military situation in China commenced deteriorating. Facilities are greatly overcrowded as a result of the above clearances and granting this request would only aggravate the present situation with the possibility of SCAP being called upon to provide additional facilities despite assurances that further logistic support is not required.
4. In view of the above G-4 can perceive no objection to G-1 recommendation.
5. Action taken is within established policy.

(Project ED #1078)

1. By C/N (2) G-4 to Hq Comdt 27 July 48, G-4 requested that Hq Comdt take necessary action to construct a BOQ of approx 9,400 sq ft for the Chinese Mission. Certain modifications were made to a rough sketch to indicate the concept of the work G-4 intended to approve. G-4 cost estimate was \$91,450.

2. By C/N (1) Hq Comdt to Engr thru G-4, dtd 29 Oct 48, subject, "Construction, Request for Approval of: (Chinese Mission BOQ) (Project ED #1078)," Hq Comdt forwarded final plans for the proposed Chinese Mission BOQ quoting as authority the C/N cited in par 1 above. The estimated cost was \$64,351.

3. As there was no indication that the Chinese concurred in the construction plans (per instructions contained in par 3, C/N, G-4 to Hq Comdt 6 Aug 47, subject, "Rehabilitation of Facilities for Foreign Missions"), the project was returned to Hq Comdt for necessary action. By C/N (3) Hq Comdt to G-4 dtd 3 Dec 48, the project was returned indicating that the Chinese wanted certain changes which included raising the ceiling on the 1st and 2nd floors by one foot, rearranging the ladies and mens toilet, and adding two new bedroom doors.

4. By SCAP Memo, AG 620 (9 Jul 48)GD dtd 27 July 48, subject, "Bachelor Officers Quarters", command approval was accorded for the construction of the desired BOQ. However, in view of the time lapse between the approval & the current policy of reducing to a minimum expenditures which have an adverse effect on the Japanese economy, and also the fact that the proposed BOQ was to be used partially for an officers club and snack bar, the DS by C/N (1) dtd 3 Jan 1949, subject, "Bachelor Officers Quarters, Chinese Mission," was requested to inform the Chinese Mission that the approval formerly accorded this project is withdrawn. Consequently, instant C/N (4) to Hq Comdt cites the C/N to DS and returns the project without action. *3 Jan 49 → Hq. Comdt. has info. copy*
